# QUEENSLAND

Situated generally between 10° and 29° south latitude and between 138° and 154° east longitude, Queensland occupies the north-eastern portion of the Australian continent. Of the six States of the Commonwealth, Queensland ranks second in area and third in population.

<b>AREA</b>	1,732,700 square kilometres (including islands), equivalent to more than seven times the area of the United Kingdom, three times the area of France or one-fifth of the area of USA
<b>COASTLINE</b>	9,800 kilometres (including islands), 7,400 kilometres on the mainland
<b>CAPITAL CITY</b>	Brisbane, situated 16 kilometres from the sea
<b>TIME</b>	Eastern Standard Time, 10 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time
<b>1824</b>	First European settlement
<b>1859</b>	Colony separated from New South Wales
<b>1901</b>	State of the Commonwealth of Australia

Queensland is a constituent State of the Commonwealth of Australia, observing the Federal Constitution, and, while returning elected members to both upper and lower houses of the Federal Parliament, is governed by its own State Parliament. A further level of government, local government, derives its powers from Acts passed by the State Parliament.

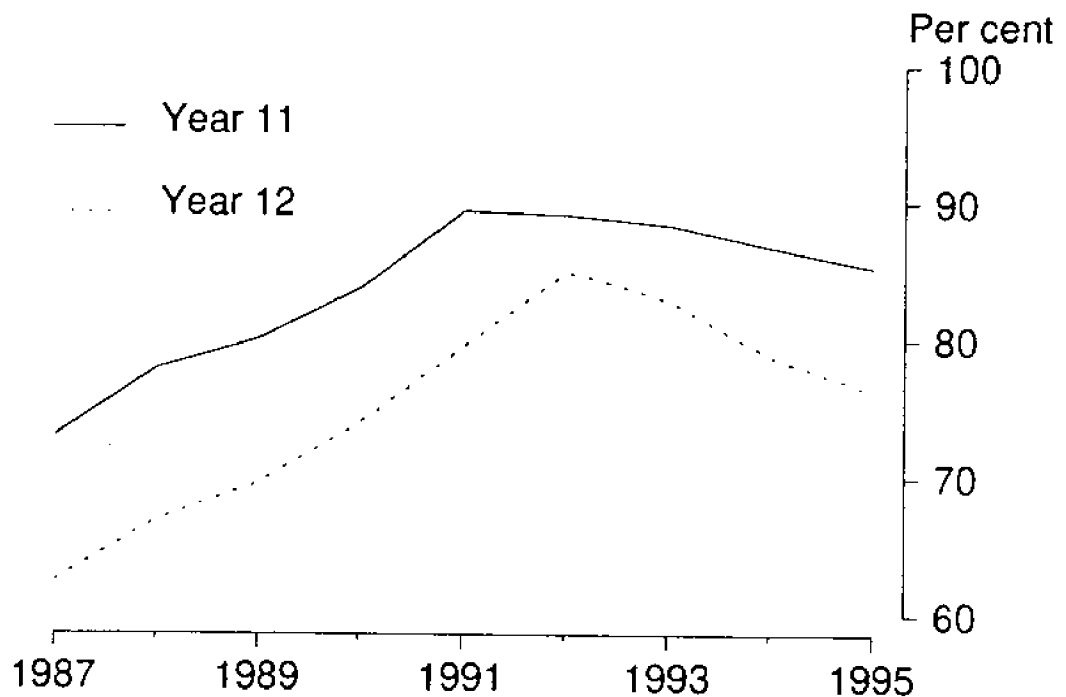

BY INDUSTRY, QUEENSLAND, 30 JUNE 1995**

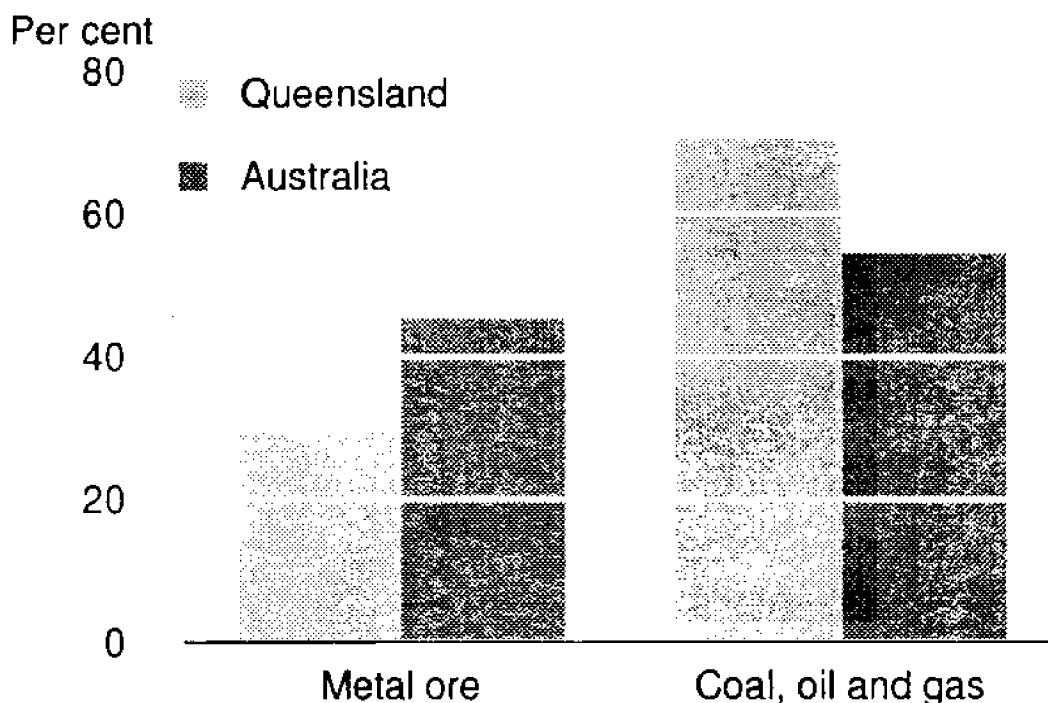

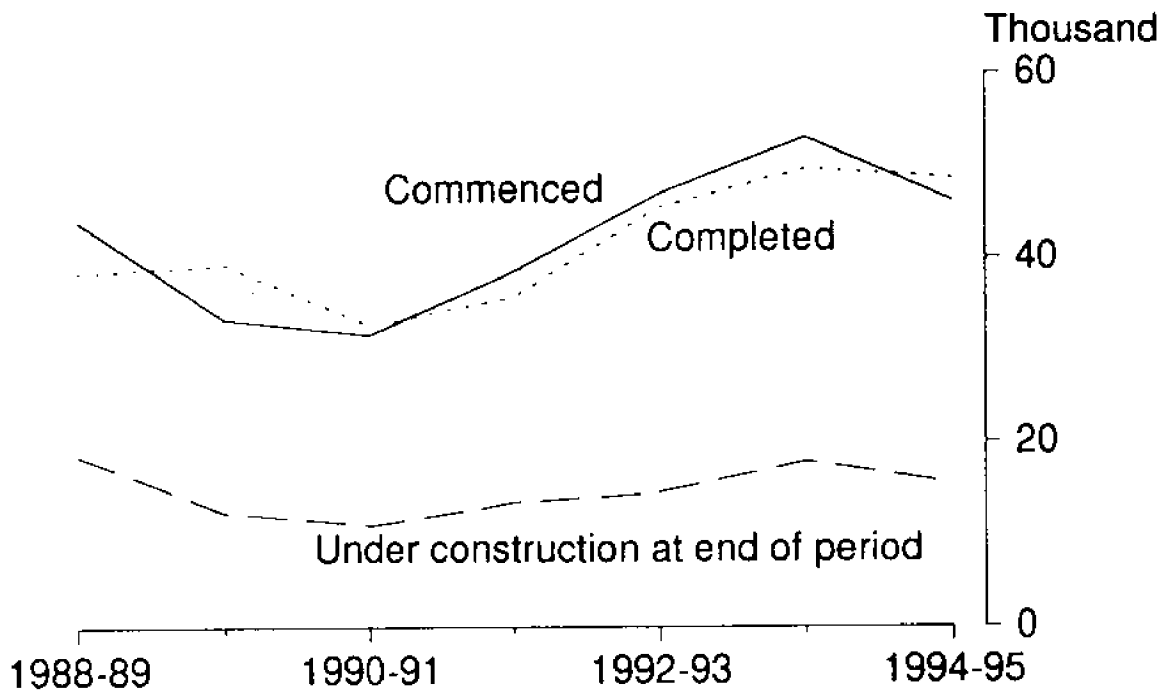

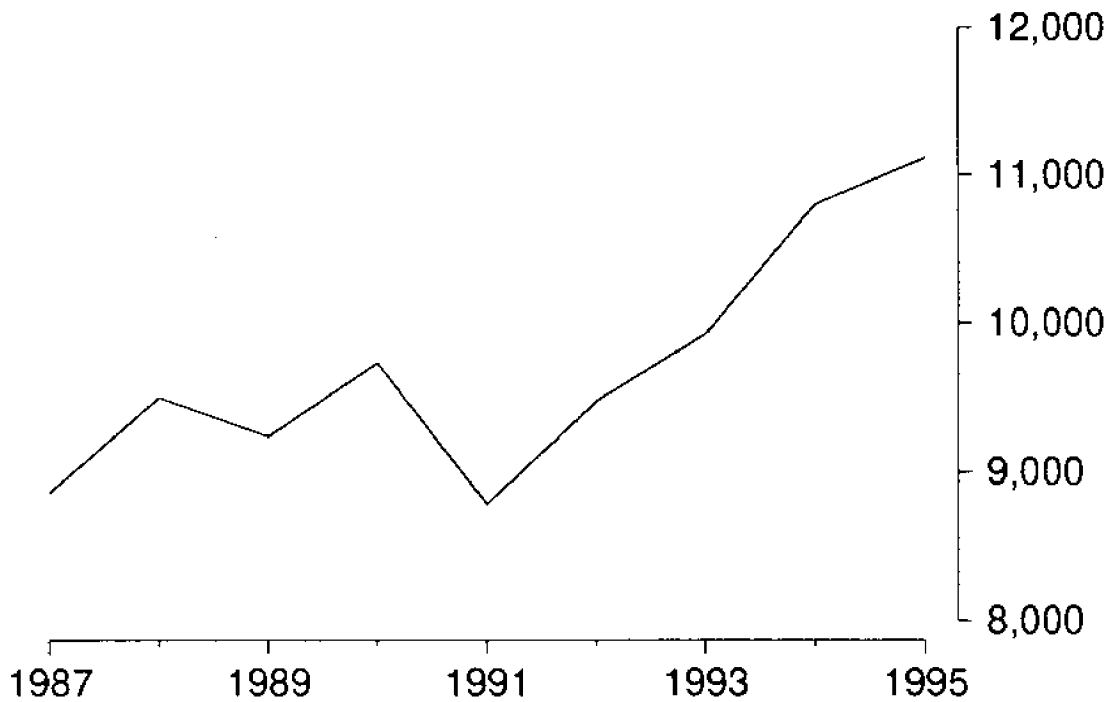

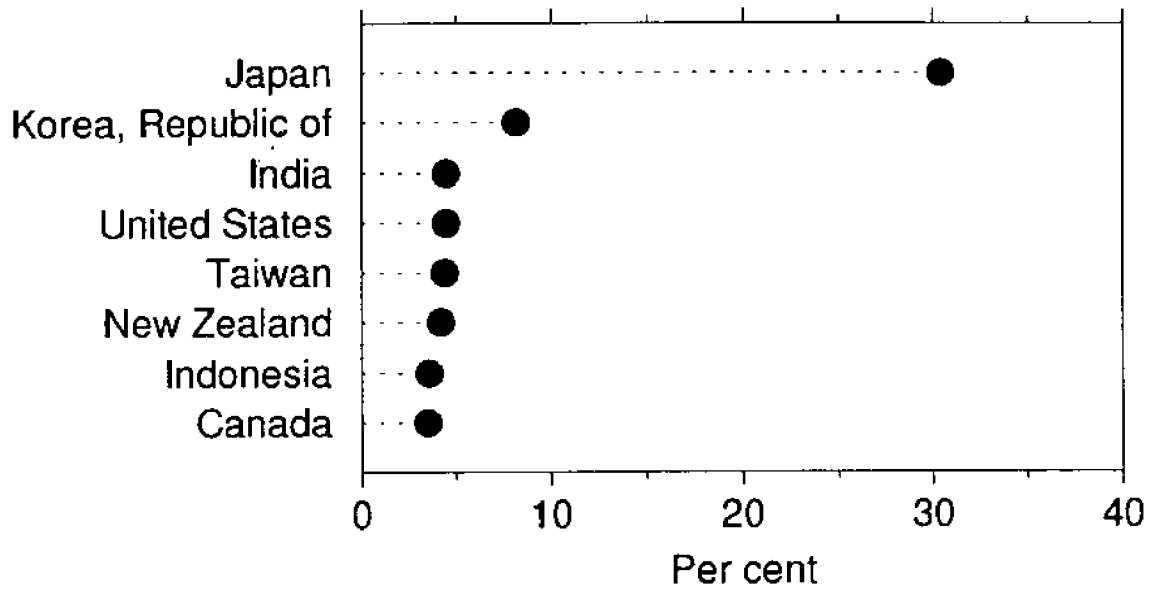

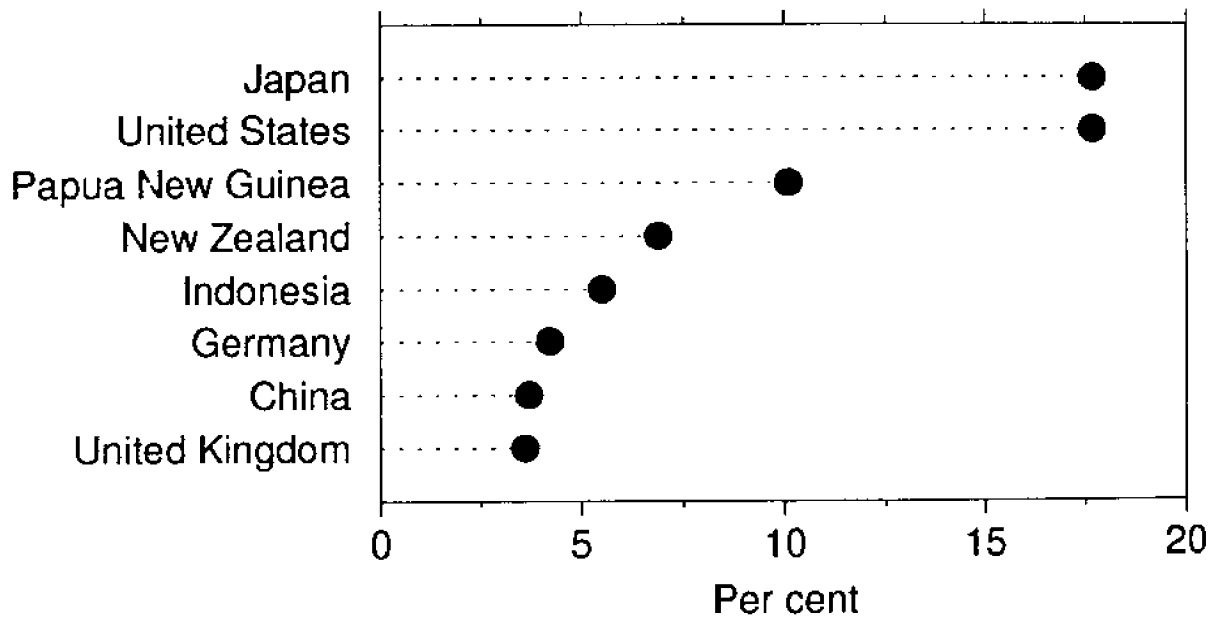

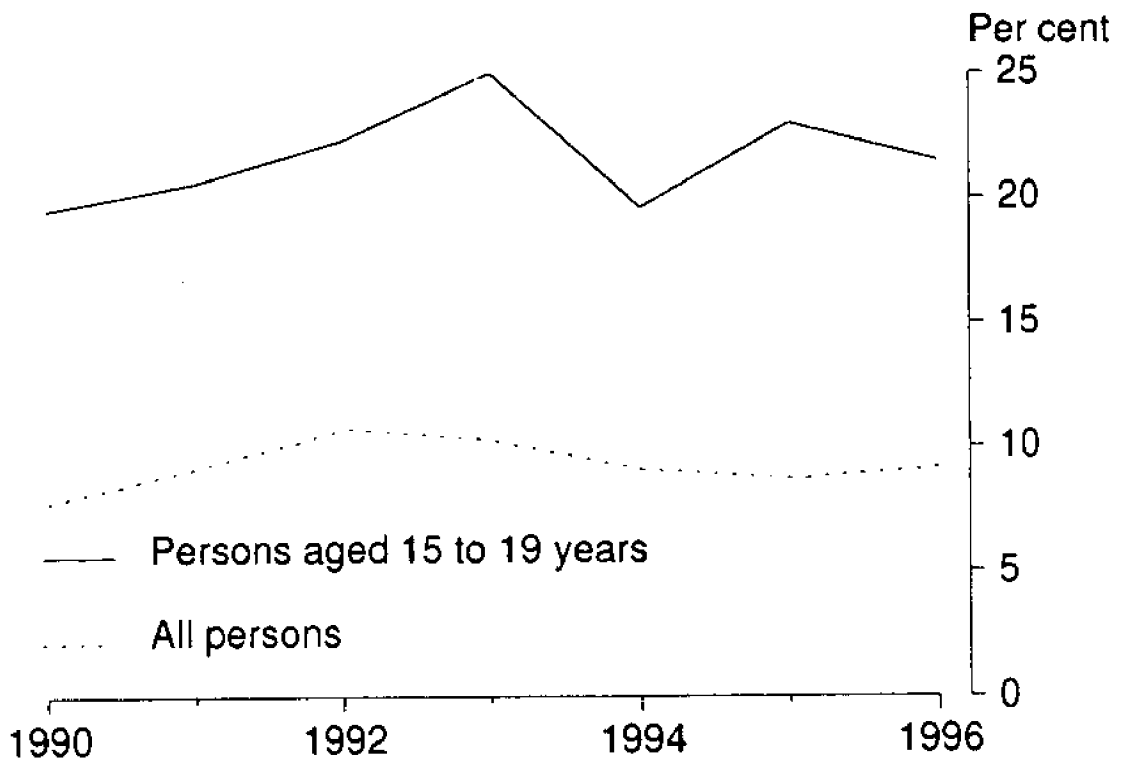
