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AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY BUSINESS INDICATORS, JANUARY 1995

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Series updated since the December 1994 issue are: population, labour force, job vacancies, industrial disputes; housing finance, building approvals, price index of house building materials, engineering construction; retail turnover; new motor vehicle registrations; and State accounts.

Notable movements in this issue include:

- Trend gross State product for the ACT increased by 1.1 per cent in the September quarter to \$2,363 million; recording the second lowest rate of growth of all States and Territories. Growth over the year to September increased for the ACT by 5.2 per cent. This was below the national rate of 7.7 per cent. In original terms, the ACT's gross State product declined by 2.4 per cent from the previous quarter and 0.1 per cent from the September quarter 1993. This compares with national increases of 2.5 per cent and 7.8 per cent, respectively.
- The estimated resident population of ACT at 30 June 1994 was 300,900; an increase of 0.2 per cent from the previous quarter. The same level of growth was also reported for Australia. Natural increase in the ACT rose from the previous quarter by 6.8 per cent, while net migration fell in the corresponding quarter. In annual terms (not published in *Business Indicators*), the ACT experienced its first net migration loss in 13 years (-504).
- Trend unemployment rate for the ACT remained steady at 7.5 per cent for the last two consecutive months from November 1994. In contrast, the national trend unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage points to 9.0 per cent in December 1994; the lowest rate since February 1994.
- Long-term unemployment in the ACT fell from 2,245 in October 1994 to 2,199 in November 1994; representing a decrease of 2.0 per cent. The proportion of total unemployment in the ACT, 22.2 per cent recorded an increase of 4.4 per cent in November 1994, compared to a decrease of

- 0.2 per cent nationally. However, from November 1993 the ACT reported a decrease of 4.1 per cent, above the national figure of 1.9 per cent.
- The trend series for the value of housing commitments in the ACT fell by 2.0 per cent in October 1994. This was less than the 3.2 per cent fall recorded nationally. The original estimates for the finance of construction of dwellings and purchase of established dwellings both fell, 34.4 and 12.0 per cent respectively, with the purchase of new dwellings remaining steady.
- Trend for total dwelling units approved continued to rise in the ACT, showing an increase of 1.9 per cent in November 1994. The ACT and Victoria are the only two State/Territories to show increases in the number of dwelling units approved, with the ACT having the highest increase during this period.
- The price index of house building materials for the ACT in October 1994 remained below that of the weighted average of the six capital cities, at the index point of 152.2 compared to 155.8. Both the ACT and Australia increased by 0.3 per cent from September 1994.
- The value of engineering construction work done during the September quarter 1994 increased by 28.0 per cent to reach \$53.9 million. This represented the highest increase across all States/Territories.
- Trend estimates of total retail turnover in the ACT increased for the fifth consecutive month to \$177.2 million in November 1994. The main contributors to this increase were clothing and soft good retailing, and household goods retailing (not published in *Business Indicators*) with both showing a 1.6 per cent growth from October 1994. Department stores, and hospitality and services declined by 0.4 per cent and 1.1 per cent, respectively, in the same period, contrary to the national trend.


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
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
 In trend terms, the number of new motor vehicles registered for the ACT decreased by 1.6 per cent from the previous period, to 883 vehicles in November 1994. The ACT had the highest fall compared to other States/Territories, with South Australia the only other State to show a decrease (0.5%). In the same period there was a national increase of 0.9 per cent.


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
