
Northern Territory (NT) comprises a land area of 1,346,200 square kilometres. It is the third largest of the States and Territories after Western Australia and Queensland, yet has the smallest population and population density.

Darwin the capital, has an estimated population of 90,011. It is the commercial and administrative centre of the territory. Mining, tourism and defence are the largest contributors to the NT economy. Darwin is as close to Singapore and Manila as it is to Sydney and Melbourne.

Alice Springs is the largest regional population centre outside Darwin and is the base for significant tourism activities in the central region. Tourism infrastructure is well developed in Alice Springs, Yulara and other local destinations and supports a growing number of visitors. Half of the Territory's 1,447,000 visitors in 1999–00 visited the Centre.
