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
Front cover: Twelve Apostles, Port Campbell — Tourism Victoria

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Victoria, located in the south-east of the Australian continent covers only about 3% of the country's area. The population is 4,521,800 – a population density of 20 persons per square km, which is the highest in Australia and is well above the national average of 2 persons per square km.

The capital city is Melbourne, with a population of 3,218.050. Its maximum average temperature ranges from 14.4°C in Winter to 25.1°C in Summer: its minimum average temperature ranges from 7°C in Winter to 13.7°C in Summer. Its average annual rainfall is 639mm.

This brochure provides only a snapshot of Victoria; more detail can be found in the variety of products released by the ABS, including the Victorian Year Book.
