

Victoria, located in the south-east of the Australian continent, has a population of 4,541,003. Although it is the second most populous State or Territory in the country, Victoria is ranked sixth in terms of geographic size and accounts for only 3% of Australia's total area.

The capital city is Melbourne, with a population of 3,248,811. Its maximum average temperature ranges from 14.4°C in winter to 25.1°C in summer; its minimum average temperature ranges from 7°C in winter to 13.7°C in summer. Its average annual rainfall is 642 mm.

This brochure provides only a snapshot of Victoria; more detail can be found in the variety of products released by the ABS, including the Victorian Year Book.
