Australia comprises a land area of 7 682 300 square kilometres. The land lies between latitudes 10°41'S. (Cape York) and 43°39'S. (South Cape, Tasmania) and between longitudes 113°09'E. (Sleep Point) and 153°39'E. (Cape Byron). The most southerly point on the mainland is South Point (Wilson's Promontory) 39°08'S.

Australia is composed of six States: New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania and two Territories: Northern Territory, Australian Capital Territory.
