Australia comprises a land area of 7,682,300 square kilometres. The land lies between latitudes 10° 41′ South (Cape York) and 43° 39′ South (South East Cape, Tasmania) and between longitudes 113° 09′ East (Steep Point) and 153° 39′ East (Cape Byron).

The area of Australia is almost as great as that of the United States of America (excluding Alaska), about 50% greater than Europe (excluding former USSR) and 32 times greater than the United Kingdom.

Australia is composed of six States: New South Wales (NSW), Victoria (Vic.), Queensland (Qld), South Australia (SA), Western Australia (WA), Tasmania (Tas.) and two Territories: the Northern Territory (NT) and the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). The longest river in Australia is the Murray River (2,520 kilometres), which forms a natural border between NSW and Vic. The highest mountain in Australia is Mount Kosciuszko, 2,230 metres, which is situated in NSW.
