

Australian Capital Territory at a Glance



In 1911, an area of 2,368 square kilometres was transferred to the Commonwealth of Australia by the State of New South Wales to become the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). The city of Canberra, Australia's national capital, is located in the northern part of this area, 300 km south-west of Sydney and 650 km north-east of Melbourne by road. On 11 May 1989 self-government for the Territory was proclaimed.

The ACT is the smallest of Australia's six States and two Territories but has the highest population density. It is the only State or Territory that has no sea borders.

CLIMATE OF THE ACT

(Lat. 35 19'S, Long. 149 11'E, Height above MSL 571 metres)

The weather in the ACT in 1997 was drier than normal with well above average daily maximum temperatures and a record average daily hours of sunshine. The year reflected typical weather patterns associated with the development of an El Nino event across the Pacific Ocean during the year.

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
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
