





PREFACE

This publication presents a range of social and housing statistics produced from the 1996 Census of Population and Housing for the Australian Capital Territory and its regions. Together with census population counts, it includes tables of selected census data which describe the characteristics of people living in each area and their housing arrangements. Similar publications are available for each State/Territory, and nationally.

Detailed characteristics from the 1996 Census are being released in two stages. The first release consists of demographic, social and housing data. The second release, comprising family and labour force related data, will be provided progressively State by State from August 1997.

The data presented in this publication relate to where people were enumerated on census night. They should not be confused with the official estimated resident population (ERP) figures, which are derived by including in the census usual residence counts the following:

- estimates of Australians overseas;
- an adjustment for estimated underenumeration; and
- adjustments for births, deaths and migration, between 30 June and 6 August 1996.

Census data presented in this publication represent only a selection of the full range of statistics that could be derived from the census. For further information about other census or ABS data refer to the Appendix — Census Products and Services, or the *Directory of Census Statistics* (Cat. no. 2910.0). Concepts and definitions used in this publication are explained in the Glossary and more detailed information is available in the *Census Dictionary* (Cat. no. 2901.0).

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

TERRITORY OVERVIEW

The 1996 Census of Population and Housing counted 299,243 people in the Australian Capital Territory (ACT) on census night, 94.9% (284,019) of whom were counted at home. This represents a growth of 6.8% in the ACT population count since 1991 (280,096).

The number of people counted in occupied private dwellings also increased by 6.8%, from 268,106 to 286,468. Over the same time period, however, the average number of people per occupied private dwelling declined, from an occupancy rate of 2.9 to 2.7 people per dwelling. This reflects the trend in the ACT towards single person and two-adult households in particular.

AGE

The ACT's age structure is relatively stable with a median age of 30 years in 1996, compared to 29 years in 1991. Close to a quarter (22.5%) of its population in 1996 were aged 0–14 years, 17.3% were aged 15–24, 32.6% were aged 25–44, 19.9% were aged 45–64 and 7.0% were aged 65 years and over.

BIRTHPLACE

The majority (74.3%) of people counted in the ACT were Australian-born. Of those people who were born overseas, around a third (33.9%) were from the United Kingdom, Ireland or New Zealand; the remaining two-thirds were predominantly from Europe and the former USSR, with a small component from Asia.

INDIGENOUS ORIGIN

The number of people who reported being of Indigenous origin increased by 81.9% between 1991 and 1996, from 1,593 to 2,898. The proportion of Indigenous people of the total ACT population increased from 0.6% in 1991 to 1.0% in 1996. This increase is partly explained by people's increased willingness to declare their Indigenous origin, and partly due to a net population increase, including from migration.

EDUCATION

Participation in post secondary education in the ACT was high with 10.3% (30,379) of people attending a Technical or Further Educational Institution, university or other tertiary institution.

INCOME

The median weekly personal income for people aged 15 years and over in 1996 was \$430 (approximately \$22,360 per annum). The corresponding findings for 1991 were \$398 (\$20,696).

DWELLINGS

There has been an increase in the past 5 years in the proportion of homes owned by their occupants. Almost one in three (29.5%) occupied private dwellings were owner-occupied, compared to a quarter (24.9%) in 1991. This increase was offset by a similar decrease in the proportion of dwellings being purchased by their occupants (from 38.3% to 34.5% respectively), while the proportion of dwellings being rented remained stable at around one-third.

REGIONAL OVERVIEW

SEX

Although overall there were only slightly more females than males counted in the ACT (50.6% and 49.4% of the total ACT population respectively), there were several Statistical Local Areas (SLAs) with distinct imbalances in their sex ratios.

The distribution of females was similar across ACT's Statistical Subdivisions (SSDs). In terms of SLAs, however, the following areas recorded a notably higher proportion of females than males: Deakin (57.2%), Ainslie (55.5%), Bruce (53.3%), Nicholls (53.0%) and Narrabundah (52.9%). Deakin, Ainslie and Narrabundah were also characterised by a relatively high proportion of females aged 65 years and over, which reflects their longer life expectancy and the location of accommodation facilities for the aged.

North Canberra contained a significant proportion of males in Majura (63.2%), City (59.4%), Braddon (54.6%) and Acton (53.9%). Outside of North Canberra, suburbs with high male proportions included the defence force bases of Duntroon (71.9%), Harman (68.3%) and Symonston (61.7%). The Parliamentary Circle, Barton also had a high proportion of males (62.6%), many of whom were professionals staying close to parliament. The outskirt suburbs of the ACT contained high concentrations of males, including Fyshwick (75.0%), Oaks Estate (66.3%), Remainder of ACT (63.9%), Tuggeranong SSD Bal (59.7%), Jerrabomberra (59.1%) and Stromlo (55.1%).

AGE

The geographic distribution of median age strongly reflects ACT's settlement patterns. Areas with a higher median age were generally the longest established and recorded a relatively high proportion of the elderly. Newer areas generally recorded a much younger age profile.

Woden Valley and South Canberra, being the oldest SSDs in the ACT, recorded the highest median ages (36 and 35 years respectively) and contained high proportions of people aged 65 years and over (11.3% and 14.7% respectively). Particularly high concentrations of people in this age group were recorded in the SLAs of Deakin (20.8%), Red Hill (18.8%), Campbell (17.3%), Ainslie (17.1%), Narrabundah (16.2%) and Yarralumla (15.2%). To some extent these proportions also reflect the presence of nursing homes/hostels and retirement villages.

In contrast, areas with a lower than average median age occurred where there were residential colleges/halls of residence attached to tertiary or other training institutions, for example, Acton (20 years), Duntroon (20), Bruce (23) and Harman (25). Town Centres or areas close to transport and other facilities also recorded lower than average median ages, including Belconnen Town Centre (24) and Phillip (Woden Town Centre) (28).

Areas with the highest proportion of young people (those aged 0–14 years) recorded the lowest median ages and were primarily located in the new suburbs of Tuggeranong (28 years) and Gungahlin-Hall (27). Some of the older areas of the ACT also recorded slight increases in their proportions of 0–14 year olds since 1991, suggesting some regeneration in these suburbs.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

BIRTHPLACE

Overseas-born

The overseas-born were fairly evenly distributed throughout the ACT. At the SSD level, the proportion of people born overseas varied within a relatively narrow margin, between 19.1% in Tuggeranong to 27.4% in Woden Valley.

At the SLA level, in Woden Valley, the highest proportions of overseas-born people were recorded in O'Malley (37.0%), Hughes (31.9%), Lyons (30.1%), Isaacs (29.0%), Garran (28.9%) and Chifley (28.7%). In North Canberra and Belconnen, a large number of overseas-born students contributed to the high proportions of those born overseas. These areas included Turner (33.1%), Acton (29.5%), Braddon (27.5%), Belconnen Town Centre (29.6%), Bruce (27.8%) and Macquarie (27.4%).

SPEAKS ANOTHER LANGUAGE AT HOME

People who reported speaking a language other than English at home were mainly recent arrivals from Asia, particularly NE Asia. Some of the earlier immigrant groups, such as those from Greece, Italy and Croatia also speak their native language at home.

The distribution of people who speak another language at home was similar to that of overseas-born people, with particular concentrations close to the two tertiary campuses in North Canberra and Belconnen. These included the areas of Turner (22.2%), Acton (21.1%), Belconnen Town Centre (21.8%) and Bruce (20.8%), reflecting the high proportion of overseas-born students. Other areas with high concentrations were O'Malley (38.8%), McKellar (28.4%), Palmerston (25.9%), Florey (23.0%), Isaacs (21.7%) and Nicholls (21.3%).

INDIGENOUS ORIGIN

The increase since 1991 in the proportion of people reporting to be of Indigenous origin was relatively uniform across Canberra's SSDs.

South Canberra and Tuggeranong had the highest proportions of people reporting to be of Indigenous origin: 1.5% (342 people) and 1.1% (937), representing an increase from 0.8% and 0.6% respectively in 1991.

At the SLA level, Narrabundah and Kambah had particularly high proportions of people reporting to be of Indigenous origin (2.6% and 1.6% respectively).

INCOME

Gungahlin-Hall recorded the highest median personal weekly income of \$503, followed by the older SSDs of South Canberra (\$481), Woden Valley and Tuggeranong (both \$460). At the SLA level, the highest median incomes were primarily found in the established areas of South Canberra SSD, including Forrest (\$683), Kingston (\$593), Barton (\$559), Griffith (\$544) and Yarralumla (\$542).

Particularly high median personal weekly incomes were recorded in areas close to the town centres, including City (\$762) and Phillip (\$568). Other concentrations of high personal income were found in all SLAs of Gungahlin-Hall; and some suburbs of Tuggeranong, including Greenway (\$549), Fadden (\$533), Macarthur (\$524) and Conder (\$515). Finally, ACT's outskirt suburbs recorded high personal incomes, including Harman (\$665), Majura (\$651) and Stromlo (\$566).

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

Areas with the lowest median personal incomes were primarily located close to residential colleges/halls of residence attached to tertiary or other training institutions. These included Turner (\$279), Belconnen Town Centre (\$275), Braddon (\$272), Bruce (\$192) and Acton (\$130), reflecting the high proportion of students. Other areas to report low personal incomes included Oaks Estate (\$252), O'Connor (\$302), Ainslie (\$313), Charnwood (\$322) and Narrabundah (\$332). The relatively high concentration of low income earners in these areas was due, in part, to high proportions of elderly people and/or young people.

TENURE TYPE

There have been significant increases in levels of home ownership in all SSDs since 1991, with the exception of Gungahlin-Hall, the newest SSD. The largest proportional increase occurred in Weston Creek-Stromlo, reporting an increase from 30.3% of dwellings being owner-occupied in 1991 to 38.2% in 1996. This was followed by Belconnen (from 25.2% to 32.4%), and Woden Valley (from 30.0% to 36.4%).

Areas with particularly high proportions of owner-occupied dwellings included most areas of Woden Valley, especially O'Malley (61.1%) and Isaacs (44.9%); most areas of Weston Creek-Stromlo and of Belconnen; and Hall (50.5%). Some areas in South Canberra also recorded high proportions of owner-occupied dwellings, including Symonston (59.5%), Forrest (51.2%), Deakin (44.6%) and Red Hill (40.7%).

Over the same time period, there were decreases in the proportion of dwellings being purchased in all SSDs, with the exception of Gungahlin-Hall. High proportions of dwellings being purchased were located in the new suburbs in Gungahlin-Hall; the newer development areas of Belconnen, especially Dunlop (75.3%), Fraser (50.5%) and MacGregor (47.4%); and all suburbs of Tuggeranong.

The major areas containing rented dwellings were located close to the town centres of Canberra, and near Parliament House. High proportions of rented dwellings specifically occurred in all areas of North Canberra (48.1%) which are close to the city centre; areas in Belconnen (30.4%) in or close to the Belconnen Town Centre such as Florey (40.0%) and Macquarie (39.3%); most of South Canberra (44.3%) such as Barton (75.2%) and Kingston (71.5%). However, in Tuggeranong only Greenway (65.2%) had a high proportion of rented dwellings.

RENT PAYMENTS

Amounts paid in rent had not increased greatly since the 1991 Census; median payments rising from \$142 to \$150 per week.

HOUSING LOAN REPAYMENTS

Over the same period, median housing loan repayments increased by 45.6%, from \$634 to \$923 per month. South Canberra and Gungahlin-Hall recorded the highest median housing loan repayment (\$1,040 each), followed by Tuggeranong (\$964).

South Canberra, Woden Valley and North Canberra recorded the largest increases in median housing loan repayments between 1991 and 1996, with increases of 83.7%, 68.8% and 67.1%. In contrast, Gungahlin-Hall and Tuggeranong recorded modest increases in their median housing loan repayments over the same period (30.3% and 27.0%), partly explained by their already high median repayment figures.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

SCOPE AND COVERAGE

- 1** The 1996 Census of Population and Housing was held on 6 August 1996. The first census was held in 1911 and since 1961 a census has been taken every five years, a frequency which is specified in the *Census and Statistics Act 1905*. The objective of the census is to measure accurately the number and key characteristics of people in Australia on census night, and the dwellings in which they live.
- 2** The census aims to count every person who spent census night in Australia. This includes Australian residents in Antarctica and people in the territories of Jervis Bay, Cocos (Keeling) Islands and Christmas Island. The other Australian External Territories, Norfolk Island and minor islands such as Heard and McDonald Islands, are outside the scope of the Australian Census. The only group of people who spend census night in Australia but are excluded from the census are foreign diplomats and their families.
- 3** The census includes people on vessels in or between Australian ports, on board long distance trains, buses or aircraft and on oil or gas rigs off the Australian coast. People entering Australia before midnight on census night are counted while people leaving an Australian port for an overseas destination before midnight on census night are not. Visitors to Australia are included regardless of how long they have been in the country or how long they plan to stay. However, for people who intend to be in Australia less than six months only basic demographic data are available. The census includes people camping out and the homeless.
- 4** All private dwellings, except diplomatic dwellings, are included in the census, whether occupied or unoccupied. Caravans in caravan parks, manufactured homes in manufactured home estates and self-care units in accommodation for the retired or aged are counted only if occupied. Occupied non-private dwellings, such as hospitals, prisons, hotels, etc. are also included.
- 5** Details about the 1996 Census content, collection operations, confidentiality and privacy protection, processing and evaluation activities are contained in *1996 Census of Population and Housing: Nature and Content of the Census* (Cat. no. 2008.0).

- 6** Tables numbered B01 to B16 contained in this publication are from the 1996 Census Basic Community Profile (Cat. no. 2901.0-8). These tables are available in hardcopy or electronic format for all standard census geographic areas. For more information about the Community Profiles please refer to the Appendix.

ABS POPULATION ESTIMATES

- 7** This publication contains population counts based on where people were counted on census night, which may not have been where they usually lived. The census can provide person counts based on place of usual residence at the geographic level of Statistical Local Area (SLA).
- 8** Official ABS population estimates (estimated resident population) are also separately available from the ABS. The estimates are based on census counts that have been adjusted to:
 - include people who were in Australia on census night but were missed in the census;
 - include Australian residents who were temporarily overseas on census night (these people were not within scope of the census); and
 - exclude overseas visitors counted in the census who were not usual residents of Australia.
- 9** The adjusted census count is then updated quarterly using demographic statistics. These are statistics on births, deaths, and overseas and internal migration.

EXPLANATORY NOTES *continued*

ABS POPULATION ESTIMATES *continued*

10 ABS population estimates are published in *Australian Demographic Statistics* (Cat. no. 3101.0), produced quarterly, and in *Estimated Resident Population by Sex and Age: States and Territories of Australia* (Cat. no. 3201.0) produced annually.

11 The ABS also provides projections (based on different assumptions as to future fertility, mortality and migration) of the resident population of Australia, States and Territories. These projections are published biennially in *Projections of the Populations of Australia, States and Territories* (Cat. no. 3222.0).

DATA LIMITATIONS

12 Census data are subject to a number of inaccuracies resulting from errors by respondents or mistakes in collection or processing. Whilst many of these are corrected by careful processing procedures, some still remain. The effect of the remaining errors is generally slight, although it may be more important for small groups in the population. The main kinds of error to keep in mind are:

- *Partial non-response*: In some cases where an answer is not provided to a question an answer is imputed (often from other information on the form). In other cases a 'not stated' code is allocated.
- *Processing error*: While such errors can occur in any processing system, quality management is used continuously to improve the quality of processed data, and to identify and correct data of unacceptable quality.
- *Random adjustment*: Table cells containing small values are randomly adjusted or suppressed to avoid releasing information about particular individuals, families, or households. The effects of these adjustments are statistically insignificant.
- *Respondent error*: Because processing procedures cannot detect or repair all errors made by people in completing the forms, some remain in final data.
- *Undercount*: Although the census aims to count each person, there are some people who are missed and others are counted more than once. The data in this publication are not adjusted for the net undercount.

13 Further information on data quality is provided progressively in *Census Update* and in *1996 Census Data Quality Working Papers*.

OVERSEAS VISITORS

14 Data for overseas visitors (who intend to be in Australia for less than six months) are restricted to age, sex and marital status. In this publication overseas visitors contribute only to the male, female and total person counts.

CALCULATIONS OF PROPORTIONS

15 When calculating the proportion of the population with a particular characteristic 'Not stated' responses are included in the denominator. For example, in the Summary of Findings, the *Proportion of Australian-born* was calculated by dividing the number of persons who stated that they were Australian-born by the total population (including those who did not report their birthplace) and expressing the result as a percentage.

CALCULATION OF MEDIANS

16 A median is a measure of central tendency. It is a mid value which divides a population distribution into two, with half the observations falling below it and half above it. Unlike averages (means) medians are not usually skewed by extreme observations.

EXPLANATORY NOTES *continued*

CALCULATION OF MEDIAN *continued*

17 There are a number of issues to be aware of:

- The categories 'Not stated', 'Overseas visitor', and 'Not applicable' are not included in the calculation of medians.
- If a median falls into a category that has a text only label then the median is set to 0. For this publication this is only relevant to the calculation of median personal income, as the income classification includes categories 'Nil income' and 'Negative income'.
- If the median is calculated on a classification containing ranges and a range is open-ended and the median falls within that category, the median is set to the number in the label. For example, in the calculation of median personal income, if the median falls in the last range '\$1,500 or more', \$1,500 is allocated as the median.

UNADJUSTED DOLLARS

18 The 1991 Census dollar values for Median Personal Income, Median Housing Loan Repayments and Median Rent Paid have not been adjusted into 1996 dollars.

GLOSSARY

General descriptions of terms and concepts used in this publication are provided below. Tables are also footnoted where applicable for additional clarity. Detailed definitions of classifications and concepts are available in the *1996 Census Dictionary* (Cat. no. 2901.0).

Dwelling A dwelling is a building or structure in which people live. This can be a building, such as a house; part of a building, such as a flat; or it can be a caravan or tent, humpy or park bench. Houses under construction, derelict houses, vacant tents, or converted garages, are not counted in the census.

There are private and non-private dwellings.

A private dwelling is normally a house, flat, part of a house, or even a room; but can also be a house attached to, or rooms above, shops or offices; an occupied caravan or unit in a caravan park or craft in a marina; occupied dwelling in a Manufactured Home Estate; occupied self-care unit in Accommodation for the Retired or Aged; a houseboat; or tent if it is standing on its own block of land. An occupied caravan situated on a residential allotment is also classed as a private dwelling. Private dwellings can be either occupied or unoccupied.

Non-private dwellings are those dwellings not included above, which provide a communal or transitory type of accommodation. These dwellings include hotels, motels, guest houses, prisons, religious and charitable institutions, defence establishments, hospitals and other communal dwellings. Only occupied non-private dwellings are included in the census.

Geographic areas The tables in this publication are at the levels of Statistical Local Area, Statistical Subdivision and Statistical Division, as defined by the 1996 Census edition of the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC).

Statistical Local Area (SLA): These areas consist of one or more whole Census Collection Districts (CDs) and cover, in aggregate, the whole of Australia without gaps or overlaps.

SLAs correspond in many cases to Local Government Areas (LGAs). The main exceptions are:

- where the boundaries of one or more Statistical Subdivisions (SSDs) cut across an LGA, the LGA is split into two or more parts, each of which forms a separate SLA;
- where a particular LGA is substantially different from other LGAs in terms of size and economic significance, or in terms of user needs for statistics, the LGA may be split into two or more SLAs. For example, the City of Brisbane covers a large area and is split into 163 SLAs while most LGAs in Victoria are split into two or more SLAs following the recent restructuring of local government in that State;
- where an area is unincorporated (i.e. not part of an LGA) an SLA is created.

Local Government Area (LGA): LGAs are spatial units which represent the whole undivided geographic area of responsibility of either:

- an incorporated local government council; or
- an incorporated community government council (CGC) where the CGC is of sufficient size and statistical significance.

LGAs cover only part of Australia. The major areas not covered by LGAs are the large northern parts of South Australia, most of the Northern Territory, and all of the Australian Capital Territory and Other Territories. For the 1996 Census, LGA boundaries are as defined on 5 August 1995 and included in the 1996 Edition of the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC) (effective 1 July 1996).

GLOSSARY *continued*

Geographic areas *continued*

Statistical Subdivision (SSD): These areas consist of one or more SLAs and cover, in aggregate, the whole of Australia without gaps or overlaps.

Statistical Division (SD): These areas consist of one or more SSDs and cover, in aggregate, the whole of Australia without gaps or overlaps. They do not cross State or Territory boundaries. However, the Other Territories, Jervis Bay Territory and the Territories of Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands together form one SD. Capital city SDs are predominantly urban in character and the boundaries are delineated to contain the anticipated urban development of the capital cities (and associated urban centres) for a period of at least 20 years.

SDs outside the capital city are designed to be relatively homogeneous regions characterised by identifiable social and economic links between the inhabitants and the economic units in the region, under the unifying influence of one or more major towns or cities.

State/Territory (STE): States and Territories consist of one or more SDs and are the largest type of spatial unit in the ASGC. The six Australian States and five Territories which are part of geographic Australia and included in the 1996 ASGC are New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, Northern Territory, Australian Capital Territory, Jervis Bay Territory and the external Territories of Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands. 
Income	People aged 15 years or more are asked to state their usual gross weekly income, which is the income before tax, superannuation, health insurance, or other deductions are made. Gross income includes family allowance, family allowance supplement, pensions, unemployment benefits, student allowances, maintenance (child support), superannuation, wages, salary, overtime, dividends, rents received, interest received, business or farm income (less operation expenses) and worker's compensation received.


Indigenous A person is defined to be of Indigenous origin if he or she identifies himself or herself as of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander origin.

Overseas-born Overseas-born people are those who state that they were born in a country other than Australia, those born at sea, and those whose responses are classed as 'Inadequately described' or 'Not elsewhere classified'.


AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY — STATISTICAL DIVISIONS, 1996 EDITION




