INTRODUCTION

The 2001 Census Household Sample File (HSF) is a 1% sample of private dwellings, with their associated family and person records, and a 1% sample of persons from all non-private dwellings together with a record for the non-private dwelling.

The data were collected on census night, 7 August 2001.

The data are available through Confidentialised Unit Record Files (CURF) released with the approval of the Australian Statistician. Subject to the limitations of sample size and the data classifications used, the CURF will enable purchasers to tabulate, manipulate and analyse data to their own specifications. More detailed information to assist in using the CURF and in interpreting the data is provided in the documentation accompanying the file or otherwise through the ABS web site.

Two versions of the CURF are available: a Basic CURF available on CD-ROM or accessed through the Remote Access Data Laboratory (RADL) and an Expanded CURF available through the RADL only. Unless otherwise indicated the term CURF has been used to apply to both the Basic CD-ROM and Expanded RADL versions of the HSF.

The RADL is an on-line database query system, under which microdata are held on a server at the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), to which users can submit programs to interrogate, analyse, model, etc. the data, and can access the results. For further information about this facility see the ABS web site, Products and Services, Access to ABS CURFs.

The RADL CURF contains similar information to the CD-ROM CURF, except that some items are shown in more detail. Both the Basic CD-ROM and Expanded RADL versions of the CURF are available in SAS and SPSS. If you obtain a copy of the CD-ROM and your analysis software is other than SAS or SPSS you may require the services of a computer programmer to use the ASCII file version of the data. The RADL can only be accessed in SAS and SPSS at this time. It is anticipated that both CURFs will be available in STATA in the future.

ABOUT THE MICRODATA

The data are released under the *Census and Statistics Act 1905* which has provision for the release of data in the form of unit records where the information is not likely to enable the identification of a particular person. Accordingly there are no names or addresses of respondents on the CURF and other steps have been taken to protect the confidentiality of respondents. These include:

- removing some classifications from the CURF
- reducing the level of detail shown on the CURF for some other classifications
- changing some characteristics within individual records.

To ensure confidentiality to large households the number of records for each household was reduced to six persons in the CD-ROM version or eight persons in the RADL version of the CURF. As a consequence approximately 1,000 individual records in the CD-ROM version and 200 individual records in the RADL version were excluded by removing:

- one or more extra families sharing the same household
- randomly selected individual records from group households
- randomly selected individual records from families and recoding them as those of persons temporarily absent from the household.

ABOUT THE MICRODATA continued

Intending purchasers should ensure that the data they require, at the level of detail they require, are available on the CURF; data obtained in the census but not contained on the CURF may be available in tabulated form on request.

The CD-ROM version contains data on 75,451 dwellings, 79,320 families and 188,013 persons.

The RADL version contains data on 75,450 dwellings, 79,541 families and 189,182 persons.

SAMPLING ERROR

As this file contains a sample of records, estimates will be subject to sampling error. Information about sampling errors associated with statistics produced from the 2001 HSF including relative standard errors are detailed in Appendix 2.

WEIGHTS

For all person, family and dwelling data from private dwellings, estimates from the HSF are derived by multiplying the number of records on the sample file by 100.

For persons within non-private dwellings, estimates from the HSF are derived by multiplying the number of records on the sample file by 100.

For dwelling data, where these dwellings are non-private dwellings, estimates from the HSF are derived by multiplying the number of records on the sample file by 4.07.

For further explanation, refer to Appendix 2.

GEOGRAPHIC AREAS

Geographic regions are described in Appendixes 3 and 7. These are Statistical Regions (SRs), or aggregates of SRs, as defined in the ABS publication *Statistical Geography:* Volume 1 — Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC), 2001 (cat. no. 1216.0).

To ensure that the information on the file is not likely to enable identification of a person, all regions have been designed so that they have a minimum population of 250,000 in the CD-ROM version (except for the Northern Territory) and 124,000 in RADL. All regions shown in Appendixes 3 and 7 can be aggregated to the state level.

Records have been randomly ordered within a region to further reduce the likelihood of individual identification.

Other Territories — comprising Jervis Bay, Cocos (Keeling) and Chrismas Islands — has been excluded.

RECORD TYPES

Data from the 2001 Census of Population and Housing are contained in three types of record: dwelling, family and person records. In this file each record is identifiable by the value in the first field on the record. This field, 'record type', has three possible values:

- 1 Dwelling record
- 2 Family record
- 3 Person record

RECORD STRUCTURES

The data in the HSF are hierarchically structured in dwelling, family and person record order for all fields. The number of fields and their respective classification categories on the file are limited to those shown in Appendixes 4 and 8.

The classification structures appearing in Appendixes 5 and 9 show the codes used to describe the values within each field on the file. Within each record, the data are comma separated and the fields ordered as shown in Appendixes 6 and 10 for each record type.

DATA FIELDS

The full classification structures for all HSF fields can be found in the *Census Dictionary*, 2001 (cat. no. 2901.0).

The classifications to be included on the HSF have been collapsed to ensure that confidentiality of the records included on the file is not compromised.

For the 2001 Census, overseas visitors are separately categorised in standard tabulations (where the table population is 'all persons' and with the exception of the Age, Sex and Marital Status tables). For overseas visitors, only the variables Age (AGEP), Sex (SEXP) and Registered Marital Status (MSTP) are available. In all other person variables an Overseas visitor category appears in order to separately designate overseas visitors when compiling tables.

CONDITIONS OF RELEASE

The HSF CURF is released in accordance with a Ministerial Determination (Clause 7, Statutory Rules 1983, no. 19) in pursuance of section 13 of the *Census and Statistics Act* 1905. As required by the Determination, the CURF has been designed so that the information on the file is not likely to enable the identification of the particular person to which it relates.

All organisations and individuals within organisations who request access to the CURF will, prior to being granted access to the CURF, be required to read the *Responsible Access to ABS Confidentialised Unit Record Files (CURFs) Training Manual*, (available on the ABS web site, Products and Services, Access to ABS CURFs page) and sign an Organisational or Individual Undertaking to abide by the legislative restrictions on use. The Australian Statistician's approval is required for each release of the CURF. Persons who purchase or access the HSF CURF are required to give an undertaking which includes, among other conditions, that in using the data they will:

- use the information only for statistical purposes
- not attempt to identify particular persons or organisations
- not disclose, either directly or indirectly, the information to any other person or organisations
- not attempt to match the information with any other unit level list of persons.

Use of the data for statistical purposes means use, by persons who have signed the Undertaking, to produce information of a statistical nature. Examples of statistical purposes are:

- manipulation of the data to produce means, correlations or other descriptive or summary measures
- estimation of population characteristics
- use of data as input to mathematical models or for other types of analysis (e.g. factor analysis)
- provision of graphical or pictorial representations of the characteristics of the population or subsets of the population.

Use of the data for unauthorised purposes may render the user or their organisation liable to severe penalties. Advice about the propriety of any particular intended use of the data is available from the contact officer in your organisation. All information required to apply for and understand the use of CURFs is available on the ABS web site, Products and Services, Access to ABS CURFs page.

CONDITIONS OF SALE

PRICE

The price of the 2001 HSF Basic CURF on CD-ROM or Expanded CURF on RADL is \$8,000 at release date, including freight and handling charges as appropriate. An administrative fee of \$420 applies to change from either method of access to the other or to apply for access to both Basic and Expanded CURFs.

While the utmost care is taken in handling each CURF on CD-ROM, deterioration may occur between the time of copying and receipt of the file. Accordingly, if the CD-ROM is unreadable on receipt and this is reported to ABS within 30 days of receipt, it will be replaced free of charge.

HOW TO ORDER

All clients wishing to access the HSF CURFs should refer to the ABS web site, Products and Services, Access to ABS CURFs and read the *Responsible Access to ABS Confidentialised Unit Record Files (CURFs) Training Manual*, and other relevant information, before downloading the Application and Undertaking to apply for access.

APPENDIX 2 SAMPLING ERROR

ESTIMATION PROCEDURE

For all person, family and dwelling data from private dwellings, estimates from the Household Sample File (HSF) are derived by multiplying the number of records on the sample file by 100, thereby reflecting the manner in which the file was constructed. For all person data from non-private dwellings, estimates from the HSF are also derived by multiplying the number of records on the sample file by 100. For all dwelling data from non-private dwellings, estimates from the HSF are derived by multiplying the number of records on the CURF by 4.07. These estimates will not exactly match estimates from the full census file due to the introduced sampling error: the HSF is only one of numerous CURFs that could have been drawn, each of which would result in different although valid estimates. Observed variation between possible CURFs is termed sampling variability. This variability needs to be taken into account in interpreting results from the HSF compared to the published census results. It is not the only error associated with HSF estimates, but it is one for which standard measures exist, and from which intervals of confidence around individual estimates can be constructed. How sampling error is measured and how confidence intervals are used is explained below.

RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

Since HSF estimates are subject to sampling variability they may differ from estimates that would have been produced if all in-scope persons had been included in the sample. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE) which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of persons was included. There are about 2 chances in 3 that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the estimate that would have been obtained if all persons had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of sampling variability is the relative standard error (RSE) which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers. The RSE is a useful measure in that it provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and so avoiding the need to refer to the size of the estimate.

Imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the SE, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents; errors made in collection (such as when recording responses); and errors made in processing the data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as non-sampling error. They may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. It is not possible to quantify non-sampling error, but every effort is made to reduce it to a minimum. For the examples on the next page it is assumed to be zero. In practice, the potential for non-sampling error adds to the uncertainty of the estimates caused by sampling variability.

SEs for all weighted estimates derivable from this CURF can be calculated using table A2.2. The size of the SE increases with the level of the estimate, be it an estimate of persons, families or dwellings: the larger the estimate the larger the SE. However, it should be noted that the larger the sample estimate is the smaller the SE in percentage terms (i.e. the RSE). Thus, larger estimates will be relatively more reliable than smaller estimates.

Conversely, as the SEs in table A2.2 also show, the smaller the estimate the higher the RSE. Such high RSEs detract seriously from the value of very small estimates for most reasonable uses. This should be borne in mind when interpreting aggregated data produced from the CURF. It is usual to regard estimates with RSEs above 50% as unreliable in most circumstances. Estimates with RSEs between 25% and 50% should only be used with caution.

CLUSTERING

The method of sampling from the census CURF influences the reliability of certain estimates differently depending on the degree to which they are derived from variables which exhibit clustering within dwellings, and the extent to which a systematic sample of dwellings may be less reliable than a purely random sample (were that achievable). These effects are taken into account when estimating SE by partitioning variables into those that simply reflect the systematic selection; and variables which also include effects of the clustering of person records within dwellings. Empirical point tests of SE are compiled for each group of variables, and in each case used to determine a model which best matches the point estimates of variance.

The table below divides variables into three: dwelling and family characteristics (A1); unclustered person characteristics (A2); clustered person characteristics (A3). Note that clustering takes preference: where a given set of tabular estimates is described using both clustered and unclustered variables, for example Birthplace by Age, table A3 should be consulted; unlike estimates of Age by marital status where A2 is still appropriate. Separate SE and RSE entries apply to each group — see table A2.2.

To establish the variability of an estimate, determine the correct cluster model as follows:

Does the estimate specification include a variable from the dwelling or family topic column?

- if Yes, use column A1
- Otherwise, use either column A2 or A3

Does the estimate specification include a variable from the clustered person topic column above?

- if Yes, use column A3
- Otherwise, use column A2

Once the correct cluster model is determined for the estimate, read off the SE (or RSE) which corresponds to the size of the estimate from the corresponding column (A1–A3) in table A2.2. To illustrate, consider the estimate of 1,145,400 Australians who are full-time students aged 15–24. From the key, full-time/part-time student is a clustered topic and therefore column A3 should be used. Referring to columns A3 in table A2.2 the

estimate of 1,145,400 persons is between 1,000,000 and 1,250,000, and the SE will be between 13,552 and 15,131, and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general formula:

SE of estimate =

= lower SE +
$$\left(\left(\frac{\text{size of estimate } - \text{lower estimate}}{\text{upper estimate } - \text{lower estimate}}\right) \times (\text{upper SE } - \text{lower SE})\right)$$

= 13,552 + $\left(\frac{1,145,400-1,000,000}{1,250,000-1,000,000}\right) \times (15,131-13,552)$
= 14,450 (rounded to the nearest 50)

Therefore, there are about 2 chances in 3 that the true value (the number that would have been obtained if the whole population had been included in the survey) is within the range 1,130,950 to 1,159,850. There are about 19 chances in 20 that the value is within the range 1,116,500 to 1,174,300.

STANDARD ERRORS OF RATES AND PERCENTAGES

Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and denominator. The formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion or percentage where x and y are similarly clustered is given below. The formula is only valid when x is a subset of y:

$$RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$$

Considering the example from above, the 1,145,400 Australian full-time students aged 15-24 years represent 29.5% of all Australian full-time students (3,882,756). The SE of 1,145,400 is approximately 14,450 so the RSE is 1.26%. The RSE of 3,882,756 is 0.68%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is:

$$\sqrt{(1.26)^2 - (0.68)^2}$$

or 1.06%, giving a SE for the proportion (29.5%) of 0.31 percentage points. Therefore, there are about 2 chances in 3 that the true value (the number that would have been obtained if the whole population had been included in the survey) is within the range 29.19% to 29.81%. There are about 19 chances in 20 that the true value is within the range 28.88% to 30.12%.

The SE of an estimated percentage or rate computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends on both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. However, the RSE of the estimated percentage or rate will be lower than the RSE of the estimate of the numerator providing \boldsymbol{x} is a subset of \boldsymbol{y} .

Approximate SEs of the rates or percentages may be derived by first obtaining the number of persons corresponding to the numerator of the rate or percentage and then applying this figure to the estimated rate or percentage.

The difference between two sample CURF estimates is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling variability. The SE of the difference of two estimates depends on the SEs of the original estimates and on the relationship (correlation) between the two original estimates. An approximate SE of the difference between two correlated estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated (unrelated) characteristics or sub-populations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest.

SEs contained in table A2.2 are designed to provide an average SE applicable to most person and dwelling estimates. However the SEs are not exactly equal for different estimates, and table A2.2 may be quite inaccurate for some unusual estimates.
