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
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

DIAGRAM 1: BIRTH RATES MELBOURNE STATISTICAL DIVISION, 1992






DEMOGRAPHIC SUMMARY BY STATISTICAL DIVISIONS

Births

In 1992, mothers resident in the Melbourne Statistical Division accounted for 46,299 live births (70.4 per cent of Victorian total), which represented a crude birth rate of 14.6 per 1,000 population. For the third year running, Cranbourne (S) recorded the highest crude birth rate, with 23.4, followed by Bulla (S) with 21.5 and Werribee (S) with 20.4. As in 1991, the municipalities of Prahran (C) and Waverley (C) recorded the lowest crude birth rates in 1992 with 8.7 and 9.4 respectively.

- Mothers resident in the Rest of Victoria accounted for 19,467 live births (29.6 per cent of the Victorian total) in 1992, with a crude birth rate of 15.3. As in 1991, the Mallee Statistical Division again recorded the highest crude birth rate, with 16.6. The Barwon and the Central Highlands Statistical Divisions recorded the lowest crude birth rate of 14.6.
- In the Melbourne Statistical Division there were 21,503 deaths (67.3 per cent of the Victorian total) registered in 1992, which represented a crude death rate of 6.8 per 1,000 population. The highest crude death rate was recorded in Flinders (S) with 13.5, as in 1991, followed by Brighton (C) and St Kilda (C) with 11.8. For the third year running, the lowest death rate was recorded in Melton (S) with 2.7.
- In the Rest of Victoria there were 10,448 deaths (32.7 per cent of the Victorian total) registered in 1992. As in 1991, the Wimmera Statistical Division recorded the highest crude death rate (10.5) and the Goulburn Statistical Division recorded the lowest (7.0).

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
POPULATION: SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Estimated resident population

Population growth

- The estimated resident population of Victoria at the end of December 1992, was 4,456,000, comprising 2,207,900 males and 2,248,100 females.
- In 1992, the Victorian population increased by an estimated 20,800, of which the net natural increase was the largest component. Net overseas migration contributed 12,300, whilst the significant upward trend in interstate migration loss continued, with a loss of 25,600 residents (an increase of 38.4 per cent from 1991).






Overseas arrivals and departures

Total arrivals and departures in Victoria for 1992 were 1,910,480, an increase of 3.8 per cent on 1991.

The number of permanent arrivals was down on the 1991 total by 21.5 per cent, and departures were down by 7.9 per cent.

Long term arrivals increased by 5.8 per cent and departures dropped by 0.7 per cent from 1991 to 1992; short term arrivals also increased by 4.3 per cent and departures by 4.4 per cent in the same period.



BIRTHS: SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Total births

There were 65,766 births to mothers resident in Victoria in 1992, a marginal increase of 0.5 per cent from the 65,438 births registered in 1991. The crude birth rate (per 1,000 of the mean estimated resident population) remained steady at 14.8.


NUMBER OF BIRTHS BY NUPTIALITY, VICTORIA, 1972-1992




Multiple births

-Median ages

- Of the 65,766 births resulting from 64,898 confinements in 1992, there were 863 multiple births, comprising 840 sets of twins and 23 sets of triplets.
- The long established upward trend in median ages of mothers and fathers at nuptial confinements continued in 1992. Since 1987 it has risen steadily from 28.6 years to 29.7 years for mothers, and from 30.9 years to 32.0 years for fathers. The median age of mothers at first nuptial first confinements has now risen to 28.3 years.






Nuptial and ex-nuptial births


In 1992, there were 53,175 nuptial and 12,591 ex-nuptial births, with exnuptial births increasing gradually every year, from 13.8 per cent in 1987 to 19.1 per cent in 1992.

The proportion of ex-nuptial births where the father was acknowledged has continued to rise and in 1992 was 82.4 per cent of all ex-nuptial births.



Birthplaces of parents

- The total fertility rate for Victorian women showed a slight increase from 1,814 in 1991 to 1,822 in 1992 which is also reflected by the increase in the female net reproduction rate from 0.867 to 0.878.
 - In 1992, 61.2 per cent of the nuptial confinements resulting in liveborn children were to parents who were both born in Australia, and 14.3 per cent were to parents who were both born in the same overseas country. Of those born in the same overseas country, the major contributing country was Viet Nam with 13.0 per cent.

DEATHS: SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Total deaths

Of the 31,951 deaths of Victorian residents registered in 1992, 16,816 were males and 15,135 were females. This represented an increase of 2.4 per cent from the 31,216 deaths registered in 1991. The crude death rate (per 1,000 of the estimated resident population) increased marginally from 7.1 in 1991 to 7.2 in 1992.


Age at death

In 1992, 84.3 per cent of male deaths and 91.2 per cent of female deaths occurred after the age of 55, and 71.3 per cent of male deaths and 83.8 per cent of female deaths occurred after the age of 65.

Median age at death

The median age at death in 1992 for males was 73.2 years and for females 80.1 years, both higher than the Australian median ages of 72.6 and 79.3 years respectively. This is the first time that the median age at death for females exceeded 80 years.


MEDIAN AGE AT DEATH, VICTORIA, 1972-1992



Life expectancy

Since the mortality rates for females are relatively lower than for males, the life expectancy of females is greater at each age group. The life expectancy of a female child born in 1992, to a mother resident in Victoria, is 80.7, while for a male child the life expectancy is 74.8 years.


EXPECTATION OF LIFE AT SELECTED AGES, VICTORIA, 1992



Infant mortality

In 1992 there were 366 infant deaths (220 males and 146 females), a decrease of 14.5 per cent over the 428 infant deaths in 1991. This resulted in an infant mortality rate of 5.6 infant deaths per thousand live births, which continued the long term downward trend.

Causes of death

In 1992, diseases of the circulatory system (including heart attack and stroke) accounted for 43.6 per cent of all deaths in Victoria. The major single cause of death was malignant neoplasms (cancer) which accounted for 26.5 per cent of all deaths. For males, cancer (28.3 per cent) was the major cause, whilst for females, cancer and ischaemic heart disease (heart attack) each accounted for 24.6 per cent. The number of deaths from motor vehicle accidents and suicides both declined in 1992.

LEADING CAUSES OF DEATH, VICTORIA, 1972, 1982 AND 1992






- There were 28,429 marriages registered in Victoria in 1992, a marginal decrease of 0.4 per cent from the 28,535 marriages registered in 1991.
- The crude marriage rate (the number of marriages per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population) decreased from 6.5 in 1991 to 6.4 in 1992.
- In 1992, the age at marriage continued to increase. Of those persons marrying for the first time in 1992, 69.2 per cent of bridegrooms and 50.3 per cent of brides were aged 25 years and over, compared with 67.5 per cent and 48 per cent respectively in 1991.

This trend towards an older age at marriage was also reflected in the median age at marriage. The median age at marriage, for all marriages, increased from 28.3 years in 1991 to 28.6 years in 1992 for bridegrooms, and from 26.1 years to 26.3 years (over the corresponding period) for brides. The median age for first marriage was 27.0 years for bridegrooms and 25.0 for brides.

Previous marital status



Of the 28,429 marriages registered in 1992, 19,882 were first marriages for both partners, 4,926 had one partner previously married, and 3,621 had both partners previously married.

- In 1992, 65.1 per cent of all marriages were between Australian-born partners, and 21.7 per cent had either the bride or the bridegroom born overseas. In 8.6 per cent of marriages, both partners were born in the same overseas country.
- In 1992, 61.1 per cent of marriages were conducted by Ministers of Religion, with the major denomination being Catholic (23.6 per cent). Official Registrars conducted 7.3 per cent of marriages and other Civil Celebrants conducted 31.6 per cent of marriages.

Previously widowed bridegrooms and brides show differing patterns in the time taken before remarriage. 64.9 per cent of previously widowed bridegrooms and 43.6 per cent of previously widowed brides remarrying in 1992 did so within 5 years of the death of their previous spouse.

INTERVAL TO REMARRIAGE, BY PREVIOUS MARITAL STATUS, VICTORIA, 1992



Number of divorces


There were 10,533 divorces granted in Victoria in 1992, a decrease of 5.4 per cent on the 11,134 granted in 1991. This decrease is also reflected in the crude divorce rate which dropped from 2.5 in 1991 to 2.4 in 1992.

Age specific divorce rate

Rates

The age specific divorce rate for 1992, when compared to that for 1991, has shown a decrease in all age groups, for both husbands and wives, from under 24 to 54 years. The highest rate of 11.7 was in the 30 to 34 year age group for both husbands and wives.


AGE SPECIFIC DIVORCE RATES, VICTORIA, 1982 AND 1992

In 1992 the median age at divorce was 38.6 years for husbands and 35.9 years for wives, compared with 38.1 and 35.4 respectively in 1991.


MEDIAN AGE AT DIVORCE, VICTORIA, 1977 TO 1992



Application for divorce

The proportion of divorces resulting from joint applications, which had been increasing in recent years, fell slightly to 15.8 per cent in 1992. Applications lodged by wives accounted for 47 per cent of the divorces granted in 1992.

Duration of marriage

More than 38 per cent of the couples who divorced in 1992 had separated within 5 years of marriage (the most common interval was between one and two years), and nearly 60 per cent had separated within 10 years. The median interval between marriage and separation was 7.5 years.

Children of the marriage

The average number of children, per divorce involving at least one child under the age of eighteen, has remained steady since 1987 (at 1.9). There were 10,470 children who were dependants of persons divorcing in 1992, compared with 11,026 in 1991.

DIVORCES, NUMBER OF CHILDREN OF THE MARRIAGE, VICTORIA, 1982 AND 1992



EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

- 1 This publication has replaced the separate publications of Births, Deaths, Marriages and Divorces, which were discontinued after the 1989 issues. It also includes some information on numbers of persons counted at the 1991 Census. estimated resident population and migration. For details of publication of other data related to demography, readers should refer to paragraph (31) of these Notes.
- 2 A Glossary of Terms follows the Explanatory Notes. More detailed definitions are to be found in more specialised publications.

Census counts

3 All information collected in the census is confidential. In statistical tables, to protect the confidentiality of information about individual persons and families, automatic adjustments are made to some tables. For this reason the sum of the components of a table will not always equal the total of the table nor will the totals of similar tables be the same. For further information contact the Census Information Officer on (03) 615 7000.

Population

- 4 This Section provides estimates of the resident population and population projections, with information on overseas arrivals and departures and net interstate migration.
- 5 Estimates of the Victorian population are made to varying degrees of detail thoughout the year, and this publication has used the most up to date estimates available for each particular table.
- 6 The figures for natural increase in Tables 1 and 3 are those used in the preliminary estimate of the population as at 31 December 1992. These estimates have been rounded to the nearest thousand. The final estimate of population, using final Census and vital statistics data, were published in the March quarter 1993 issue of the Australian Demographic Statistics Quarterly (3101.0).

7 Data on overseas arrivals and departures relate to the number of movements of movements of operational air crew and ships' crew, transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not engaged on regular

- travellers rather than to the number of travellers. However, the statistics exclude the voyages. Estimates of transit sea passengers are no longer available.
- 8 Data on interstate migration have been derived from aggregated statistical information on interstate changes of addresses advised to the Health Insurance Commission in the process of administering Medicare. The ABS adjusts the Health Insurance Commission data to make allowance for the persons who do not inform the Commission of their changed addresses. Further details are shown in the Explanatory Notes to Australian Demographic Statistics Quarterly (3101.0).
- 9 Birth statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the mother, regardless of where in Australia the birth occurred or was registered.
- 10 Births to mothers usually resident in Australia which took place overseas are excluded. Births to mothers usually resident overseas which occurred in Australia are included in the State or Territory where the birth occurred.

- Migration

Births

- 11 Except for Tables 13 to 16, the statistics in this publication refer to births registered during the calendar year shown. Tables 13 to 16 refer to births which occurred in the years shown, the data being drawn from registrations up to 30 June 1993. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a birth, and some births occurring in one year are not registered until the following year, or even later. However, most births are registered shortly after they occur, and more than 99 per cent of births occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year.
- 12 Users are advised that data on stillbirths (fetal deaths) may be found in summary form in the Deaths section of the publication, and in more detailed form in *Deaths*, *Victoria* (3312.2).
- 13 The live birth statistics used to calculate the fetal and neonatal death rates have been adjusted (in accordance with the WHO definition of perinatal death) to exclude cases where the birthweight was known to be less than 500 grams. However, infant death rates are calculated using all live births registered, because figures are not available for infants who weigh less than 500 grams at birth, and who live for 28 days, but die before they are one year old.
- 14 In this publication death statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the deceased, regardless of where in Australia the death occurred and was registered.
- 15 Deaths of people normally resident in Victoria, which occurred overseas, are excluded from this publication. Deaths of people usually resident overseas but which occurred in Victoria are included.
- 16 Except for Tables 23 to 25, the death statistics in this publication refer to deaths registered during the year shown. Tables 23 to 25 refer to deaths occurring in the years shown, with data drawn from registrations up to 30 June 1993. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a death, and some deaths occurring in one year are not registered until the following year, or even later. However, most deaths are registered shortly after they occur, and more than 99 per cent of deaths occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year.
- 17 The Deaths and Perinatal Deaths collections are published in more detail in Deaths, Victoria (3312.2).
- 18 The statistics in this publication refer to marriages registered by the Victorian Registrar during the years shown. There is usually an interval of at least some days between the celebration and the registration of a marriage. As a result of the delay in registration, some marriages celebrated in one year are not registered until the following year. Under the Australian Marriage Act 1961, marriages may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month, and within 6 calendar months, before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration to a District Registrar in the State in which the marriage took place.

Deaths

Marriages

- 19 From 20 June 1973, the minimum age at which a person may marry without parental or guardian consent has been 18 years. A male aged between 16 and 18 years may marry with such consent, combined with a judicial order, but the marriage of a female within the same age range requires the consent of her parents or guardians only. A judge or magistrate may, in exceptional circumstances, make an order authorising a male who has attained 16 years of age, or a female who has attained 14 years, to marry a person of marriageable age.
- 20 Figures for years before 1966 exclude registered marriages identified as those of full-blood Aboriginals. Tribal marriages are excluded from the statistics.
- 21 Under the Family Law Act 1975, the only ground on which a divorce may be granted is that of irretrievable breakdown of the marriage. This ground is established by the husband and wife having lived apart for 12 months or more, with there being no reasonable likelihood of reconciliation. Application for nullity of marriage under Family Law legislation must be on the ground that there was a failure to meet a legal requirement, such as that neither party be already lawfully married to another person. There is no provision for judicial separation under Family Law legislation.
- 22 Successful applicants for a divorce are initially granted a decree *nisi*. This becomes absolute after one month, unless it is rescinded or appealed against, or the Court is not satisfied that proper arrangements have been made for the welfare of any children involved.
- 23 The statistics shown in this publication are compiled by the ABS from details provided by the Family Court in respect of each application which resulted in the granting of a decree absolute. These details are forwarded to the ABS on finalisation of proceedings.
- 24 In the interpretation of data, it is important to bear in mind that the availability of judges, and complexity of the cases brought before them can affect the number of decrees granted or made absolute in any one year. A rise in numbers may reflect only the clearing of a backlog of cases from an earlier period.
- 25 The number of divorces shown for Victoria is dependent on the number of cases heard by Family Law Courts in Victoria. As there is no residential requirement under Family Law, applicants may be resident anywhere in Australia. Caution should therefore be exercised in interpreting the rates shown in this bulletin.

Geographic Boundaries

Divorces

- 26 The geographic boundaries for small area data are defined in the Australian Standard Geographical Classification, Edition 2.1 (1216.0) with effect from January 1991. They equate directly with local government areas, with the sole exception that the Shire of Upper Yarra is divided between Melbourne Statistical Division (Part A) and Gippsland Statistical Division (Part B).
- 27 The boundaries of statistical local areas used in determining the population are those in existence at 30 June 1991. The boundaries used for Births and Deaths statistics are the SLA boundaries at January 1991.
- 28 The country of birth tables use the Australian Standard Classification of Countries (ASCCSS) which was developed for Australian users. In this classification, neighbouring countries are grouped into progressively broader geographic areas on the basis of social, cultural, political and economic similarities. The base units of ASCCSS are broadly compatible with those of the United Nations birthplace classification. ASCCSS has been applied to Demographic statistics since January 1990.

29 For more detailed information on the classification of countries, refer to the ABS publication Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (1269.0).

Additional statistics and services available

- 32 In most cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published. This information may be made available in one or more of the following forms: microfiche, photocopy, data tape, floppy disk, computer printout, or clerically extracted tabulation.
- 33 Current publications produced by the ABS are listed in the Catalogue of Publications and Products, Australia (1101.0). The ABS also issues, on Tuesdays and Fridays, a Publications Advice (1105.0) which lists publications to be released in the next few days. These publications are available from any ABS office.
- 34 Life tables prepared by the Australian Bureau of Statistics are included in Table 20, and summarise mortality expectation relating to the number of deaths registered in 1992. These tables are not constructed according to strict actuarial principles. Readers wishing to use life tables for actuarial purposes are advised to refer to the Official Australian Life Tables 1980-82, prepared by the Australian Government Actuary. These were released in April 1985, and copies are available from the AGPS Bookshop in each State capital city.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Age and marital status specific marriage rates

1 Age and marital status specific marriage rates distinguish first marriages and remarriages, and use as the denominator the appropriate population estimates by age and marital status. Thus, first marriage rates are the numbers of males and females of a certain age marrying for the first time per 1,000 (mid-year) population of never married males and females of the same age. Remarriage rates are based on the number of remarrying males and females per 1,000 widowed or divorced males and females respectively of the same age. These rates for Victoria are calculated on the population census count, as the estimated resident population by marital status by age and sex is calculated only for Australia.

Age specific birth rates

2 Age specific birth rates are the live births registered during the calendar year, according to age of mother, per 1,000 of the estimated mid-year female resident population of the same age. For the purposes of calculating these rates, births to mothers under 15 are included in the 15-19 year age group, and births to mothers aged 50 and over are included in the 45-49 year age group.

Age specific death rate

3 The age specific death rate is the number of deaths at a specified age per 1,000 of the population of that age.

Age specific divorce rate

4 The age specific divorce rate (per 1,000 population) relates the number of divorced parties by age to the estimated mid-year resident population in specific age groups. Males under 18 and females under 16 are excluded from the population.

Birth

5 A birth, unless otherwise stated, is a live birth, i.e., the delivery, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, of a child who, after being born, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat. A multiple birth is a confinement (see below) which results in two or more births, at least one of which is liveborn.

Category of movement

6 Category of movement in overseas arrivals and departures is primarily determined by the traveller's own selection of his or her category on the passenger card. This selection is accepted, provided it is consistent with other information on the card.

Children

7 Children are unmarried children of the marriage who were aged under 18 years at the time of application for divorce. Under the Family Law Act 1975, these may include (in certain cases) adopted and ex-nuptial children and children from a former marriage. Children who are married or aged 18 years or more are not subject to custody and guardianship orders and are excluded. In the Marriages collection, the term children refers to persons under 16 years of age born from previous marriages. The term children must not be confused with previous issue, used in the Births collection (see paragraph 36).

Confinement

8 A confinement is a pregnancy which results in at least one live birth. Nuptial first confinements are the first confinements in the current marriage, and do not necessarily represent the woman's first ever confinement resulting in a live birth.

Crude birth rate

9 The *crude birth rate* is the number of registered live births per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population, except for Table 2 in which the crude birth rate is measured as the number of registered live births per 1,000 of the mid-year estimated resident population for each statistical local area.

Crude divorce rate

11 The crude divorce rate is the number of decrees absolute granted per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population. (In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is unmarried or below the minimum age of marriage.)

Crude marriage rate

12 The crude marriage rate is the number of marriages per 1,000 estimated mean resident population.

Date of final separation

13 Date of final separation is the date, given on the application for divorce, from which the period of living apart is calculated for the purpose of establishing grounds for divorce. In determining the date of final separation, a single period of resumed cohabitation of less than 3 months may be ignored, provided the periods of living apart before and after resumed cohabitation amount to a total of 12 months or more.

Divorce

14 The term divorce, as used in this publication, refers to decrees absolute of dissolution of marriage.

Duration of marriage

15 Duration of marriage is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date the marriage ended by decree made absolute or death of the spouse.

Estimated resident population

16 The estimated resident population (ERP) is the official ABS estimate of the Australian population. The ERP for the whole of Victoria is based on the final results of the 1991 population census.

Female net Reproduction rate

17 The female net reproduction rate represents the number of daughters a woman would bear if she were subject to the female age-specific fertility and mortality rates of the year shown. It is obtained by multiplying the female age-specific birth rates by the proportion of survivors at corresponding ages in a life table, adding the products and dividing by 1,000.

Fetal deaths

18 Fetal deaths relate to the delivery of a child, weighing at least 500 grams at delivery (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 22 weeks gestation) who did not, at any time after delivery, breathe or show any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat.

Fetal death rate

19 The fetal death rate is the number of fetal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 22 weeks gestation) plus fetal deaths.

Infant death

20 An infant death is the death of a live-born child who died when less than one year old.

Infant mortality rate

21 The infant mortality rate is the number of deaths of children under 1 year of age per 1,000 live births.

Interstate migration

22 Net estimated interstate migration is derived from information on interstate changes of address advised to the Health Insurance Commission.

Life expectancy

23 Life expectancy refers to the average number of additional years a person of a given age and sex might expect to live if the age-specific death rates of the given year continued throughout his or her lifetime.

Long term arrivals

24 Long term arrivals comprise overseas visitors (except those who hold migrant visas) who intend to stay in Australia for 12 months or more, and Australian residents returning after an absence of 12 months or more overseas.

Long term departures

25 Long-term departures comprise Australian residents who intend to stay abroad for 12 months or more, and overseas visitors departing who stayed 12 months or more in Australia.

Median values

26 The median value (age, duration or interval) is that value which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, half falling below this value, and half exceeding it. Where the value for a particular record has not been stated, that record is excluded from the calculation.

Natural increase

27 Natural increase is the excess of births over deaths registered in the recording year.

Neonatal deaths

28 Neonatal deaths are deaths of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, were of at least 22 weeks gestation) and who died within 28 days of birth.

Neonatal death rate

29 The neonatal death rate is the number of neonatal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at birth, (or, when birthweight is unavailable, were of at least 22 weeks gestation). See also paragraph (13) in the Explanatory Notes.

Never married

30 Never married refers to those persons who have never been validly married.

Nuptiality

31 Nuptiality relates to the relative marital status of parents in the Births collection. Confinements and births are identified as being nuptial where the father registered was married to the mother at the time of the birth, or where the husband died during the pregnancy. Other confinements, and the children resulting from them, are classified as ex-nuptial whether or not the parents were living together at the time of the birth, and whether or not the child may subsequently have been legitimised or adopted.

Perinatal death

32 A perinatal death is either a fetal or a neonatal death, as elsewhere defined.

Perinatal death rate

33 The perinatal death rate is the number of perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births and fetal deaths combined.

Permanent movement

34 Permanent movement comprises arrivals of settlers, and permanent departures of Australian residents, (i.e., those who, on departure, state that they do not intend to return to Australia).

Rate of population growth

35 The rate of population growth expresses population change over a period as a proportion (per cent) of the population at the beginning of that period. In this publication, population growth rate is measured over the twelve months to 31 December of the recording year.

Previous issue

36 Previous issue in the Births collection refers to previous live-born issue of a mother to the current marriage only, and excludes foster, step, or adopted children.

Sex ratio

37 The sex ratio is the number of males per 100 females.

Short-term movements

38 Short-term movements relate to movements of travellers (other than those who, on arrival, hold migrant visas) whose intended or actual length of stay is less than 12 months.

Total fertility rate

39 The total fertility rate is obtained by summing the five year age-specific birth rates and multiplying by five. It represents the number of children 1,000 women would bear during their lifetimes if they experienced the rates of the year shown.
