MAIN FEATURES (June quarter 1994)

Short-term movement - Overseas visitors

There were 701,000 short-term overseas visitor arrivals to Australia, an increase of 9 per cent compared with the June quarter 1993 (644,300).

The main source countries for visitor arrivals in June quarter 1994 were: Japan (23% of total), New Zealand (16%), the United States of America (9%) and the United Kingdom (8%). These four countries accounted for 56 per cent of the total visitor arrivals compared with 61 per cent in June quarter 1993 and 66 per cent in June quarter 1992.

The main purpose of journey reported by visitors arriving was 'Holiday or accompanying business traveller' (63%) followed by 'Visiting relatives' (16%) and 'Business or employment' (13%).

The age group with the greatest number of visitor arrivals was 25 to 34 years with 165,700 (24% of total) followed by the 35 to 44 year age group with 129,500 (18%).

All visitors were asked, on completion of their visit to Australia, to report the State or Territory in which they spent most time. Forty-six per cent reported New South Wales (compared to 45 per cent in June quarter 1993), 27 per cent Queensland (28%), 12 per cent Victoria (13%) and 10 per cent Western Australia (9%).

Of those visitors who reported spending most time in New South Wales, 17 per cent stayed for one month or more. Thirty per cent of visitors to Victoria, and 13 per cent of visitors to Queensland reported the same length of stay.

Short-term movement - Australian residents

The number of short-term resident departures (598,400) remained virtually the same as for June quarter 1993 (593,400).

The main destinations of Australian residents departing short-term were: the United Kingdom (14% of total), the United States of America (13%), New Zealand (12%), Indonesia (8%), Hong Kong (5%) and Singapore (4%).

In the June quarter 1994, 48 per cent (compared with 52% in June quarter 1993) of short-term resident departures were for the purpose of 'Holiday or accompanying business traveller', 21 per cent for 'Business or employment' (18%) and 23 per cent for 'Visiting relatives' (23%).

Twenty-one per cent of all short-term Australian resident departures were in the 45 to 54 year age group (126,200), followed by 20 per cent aged 35 to 44 years (119,500) and 19 per cent aged 25 to 34 years (112,400).

Australian residents who intended to stay abroad for less than one month accounted for 58 per cent of all short-term resident departures, with a further 18 per cent intending to stay for one month and less than two months.

Permanent and long-term movement

Permanent and long-term arrivals (43,700) increased 14 per cent, while permanent and long-term departures (31,970) increased 2 per cent compared with June quarter 1993. The excess of permanent and long-term arrivals over permanent and long-term departures was 11,730, 66 per cent higher than the net gain of 7,070 for June quarter 1993.

The majority of permanent and long-term arrivals were persons born in Australia and returning after being overseas for one year or more (17% of the total), followed by persons born in the United Kingdom (12%), New Zealand (8%) and Japan and Hong Kong (both 4%).

The major countries of intended residence recorded for permanent and long-term departures were the United Kingdom (6,730 or 21% of total), New Zealand (3,480 or 11%), the United States of America (2,870 or 9%) and Hong Kong (1,850 or 6%). These countries accounted for 47 per cent of all destinations for permanent and long-term departures.

There were 18,360 permanent (settler) arrivals, 21 per cent more than the 15,160 settler arrivals in June quarter 1993. Increased settler arrivals were recorded for persons born in New Zealand (an increase of 560 or 37% over June quarter 1993), Cambodia (460 or 575%), South Africa (380 or 211%), the Philippines (260 or 33%) and Sri Lanka (200 or 91%), while decreases were recorded for Viet Nam (down 260 or 17% from June quarter 1993), Indonesia (70 or 37%) and Malaysia (40 or 14%).

The major source countries for settlers were the United Kingdom (with 12% of all settler arrivals), New Zealand (11%), Viet Nam (7%), the Philippines (6%) and China and Hong Kong (both 4%).

There were 6,510 permanent departures, 5 per cent down from June quarter 1993 (6,830).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains statistics of persons arriving in, and departing from, Australia in summary form for the latest available quarter, together with three year time series for the major characteristics of travellers. More detailed statistics can be made available, on request (see paragraph 22). Monthly statistics have previously been released (see paragraph 19).

Source of the statistics

2. Persons arriving in, or departing from, Australia are required to complete prescribed questionnaires in the form of Incoming and Outgoing Passenger cards (see Appendix A). These cards provide information to the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs for administrative purposes and serve as the source of statistics of overseas arrivals and departures. In accordance with the *Census and Statistics Act 1905*, information relating to individuals, individual flights or ships and individual carriers, which is contained in these cards or other documents, is treated as confidential by the ABS.

Scope

3. The statistics in this publication relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than the number of travellers (i.e. the multiple movements of individual persons during a given reference period are each counted separately). The statistics exclude the movements of operational air and ships' crew, of transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and of passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not then engaged on regular voyages.

Definitions*Category of movement*

4. Category of movement is primarily determined by the traveller's selection of their own category on the passenger card. This selection is accepted provided it is consistent with other information on the passenger card.

Permanent movement

5. Permanent arrivals (settlers) comprise travellers who hold migrant visas, (regardless of stated intended period of stay), New Zealand citizens who indicate an intention to settle and those who are otherwise eligible to settle (e.g. overseas born children of Australian citizens). Permanent departures are Australian residents (including former settlers) who on departure state they do not intend to return to Australia.

Long-term movement

6. Long-term arrivals comprise overseas visitors (except those who hold migrant visas—see paragraph 5 above) who intend to stay in Australia for 12 months or more and Australian residents returning after an absence of 12 months or more overseas. Long-term departures comprise Australian residents who intend to stay abroad for 12 months or more and overseas visitors departing who stayed 12 months or more in Australia.

Short-term movement

7. Movements of travellers whose intended or actual length of stay is less than twelve months are classified as short-term, except those who on arrival hold migrant visas (see paragraph 5 above).

8. A large number of travellers state exactly 12 months or one year as their intended period of stay. Many of these stay for less than that period and on their departure from, or return to, Australia should therefore be classified as short-term. To maintain consistency between arrivals and departures, movements of travellers who report their actual or intended period of stay as being one year exactly are randomly allocated to long-term or short-term, in proportion to the number of movements of travellers who report their actual length of stay as up to one month more, or one month less, than one year.

Country of birth, residence or citizenship

9. The classification of countries in this publication is based on the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS). For more detailed information refer to the ABS publication *Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics* (1269.0).

10. Political developments in Europe and the Former USSR have resulted in a number of changes to the ASCSS, detailed in Revisions 1.01 and 1.02 of the ASCSS. Further developments in Europe and Africa have affected some of the categories in this publication and are detailed in Revision 1.03 of the ASCSS. These changes came into effect for March 1994 data.

11. Statistics on country of birth, residence or citizenship have certain limitations because of inadequate reporting on passenger cards. For instance, it is not possible to identify separately England, Scotland and Wales. Similarly 'Korea' includes both the Republic of Korea and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. United States of America includes 'America (undefined)'.

State or Territory of clearance

12. State or Territory of clearance refers to the State or Territory in which a passenger is cleared by Customs and Immigration authorities. Embarkation or disembarkation and clearance are usually, but not necessarily, in the same State.

State or country of residence

13. State of residence or country of residence refers to the State or country in which travellers regard themselves as living or as last having lived. State of intended residence is derived from the intended address given by settlers and Australian residents returning after a journey abroad. Particularly in the case of the former, this information does not necessarily relate to the State in which a traveller will eventually establish a permanent residence.

State of stay and country of intended stay for short-term travellers

14. Overseas visitors are asked on arrival for their intended address and on departure for the name of the State in which they spent most time. Australian residents travelling overseas are asked on departure for the name of the country in which they intend to spend most time and on their return for the name of the country in which they spent most time.

Estimation method

15. Overseas arrival and departure statistics are derived from a combination of full enumeration and sampling. All permanent movements and all movements with a duration

of stay of one year or more are fully enumerated. All movements with a duration of stay of less than one year are sampled. Statistics relating to these movements are therefore estimates which may differ from statistics which would have been obtained if details of all these movements had been processed. Details of the sampling method and comments on the sampling errors associated with the estimates are contained in the Technical Note, Appendix C.

16. The statistics in this publication have been rounded, to the nearest 100 for short-term movements and to the nearest 10 for permanent and long-term movements. In tables showing both short-term and permanent and long-term movements the total movements have been rounded to the nearest 100. The sums of the components may, due to rounding, not add exactly to totals.

Corrections and imputations

17. The imprecision due to sampling errors should not be confused with errors arising from imperfections in reporting, which may occur in any data collection, whether sampled or not. Every effort is made to minimise such errors, both through careful design of the passenger cards and through checks on the information once it is received. During the edit process some items are corrected where they conflict with other known information. Missing replies to certain items such as age and country of birth are also imputed by reference to other related items.

18. Errors of this kind differ from discrepancies arising from the fact that certain information reflects the travellers intentions, at the time the passenger cards were completed. These intentions are of course subject to change. Particularly affected is the distinction between permanent and temporary movement and in the latter case, length of intended stay, country in which most time will be spent and purpose of journey.

APPENDIX B

PLANNED CHANGES TO INCOMING AND OUTGOING PASSENGER CARDS

Overseas arrivals and departures data are compiled by the ABS from information collated by the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs (DIEA), provided on passenger cards collected from each traveller arriving in and leaving Australia. Two cards are used. The Incoming Passenger Card (IPC) collects information on migrants, arrivals of overseas visitors and Australian residents returning from abroad, and the Outgoing Passenger Card (OPC) collects information on departures of overseas visitors, and Australian residents leaving both temporarily and permanently.

The implementation of the Migration Reform Act by the DIEA has required some changes to be made to the Incoming Passenger Card. These mainly involved the addition of a health and character check. For this reason, the complete design of both cards was examined, and consequently other aspects were redesigned. The redesigned cards will be officially introduced on 1 September 1994.

There are two main statistical changes to the cards. These are discussed in detail below.

1. Registered Marital Status

The existing passenger cards request details regarding marital status. The current categories, reflecting requirements to collect registered marital status, are:

The new passenger cards will include two new categories for marital status:

- Separated but not divorced
- Common law/de facto

Of the two new categories, "separated but not divorced" reflects a change in a registered marriage, whereas "common law/de facto" does not. It is intended that this be reflected in ABS output, with "common law/de facto" being shown as "Registered marital status not stated - de facto".

2. Main Reason for Journey

There are a number of changes to this data item. On the IPC, the "In transit" category has been dropped; on the OPC the "Student vacation" category has been dropped; and on both cards "Visiting relatives" has been changed to "Visiting friends/relatives", "Convention" has been changed to "Convention/conference" and "Accompanying business visitor" has been dropped. The changes made to both cards are designed to bring the Australian classification in line with international standards, and therefore provide comparability with international data. "Student vacation" was a little-reported category felt to be better covered by the "Holiday" category, and "In transit" was deleted due to the large percentage of visitors incorrectly indicating this category and the small number of actual in transit visitors (i.e. those who are stopping in Australia for no purpose other than to change flights, and who actually leave the airport and therefore complete a passenger card in doing so). In summary, the new categories on both cards are:

This data item appears in a number of tabulations in all Overseas Arrivals and Departures publications. Because of this, problems will arise due to the different values being available pre and post 1/9/94.

While the loss of "in transit" (95,600 out of 2,996,200 short-term visitor arrivals in 1993) and "accompanying business visitor" (23,700 short-term visitor arrivals in 1993) as reasons for journey are not very significant, the wording change "visiting relatives" to "visiting friends/relatives" may be more significant.

It is likely that a significant number of visitors will select "visiting friends/relatives" on the new card rather than "holiday", which would have been their selection had "visiting friends" not been an option. The ABS has estimated the likely percentage change, based on information gathered from the International Visitor Survey (conducted by the Bureau of Tourism Research) and from other international data.

In the 1992 International Visitor Survey, 14 per cent of visitors who came to Australia for a "holiday" stated that "visiting friends" was a secondary reason for visiting Australia. This does not, however, provide an indication of what they would have ticked as their "Main reason for journey" had "visiting friends" been an option on the card. The Bureau of Tourism Research, in their July 1994 survey of visitors, asked visitors selecting "holiday" as their "main reason" what they would have selected had "visiting friends" been an option. The results should provide a better indication of the likely drop in "holiday" travellers and offsetting increase in "visiting friends/relatives".

The current New Zealand passenger card has "visiting friends/relatives" as a "Main reason for journey" category. New Zealand statistics show that in 1993, 57 per cent of visitors stated "holiday" as their main reason for journey and 22 per cent stated "visiting friends/relatives". This compares with Australia's 62 per cent "holiday" and 18 per cent "visiting relatives". Based on these figures, there could be a 4 to 5 per cent drop in the percentage of "holiday" travellers and an offsetting increase in "visiting friends/relatives" in Australia's arrivals statistics. However, due to the fact that 23 per cent of Australia's population are overseas born, while only 15 per cent of New Zealand's population are overseas born, the proportion "visiting friends" in Australia may well be higher.

While there will be a break in statistical series for "Main reason for journey", the inclusion of "visiting friends/relatives" will make Australia's Overseas Arrivals and Departures statistics comparable with most overseas countries by conforming to World Tourism Organisation standards. In addition, it will particularly improve the quality of "holiday" data, for example by providing a more accurate reflection of those international visitors requiring accommodation services.

It is proposed that data from 1/9/94 be tabulated using the new categories. For September quarter 1994, which will have both old and new categories, "in transit" will be included with "other", and "student vacation" will be included with "holiday", as will "accompanying business visitor". The same will apply for calendar year 1994 and financial year 1994/95 data.

Footnotes and explanatory notes will be provided in ABS Overseas Arrivals and Departures publications to explain the changes.

APPENDIX C

TECHNICAL NOTE : METHOD OF SAMPLING AND RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

Method of sampling

All movements with a duration of stay less than one year are sampled using the following stratification:

<i>Country of Citizenship</i>	<i>Sample</i>
Australia, New Zealand, Japan, United Kingdom (excl. Ireland), and the United States of America	1 in 40
Canada, Germany, Malaysia and Singapore	1 in 15
Any other individual country depending on the number of movements	1 in 1 or 1 in 4 or 1 in 10

Reliability of estimates

Estimates based on a sample are subject to sampling variability, i.e. they may differ from those that would be obtained from a full enumeration.

The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results and one measure so derived is the standard error. Given an estimate and the standard error on that estimate, there are about two chances in three that the sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained from full enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the sampling error is the relative standard error which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

It would be impracticable to publish estimates of standard errors for all figures in individual tables. However, the following tables of standard errors and relative standard errors gives an indication of the magnitude of the sampling error associated with any estimate of a particular size for short-term and total movement.

An example of the use of this table is as follows: if the estimate of the number of the Australian resident departures for short-term visits is 500, then the standard error on this estimate is 130, i.e. there are two chances in three that the actual number of Australian resident departures for a short-term visit will lie between 370 and 630 and nineteen chances in twenty that it will lie between 240 and 760.

As the table shows, the larger the size of an estimate the smaller the relative standard error. For any estimate of greater than 10,000 the relative standard error will be less than 6 per cent and so the sampling error can be assumed to be negligible for most practical purposes.

The estimate of the difference between an estimate in two different periods or between estimates from the same

period is also subject to sampling error. The standard error on the difference between any two estimates which are subject to sampling error can be approximated by using the larger standard error of the estimates inflated by a factor of 1.4. An example of the use of this procedure is as follows:

Assume the estimates of the number of arrivals to Australia of visitors who stated 'attending convention' as the purpose of journey in January 1992 and 1993 are 1,500 and 750 respectively. The difference between the 1992 and 1993 figures is 750 and the standard errors on these estimates are approximately 190 and 140. The standard error on the difference is approximately $(1.4 \times 190) = 266$, and there are nineteen chances in twenty that the estimate of the difference between the two years will lie between 218 and 1,282.
