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NATIONAL SCHOOLS COLLECTION GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS, AUSTRALIA 1982

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MAIN FEATURES

In July 1982 there were 7,556 government schools operating compared with 7,531 in 1981.

The number of full-time students attending these schools totalled 2,282,970, a decrease of 15,630 (0.7 per cent) from the number attending in 1981.

While the total number of school staff increased by 1,515, or 0.8 per cent, this was attributable to an increase in the number of part-time teaching staff of 33.6 per cent, from 11,308 in 1981 to 15,107 in 1982. Full-time teaching staff decreased slightly overall from 134,582 in 1981 to 134,459 in 1982 (0.1 per cent) and non-teaching staff by 6.6 per cent from 32,933 in 1981 to 30,772 in 1982.

The number of non-school staff increased from 8,019 in 1981 to 8,795 in 1982 (9.7 per cent).

Introduction

This publication contains statistics of government schools, ancillary education establishments and other education establishments which have as their major activity the administration and/or provision of full-time day primary, day secondary or special education.

2. It is the second of an annual series conducted by the Australian Education Council School Statistics Committee of which ABS is a member. The Australian Education Council, which comprises Federal and State Ministers for Education, established the Committee in 1979 to improve the quality of education statistics relating to government and non-government primary and secondary education.

3. The AEC School Statistics Committee has developed a set of concepts, definitions and classifications for use in this collection (referred to as 'The National Schools Statistics Collection'). The statistics presented in this publication supersede the government school series previously released in the ABS publication Schools, Australia (4202.0).

4. Development is proceeding to implement a nongovernment section of the National Schools Statistics Collection in 1984. In order to provide continuity of data for that sector in the interim, the non-government collection from the Schools, Australia series is being maintained and will, for 1982 and 1983, be available in the ABS publication Non-Government Schools, Australia (4216.0). However, since the concepts, classifications, definitions and coverage of the National Schools Statistics Collection differ from this series, care should be exercised in drawing comparisons between the data for the government and non-government sectors.

Scope and Coverage

5. The statistics in this publication relate to establishments operated by State Directors-General of Education (or equivalent) and which have as their MAJOR activity the administration or provision of full-time day primary, day secondary or special education, or primary or secondary education by radio or correspondence. (Major activity is based on the activity of students or, where this is not appropriate, on the activity of staff in full-time equivalent units, FTE.) See paragraphs 20 and 25 for details of the calculations of FTE.

6. As those establishments at which some OTHER activity is major are excluded, the statistics presented do NOT include ALL establishments, students or staff engaged in such activities under the control of State Directors-General of Education (or equivalent); for example, Tertiary Orientation Programs activity conducted by technical and further education institutions in Victoria are excluded.

Census Date

7. The census date for the collection is 1 July 1982. The reference period is usually taken as five continuous school or working days including the census date.

Definitions of units

8. The statistical concept of an education establishment is that of a unit which engages in the provision or administration of educational services. Three types of establishment are recognised as within scope of this collection: schools, ancillary education establishments and other education establishments.

9. A School is defined as an establishment which satisfies the following criteria:

- (a) Its major activity is:
 - (i) the provision of full-time day primary, day secondary or special education, or
 - (ii) the provision of primary or secondary education by radio or correspondence;
- (b) It is headed by a principal (or equivalent) responsible for its internal operation; and
- (c) It is possible for students to enrol for a minimum of four continuous weeks, excluding breaks for school vacations.

10. An Ancillary Education Establishment (AEE) is defined as an establishment which satisfies the following criteria:

- (a) its major activity is the provision of aspects of primary, secondary or special education to students supplementary to that provided by schools;
- (b) It has attached to it (possibly on a part-time basis) at least one permanent teacher; and
- (c) It permits its facilities to be used by students from more than one school.

AEEs include education establishments in institutions and hospitals where students cannot enrol for a period exceeding four continuous weeks, certain holiday excursion centres, etc.

NOTE that for the purposes of this publication, data for AEEs are included with schools.

11. Other education establishments within scope of these statistics, and not defined as schools or ancillary education establishments, include:

- (a) administrative offices which have as their major activity the administration of primary, secondary or special education; and
- (b) teacher resource centres operated by a State Director-General of Education.

12. Government schools, for the purposes of this publication, are schools operated by the State Directors-General of Education (or equivalent).

Methodology

13. The methodologies employed by State Departments of Education in compiling the State aggregates on which the statistics in this publication are based vary from State to State. They range from derivations resulting from manipulation of central administrative records to direct collection of data from establishments.

Definitions of Terms

14. Many of the tables in this publication present information on the basis of classifications derived from type of education. Three types of education are recognised:

- (a) Primary education is defined as that full-time education which typically commences at around age 5 and lasts for seven to eight years. It does not include sessional education such as preschool education. In New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory, primary education may extend from Pre-year 1 to Year 6 (or equivalent). In South Australia and Northern Territory it may extend from Pre-year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent). In Queensland and Western Australia it may extend from Year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent);
- (b) Secondary education is defined as that education which typically commences at around age 12 after completion of primary education and lasts for five or six years. In New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory, secondary education may extend from Year 7 to Year 12 (or equivalent). In Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and Northern Territory it may extend from Year 8 to Year 12 (or equivalent); and
- (c) Special education is defined as that education provided at special schools.

- 15. Four types of school are recognised:
 - (a) A *primary school* is defined as one which offers only primary education;
 - (b) A secondary school is defined as one which offers only secondary education;
 - (c) A combined primary-secondary school is defined as one which offers both primary and secondary education; and
 - (d) A special school is defined as one which requires one or more of the following characteristics to be exhibited by students before enrolment is allowed:
 - (i) mental or physical handicap, slow learning ability;
 - (ii) social or emotional problems;
 - (iii) in custody, on remand, in hospital.
- 16. Three levels of schooling of students are recognised:
 - (a) Primary level;
 - (b) Secondary level; and
 - (c) Not identifiable as primary or secondary level.

Students are classified to the appropriate level on the basis of the type of education being received.

- 17. Four areas of activity of staff are recognised:
 - (a) Primary education only;
 - (b) Secondary education only;
 - (c) Special education only; and
 - (d) More than one area of activity.

Staff are classified to the appropriate area of activity on the basis of the type of education they provide.

18. A student is defined as a person who is enrolled in a school and active in a course of study other than preschool or Technical and Further Education (TAFE) courses. Persons absent at the reference date are included if they were expected to be absent for less than four continuous weeks (excluding school vacations) and are excluded if they had left the school or had been absent without explanation for four continuous weeks (excluding school vacations) prior to the reference week.

19. A *full-time student* is defined as one who undertakes a workload specified as full-time by a State Department of Education.

20. A part-time student is defined as one who undertakes a workload less than that specified as full-time by a State Department of Education. The *full-time equivalent* (FTE) of a part-time student is based on the student's workload compared to that usually undertaken by a fulltime student. A student carrying a workload equal or greater than that undertaken by a full-time student is considered to have an FTE of 1.0.

21. Staff are defined as persons who are involved in the administration or provision of primary, secondary or special education, under the administrative control of the State Directors-General of Education (or equivalent).

NOTE that as a rule:

- (a) Full-time equivalents (FTE) for staff are apportioned across areas of activity on the basis of time spent in the various areas of activity;
- (b) The functions (general teaching, etc.) of staff are determined on the basis of predominant activity.

22. Teaching staff are defined as those paid under a Teachers Salary Award (or equivalent) and who are in contact with students, i.e. support students either by direct class contact or on an individual basis. They include classroom and general teachers, librarians/teacher librarians, guidance/counselling/careers advisors and relieving teachers but exclude staff who provide professional support to teachers.

NOTE:

- (a) Public Service Awards are not considered to be equivalent to Teachers Salary Awards;
- (b) Teachers in promotional positions, such as Principals and Deputy Principals, are considered to be teaching staff.

23. Non-teaching staff are defined as those who are not in contact with students, or who are not paid under a Teachers Salary Award (or equivalent).

24. Full-time staff are defined as those who perform the full allocation of duties specified as full-time in the relevant award, contract or administrative arrangement. (However, persons who are employed full-time by the relevant State Department of Education, but part of whose duties are 'out of scope' of the collection (e.g. pre-school, TAFE, etc.) have been regarded as part-time.)

25. Part-time staff are staff who are not employed full-time by the relevant State Department of Education or who are employed full-time but part of whose duties are 'out of scope' of this collection, e.g. pre-school, TAFE, etc.

NOTE:

- (a) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing some out-of-scope activities is calculated on the basis of the proportion of time spent on 'in scope' activities compared to that spent by a full-time staff member solely occupied by 'in scope' activities.
- (b) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing solely 'in scope' activities is calculated on the basis of time worked compared to that worked by full-time staff performing similar duties.

(c) Some States however, are not able to calculate full-time equivalent on a time spent basis for all staff functions but use wages paid as a fraction of full-time rate, or a resource allocation based formula. Some also use a pro-rata formula based on student or teacher numbers to estimate aggregate FTE for some categories of staff.

26. Staff are categorised as School staff or as Nonschool staff. They are placed in the former category if they usually spend more than half of their time actively engaged in duties at one or more schools or AEEs.

27. The Area of Activity of staff is considered to be primary education, secondary education and special education. Special education is taken as only referring to activities carried out at special schools.

Confidentiality

28. In order to preserve confidentiality of data on individuals, several tables in this publication have been adjusted. To minimise data loss and thereby the inconvenience to users, two methods have been used:

- (i) cells in Tables 4, 5 and 6 have been rounded to the nearest ten; and
- (ii) cells in Table 1 have been suppressed and replaced with the symbol 'n.p.'.

32. Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

R. J. CAMERON Australian Statistician The structure of primary and secondary schooling in Australia varies between the different States and Territories. There are three basic patterns evident, as illustrated below.

The first pattern exists in South Australia and Northern Territory where the primary system comprises a Reception or Transition grade followed by Years 1 to 7. The secondary system comprises Years 8 to 12.

The second pattern exists in New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory where the primary system comprises a Kindergarten or Preparatory grade followed by Years 1 to 6. The secondary system comprises Years 7 to 12.

The third pattern exists in Queensland and Western Australia where the primary system comprises Years 1 to 7 and the secondary system Years 8 to 12.

Each State and Territory also has a pre-school sector which is separate from primary and secondary schooling. Data on pre-school education within schools have been excluded from primary enrolments in this publication.
