#### MAIN FEATURES

In July 1994 there were 9,679 schools operating in Australia of which 7,159 (74.0%) were government schools operated by the State Directors-General of Education (or equivalent) and 2,520 (26.0%) were non-government schools.

There were 3,099,380 full-time students attending these schools in July 1994. Of these, 2,214,938 (71.5%) were attending government schools and 884,442 (28.5%) were attending non-government schools.


The number of full-time students attending government schools decreased by 0.6 per cent (13,118) from the 2,228,056 attending in 1993, while the number of

full-time students attending non-government schools increased by 1.6 per cent (14,123) from the 870,319 attending in 1993.

The apparent retention rate of secondary school students to Year 12 fell from 77.1 per cent in 1992 and 76.6 per cent in 1993 to 73.1 per cent in 1994.

There was the equivalent of 143,379 full-time teaching staff in government schools in July 1994, a fall of 2.2 per cent from the 146,637 in 1993, while teaching staff in non-government schools totalled 56,965 full-time equivalent units, an increase of 3.1 per cent (1,691).

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

This publication contains preliminary statistics of government and non-government schools, and full-time students enrolled and active in a course of study at those schools as at July 1994.

- 2. The National Schools Statistics Collection (NSSC) is a collaborative arrangement between State, Territory and Commonwealth education authorities. A schools statistics committee, of which the ABS is a member, was established in 1979 to improve the quality of education statistics relating to government and non-government primary and secondary education. It has developed a set of concepts, definitions and classifications for use in the National Schools Statistics Collection.
- 3. The statistics are compiled from collections conducted, in co-operation with the MCEETYA, by the State/Territory Departments of Education (government series) and the Commonwealth Department of Employment, Education and Training (non-government series).
- 4. With the implementation of the NSSC concepts, the definitions, classifications and coverage were revised. The new government series was implemented in 1981 and the non-government in 1984. Therefore, care should be exercised when comparing data in this publication with that prior to 1981 and 1984 for the government and non-government series respectively, and between the two series from 1981 to 1983.
- 5. The scope of the NSSC series comprises government and non-government establishments which have as their major activity the administration and/or provision of full-time day primary or secondary education, or primary or secondary education by radio or correspondence.
- 6. Education services in Jervis Bay Territory are provided by the ACT Department of Education and Training, through Commonwealth government funding. For the purposes of the NSSC, figures for Jervis Bay Territory are included in statistics for the ACT. As at July 1994 there was one primary school in Jervis Bay Territory with 73

students, 4 (FTE) teaching staff and 5 (FTE) non-teaching staff.

7. More detailed statistics and information about the scope and definitions used in this collection were published in the ABS publication *Schools, Australia, 1993* (4221.0).

#### Census Date

8. The census date for the collection is the Friday nearest to August 1 each year. For 1994, this was July 29, except for the Northern Territory which held its census on August 12.

#### **GLOSSARY**

Affiliation of non-government schools: non-government schools are classified to three groups: Anglican, Catholic and Other. Included in the 'Other' category are schools with specific religious affiliations (other than Anglican and Catholic) and schools that are inter-denominational, non-denominational or which have no religious affiliation.

Ancillary Education Establishment (AEE): an establishment where the major activity is the provision of aspects of primary, secondary or special education to students supplementary to that provided by schools. AEEs include those education establishments in institutions and hospitals which do not have officially recognised student enrolments. Only student and staff data are included for AEEs.

Apparent retention rate is the percentage of students of a given cohort group who continued to a particular Level/Year of education. In this publication, apparent retention rates are calculated for students who continued to Year 12 from the commencement of their secondary schooling. Care should be exercised in the interpretation of apparent retention rates since a range of factors affecting calculation have not been taken into account. At the Australia level these include students repeating a Year of education, migration and other net changes to the school population. At lower levels of disaggregation, additional factors affecting the data, such as enrolment policies (which contribute to different age/grade structures between States), inter-sector transfer and interstate movements of students have not been taken into account. Note: Part-time students are excluded from apparent retention rates; the effect of this exclusion varies between States.

Category of school: schools/AEEs are classified to the government or non-government sector for the purposes of this collection.

Full-time equivalent units (FTE): a measure of the total level of staff resources used. The FTE of a full-time staff member (i.e. employed full-time and engaged solely on activities which fall within the scope of this collection) is equal to 1.0. The calculation of FTE for part-time staff is as follows:

- (a) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing some activities which fall outside the scope of this collection (eg pre-school, TAFE) is calculated on the basis of the proportion of time spent on in-scope activities compared with that spent by a full-time staff member solely occupied by in-scope activities.
- (b) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing activities which fall solely within the scope of this collection is calculated on the basis of time worked compared with that worked by full-time staff performing similar duties.

Some States are not able to calculate full-time equivalent on a time spent basis for all staff functions but use wages paid as a fraction of full-time rate, or a resource allocation based formula. Some also use a pro rata formula based on student or teacher numbers to estimate aggregate FTE for some categories of staff.

Level/Year of education is defined as follows:

Primary education is that full-time education which typically commences at around age 5 and lasts for seven to eight years. It does not include sessional education such as pre-school education. In New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory, primary education may extend from Pre-Year 1 to Year 6 (or equivalent). In South Australia and Northern Territory it may extend from Pre-Year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent). In Queensland and Western Australia it may extend from Year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent).

Secondary education is that education which typically commences at around age 12 after completion of primary education and lasts for five or six years. In New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory, secondary education may extend from Year 7 to Year 12 (or equivalent). In Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory it may extend from Year 8 to Year 12 (or equivalent).

Non-teaching staff are staff who provide support services. Included in this category are those engaged as specialist support staff, administrative and clerical staff, maintenance workers etc.

Other education establishments: a number of other establishments within the scope of these statistics, but not defined as schools or AEEs include:

- (a) Administrative offices which have as their major activity the administration of primary, secondary or special education; and
- (b) Teacher resource centres operated by a State Director-General of Education.

School (other than a special school) must satisfy the following criteria:

- (a) Its major activity is:
  - the provision of full-time day primary or secondary education or,
  - (ii) the provision of primary or secondary education by radio or correspondence;
- (b) It is headed by a principal (or equivalent) responsible for its internal operation; and

(c) It is possible for students to enrol for a minimum of four continuous weeks, excluding breaks for school vacations.

The term 'school' in this publication includes schools in institutions and hospitals, mission schools and similar establishments. The term excludes pre-schools, kindergarten centres, pre-primary schools or pre-primary classes in or attached to non-special schools, senior technical and agricultural colleges, evening schools, continuation classes, and institutions such as business or coaching colleges.


Special school: a school which provides special instruction for physically and/or mentally disabled or impaired students, or those with social problems. Students must exhibit one or more of the following characteristics before enrolment is allowed:

- (i) mental or physical disability or impairment;
- (ii) slow learning ability;
- (iii) social or emotional problems;
- (iv) in custody, on remand, in hospital.

Staff are persons who are involved in the administration or provision of primary or secondary education.

Students are persons who are enrolled or registered and active in a course of study at a school. This publication details full-time students only. As from 1990 students attending special schools have not been identified separately and have been allocated to either primary or secondary level of education.

Teaching staff are staff who spend the majority of their time in contact with students and have teaching duties, i.e. are engaged to impart the school curriculum or are engaged in the provision of services for the direct benefit of students. Teaching staff are usually employed under a teacher's award or equivalent. Also included for the purposes of this collection are principals, deputy principals and senior teachers mainly involved in administrative duties
