STATISTICAL BULLETIN : CONSUMPTION OF TEA AND COFFEE, AUSTRALIA

NO. 2 : 1962-63

This bulletin contains particulars of the estimated quantities of tea and coffee available for consumption (i.e. the apparent consumption) during the years 1958-59 to 1962-63. Consumption data have, in general, been obtained by deducting quantities of these commodities exported from imports cleared for home consumption. An adjustment has been made for changes in stocks held by firms which imported tea and coffee products in each of the years ended 30th June. Stocks held by retailers have, for the most part, been excluded.

TEA

Total apparent consumption of tea in 1962-63 increased slightly over the previous year, but consumption per head remained steady at 5.8 to the consumption per head remained steady at 5.8 to the constraint of th

The basic information on stocks, imports cleared and exports of coffee covers a variety of coffee products such as raw beans, pure processed whole or ground coffee, instant coffee, etc. For the purpose of obtaining apparent consumption of coffee, these commodities have been converted to the pure processed whole or ground coffee equivalent, and it is on this basis that details are shown in Table 2.

Owing primarily to the inclusion of information relating to changes in stocks in calculating apparent consumption since 1960-61, data relating to the consumption of coffee for the years since then are not strictly comparable with particulars for 1959-60 and earlier years.

The apparent consumption of coffee per head in 1962-63, at 2.0 lb., was the same as consumption in the previous year, although total consumption increased slightly.

Data relating to the supply and utilization of coffee for the years 1958-59 to 1962-63 are shown in Table 2.
