

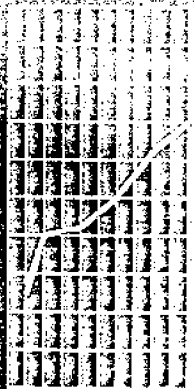

### INTRODUCTION

This publication contains results from the Child Care Survey conducted throughout Australia in March 1996. It is a continuation of a series of surveys, on this topic, conducted since 1969. The previous survey was in June 1993. The major aim of the survey was to collect data on the supply of, and demand for, child care for children aged less than 12 years. Information was also collected on the use, or not, of the Childcare Cash Rebate as well as the working arrangements of parents with children under 12.

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# SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

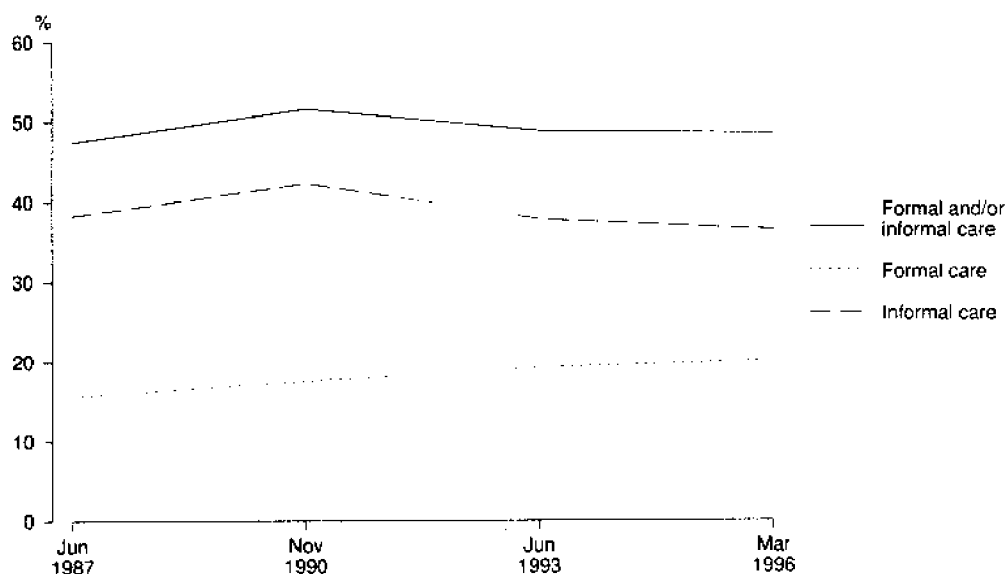
## INTRODUCTION

Child care refers to arrangements (other than parental care) made for the care of children under 12 years of age. Formal child care is regulated care which takes place away from the child's home and includes attendance at preschool, a child care centre, family day care and occasional care. Informal care is care which is non-regulated and can take place in the child's home or elsewhere. It includes care by family members, friends, neighbours and paid baby sitters.

In March 1996, 1,501,800 children aged less than 12 years used some type of formal and/or informal child care, representing 48% of children in this age group (table 1). This proportion has changed only slightly since 1993 (49%), but continues the reduction in the use of care since the peak in 1990 (52%).

There were 624,400 children who used formal care in 1996, 20% of children under 12 years of age, and an increase from 18% in 1990. Informal care remained, however, the most frequently used child care arrangement by Australian families. In March 1996, 1,128,300 children used informal care, which represented 36% of all children under 12 years of age, down from 42% in 1990.

## USE OF CHILD CARE

### Types of care

The most commonly used formal care was preschool, attended by 32% (200,600) of children using formal care (table 2). This was followed by long day care, 177,700 (28%), before and after school care programs, 111,700 (18%) and family day care, 96,200 (15%).

The main providers of informal care were relatives other than brothers or sisters. Nearly two-thirds of children using informal care received care of this type (726,000).

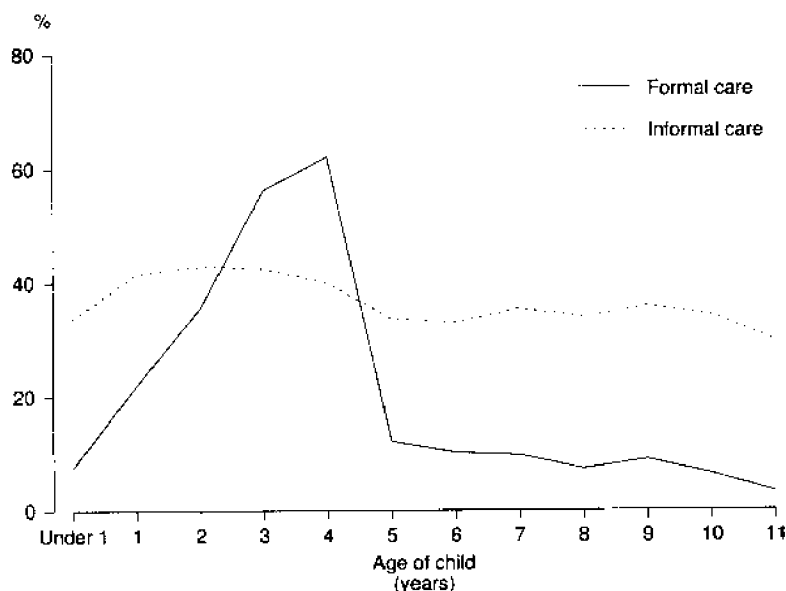
## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

The majority of children using child care (75%) were in care for less than 20 hours per week (table 6). However, 43% of informal care was for less than five hours per week and 45% of preschool was for less than 10 hours per week. For children in long day care, 21% attended for 35 hours or more per week.

### Age of children in care

Child care usage varied with age particularly for formal care (table 3). In 1996, the use of formal care by very young children was low (8% of children under one year), but increased rapidly from age one (22%) up to the age of four (62%). This reflects preschool attendance of 3–4 year old children. From age five, when most children had started school, the proportions of children using formal care dropped sharply (12% of children aged five) and continued to decrease as children grew older (6% of children aged 9–11).

In 1996, the proportion of children using informal care was higher for children below school age, than for older children. Over 40% of children aged 1–4 years used formal care compared with around 34% of those aged 5–11 years.

### Reasons for using care

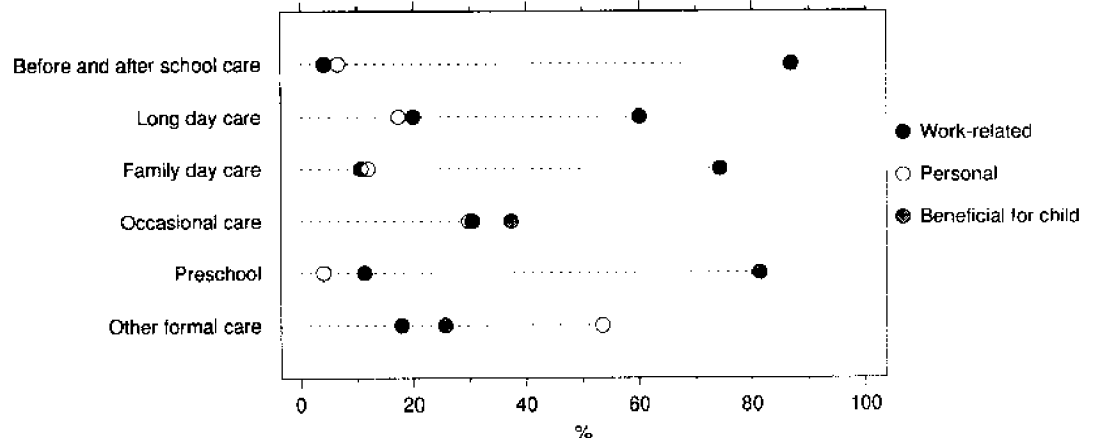
Reasons for using child care varied by the type of care used (table 8). Children who attended before and after school care programs, family day care and long day care used these types of care primarily because of the work-related reasons of their parents (87%, 74% and 60% respectively of all reasons given). Child care for work-related reasons also included care while parents were looking for work or studying/training for work.

In contrast 81% of those children who attended preschool did so mainly because parents felt it was beneficial for the child.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

The main reason given for using informal care was also related to parent's work, with 47% using informal care for this reason (table 9). However, parent's personal reasons were also given for 41% of children.

## COST OF CARE

### Cost and type of care

The cost of care varied considerably depending on the type of care. Of those children who used informal care, 86% did so at no cost (table 10).

For 31% of children who attended long day care and 24% who attended family day care the cost was \$60 or more per week. In comparison, for the majority of children attending preschool, the cost was less than \$20 per week.

### Weekly family income

In general, as family income increased the proportion of children who used care also increased (table 11), in reflection of the increasing proportion of families with both parents working. For children in families with a weekly family income of less than \$400, 43% used some form of care, compared with 75% of children in families with a weekly family income in excess of \$2,000.

### Childcare Cash Rebate

The Childcare Cash Rebate (CCR) is a non-means tested payment to families for work-related child care costs that exceed \$16.50 per week. The CCR was claimed for 278,600 children using formal and/or informal care. This represented a take-up rate (proportion of those eligible) of 56% (table 13).

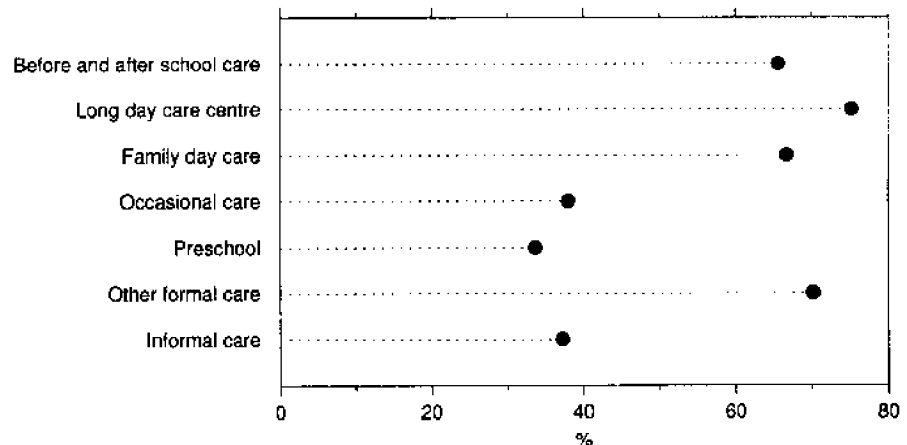
The proportion of children for whom the CCR was claimed varied depending on the type of care. The take-up rate was over 65% for children using before and after school care, long day care and family day care (table 13). In comparison, the rebate was claimed for only 34% of eligible children attending preschool, and 38% of those eligible who used occasional care.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

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The take-up rate for the CCR increased with income. Families with weekly incomes of \$1,500 to \$1,999 had the highest take-up rate of 70%, while families with incomes less than \$400 had the lowest rate (44%).

For eligible children who used paid care for which the CCR was not claimed, the survey collected the main reason for not claiming the rebate (table 14). While not being aware of the rebate was a major reason for not claiming the CCR (61% for formal care and 42% for informal care), a sizeable proportion of families using informal care indicated that the carer not being registered was an important factor (44%).

### DEMAND FOR FORMAL CHILD CARE

The survey also sought information from parents as to whether their child care requirements were met. Those families not using child care were asked if they would have liked to use child care if it were available. Those families already using child care were asked about their interest in additional care.

### Changes in demand over time

The vast majority of families (over 90%) indicated they had no additional need for child care. This was the case for families not currently using any form of care, as well as for those using either formal or informal care. Around 8% of children (261,700) under 12 years of age were reported as requiring (additional) formal care in 1996 (table 15), a fall from 16% of children (489,200) in 1993. Over the same period, the number of Commonwealth supported child care places increased from 196,000 to 301,000<sup>1</sup>. Readers should be aware there has been a change in question wording from the previous ABS Child Care Survey—see the Explanatory Notes. However, this is not expected to have had a major impact on the figures.

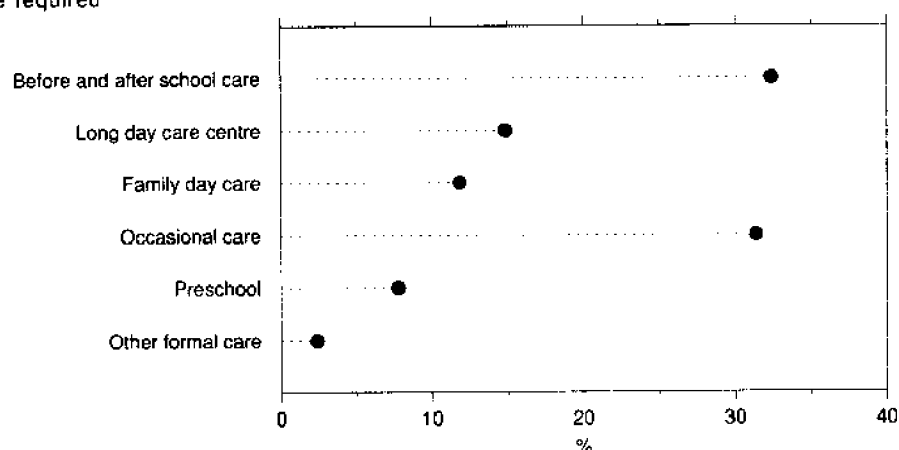

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

### Type of care required

In 1996, the main type of additional care required was before and after school care (32% or 84,900 of children requiring extra care) and occasional care (31% or 82,100) (table 16). The proportion requiring before and after school care has grown from 26% since 1993, reflecting the increasing proportions of families where both parents work full time. The proportion requiring occasional care has fallen from 39% in 1993 to 31% in 1996.

### Type of (additional) formal care required



The level of demand and the type of formal care required varied between age groups. Demand was higher in the 0-4 age group with 11% of children (143,000) requiring (additional) formal care. Of these, 40% required occasional care (57,300) and 25% required long day care (36,300). In the 5-11 age group 7% of children (118,800) required (additional) formal care. Of these, 69% required before and after school care (81,600) and 21% required some form of occasional care (24,800).

Parental work remains the single largest reason for requiring (additional) formal care with 37% of children requiring care for this reason (table 17). Again differences are apparent between age groups.

For children aged 0-4 personal reasons were stated for 47% of children who required (additional) formal care, while work-related reasons were stated for 33%. The opposite pattern is observed in the 5-11 age group where work-related reasons were stated for 60% of children, and personal reasons were given for 30%.

For 41% of children who required (additional) formal care, the main reasons given for not using care were that none existed in their area or parents did not know of any in their area or there were no places in existing centres (table 21). However, for 16% of children, the parents said the care was too expensive. Inevitably, questions on additional child care are speculative in nature. This may be more so for some respondents than others. For 13% of children whose parents reported additional requirements, the parents indicated they had not checked whether appropriate child care was available.



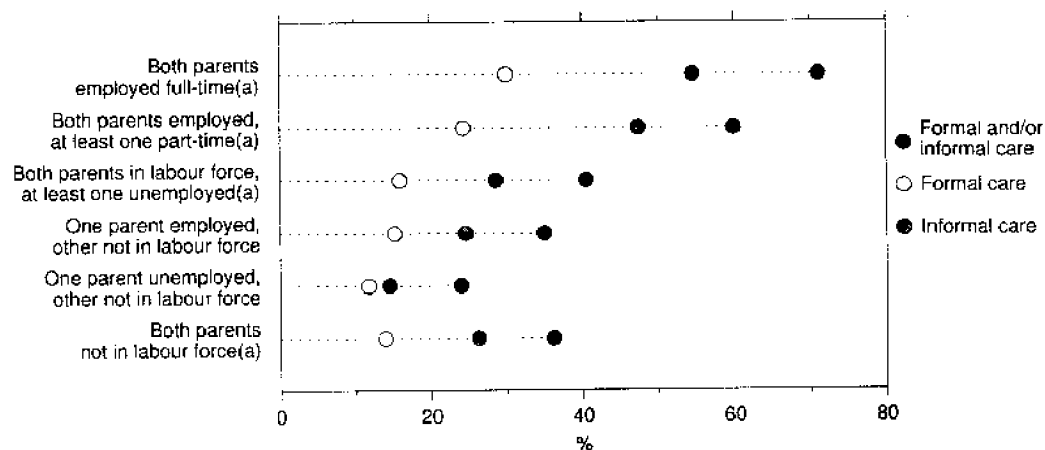

### WORK AND CHILD CARE

#### Use of care by employed parents

As already noted, child care is linked to work commitments of parents, particularly mothers. In 1996, 47% of children were in families with both parents (or the lone parent) employed either full or part time (table 23). The proportion of all children under 12 years using child care was 71% for children with both parents (or the lone parent) working full time, and 60% for those with a parent working part time (and the other parent also employed, in the case of couple families). The lowest level of usage (24%) was by children in couple families where one parent was unemployed and the other not in the labour force.

#### Care for sick children

When a child falls sick and needs time off school or to be away from child care, alternative arrangements must be made to care for the child. For families where both parents are employed or for an employed lone parent, this may involve a parent taking time off work. Of the 872,900 families with children where both parents worked, 56% had children who had been sick and needed to be away from school or child care in the previous six months.

In close to half (49%) of couple families with a sick child and both parents employed, one or other parent took time off (table 26). More mothers (41%) compared with fathers (21%) took time off. A significant proportion of parents who took time off work to care for sick children did not take formal leave. Almost 33% of mothers and 43% of fathers who took time off either used flexitime, worked at home or made up time. Mothers who took time off were more likely than fathers to take unpaid leave (28% compared with 16%). Both mothers and fathers who took time off were more likely to take sick leave (23% and 21% respectively), than they were to take family or special leave (13% and 16% respectively).

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

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A similar proportion of employed lone parents took time off to care for sick children (50%) compared with couple families with both parents employed (49%) (table 27). Lone parents who worked full time were more likely to take time off (70%) than those who worked part time (37%). Employed lone parents who took time off mostly used unpaid leave (39%) and sick leave (29%).

Half of all families with employed parents where a child was sick used arrangements other than a parent taking time off from work. In the majority of these cases children were cared for by a relative.

### Balancing work and family responsibility

Increasingly, employers and workplaces acknowledge the need for workers to balance work and family responsibilities. A range of provisions have been introduced over the years which assist families to do this. These include flexitime, permanent part-time work, home-based work and job sharing. In families with at least one parent employed, parents were asked if they used any of these work arrangements to assist them to care for their children.

Mothers were more likely to make use of particular work arrangements than fathers (69% compared with 26%) (table 29). Flexible working hours were the most frequently used option for both fathers (16%) and mothers (31%). However, 29% of mothers and 1% of fathers indicated they chose permanent part-time work so that they would not need to use child care. For parents with children under 12, around 7% of fathers and 18% of mothers worked at home so that they could also care for their children.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

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### INTRODUCTION

**1** This publication contains results from the Child Care Survey conducted throughout Australia in March 1996. It is a continuation of a series of surveys on this topic, conducted since 1969. The previous survey was in June 1993. The major aim of the survey was to collect data on the use of, and demand for, child care for children aged less than 12 years. Information was also collected on the use and non-use of the Childcare Cash Rebate as well as the working arrangements of parents with children under 12.

### SCOPE AND COVERAGE

**2** The Child Care Survey was conducted as a supplement to the Monthly Population Survey (MPS) which is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hospitals, hotels, etc.). The MPS is described more fully in *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

**3** Information for the Child Care Survey was collected only from private dwellings with children under 12 years of age resident in the selected dwelling. Children visiting the dwelling were excluded. A number of questions applicable to the family were asked only once for each family and were included on the first questionnaire completed for a child in that family.

**4** Also excluded were an estimated 7,000 children living in remote and sparsely settled parts of the Northern Territory. These children were estimated to account for around 18% of the Northern Territory's population under 12 years of age.

### SURVEY METHOD

**5** Information about the use of, and demand for child care was obtained through interviews conducted over a two-week period between 11 and 23 March 1996. Data collected on the use of child care related to the week prior to interview.

**6** Information was obtained from the child's parent, step-parent or guardian. The classification into care type was generally based on the respondent's perception. During the interview they were shown cards listing the types of care and only if they asked for clarification, were they given a more detailed description.

### DEMAND FOR FORMAL CARE

**7** Indicators of demand for formal child care services have been collected in child care surveys conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) for some time. The 1996 survey asked parents whether they wanted to use any, or additional, formal care services in the four weeks preceding the survey.

**8** There has been a change in question wording for the 1996 survey. Previous surveys asked the question, 'Was there any time in the last four weeks when you would have liked to use any (more) of these services?'. This is in comparison to the wording of the 1996 survey, which asked 'Was there any time in the last four weeks when [you/you and (*spouse/partner*)] wanted to use any (more) of these services for [the child], but didn't?'.<sup>1</sup>

**9** Additional requirements for child care identified in response to a survey question will not necessarily all be the kind that would attract increased public provision of child care services. They fit into the category of demand that Bradshaw<sup>1</sup> describes as *felt need*, that is, a requirement as articulated by an individual, judging his or her own circumstances.

**10** A limitation of using *felt need* as an unqualified measure of demand for a service is that it does not indicate under what conditions the demand would become effective. Further information gathered in ABS child care surveys has been designed to address this as far as is possible. Thus, if formal care was required, parents were then asked what type of care was required for their children, and how much. If formal care was not required, parents were asked why they did not need this type of care. Parents who stated they had a requirement for formal care were also asked whether the care was available to be used during the four week reference period. If they reported that the care was available, they were then asked why they did not use it. If respondents answered that the service was not available, they were asked the main reason why they perceived it as being unavailable.

**11** A demand measure can also be derived by reference to minimum standards of social provision established by policy makers and relevant experts. This is referred to as *normative need* because it is based on established norms or values. Information from the Child Care Survey on the family size and income of those using formal care enables the impact of such norms as exist in service eligibility criteria to be observed.

**12** Bradshaw's typology of social need also includes concepts of *expressed need*, based on action taken by individuals, and *comparative need*, where relative standards applying to groups in society are established. None of these measures alone is capable of giving an accurate measure of the broad and complex nature of social need. Policy makers depend on a range of measures in order to plan service levels and to target delivery. These must also be related to criteria for using a particular service and who this service is aimed at. Data from this survey can be used to develop complex models and resource allocation formulas in order to assist the policy making decision process.

## TECHNICAL NOTES

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### ESTIMATION PROCEDURE

**1** Estimates obtained from the survey were derived using a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that they conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age, sex and State. Estimates of the distribution of households by State and number of persons were also used to improve the estimation procedure.

### RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

**2** Estimates provided in this publication are subject to non-sampling and sampling errors.

### NON-SAMPLING ERROR

**3** Non-sampling errors may arise as a result of errors in the reporting, recording or processing of the data and can occur even if there is a complete enumeration of the population. These errors can be introduced through inadequacies in the questionnaire, non-response; inaccurate reporting by respondents; errors in the application of survey procedures; incorrect recording of answers; and errors in data entry and processing.

**4** It is difficult to measure the size of non-sampling errors and the extent of these errors could vary considerably in significance from survey to survey and from question to question. However, every effort is made in the design of the survey and development of survey procedures to minimise the effects of these errors.

### SAMPLING ERROR

**5** Sampling error is the error which occurs by chance because the data were only obtained from a sample, not the entire population.

### STANDARD ERROR OF ESTIMATES

**6** One measure of the variability of estimates which occurs as a result of surveying only a sample of the population is the *standard error* (SE). This measures the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of households was included. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20, that it is within two standard errors. That is, there are 19 chances in 20 that the true estimate is in the range:

$x - 2SE(x)$  to  $x + 2SE(x)$   
(where  $x$  is the estimate)

**7** The SE of an estimate may be obtained from the tables below.

### RELATIVE STANDARD ERRORS

**8** The SE can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the *relative standard error* (RSE). Whilst the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases, the RSE will decrease so that larger estimates are relatively more reliable than smaller ones.

**9** The RSE is determined by dividing the SE of an estimate  $SE(x)$  by the estimate  $x$  and expressing it as a percentage. That is:

$$RSE(x) = SE(x) \times \left( \frac{100}{x} \right)$$

**10** Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the RSE of a proportion or percentage is—

$$RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 + [RSE(y)]^2}$$

**11** Only estimates with an RSE of less than 25% are regarded as sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates and percentages with larger RSE have been included in this publication, preceded by an \* to indicate that they should only be used with caution.

## GLOSSARY



<b>Area of usual residence</b>	<p><i>State Capital Cities:</i> This includes the Statistical Divisions of Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide, Perth and Hobart. Please note that Darwin and Canberra are <i>excluded</i> from this category.</p> <p><i>Balance of Australia:</i> Includes all areas outside of the capital cities mentioned above plus Canberra and Darwin.</p>
<b>Before and after school care program</b>	A type of formal care available to school-aged children before and/or after school hours.
<b>Brother/sister care</b>	Informal care by the child's brothers or sisters, including step brothers or sisters.
<b>Child care</b>	Relates to those types of care described as formal and informal.
<b>Childcare Cash Rebate (CCR)</b>	The Childcare Cash Rebate scheme pays families a percentage of their work-related child care costs. It is not means tested. It is funded by the Department of Health and Family Services and paid through Medicare offices.
<b>Children</b>	Refers to all children under 12 years of age in scope for the survey.
<b>Cost of care</b>	Money paid by parents for child to attend child care (including no cost).
<b>Eligible children for the CCR</b>	Children who used work-related care for which their parents paid, where the total fees for work-related care for the family were at least \$16.50, and the family had not already received the maximum weekly rebate allowable (\$28.20 per week for one child, \$61.20 per week for two or more children).
<b>Employed persons, employees</b>	<p>See <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (6203.0) for more details. To facilitate data collection, the 1993 and 1996 Child Care Surveys used a slightly different definition of 'employee' from the standard ABS definition. The Child Care Surveys included the following, normally excluded:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◆ those who worked for less than one hour in the reference week; and</li> <li>◆ persons on leave without pay for more than four weeks;</li> </ul> <p>and excluded the following persons, who would normally be included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◆ persons receiving payment in kind from an employer; and</li> <li>◆ persons operating their own incorporated enterprise, with or without hiring employees.</li> </ul>
<b>Family</b>	For the purpose of this publication, a family consists of one or two parents and one or more children under 12 years of age, regardless of whether older children or other relatives are also usually resident.
<b>Family day care</b>	A type of formal care offered in private homes by registered carers, available for a full day to children of all ages.
<b>Family type</b>	Refers to one parent or couple families.
<b>Father</b>	The natural, adopted or step father of the child; or the male legal guardian of the child; or the spouse or de facto partner of the mother.
<b>Full-time/part-time workers</b>	<p><i>Full-time workers</i> are employed persons who usually worked 35 hours or more a week and others who, although usually work less than 35 hours a week, worked 35 hours or more during the reference week.</p> <p><i>Part-time workers</i> are employed persons who usually worked less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the reference week.</p>

## GLOSSARY *continued*

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<b>Formal care</b>	Regulated care away from the child's home, which includes Preschool; Before and after school care program; Long day care centre; Family day care; Occasional care and Other formal care.
<b>Informal care</b>	Non-regulated care either in the child's home or elsewhere. It includes care by (step)brothers or sisters; care by relatives (including non-custodial parent) and by non-relatives such as friends, neighbours or babysitters. It may be paid or unpaid.
<b>Long day care centre</b>	Regulated, centre-based care which is available to children between birth and school age for the full day. Centres are usually open for most of the year.
<b>Main type of (additional) formal</b>	Main type of (additional) formal care required for children already using formal care and for those children who do not use any. Respondents were asked 'was there any time in the last four weeks when they would have liked to use any (more) formal care services'. See 'Demand for Formal Care' in the Explanatory Notes.
<b>Mother</b>	The natural, adopted or step mother of the child; or the female legal guardian of the child; or the spouse or de facto partner of the father.
<b>Non-relative care</b>	Care by people who are not related to the child.
<b>Occasional care</b>	Regulated care, which is generally available to children between birth and school age for short periods of time to allow parents to shop, attend appointments, or to take brief breaks from parenting.
<b>Other formal care</b>	This includes any other non home-based formal care whose primary function is the care of children for short periods of time. It also includes adjunct care. An example is; facilities available at a fitness centre to care for the child while the parent participates in the centre's activities.
<b>Other relative care</b>	Care by relations of the child excluding (step) brothers and sisters; includes the child's grandparents as well as in-laws, ex-wives/husbands of the parent interviewed.
<b>Preschool</b>	A type of formal care generally available in school hours during school terms for children from three years of age (younger children are sometimes accepted) up to the school starting age. Children usually have fixed attendance times. Also known as kindergarten in some States.
<b>Reason used care</b>	The respondent was asked to identify their main reason for using child care.  <i>Work-related reasons</i> include looking for work and studying/training for work.  <i>Personal reasons</i> include non work-related study or training, shopping, entertainment, social or sporting activities, give parents a break/time alone, care for relatives, visit doctor, or undertake voluntary/community activities.  <i>Beneficial for child reasons</i> include good for child and to prepare them for school.
<b>Take-up rate</b>	The take-up rate for the Childcare Cash Rebate is the proportion of eligible children whose parents claimed or intended to claim the rebate.
