


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

March quarter 1995 compared with December quarter 1994 ----

Excess of merchandise exports or imports

In the March quarter 1995 merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$2,167 million. The increase of \$792 million in the deficit on merchandise trade occurred mainly as a result of a decrease in exports which was partly offset by a small fall in imports.


Australia's trade with its major trading partners produced deficits with:

- USA, up \$108 million (4%) to \$2,769 million;
- UK, down \$33 million (6%) to \$510 million; and
- China, down \$89 million (35%) to \$166 million.

Surpluses were recorded with:

- Republic of Korea, up \$74 million (10%) to \$834 million;
- Japan, down \$257 million (29%) to \$623 million;
- Singapore, up \$95 million (24%) to \$497 million;
- New Zealand, down \$34 million (11%) to \$264 million; and
- Taiwan, up \$43 million (43%) to \$143 million.


GRAPH 1: AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES Excess of exports(+) or imports(-)



Merchandise exports

Merchandise exports for March quarter 1995 were \$16,268 million, down \$886 million or 5 per cent on the previous quarter.

The exports commodity groups recording significant decreases on the previous quarter were:

- food and live animals, down \$638 million (19%) to \$2,800 (due mainly to decreased exports of sugar, meat and dairy products);
- crude materials, down \$208 million (6%) to \$3,429 million (due mainly to decreased exports of textile fibres); and
- machinery and transport equipment, down \$158 million (8%) to \$1,889 million (due mainly to decreased exports of office machines and computers, road vehicles and electrical machinery).

An increase was recorded for commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC, up \$162 million (10%) to \$1.764 million (due mainly to an increase in exports of gold).


Australia's major export destinations were:

- Japan, down \$365 million (9%) to \$3,821 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$61 million (5%) to \$1,353 million:
- USA, down \$51 million (4%) to \$1,122 million;
- New Zealand, down \$122 million (10%) to \$1,117 million:
- Singapore, up \$91 million (10%) to \$1,041 million;
- China, up \$1 million to \$755 million:
- Taiwan, down \$75 million (9%) to \$736 million;
- Hong Kong, down \$54 million (8%) to \$586 million.

Merchandise imports

Merchandise imports for March quarter 1995 were \$18,435 million, down \$94 million, less than 1 per cent, on the previous quarter.

The imports commodity groups recording significant decreases on the previous quarter were:

- miscellaneous manufactured articles, down \$223 million (8%) to \$2,579 million (due mainly to decreased imports of miscellaneous manufactured articles);
- machinery and transport equipment, down \$215 million (2%) to \$8,531 million (due mainly to decreased imports of road vehicles, telecommunications and general industrial machinery);
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$44 million (2%) to \$2,700 million (due mainly to decreased imports of textiles); and
- beverages and tobacco, down \$27 million (18%) to \$120 million (due to decreased imports of beverages).

Increases were recorded for *mineral fuels*, up \$199 million (27%) to \$931 million (due mainly to increased imports of petroleum); and for *chemicals*, up \$147 million (8%) to \$2,051 million (due mainly to increased imports of fertilisers and inorganic chemicals).

Australia's major import sources were:

- USA, up \$57 million (1%) to \$3,891 million;
- Japan, down \$108 million (3%) to \$3,198 million;
- Germany, up \$111 million (10%) to \$1,250 million;
- UK, down \$99 million (9%) to \$1,040 million;
- China, down \$89 million (9%) to \$920 million;
- New Zealand, down \$89 million (9%) to \$853 million:

- Taiwan, down \$118 million (17%) to \$593 million;
- Singapore, down \$4 million (1%) to \$544 million.

Year ended March 1995 compared with year ended March 1994 —

Excess of merchandise exports or imports


For the year ended March 1995 merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$5,458 million, a turnaround of \$5,758 million from the surplus of \$300 million recorded for the previous year.

Australia's trade with its major trading partners produced deficits with:

- USA, up \$1,985 million (23%) to \$10,567 million;
- UK, up \$1,197 million (162%) to \$1,935 million;
- China, down \$23 million (4%) to \$592 million.

Surpluses were recorded with Japan, down \$576 million (14%) to \$3,507 million; Republic of Korea, up \$233 million (8%) to \$3,009 million; Singapore, down \$109 million (7%) to \$1,392 million; New Zealand, up \$334 (44%) to \$1,091 million; and Taiwan, down \$90 million (19%) to \$392 million.

Merchandise exports

Merchandise exports for the year ended March 1995 were \$65,960 million, up \$2,418 million or 4 per cent on the previous year.


The exports commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous year were:

 manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$1,024 million (13%) to \$8,699 million (due to increased exports in all categories with the largest being in non-ferrous metals, non-metallic mineral manufactures, leather, and iron and steel);

- crude materials, up \$986 million (8%) to \$13,656 million (due mainly to increased exports of textiles);
- machinery and transport equipment, up \$721 million (10%) to \$7,927 million (due mainly to increased exports of telecommunications equipment, electrical machinery, and office machines and computers).

Decreases were recorded for mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, down \$587 million (5%) to \$11,002 million (due to decreased exports of coal), and commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere, down \$337 million (5%) to \$6,255 million (due mainly to decreased exports of gold).

GRAPH 5: COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS




Australia's major export destinations were:

- Japan, up \$374 million (2%) to \$16,135 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$262 million (6%) to \$4,923 million;
- USA, down \$383 million (8%) to \$4,688 million;
- New Zealand, up \$713 million (18%) to \$4,577 million;
- Singapore, up \$471 million (15%) to \$3,609 million:
- China, up \$552 million (23%) to \$2,955 million;
- Taiwan, up \$133 million (5%) to \$2,924 million; and
- Hong Kong, down \$73 million (3%) to \$2,594 million.

Merchandise imports


Merchandise imports for the year ended March 1995 were \$71,419 million, up \$8,177 million or 13 per cent on the previous year.

The imports commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous year were:


- machinery and transport equipment, up \$5,145 million (18%) to \$33,257 million (due to increased imports in all categories, with the largest being in road vehicles, office machines and computers, machinery specialised for particular industries, electrical machinery and telecommunications equipment);
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$1,191 million (13%) to \$10,469 million (due to increased imports in all categories, with the largest being in paper and paperboard, textile yarn, and manufactures of metal);
- miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$949 million (10%) to \$10,521 million (due mainly to increased imports of miscellaneous manufactured articles, articles of apparel and clothing, photographic equipment, optical goods and clocks and professional, scientific and controlling instruments); and
- chemical and related products, up \$749 million (11%) to \$7,651 million (due mainly to increased imports of organic chemicals, medicinal and pharmaceutical products, fertilisers and essential oils and resinoids).

Decreases were recorded in imports of commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere, down \$276 million (25%) to \$845 million (due mainly to decreased imports of gold); and mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, down \$121 million (3%) to \$3,453 million (due to a fall in imports of petroleum).

Australia's major import sources were:

- -USA, up \$1,603 million (12%) to \$15,256 million;
- Japan, up \$950 million (8%) to \$12,629 million;
- Germany, up \$721 million (19%) to \$4,420 million;
- UK, up \$578 million (16%) to \$4.218 million;
- China, up \$529 million (18%) to \$3,547 million;
- New Zealand, up \$380 million (12%) to \$3,487 million:
- Taiwan, up \$224 million (10%) to \$2,532 million;
- Singapore, up \$578 million (35%) to \$2,217 million.

REVISIONS

Revisions since the last issue of this publication have:

- increased total exports for the December quarter 1994 by \$45 million, and for the twelve months ended December 1994 by \$58 million;
- resulted in virtually no change to total imports for either the December quarter or for the twelve months ended December 1994; and
- decreased the merchandise trade deficit for the December quarter 1994 by \$46 million, and for the twelve months ended December 1994 by \$59 million.

These revisions resulted in generally small changes to a large number of commodities and countries, with no significant contributor.

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

Commencing with this issue, several changes have been made to the content of the tables in this publication. Details of the changes are:

- Table 5 has been expanded to include data on exports and imports by country for the previous quarter as well as the current quarter.
- A new table, Table 6, has been added. It shows exports and imports by Standard International Trade Classification Sections and Divisions for the current quarter, previous quarter, and corresponding quarter of the previous year.
- As a result of the inclusion of the new table, tables numbered 6 through 17 in previous issues of this publication have been renumbered as Tables 7 through 18.
- Changes have been made to Tables 2, 5, 8, 17 and 18 to reflect the expanded membership of the European Union (EU) country group to include Austria, Finland and Sweden, who joined the EU on I January 1995. As outlined in paragraph 17 of the Explanatory Notes, statistics for all periods shown in this publication include Austria, Finland and Sweden in the EU.
- As all the new members of the EU were, prior to I January 1995, members of the European Free Trade Association (EFTA), data for that country group will not be included in this and future issues of this publication.

Changes have also been made to the Explanatory Notes and Appendix to reflect these changes.

AUSTRALIA'S MERCHANDISE TRADE WITH APEC MEMBER ECONOMIES

INTRODUCTION

This article reviews the pattern of merchandise trade between Australia and the member economics of the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) forum over the five year period from 1990 to 1994. It examines the significance of Australia's total trade with the members of APEC, and analyses Australia's trade with individual member economies, including the major commodities imported and exported. The statistics are presented on an international trade basis (rather than a balance of payments basis) and are classified according to the Standard International Trade Classification Rev 3 (SITC).


BACKGROUND

- 2. The Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation forum (APEC) was formed in 1989 in recognition of the growing interdependence of economies in the Asia-Pacific region. It began as an informal group but has rapidly developed into a major regional vehicle for promoting open trade and practical regional cooperation. There are currently 18 member economies and a three year moratorium has been imposed on new members.
- 3. When APEC was formed in 1989 there were 12 member economies: Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Indonesia, Japan, the Republic of Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and the United States of America. Since then the following economies have joined: Chile (1994), the People's Republic of China (1991), Hong Kong (1991), Mexico (1993), Papua New Guinea (1993) and Chinese Taipei (Taiwan) (1991).

ANALYSIS OF RECENT TRENDS


4. Trade with APEC member economies has dominated Australia's external trading patterns over the last five years, accounting for almost three quarters of Australia's global trade in 1994. In that year APEC member economies accounted for nine of Australia's top ten export destinations and seven of the top ten import sources (see Graphs 1 and 2). While there were no changes in the composition of Australia's top ten trading partners between 1990 and 1994, all APEC member economies in the top ten, with the exception of Japan and the USA, increased their share of Australian merchandise trade.

- 5. Table A (over page) shows the value of Australia's merchandise exports and imports with each of the APEC member economies for the five years from 1990 to 1994. Table B shows the value of Australia's total merchandise exports to and imports from each of the member economies for 1990 and 1994, the significance of this trade expressed as a percentage of Australia's total exports and imports, and the excess of exports over imports (trade balance) with each member.
- 6. The relative importance of Australia's merchandise trade with APEC has increased slightly over the five year period from 1990 to 1994. Australia's merchandise exports to APEC member economies increased from 72.1 per cent of total exports in 1990 to 77 per cent in 1994. Similarly, Australia's imports from the APEC region increased from 66.4 per cent of total imports in 1990 to 68.4 per cent in 1994.
- 7. Australia recorded a trade surplus with the APEC group as a whole in each year of the five year period, with the size of the surplus ranging from a high of \$6,215m in 1991 to a low of \$3,421m in 1994.
- 8. Australia recorded a trade surplus with 12 of its 17 APEC trading partners in 1990, with the number increasing to 14 by 1994. In 1990, APEC member economies accounted for six of Australia's largest ten bilateral trade surpluses and only one of Australia's largest ten bilateral trade deficits (the USA). By 1994, nine of Australia's largest ten bilateral trade surpluses and two of Australia's largest ten bilateral trade deficits (the USA and China) were with APEC member economies,
- 9. The remainder of this article focuses on developments in merchandise trade between Australia and selected APEC member economies over the five year period from 1990 to 1994. Where the member economy joined APEC after 1990 (see paragraph 3), the whole of the five year period is examined. It should be noted that, in Australia's international trade statistics by country, confidential commodity data are not reported against the commodity, but rather are classified to SITC division 98 combined confidential items of trade. As a result, while confidentiality restrictions do not impact on total trade figures by country they can impact on data at the commodity level.



JAPAN

10. In each of the years from 1990 to 1994 Japan was by far Australia's major trading partner. In nominal terms the value of Australia's trade (exports plus imports) with Japan increased by 23.2 per cent, from \$22,800m in 1990 to \$28,111m in 1994. Japan's share of Australia's total trade, however, has decreased marginally over the five year period, from 22.6 per cent in 1990 to 21.1 per cent in 1994.



11. Australia recorded a trade surplus with Japan in each of the years from 1990 to 1994; however, the trade surplus has been steadily declining since 1991. In 1991 the trade surplus measured \$6,092m but by 1994 this had decreased to \$3,911m.



Exports

- 12. During the five years from 1990 to 1994 Japan was Australia's leading export destination. As shown in Graph 3, exports to Japan increased in nominal terms by 19 per cent, from \$13,441m in 1990 to \$16,011m in 1994. However, Japan's proportion of Australia's total exports decreased from 26.4 per cent in 1990 to 24.6 per cent in 1994.
- 13. Coal. coke and briquettes (SITC 32) was the most significant group of commodities exported to Japan in 1994; however, in terms of Australia's total exports to Japan this commodity group declined in importance over the five years from 1990 to 1994. In 1990, trade in these goods accounted for 23.5 per cent of Australia's total exports to Japan, decreasing to 19.9 per cent in 1994. In terms of Australia's total exports of these goods, Japan was Australia's most important export destination, accounting for 47.2 per cent of this trade in 1994.
- 14. Exports of meat and meat preparations (SITC 01) have shown a 71.4 per cent increase in value over the period. The commodity principally responsible for this growth in trade was meat of bovine animals, fresh, chilled or frozen (SITC 011). Exports of meat increased from 7.6 per cent of total exports to Japan in 1990 to 11 per cent in 1994. Japan's proportion of Australia's total exports of meat increased from 33.2 per cent in 1990 to 46.3 per cent in 1994.

Imports

- 15. Since 1990 Japan has been Australia's second largest source of imports. Between 1990 and 1994 imports from Japan increased by 29.3 per cent, from \$9,358m in 1990 to \$12,100m in 1994 (see Graph 3). The significance of the Japanese market as a source of Australia's total imports, however, decreased from 18.8 per cent to 17.8 per cent over the five year period.
- 16. Australia's imports from Japan are dominated by machinery and transport equipment (SITC 7). In 1990 these goods accounted for 74.6 per cent of imports from Japan, increasing to 77.1 per cent by 1994.




17. The largest component of this commodity group was road vehicles (including air-cushion vehicles) (SITC 78) which accounted for 42,3 per cent of total imports from Japan in 1994, an increase from 34,8 per cent in 1990. The value of road vehicle imports from Japan increased

by 57.4 per cent between 1990 and 1994, from \$3,252m to \$5,119m. Despite the value of Australia's total imports of road vehicles increasing by 65.1 per cent between 1990 and 1994, the proportion of road vehicles imported from Japan declined. In 1990 Japan was the source of 67.4 per cent of Australia's total imports of road vehicles; by 1994, this proportion had dropped to 64.3 per cent, after peaking at 74.4 per cent in 1991 (see Graph 4).

18. Office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75) was the second largest group of commodities imported from Japan in 1994 accounting for 8.5 per cent of imports. Imports of this commodity increased in value by 10.5 per cent from \$927m in 1990 to \$1,024m in 1994. This growth was largely due to a 24.5 per cent increase in imports of parts and accessories for use with office and automatic data processing machines (SITC 759) over the period. However, this increase was partly offset by a decrease of 7.4 per cent in imports of automatic data processing machines (SITC 752).

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

19. Since 1990, the USA has been Australia's second most important trading partner with the value of total trade increasing by 10.2 per cent, from \$17,673m in 1990 to \$19,481m in 1994. However, the USA's share of Australia's total trade has decreased from 17.6 per cent in 1990 to 14.6 per cent in 1994, with decreasing shares of both exports and imports.

20. In each of the years from 1990 to 1994 Australia's largest trade deficit with any country in the world was with the USA. Over this period Australia's trade deficit with the USA increased by 68 per cent, from \$6,071m in 1990 to \$10,197m in 1994. The majority of this increase in the trade deficit occurred between 1993 and 1994 and was due to a large increase in imports and decline in exports.

Exports

21. In 1994, the USA was Australia's third largest export destination, down from second position in 1990. Total exports to the USA decreased by 20 per cent from \$5,801m in 1990 to \$4,642m in 1994 (see Graph 5). This represented a decrease in the USA's share of Australia's total exports, from 11.4 per cent in 1990 to 7.1 per cent in 1994. The majority of this drop occurred between 1993 and 1994, when exports to the USA dropped from \$5,067m in 1993 to \$4,642m in 1994.



- 22. Meat and meat preparations (SITC 01) was the largest single group of commodities exported to the USA; the major component of this group was meat of hovine animals, fresh. chilled or frozen (SITC 011). Trade in meat with the USA decreased in value by 29.8 per cent over the five year period, with the most notable decrease occurring between 1993 and 1994 when the value dropped from \$1,079m in 1993 to \$807m in 1994. The USA was the destination for 37.2 per cent of Australia's meat exports in 1990; by 1994 this had decreased to 21.3 per cent.
- 23. Office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75) was the second largest single group of commodities exported to the USA in 1994. During the five year period to 1994, the value of these exports more than doubled, from \$144m in 1990 to \$297m in 1994, due to an increase of 131.4 per cent in the export of parts and accessories for use with office machines and data processing machines (SITC 759). In 1990 office machines accounted for only 2.5 per cent of Australia's exports to the USA, increasing to 6.4 per cent by 1994.

Imports

24. The USA was Australia's major source of imports over the five year period, supplying 23.8 per cent of Australia's total imports in 1990 and 21.8 per cent in 1994. The value of imports from the USA increased by 25 per cent over the period, from \$11,872m in 1990 to \$14,839m in 1994. As with exports, the largest annual percentage increase (12.5 per cent) occurred between 1993 and 1994.

- 25. Office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75) was the largest single group of commodities imported into Australia, accounting for 12.3 per cent of imports from the USA in 1994. The value of these goods increased by 24.3 per cent, from \$1,468m in 1990 to \$1,825m in 1994. This increase resulted from a 17.6 per cent increase in imports of automatic data processing machines and units thereof, magnetic, optical readers; data transcribers and processors (SITC 752) and a 37.8 per cent increase in imports of parts and accessories for use with office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 759). The USA was Australia's major source of imports of office machines, providing 35.1 per cent of total imports of these goods in 1994, down from 42.4 per cent in 1990.
- 26. Imports of transport equipment (excluding road vehicles) (SITC 79) were the most variable of the top commodity groups imported from the USA. Table D shows these imports decreasing in value by 43.5 per cent over the period from 1990 to 1994. As the major component of this commodity group is aircraft and associated equipment; spacecraft (including satellites and spacecraft launch vehicles; parts thereof) (SITC 792), imports of a small number of high value goods can cause large fluctuations in the data (see Graph 6).



NEW ZEALAND

- 27. In 1994, New Zealand was Australia's third most important trading partner with total trade valued at \$7,770m, an increase of 63.5 per cent from 1990. In 1994 New Zealand's share of Australia's total trade was 5.8 per cent, up from 4.7 per cent in 1990.
- 28. Over each of the five years from 1990 to 1994, Australia recorded a trade surplus with New Zealand, the surplus increasing from \$367m in 1990 to \$1,006m in 1994. The value of both imports and exports rose over the period, with exports increasing at a faster rate.



Exports


- 29. In 1994 New Zealand was Australia's fourth largest export destination, taking \$4,388m, or 6.8 per cent of Australia's total exports; an increase of 71.3 per cent from \$2,559m in 1990.
- 30. Road vehicles (including air-cushion vehicles) (SITC 78) accounted for 9.1 per cent of Australia's exports to New Zealand in 1994 with a value of \$397m, an 88.9 per cent increase from \$210m in 1990, when road vehicles represented 8.2 per cent of exports to New Zealand. The major component of this commodity group was motor vehicles principally designed for transport of persons (excluding public-transport type, including racing cars) (SITC 781) which increased by 87.7 per cent, from \$145m in 1990 to \$272m in 1994. In terms of Australia's total

exports of road vehicles, New Zealand was the major export destination in 1994 taking 39.2 per cent of exports, up from 28.5 per cent in 1990.

31. Petroleum, petroleum products and related materials (SITC 33) showed the largest increase in value for commodities exported to New Zealand. Exports increased by 203.6 per cent, from \$68m in 1990 to \$207m in 1994. The major commodities responsible for this large growth in trade were: petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude (SITC 333) which increased from \$8m in 1990 to \$71m in 1994; and petroleum oils, oils from bituminous materials (not crude); preparations, containing 70% or more by weight of these oils (SITC 334) which rose from \$52m in 1990 to \$136m in 1994.

Imports

- 32. New Zealand is Australia's fifth most important source of imports, with 5 per cent of imports in 1994 originating in New Zealand, up from 4.4 per cent in 1990. Over the five year period, the value of imports increased by 54.3 per cent, from \$2,192m in 1990 to \$3,382m in 1994.
- 33. -Cork and wood (SITC 24) was the major sinlge commodity group imported from New Zealand in 1994 and accounted for 7.2 per cent of total imports from this country. Imports of this commodity steadily increased over the period from \$116m in 1990 to \$245m in 1994 (see Graph 8). Wood is the commodity responsible for the increase in trade as no cork is imported from New Zealand. New Zealand was Australia's major source of wood, providing 40.5 per cent of Australia's total imports of wood in 1994, up from 25.4 per cent in 1990.



REPUBLIC OF KOREA

- 34. In 1994 the Republic of Korea was Australia's fourth most important trading partner, up from sixth in 1990. Over the five year period to 1994 the value of total trade increased by 55.6 per cent, from \$4,179m in 1990 to \$6,502m in 1994, while the Republic of Korea's share of Australia's total trade increased from 4.2 per cent in 1990 to 4.9 per cent in 1994.
- 35. Between 1990 and 1994 Australia recorded a steadily increasing trade surplus with the Republic of Korea, from \$1,789m in 1990 to \$2,970m in 1994. Although both exports and imports increased in value, exports increased at a faster rate, causing the increasing trade

surplus.



Exports

- 36. In 1994 the Republic of Korea was second only to Japan as a destination for Australia's exports. The value of exports to the Republic of Korea totalled \$4,736m in 1994, up 58.7 per cent on the 1990 value of \$2,984m. Over the five year period the Republic of Korea's share of Australia's exports increased from 5.9 per cent to 7.3 per cent.
- 37. Exports of *coal*, *coke* and *briquettes* (SITC 32) accounted for 17.8 per cent of total exports to the Republic of Korea in 1994, up slightly from 17.2 per cent in 1990, making it the largest single group of commodities exported in each of the years from 1990 to 1994. Between 1990 and 1994, the value of exports of these commodities rose by 64.2 per cent, from \$514m to \$844m. In terms

of Australia's total exports of *coal, coke and briquettes* the Republic of Korea was the destination for 12.5 per cent in 1994, up from 8.5 per cent in 1990.

38. While the value of export trade to the Republic of Korea increased in many commodities, the largest single commodity group increase was in exports of gold, non-monetary (excluding gold ores and concentrates) (SITC 97) which recorded a 189.6 per cent increase, from \$260m in 1990 to \$754m in 1994.

Imports

- 39. In 1994, the Republic of Korea was Australia's tenth most important import source (down from ninth in 1990) supplying \$1,766m of imports. Despite this drop in ranking, the value of imports increased by 47.8 per cent from \$1,195m in 1990. The Republic of Korea was the source of 2.6 per cent of Australia's total imports in 1994.
- 40. Road vehicles (including air-cushion vehicles) (SITC 78) was the largest single group of commodities imported in 1994. The value of these imports grew strongly between 1990 and 1994, rising by 280.6 per cent from \$79m in 1990 to \$300m in 1994. In 1990, road vehicles accounted for 6.6 per cent of total imports from the Republic of Korca, increasing to 17 per cent in 1994. In terms of Australia's total imports of these goods, the increase reflected a change from 1.6 per cent imported from the Republic of Korca in 1990 to 3.8 per cent in 1994.
- 41. Textile yarn, fabrics, made up articles nes, and related products (SITC 65) was the largest single group of commodities imported from the Republic of Korea in 1990 and 1991. Although the value of imports increased by 12.8 per cent over the five years, this group dropped to the second most important in 1994. The value of most commodities in this group remained stable over the five year period with fabrics, woven, of man made textile materials (excluding narrow or special fabrics) (SITC 653) being the only commodity to significantly increase in value.

PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA

42. Over the period 1990 to 1994, China's relative ranking as an Australian trading partner increased from ninth most important in 1990 to sixth in 1994. This change in ranking represents a 136 per cent increase in the value of total trade, from \$2,624m in 1990 to \$6,195m in 1994, and an increase in China's share of Australia's total trade from 2.6 per cent in 1990 to 4.7 per cent in 1994.


43. Australia has recorded a trade deficit with China in each of the years from 1990 to 1994, with the deficit steadily increasing from \$38m in 1990 to \$553m in 1994,

Exports

- 44. In 1994, China was Australia's seventh most important export destination, accounting for 4.3 per cent of Australia's total exports. The value of exports to China increased by 118.2 per cent from \$1,293m in 1990 to \$2,821m in 1994 (see Graph 10).
- 45. Textile fibres and their wastes (not manufactured into varn or fabric) (SITC 26) was the largest single group of commodities exported to China in 1994, accounting for 26.4 per cent of exports, an increase from 13.4 per cent in 1990. The value of this trade increased by 330.5 per cent over the five year period, from \$173m in 1990 to \$744m in 1994. The major commodities responsible for this large increase in value were wool and other animal hair (including wool tops) (SITC 268) and cotton (SITC 263). The value of wool exports increased steadily from \$138m in 1990 to \$666m in 1994, while the value of cotton increased from \$34m in 1990 to \$75m in 1994, despite a decrease in cotton exports between 1991 and 1993 (see Graph 11).



Imports

- 46. In 1994, China was ranked sixth as a source of Australian imports, up from seventh in 1990. The value of imports increased during this period by 153.4 per cent, from \$1,331m in 1990 to \$3,374m in 1994. China's share of Australia's total imports increased from 2.7 per cent in 1990 to 5 per cent in 1994.
- 47. The main group of commodities imported from China in 1994 was articles of apparel and clothing accessories (SITC 84) which increased in value by 155.3 per cent, from \$342m in 1990 to \$874m in 1994. These goods represented 25.9 per cent of Australia's total imports from China in 1994. In terms of Australia's total imports of these goods, China was a major supplier, accounting for 56.5 per cent of Australia's imports in 1994, an increase from 37.5 per cent in 1990.

SINGAPORE


- 48. In terms of total trade, Singapore was Australia's seventh most important trading partner in both 1990 and 1994, accounting for 4.2 per cent of Australia's total trade in 1994, an increase from 3.5 per cent in 1990. During the five year period, the value of total trade increased by 55.4 per cent from \$3,551m in 1990 to \$5,520m in 1994.
- 49. Australia's trade surplus with Singapore over the period 1990 to 1994 increased by 17.4 per cent, from \$1,183m in 1990 to \$1,390m in 1994, with the trade surplus peaking in 1992 at \$2,440m due to a surge in exports (see Graph 12).



Exports

50. Singapore was Australia's fifth most important export destination in 1994, taking 5.3 per cent of total Australian exports. The value of exports to Singapore increased by 45.9 per cent over the five year period from \$2,367m in 1990 to \$3,455m in 1994.



- 51. The most important commodity exported to Singapore in 1994 was gold, non-monetary (excluding gold ores and concentrates) (SITC 97), the value of which increased from \$917m in 1990 to \$1,435m in 1994, an increase of 56.5 per cent, with the value peaking at \$2,088m in 1992. Non-monetary gold represented 41.5 per cent of Australia's total exports to Singapore in 1994, an increase from 38.7 per cent in 1990. Singapore was Australia's most important destination for this commodity in 1994, taking 30.2 per cent of Australian exports.
- 52. Petroleum and petroleum products (SITC 33) was Australia's second largest single group of exports to Singapore in each year from 1990 to 1994. This commodity group represented 11.6 per cent of exports in 1994, a decrease from 23.3 per cent in 1990. The major commodity responsible for the decrease in trade over this period was petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude (SITC 333), exports of which decreased in value by 49.4 per cent. Petroleum oils, oils from bituminous materials (not crude); preparations, containing 70% or more by weight of these oils (SITC 334) increased in value by 48.1 per cent (see Graph 13).




Imports

53. Over the five years from 1990 to 1994, the ranking of Singapore as a source of Australia's imports increased from tenth in 1990 to eighth in 1994. This change reflected a 74.4 per cent increase in the value of imports from \$1,184m in 1990 to \$2,065m to 1994 (see Graph 12). The proportion of Australia's total imports from Singapore increased slightly from 2.4 per cent to 3 per cent over the period.

54. The largest group of commodities imported in 1994 was office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75). Australia's imports of these goods increased by 367.3 per cent over the period, from \$142m in 1990 to \$663m in 1994. In 1990 this commodity represented only 12 per cent of total imports from Singapore; by 1994 imports of office machines had increased significantly to account for 32.1 per cent. In 1994 Singapore was the source of 12.7 per cent of Australia's total imports of these goods.

CHINESE TAIPEI

55. In 1990 and 1994 Chinese Taipei was Australia's eighth most important trading partner with 4 per cent of total trade in 1994, up from 3.5 per cent in 1990. The value of total trade in 1994 was \$5,303m, up 50 per cent from \$3,543m in 1990.



56. Australia recorded a trade surplus with Chinese Taipei for each of the years from 1990 to 1994, with the surplus growing from \$15m in 1990 to \$393m in 1994, peaking at \$482m in 1993 (see Graph 14).


- 57. Chinese Taipei was Australia's sixth most important export destination in 1994, accounting for 4.4 per cent of Australia's exports. The value of exports between 1990 and 1994 increased by 60 per cent, from \$1,779m in 1990 to \$2,848m in 1994.
- 58. In 1994 the single largest commodity group exported to Chinese Taipei was non-ferrous metals (SITC 68). Exports of non-ferrous metals increased in value by 36.8 per cent between 1990 and 1994, from \$345m to \$472m. Copper (SITC 682), which increased from \$5m in 1990 to \$135m in 1994, was the major commodity responsible for the increase in trade. Exports of aluminium (SITC 684), the most significant commodity in this group, decreased slightly from \$265m in 1990 to \$256m in 1994.

Imports

- 59. Chinese Taipei was Australia's seventh most important source of imports in 1994. Although the value of imports increased by 39.2 per cent between 1990 and 1994, from \$1,764m to \$2,455m, Chinese Taipei's share of total Australian imports changed only marginally from 3.5 per cent to 3.6 per cent over the period.
- 60. Office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75) was the most important single group of commodities imported in 1994, accounting for 27.8 per cent of total imports from Chinese Taipei. This group increased by 123.9 per cent in value between 1990 and 1994, from \$305m to \$684m, and represented 13.1 per cent of Australia's total imports of this commodity in 1994.

HONG KONG

61. In 1994, Hong Kong was Australia's tenth most important trading partner in terms of total trade. The value of trade over the five year period to 1994 increased by 67 per cent, from \$2,092m in 1990 to \$3,495m in 1994.



62. Australia maintained a trade surplus with Hong Kong between 1990 and 1994, with the surplus increasing from \$522m in 1990 to \$1,813m in 1994 due to a large increase in exports only partly offset by a small increase in imports (see Graph 15).

Exports

63. Hong Kong was Australia's eighth most important export destination in 1994. The value of exports between 1990 and 1994 more than doubled, from \$1,307m in 1990 to \$2,654m in 1994. During the five year period, Hong Kong's share of Australia's total exports increased from 2.6 per cent to 4.1 per cent.

64. Gold, non-monetary (excluding gold ores and concentrates) (SITC 97) was Australia's principal export to Hong Kong in each year since 1990, accounting for 15.4 per cent of exports to Hong Kong in 1994. The value of exports of this commodity increased by 41.7 per cent, from \$289m in 1990 to \$410m in 1994, with exports peaking at \$651m in 1993. Hong Kong was the destination for 8.6 per cent of Australia's exports of non-monetary gold in 1994, down from 13.9 per cent in 1993.

Imports


65. Over the period 1990 to 1994 Hong Kong decreased in importance as a source of Australia's imports, ranking nineteenth in 1994. During this period the value of imports only increased by 7.1 per cent, from \$785m in 1990 to \$841m in 1994, with the share of Australia's total imports falling from 1.6 per cent to 1.2 per cent.

66. Office machines and automatic data processing machines (SITC 75) were the most important single group of goods imported in 1994, and showed the largest increase in trade over the five years, rising by 91.8 per cent. The most significant decrease in imports over the five year period was in articles of apparel and clothing accessories (SITC 84).

MALAYSIA

67. Malaysia's importance as a trading partner dramatically increased between 1990 and 1994, rising from sixteenth to eleventh in total trade terms. The value of total trade almost doubled between 1990 and 1994 from

\$1,637m to \$3,177m. Malaysia's share of Australia's total trade also increased over the same period, from 1.6 per cent in 1990 to 2.4 per cent in 1994.



68. Reflecting the relatively faster growth in the value of exports compared with the value of imports (see Graph 16), Australia's trade surplus with Malaysia more than doubled from \$329m in 1990 to \$737m in 1994.



Exports

69. In 1994, gold, non-monetary (excluding gold ores and concentrates) (SITC 97) was Australia's largest export to Malaysia. Since 1992 trade in this commodity has increased significantly with the value of exports increasing from \$3m in 1990 to \$284m in 1994.

70. Non-ferrous metals (SITC 68) was the second largest single group of commodities exported to Malaysia in 1994. Exports of these commodities have displayed volatility, increasing in value between 1991 and 1993, before dropping from \$182m in 1993 to \$143m in 1994 (see Graph 17).



Imports

71. Telecommunications and sound recording and reproducing apparatus and equipment (SITC 76) was the most important single group of commodities imported from Malaysia in 1994 and accounted for 21.5 per cent of total imports from Malaysia. This commodity group increased in value from \$62m in 1990 to \$263m in 1994, an increase of 322.2 per cent.

INDONESIA

- 72. In 1994, Indonesia was Australia's twelfth most important trading partner in terms of total trade, up from fourteenth in 1990. During this period, the value of total trade between the two countries increased by 62.5 per cent, from \$1,877m in 1990 to \$3,052m in 1994, and Indonesia's share of Australia's total trade increased from 1.9 per cent in 1990 to 2.3 per cent in 1994.
- 73. Although the value of imports almost doubled, exports increased by 48.5 per cent (see Graph 18), with the result that Australia's trade surplus with Indonesia increased by 17 per cent from \$833m in 1990 to \$976m in 1994.



Exports


- 74. The largest single group of commodities exported to Indonesia in 1994 was non-ferrous metals (SITC 68), which accounted for 13 per cent of Australia's total exports to Indonesia, up from 7.9 per cent in 1990. An increase in exports of aluminium (SITC 684), from \$47m in 1990 to \$120m in 1994, was the major cause of the increase in the value of non-ferrous metals.
- 75. Petroleum petroleum products and related materials (SITC 33) was the largest single group of commodities exported in 1990, representing 20.2 per cent of Australia's total exports to Indonesia. This group's share of total exports dropped to 11 per cent in 1994, reflecting a 19.3 per cent decrease in value, from \$273m in 1990 to \$220m in 1994.

Imports

76. Petroleum, petroleum products and related materials (SITC 33) was the largest single group of commodities imported from Indonesia for each of the five years from 1990 to 1994. Although petroleum imports increased by 20.8 per cent over the period, from \$253m in 1990 to \$305m in 1994, the highest value of petroleum imports during this period was \$649m in 1992. In 1994, petroleum accounted for 29.4 per cent of imports from Indonesia, down from 48.4 per cent in 1990 and 52.2 per cent in 1992.

THAILAND

77. In 1994 Thailand was Australia's fifteenth most important trading partner, accounting for 1.7 per cent of total trade. In 1990 Thailand was ranked nineteenth amongst Australia's trading partners. Over the five year period Australia's total trade with Thailand grew by 106 per cent, from \$1,089m to \$2,245m.



78. Australia had a steadily increasing trade surplus with Thailand over the five year period due to a 125 per cent increase in the value of exports, compared to a 82.6 per cent increase in imports. The value of the trade surplus increased from \$129m in 1990 to \$491m in 1994 (see Graph 19).



79. As with Malaysia, exports of gold, non-monetary (excluding gold ores and concentrates) (SITC 97) showed the most dramatic growth, increasing steadily in value from \$10m in 1990 to \$242m in 1994.

CANADA

80. In 1994, Canada was Australia's sixteenth most important trading partner in terms of total trade, down from thirteenth in 1990. This reflected a drop in Canada's share of Australia's total trade, from 1.9 per cent in 1990 to 1.7 per cent in 1994. This drop occurred despite a 17.5 per cent increase in total trade with Canada, from \$1,877m in 1990 to \$2,207m in 1994.

81. In 1994, Australia had a small trade surplus of \$1m with Canada, compared to a surplus of \$201m in 1993 and a deficit of \$199m in 1990 (see Graph 20).

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

83. In 1994 Papua New Guinea was Australia's seventeenth most important trading partner in terms of total trade. Trade increased by 84.9 per cent over the five year period from \$1,130m in 1990 to \$2,089m in 1994, resulting in an increase in Papua New Guinea's share of Australia's total trade from 1.1 per cent to 1.6 per cent.



OTHER APEC MEMBERS

86. A detailed analysis of commodities traded with the Philippines, Chile, Mexico and Brunei has not been undertaken for this article as these four APEC members collectively accounted for only 1.1 per cent of Australia's total trade in 1994.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.

2. The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The sections below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation.

Source of data

3. These statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS).

Scope

4. Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) Australia's stock of material resources.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- (b) ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- (c) non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (eg mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

Coverage

- 5. The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries the customs record will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- (a) certain materials under inter-governmental agreements for defence and similar projects;
- (b) migrants and passengers' effects exported or imported and parcel post exports and imports of small value, for which Customs entries are not required;
- (c) the sale or delivery of certain ships intended for use on overseas routes; and

For exports only:

(d) sales of aircraft (and parts or components) which were imported into Australia prior to 1 July 1987 for use on overseas routes; sales of aircraft (and parts or components) which were imported into

- Australia on or after 1 July 1987 for use on overseas routes are included in recorded export statistics;
- (c) fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- (f) from 1 July 1986 export consignments where the value of the goods in each transaction is less than \$500. Prior to that date, the value level was \$250.

For imports only:

- (g) bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft;
- (h) prior to 1 July 1987 the delivery of certain aircraft (and parts and components) intended for use on overseas routes; and
- (i) entries lodged on informal clearance documents (ICDs) for values not exceeding \$250. From 21 October 1985 onwards, ICDs for postal articles valued between \$250 and \$1000 are excluded.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information,

Basis of compilation

- 6. The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- 7. Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- 8. Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged.

Statistical Period

- 9. From January 1988, exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia. Prior to January 1988, exports are recorded in the month in which the entries were processed by the ACS. For further details on the impact of the changed compilation basis on the merchandise export series refer to the article 'Changed timing basis for compilation of merchandise exports statistics' in the June 1992 issue of this publication.
- 10. Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the ACS. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by

- ACS. Currently, approximately 85 per cent of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10 per cent reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5 per cent by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- 11. Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. When the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

Valuation

- 12. The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment and enter an approximate value must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- 13. The value of imports is the Australian Customs value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- 14. Changes in Customs valuation introduced from 1 July 1989 with the Customs and Excise Legislation Amendment Act 1989 are likely to have marginally raised Customs valuations. Data for periods from 1 July 1989 are therefore not fully comparable with data for previous periods. However, investigations of imports valuations, for years before and after the change have shown no measurable effect on the valuation of imports that can be attributed to the change in legislation. For details of the changes in legislation see the note 'Change in the Valuation of Imports' at the beginning of the Explanatory Notes of the 1989-90 issue of Foreign Trade, Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables (5410.0).

Country

- 15. For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with ACS provisions. External territories under Australian administration are treated as separate countries while self-governing territories and dependent territories under the administration of other countries may be treated as individual countries in Australian international merchandise trade statistics.
- 16. For exports, country refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. For imports, country refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of imports and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'.

- 17. Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- 18. However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.
- 19. The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:
 - Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);
 - Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);
 - Developing Countries (DCs);
 - European Union (EU); and
 - Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC).
- 20. A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, OPEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- 21. More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra (06) 252 5409.

Commodity classification

- 22. Commodity export and import statistics in Tables 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' Standard International Trade Classification (SITC Rev3) with the addition of dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.
- 23. Tables 15 and 16 of this publication are presented according to the second revision of SITC for 1982-83 to December 1987 and according to SITC Rev3 from January 1988. See Appendix B of the 1988-89 issue of Foreign Trade Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables (5410.0) for details of Divisions significantly affected by this change.

Broad Economic Categories

24. Merchandise trade in Tables 11 and 12 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' classi-

fication, Broad Economic Categories (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

Industry of origin

25. Exports and imports statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in Tables 9 and 10. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the main economic activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification, 1993 Edition (1292.0).

State

- 26. State information for exports presented in Table 13 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- 27. State information for imports presented in Table 14 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under ACS control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by the ACS.

Confidentiality

28. Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. More details on the confidentiality process can be obtained from the *Confidentiality Manager* on Canberra (06) 252 5409.

Reliability

29. Statistics in this publication for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.

Relationship to balance of payments statistics

30. The basic source of balance of payments data on merchandise exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only)

valuation adjustments are necessary before foreign trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 9 of Balance of Payments, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5331.0).
