

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PREFACE

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the job search experience of unemployed persons.

Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Australian Burcau of Statistics (ABS) survey Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons.

ABOUT THIS SURVEY

The Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons survey was conducted throughout Australia in July 1996 as a supplement to the ABS monthly Labour Force Survey.

Data from the survey relate to persons who were unemployed in July 1996, except for those unemployed persons who were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been stood down. All tables in this publication, with the exception of table 1, exclude this group of unemployed persons.

Questions asked in this survey covered the two key aspects of the experience of persons looking for work — the steps being taken to find work and barriers to obtaining work that are encountered.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

THE LABOUR FORCE

In July 1996, the Australian labour force was estimated at 9,111,500 persons. In original terms, there were 731,600 unemployed persons, 3.1% more than in July 1995. The unemployment rate was 8.0%, which was 0.1 percentage points higher than in July 1995. Some 79% of unemployed persons were looking for full-time work, of whom 64% were males. Females represented 67% of unemployed persons looking for part-time work.

Two key aspects of the job search experience are the steps being taken to find work and the barriers to obtaining work that are encountered. Characteristics — such as age, sex and education — of the individual looking for work often influence the job search experience and outcomes. Examples of steps taken to find work are registering with the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) and contacting prospective employers. Common difficulties in finding work are being considered too young or too old by employers, too many applicants for available jobs or there being no vacancies at all.

ACTIVE STEPS TAKEN TO FIND WORK

Active steps taken to find work included:

- registering with the CES or other employment agencies;
- writing, phoning or applying in person to an employer;
- answering a newspaper advertisement;
- checking factory/CES noticeboards;
- advertising or tendering; and
- contacting relatives/friends.

Almost three-quarters (74%) of unemployed persons were registered with the CES and also contacted prospective employers. A further 20% contacted prospective employers but were not registered with the CES.

For most of those looking for full-time work, the active steps taken to find work included registering with the CES and contacting prospective employers (84%). However, of those looking for part-time work, the majority contacted prospective employers but were not registered with the CES (58%).


Persons registered with the CES

The proportion of unemployed persons registered with the CES fell slightly for the third consecutive year to 78% in July 1996 (from a high of 83% in 1993). The proportion of full-time job seekers registered with the CES (88%) was higher than that for part-time job seekers (36%).

A higher proportion of unemployed males were registered with the CES (87%) than females (65%). Of those looking for full-time work, this difference was greatest in the 25-34 years age group (22 percentage points), and least in the older age groups (5 percentage points in the 45-54 years age group and 6 percentage points in the 55 years and over age group).

Of all unemployed 15-19 year olds, only 59% were registered with the CES. This reflects the relatively high proportion of 15-19 year olds searching for part-time work (41% compared with 10% to 15% in other age groups). In fact, unemployed 15-19 year olds represented 42% of all persons seeking part-time work and 13% of all persons seeking full-time work. Of unemployed 15-19 year olds looking for full-time work, the proportion who were registered with the CES was much higher at 89%.

MAIN DIFFICULTY IN FINDING WORK

The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported were:

- considered too young or too old by employers (13%);
- too many applicants for available jobs (13%); and
- no vacancies at all (12%).

Of unemployed males, 14% reported 'considered too young or too old by employers' as the main difficulty in finding work. Of unemployed females, 14% reported 'too many applicants for available jobs' as the main difficulty.

'Being considered too young or too old by employers' was the main difficulty most commonly reported by both males and females aged 45 years and over (45% of males and 33% of females).

'No vacancies in line of work' was the most common main difficulty for males aged 25–44 years (18%), and females aged 25–34 years (16%). For females aged 35–44 years, 'too many applicants for available jobs' was the difficulty most commonly reported (16%).

In the younger age groups, males aged 15–24 years most commonly reported 'lacked necessary skills/education' as the main difficulty (17%). For females aged 15–24 years the most commonly reported main difficulty was 'insufficient work experience' (16%).


Average duration of unemployment

In July 1996 the average duration of unemployment was 53 weeks. However, the median duration of unemployment (the point at which half of unemployed persons are below and half are above) was only 26 weeks, reflecting the marked effect of the long-term unemployed upon the average duration of unemployment.

The average duration of unemployment for males was 60 weeks for those seeking full-time work and 32 weeks for those seeking part-time work. The average duration of unemployment for females was lower at 55 weeks for those seeking full-time work and 28 weeks for those seeking part-time work.

Those reporting 'language difficulties' as the most common main difficulty finding work had the longest average duration of unemployment for both males (104 weeks) and females (109 weeks).

'Language difficulties' were followed by 'own ill health or disability' (males 101 weeks, females 63 weeks), 'considered too young or too old by employers' (males 84 weeks, females 76 weeks) and 'too far to travel' (males 63 weeks, females 31 weeks).

Although the overall average duration of unemployment was shorter for females than for males, females reporting 'language difficulties', 'insufficient work experience', 'too many applicants for available jobs' or 'difficulties with child care/other family responsibilities' recorded a longer average duration of unemployment than males reporting the same main difficulty in finding work.

The long-term unemployed

The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported by the long-term unemployed were 'considered too young or too old by employers' (21%) and 'lacked necessary skills or education' (12%).

The majority (90%) of long-term unemployed persons in July 1996 had not received any offers of employment in the previous 12 months, slightly higher than in July 1995 when 86% had not received any offers of employment.

Educational attainment

In July 1996, 32% of unemployed persons had post-school qualifications.

For those without post-school qualifications, the response 'lacked necessary skills/education' was one of the most commonly reported main difficulties in finding work for both males (14%) and females (13%).

'No vacancies at all' was reported almost equally as a main difficulty in finding work by those with post-school qualifications and those without (12% compared to 11%). Similarly, 'insufficient work experience' (9% and 11%) respectively and 'considered too young or too old by employers' (13% and 14%) were other main difficulties reported by persons with and without post-school qualifications.

For persons who had not completed the highest level of secondary school the average duration of unemployment was 66 weeks, compared with 40 weeks for those who had completed the highest level. Unemployed persons with a Basic or Skilled vocational


qualification recorded an average duration of 50 weeks and 48 weeks respectively. Those with a Bachelor degree or higher qualification had a lower average duration of 47 weeks.

The average duration of unemployment for persons with post-school qualifications (males 50 weeks, females 45 weeks) was lower than that for those without post-school qualifications (males 64 weeks, females 52 weeks).

Males generally had a higher average duration of unemployment than females, 57 weeks compared to 47 weeks, with some exceptions. Females with an undergraduate diploma, skilled or basic vocational qualifications, or who had completed secondary school had a higher average duration of unemployment.

The highest average duration of unemployment for males and females was reported by those who had left school aged 15 or under (59 weeks and 87 weeks respectively). The lowest average duration of unemployment of all persons was recorded for males with undergraduate diplomas, 18 weeks.

Main field of study

Of all unemployed males with post-school qualifications, 47% had Engineering qualifications. The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported by this group of males were 'no vacancies in line of work' and 'considered too young or too old by employers' (both 18%), 'too many applicants' and 'other difficulties' (both 17%) and 'no vacancies at all' (15%).

Other main fields of study common among unemployed males were Business and administration and Natural and physical sciences qualifications.

Of all unemployed females with post-school qualifications, 36% had Business and administration qualifications. These females experienced a wide range of difficulties finding work although 20% reported that 'too many applicants' was the main difficulty. Females whose main field of study was Society and culture, found 'no vacancies in line of work' a particular problem, representing 38% of all females with post-school qualifications reporting this main difficulty.

REASON FOR CEASING LAST FULL-TIME JOB

In July 1996, almost half (48%) of unemployed persons, had been employees in their last full-time job and had ceased that job in the last two years.

Of these, two-thirds (66%) had left their last job involuntarily, representing 222,500 persons, including 142,600 who had been retrenched. The proportion who left involuntarily increased according to age group. While 61% of those aged 15–24 years left their last job involuntarily, 64% of those aged 25–44 years and 77% of those aged 45 years and over had left their last job involuntarily.

The proportion of employees who had left their last job involuntarily was high among those who had worked in the Agriculture, forestry and fishing industry and the Construction industry (78%). Those who had worked in the Retail trade industry, just over half (54%) had left their last job involuntarily (the lowest proportion across all industries).

Some 76% of former tradespersons had left their last job involuntarily, the highest proportion across all occupations. The lowest proportion was recorded for those whose last occupation was in the Salesersons and personal service workers group, (46%).

RESULTS OF THE SURVEY

- 1 The monthly population survey (which is described in *Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly Labour Force Survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains results of a supplementary survey run in association with the July 1996 Labour Force Survey conducted throughout Australia.
- 2 Respondents to the Labour Force Survey who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions about their job search experience, including their difficulties in finding work, steps taken to find work and whether they had had offers of employment, as well as their educational attainment and the characteristics of their last job, if any.
- 3 The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the Labour Force Survey (described in full in Labour Force, Australia (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to unemployed persons excluding those who were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown). Students at boarding school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of reformatories, gaols, etc. were also excluded.
- 4 The number of unemployed persons published in *Labour Force*, *Australia*, *July 1996* (6203.0) differs from that published in this publication because persons who were stood down were excluded from this survey, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience. Persons who were stood down comprised 3.7% of all unemployed persons in July 1996.
- **5** In the monthly population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See *Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0) for more details.
- 6 See the Glossary for definitions specific to this survey. Definitions of labour force and demographic classifications relating to the Labour Force Survey appearing in this publication are given in *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 7 Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in these tables relate to the week before the interview (i.e. the reference week).
- **8** Estimates of unemployed persons are also published in *Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0). However, more detailed information is contained in this publication.
- **9** Due to differences in the method of estimation used in this supplementary survey and that used in the Labour Force Survey, there are some small variations between estimates in this publication and those in the corresponding issue of *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 10 The estimates in this publication refer to information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

COMPARABILITY OF SERIES

14 Information about the labour force collected in the monthly Labour Force Survey and the Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons supplementary survey may not be strictly comparable. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to the whole of the previous 12 months which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly Labour Force Survey, for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining labour force status and duration of current period of unemployment depend on a detailed set of questions. The items time spent looking for work and number of spells of looking for work during the previous 12 months are based on a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms working, looking for work and not working or looking for work are used for these items rather than the more precisely defined terms employed, unemployed, and not in the labour force.

BENCHMARK REVISION

15 Results of monthly population surveys conducted before February 1994 are based on population estimates from the 1986 Census of Population and Housing. From February 1994, the monthly Labour Force Survey and its supplementary surveys have been based on population estimates from the 1991 Census of Population and Housing. This change in base population estimates should be considered when comparing the results of surveys conducted before February 1994 with the results of those conducted after February 1994.

SAMPLE SIZE

16 In previous years this supplementary survey has been conducted on all dwellings selected in the Labour Force Survey. Since July 1994 this has been reduced to seven-eighths of the Labour Force Survey sample. As a result, the standard errors for surveys conducted from July 1994 on, differ from those applicable to previous surveys.

ESTIMATION PROCEDURE

17 The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, sex and labour force status rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

RELIABILITY OF STATISTICS

18 Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For further information refer to the Technical Notes, page 30.

TECHNICAL NOTES


INTRODUCTION

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the *relative standard error*, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on page 32. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows: table 3 shows that the estimated number of unemployed persons in Australia who did not have a post-school qualification was 436,100. Since this estimate is between 300,000 and 500,000 the table of standard errors shows the standard error for Australia will be between 8,050 and 9,900 and can be approximated by interpolation as 9,300 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 426,800 to 445,400 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 417,500 to 454,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the bigher the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors of 25% or less and percentages based on such estimates are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.

AVERAGES AND MEDIANS

The relative standard errors of estimates of average duration of unemployment, and median duration of unemployment are obtained by first finding the relative standard error of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the average or median and then multiplying the relevant number so obtained by the following factors:

Average duration of unemployment: 1.3 Median duration of unemployment: 2.0

An example of the calculation of standard errors by the use of those factors is as follows: table 3 shows the estimated median duration of unemployment for unemployed males in Australia was 26 weeks and the number of males was estimated as 409,800. From the table on the following page it can be calculated that this estimate (409.800) has a standard error of about 9,100 and therefore a relative standard error of about 2.2%. The relative standard error of the estimate of median duration of unemployment is calculated by multiplying this number (2.2) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 2.0): 2.2 x 2.0 = 4.4%. The standard error of this estimate of median duration of unemployment is therefore 4.4% of 26, i.e. about 1. Therefore there are about two chances in three that the median duration of unemployment for males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 25-27 weeks and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 24-28 weeks.

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

Proportions and percentages derived from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is:

RSE (x/y) =
$$\sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

Considering the example from the previous page, the 436,100 persons without post-school qualifications represent 62.1% of the 701,700 unemployed persons. The standard error of 701,700 is approximately 11,200 so the relative standard error is 1.6%. The relative standard error for 436,100 is 2.1%. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(2.1)^2 - (1.6)^2}$ or 1.4%, giving a standard error for the proportion (62.1%) of 0.9 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons without post-school qualifications is between 61.2% and 63.0% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 60.3% to 63.9%.

SAMPLING ERROR

Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE
$$(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

NON-SAMPLING ERROR

The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

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GLOSSARY

Active steps taken to find work

Steps taken during the current period of unemployment. They comprise: writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.

All difficulties in finding work

All difficulties experienced during the current period of unemployment.

All unemployed persons

Those persons who were not employed during the reference week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

Average duration (of current period of unemployment)

The duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group.

Ceased last full-time job

Left or lost last full-time job.

CES

The Commonwealth Employment Service is a referral service for jobseekers and employers, which also attempts to redress skill shortages through labour market programs.

Duration of current period of unemployment

The period from the time the person began looking for work to the end of the reference week. Thus this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full-time for two weeks or more to the end of the reference week.

Educational attainment

Measures the highest qualification completed by the respondent, classified according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications. The seven categories for level of attainment are as follows:

Higher degree

Comprises primarily Doctorates and Master's degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a Master's degree or a first class honours degree for a Doctorate and completion of an honours degree for a Master's degree. The duration of study is a minimum of two to four years for a Doctorate and two years full-time or equivalent for a Master's degree. This level of qualification is designed to recognise significant contributions to original research or the application of knowledge within a given field of study.

Postgraduate diploma

Includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a Bachelor degree or an Undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from six months (for a Graduate Certificate) to one year full-time study or equivalent. Courses usually build on undergraduate studies, and are designed to broaden or develop professional knowledge and skills in a related or new area of studies.

Bachelor degree

The entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from three to six years full-time study or its equivalent. Courses are designed to provide students with a systematic and coherent introduction to a broad body of knowledge. The emphasis is on the underlying principles and concepts of that body of knowledge.

Undergraduate diploma

The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is three years full-time study or its equivalent. Certain other qualifications are classified to this level on the basis that their entry requirements, duration of study and theoretical orientation are regarded as being equivalent to those of undergraduate diplomas, for example, Certificate in Psychiatric Nursing. Courses are designed to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary for practice in a professional or associate professional occupation.

Associate diploma

The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a prerequisite certificate course. The duration of study ranges from one to two years full-time or its equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skill necessary to give support to professionals, and for positions in advanced trade, technical or associate professional occupations. Advanced Certificates, Technician's Certificates and Certificates of Technology are included in this level as they have broadly the same theoretical orientation as associate diplomas.

Skilled vocational qualification

The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is two to four years, and typically involves some on-the-job training. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to work in specific vocation, recognised trade or craft that requires a high degree of skill in a range of related activities.

Basic vocational qualification

Often requires Year 10 completion, however many courses have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from one semester to one year full-time study or equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the practical skills and background knowledge necessary for employment at the operative level in many different fields.

Highest level of secondary school available

The highest level of secondary school available to the respondent, as determined by the respondent, at the time he or she left school (i.e. Year 12 or equivalent).

Between States/Territories.

Any paid employment, full-time or part-time, lasting two weeks or more.

Job leavers

Persons who have ceased their last job voluntarily, that is, because:

- of unsatisfactory work arrangements/pay/hours;
- the job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they left that job to return to studies;
- they retired, started a new business, got a better job, left for family or other reasons; or
- changed locality but not employer/business for employment, personal or other reasons.

Job losers Persons who ceased their last job involuntarily, that is:

 they were retrenched or their business closed down because of financial difficulties;

 their job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they did not leave that job to return to studies; or

they left their job because of their own ill-health or injury.

Looking for part-time work

Actively looking for part-time work only.

Main difficulty in finding work

The main difficulty experienced during the current period of unemployment.

Main English speaking countries

Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.

Main field of study

For those persons whose highest qualification is a degree, vocational qualification, certificate or diploma, it is the main field of study for that qualification.

Median duration (of current period of unemployment)

The duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal size groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median, and the other, persons whose duration is below it.

Number of offers of employment The number of separate offers of employment received during the current period of unemployment.

Number of spells of looking for work in the previous 12 months The number of different periods, including the current period, during which persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job.

Persons with post-school qualifications Persons who have obtained a vocational qualification, certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification, since leaving school. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification: Higher degree; Postgraduate diploma; Bachelor degree; Undergraduate diploma; Associate diploma; Skilled Vocational Qualification; Basic Vocational Qualification.

Persons who were stood down

Persons classed as unemployed who had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks, for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

Still at school


Current school attendance was recorded only for persons aged 15–20 years.

Time spent looking for work in the previous 12 months

The total number of weeks persons reported having been out of work and looking for a job, including the weeks in the current period of unemployment.

Usual gross weekly pay

The amount of usual total weekly pay (i.e. before taxation and other deductions have been made).
