

#### Overview

In September 1993, 49 per cent (1,332,000) of the estimated 2,710,200 persons aged 15 to 24 were attending an educational institution. Of these students, 692,000 (52%) were at school, 350,900 (26%) were in higher education, 241,400 (18%) in TAFE and 47,700 (4%) were attending other educational institutions.

Labour force participation rates varied from 34 per cent for those attending school to 54 per cent for those attending higher education and 81 per cent for those at TAFE.



#### School attendance of 15 to 19 year olds

Fifty-four per cent (685,400) of the 1,273,600 persons aged 15 to 19 years in September 1993 were attending school. School participation rates for individual ages were estimated at 96 per cent for 15 year olds, 85 per cent for 16 year olds, 68 per cent for 17 year olds and 22 per cent for 18 year olds. Only 3 per cent of 19 year olds were still attending school.

Of the 15 to 19 year olds who were attending school, 68 per cent (466,400) were reported to be attending government schools while 32 per cent (217,200) were attending non-government schools.

In September 1993, 67 per cent (456,400) of school students aged 15 to 19 were not in the labour force, 8 per cent (54,400) were unemployed and 25 per cent (174,500) were employed — 173,400 on a part-time basis.

#### Tertiary attendance of 15 to 24 year olds

An estimated 24 per cent of 15 to 24 year olds were participating in tertiary education in September 1993. Of these 640,000 students, 55 per cent (350,900) were in higher education, 38 per cent (241,400) were in TAFE and 7 per cent (47,700) were attending other tertiary educational institutions.

Other characteristics of tertiary students in September 1993 include:

- 63 per cent (406,200) were attending full-time
- 60 per cent (381,300) were aged 20 to 24
- 10 per cent (63,700) were unemployed, 55 per cent (354,200) were employed (175,300 on a part-time basis), and the remaining 35 per cent (222,200) were not in the labour force
- 63 per cent (406,000) had last attended a government school
- females accounted for 54 per cent (159,100) of those undertaking bachelor degree level courses and 56 per cent (8,800) of those attending courses at a level of post-graduate diploma or higher.
- there were 80,700 males, and 23,700 females, attending skilled vocational level courses.

#### Labour force activity among 15 to 24 year olds

In September 1993, 530,700 students aged 15 to 24 were employed — 349,700 on a part-time basis — and 118,800 students were unemployed. The labour force participation rate for students aged 15 to 24 was 49 per cent. In comparison, the labour force participation rate for 15 to 24 year olds who were not students was 89 per cent. For all persons aged 15 to 24 the rate was 69 per cent.


Labour force participation rates for other groups were:

- 42 per cent for students aged 15 to 19 years and
   65 per cent for students aged 20 to 24 years
- · 95 per cent for part-time students
- 39 per cent for full-time students.

#### Birthplace characteristics of students aged 15 to 24

Education participation rates differed widely according to country of birth. The rates were 47 per cent for Australian-born students, 42 per cent for those born overseas in main English-speaking countries and 68 per cent for those born in other overseas countries.

The labour force participation rate for overseas-born students was 37 per cent in September 1993 compared to 52 per cent for Australian-born students. Their unemployment rates also differed — 29 per cent for overseas-born and 17 per cent for Australian-born students.

#### States and Territories

The national education participation rate for 15 to 24 year olds was 49 per cent in September 1993. The Australian Capital Territory recorded the highest rate, 59 per cent, New South Wales recorded 53 per cent, Victoria 51 per cent, Tasmania 47 per cent, South Australia 46 per cent, Western Australia 44 per cent, Queensland 43 per cent and the Northern Territory 42 per cent.

#### Changes over time

From September 1989 to September 1993:

- there was a 4 percentage point increase in the education participation rate of 15 to 24 year olds, from 45 to 49 per cent — the number attending increasing from 1,216,500 to 1,332,000
- full-time tertiary education participation rates increased by 4 percentage points from 11 to 15 per cent while the rate for part-time tertiary attendance has remained constant at around 9 per cent
- the number of 15 to 19 year olds not attending an educational institution (329,500) has decreased by 134,700 while the estimate of persons aged 20 to 24 years not attending has increased 10,300 and currently stands at 1,048,600.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

The monthly population survey (which is described in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the September 1993 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked whether they were attending an educational institution and, if so, the type of educational institution and the type of attendance.

#### Scope

- 3. The scope of this supplementary survey was restricted to persons aged 15 to 24 and excluded the following persons:
  - (a) members of the permanent defence forces;
  - (b) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
  - (c) overseas residents in Australia;
  - (d) members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants);
  - (e) persons permanently unable to work;
  - (f) some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums; and
  - (g) inmates of reformatories, gaols etc.

#### Coverage

4. In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

#### **Definitions**

- 5. Definition of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0).
- 6. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview (i.e. the reference week).

#### Results of the Survey

7. Due to differences in the method of estimation used in this supplementary survey and that used in the labour force survey, there are some small variations between estimates in this publication and those in the corresponding issue of *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0).

- 8. The estimates in this publication refer to information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.
- 9. Results of similar surveys, conducted annually since September 1988, have been given in previous issues of this publication.
- 10. This survey will be conducted next in September 1994.

#### Comparability of series estimates

11. When comparing estimates of attendance between May and September, particularly for schools, it should be noted that approximately one third of 14 year olds turn 15 between the two surveys, thus coming within the scope of the survey and boosting the September estimates. Because attendance estimates amongst 24 year olds are relatively small there is little corresponding loss among 24 year olds turning 25 between surveys.

#### Discontinuities in the series

12. In the absence of a unique classification to describe level of course, the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ) has been used in this survey. A consequence of this is that the ABSCQ, which focusses on formal educational outcomes, does not recognise courses of less than one semester's full-time study.

In this publication persons undertaking such courses are recognised for inclusion in estimates of attendance at an educational institution, but cannot be assigned to a level of course and have only been included in the totals.

#### Unpublished tables

#### Reliability of the estimates

14. Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For more information refer to the Technical Note.

#### Estimation procedure

15. The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, labour force status and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.


#### TECHNICAL NOTE

#### Estimation procedure

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

- 2. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 3. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 1 shows the estimated number of persons aged 15 to 24 who, in September 1993, were attending a TAFE as 241,400. Since this estimate is between 200,000 and 300,000 in the standard error table, the standard error for Australia will be between 6,200 and 7,300 and can be approximated by interpolation as 6,700 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 234,700 to 248,100 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 228,000 to 254,800. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.

- 4. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication only estimates with relative standard errors of 25 per cent or less and percentages based on such estimates are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates and percentages with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. \*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.
- 5. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

- 6. Considering the example from paragraph 3 above, the 241,400 persons represent 37.7 per cent of the 640,000 persons aged 15 to 24 who were attending tertiary institutions in September 1993. The standard error of 640,000 is approximately 9,800 so the relative standard error is 1.5 per cent. The relative standard error for 241,400 is 2.8 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(2.8)^2}$   $(1.5)^2$  or 2.4 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (37.7 per cent) of 0.9 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of persons aged 15 to 24 who were attending a TAFE in September 1993 is between 36.8 per cent and 38.6 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 35.9 per cent to 39.5 per cent.
- 7. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE 
$$(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics of subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication. 8. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents, and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they

may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

#### GLOSSARY

Associate Diploma courses: The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a pre-requisite certificate course. The duration of study ranges from one to two years full-time study or its equivalent. Advanced Certificates, Technician Certificates and Certificates of Technology are included in this level as they have broadly the same theoretical orientation as associate diplomas.

Bachelor Degree courses: The entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from three to six years full-time study or its equivalent.

Basic Vocational courses: Often require Year 10 completion, however many courses have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from one semester to one year of full-time study or equivalent.

Business College: Includes private business colleges or establishments that offer training or educational courses in Secretarial Studies, Business Management, Marketing etc.

Educational institution: any institution whose primary role is education. Included are schools, higher education establishments, colleges of technical and further education, public and private colleges, etc. Excluded are institutions whose primary role is not education, for example hospitals.

Education participation rate: the estimate of persons attending an educational institution in any group expressed as a percentage of the civilian population in the same group.

Employed: persons aged 15 to 24 who, during the reference week:

- (a) worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and self-employed persons); or
- (b) worked for one hour or more without pay in a family ly business or on a farm (i.e. unpaid family helpers); or
- (c) were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or
- (d) were employers, self-employed persons or unpaid family helpers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.

Full-time attendance: persons who consider themselves to be attending full time, or the institution which they are attending so classifies them.

Government schools: all schools administered by the relevant State and Territory governments.

Higher Degree courses: Includes doctorates and masters degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a masters degree or first class honours for a doctorate and first class honours for a master degree. The duration of study is a minimum of two to four years for a doctorate and two years full-time or equivalent for a masters degree.

Higher Education Institutions: includes all Australian institutions providing higher education courses, eg., Universities and University Colleges; Institutes of Tertiary Education; Agricultural Colleges and some Institutes of Technology.

Industry Skills Centre: Consists of vocation oriented training centres which provide accredited courses, e.g. automotive skills centres and retail skills centres.

Other educational institutions: includes institutes or establishments that offer educational courses that lead to qualifications such as hairdressing etc; and instances where insufficient information was available to determine the type of educational institution.

Participation rate: in this publication refers to labour force participation rate which is an estimate of the labour force in any group expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 to 24 in the same group. For a more detailed explanation see *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0).

Part-time attendance: persons who consider themselves to be attending part-time or the institution which they are attending so classifies them.

Postgraduate Diploma courses: Includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a bachelor degree or an undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from six months (for a Graduate Certificate) to one year full-time study or equivalent.

Skilled Vocational courses: The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is two to four years, and typically involve some on-the-job training.

TAFE: college of technical and further education.

Tertiary institutions: any educational institution offering post-school courses.

Undergraduate Diploma courses: The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is three years full-time study or its equivalent. Certain other qualifications are classified to this level on the basis that their entry requirements, duration of study and theoretical orientation are regarded as being equivalent to those of undergraduate diplomas, for example, Certificate in Psychiatric Nursing.

Unemployed: persons aged 15 to 24 who were not employed during the reference week, and:

- (a) had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week and;
  - (i) were available for work in the reference week,

- or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week); or
- (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then; or
- (b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (including the whole of the reference week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

Unemployment rate: an estimate of unemployed persons in any group expressed as a percentage of the labour force in the same group.


