Main price changes between September quarter 1986 and December quarter 1986 were as follows:

Prices of fresh vegetables increased gignificantly in all cities. Prices of tresh fruit fell in all cities except Perth and Darmin where prices rose. Prices of mals dut increased in all cities except Canberra and Darwin where prices fell slightiy.
Fish prices increased significantly in all cities. Prices of take away foods rose in all cities. Beef prices increased in all cities except Adelaide and Perth where prices fell.
Lamb prices fell in all cities except Darwin where prices rose.

## EXPLANATDRY NOTES

Brief description of the CPI

1. The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a 'basket' of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditures by metropolitan wage and salary earner households. This 'basket' covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing; housing; household equipment and operation; transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Each group is in turn divided into sub-groups. Index numbers at the group and Ald Groups levels are published for each State capital city, Canberra, Darwin, and for the weighted average of eight capital cities. Index numbers for All Groups are also published for the weighted average of six State capital cities (see paragraph 10 below). Subgroup index numbers are published for the weighted average of eight capital cities.
2. It is important to note that the capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled $A$ Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (64bl.0).

## Prices

4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPl are generally collected quarterly. However, some important jtems are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and figh, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobaccol and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and chargesi.
5. The bulk of items for which prices are callected quarterly are priced at the middle of the mid-month of the quarter (i.e, in August, November, February and May), but, to facilitate a more even spread of the field collection workload, some goods and services are priced in the first and third months of each quarter. Items priced in the third month are generally those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information is obtained of any changes in price during the quarter so that a weighted average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

## Weighting pattern

6. There are 105 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like itemg) in the tenth series CFI and each expenditure class has its own weight; or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights,
7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterng. The CPI now conprises ten series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series. The tenth series (that is, the current series), which was introduced in the june quarter 1982, has a weighting pattern based, in general, on estimated household expenditure in 19.79~80.

Review of consumer price index
8. A major review of the CPI is nearing completion. The results of this review, which has included a review of the treatment of home ownership costs, will be incorporated in the lith CPI series to be introduced in the March quarter 1987 issue of this publication.
9. The new series will have updated weights reflecting household expenditure in 1984 in place of the present weights reflecting household expenditure in 1979-80.
10. With the introduction of the new lith series, publication of index numbers for the weighted average of sik State capital cities will cease. Index numbers for the weighted average of six state capital citieg will continue to be made available by the ABS on request. However, users of this particular series might consider it more convenient to switch to using index numbers.for the weighted average of eight capital cities.

## Index points and percentage changes

11. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as percentage changes, or as changes in
'index points.' The difference between these two methods of describing movements in indexes is shown by the following example:

The index number of 157.0 for September quarter 1986 indicates an increase of $57.0 \%$ since the reference bage year (1980-81).

Special tables and groupings
12. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of aight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for some special series. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup alakes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy produce subgroup contributed 2.91 index points to the total All Groups index number of 157.0 for September quarter 1986. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.
13. The All Groups index includes the effects of changes in prices for hospital and medical services. To facilitate analysis of trends in retail prices without the effects of these changes, Table 5 shows index numbers and percentage changes for a special series All Groups excluding hospital and medical services, and compares these with changes in the All Groups index.

## State and doral government charges

14. Information on the impact of changes in selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 7 . Table 3 ghows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 7 shows index numbers for two special groupings 'Selected State and local government charges' and 'All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. For information on the derivation and liaitations of these figures, see the Appendix to the Deceaber quarter 1982 issue of this publication.
