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



Overview.

The CPI increased by 1.7% between the December and March quarters and by 8.6% since March quarter last year.

The annual rate (8.6%) follows an annual rate last quarter of 7.8% although that rate (and the rate for the previous three quarters) was affected by a change in the treatment of mortgage interest charges introduced in March quarter 1989. For a comparable annual series see *Changes over recent years* on page 2 of this publication.






Increases in transportation costs - mainly driven by petrol price increases - overshadowed housing costs this quarter as the single most important factor affecting increases in the *all groups* index. Significant increases in petrol prices have resulted from increases in wholesale prices and a marked decrease in the incidence of discounting. The change in the rate of increase in housing costs reflects a moderation in the rate of increase of mortgage interest charges, mainly due to a slowing of increases in house prices.

Food prices had a moderating influence on the CPI for the second quarter in a row (increasing by 0.2% this quarter following an increase of 0.3% last quarter). The small increase this quarter was mainly due to falls in the prices of fresh vegetables.

Main contributions to change.

Four groups accounted for more than 70% of the increase in the all groups index - Transportation (25.1%), Housing (19.0%), Household equipment and operation (15.7%), and Recreation and education (14.5%) - see chart below.



Transportation: +2.6%

This represents the largest increase recorded since December quarter 1987 (+2.6%). The transportation group is the largest contributor to the change in the all groups index - accounting for 25.1% of the change. Increases in petrol prices account for 65% of this and increases in prices of motor vehicles for a further 13%.

Petrol prices increased by 6.5% on average this quarter following an increase of 4.7% last quarter. The largest increase was recorded in Canberra (9.0%) and the smallest in Darwin (3.2%). The result reflects increases in wholesale prices combined with a marked reduction in the incidence of discounting.

Prices of motor vehicles increased by 1.0% on average with increases being recorded in all cities with the exception of Melbourne where prices remained unchanged. The largest price increase was recorded in Perth (2.1%).

Housing: +2.0%

While the rate of increase recorded this quarter is significantly lower than the rate of 3.4% recorded last quarter, the housing group still contributed significantly to the change in the all groups index - accounting for 19.0% of the change. Increases in mortgage interest charges account for 80% of this.

The increase in mortgage interest charges this quarter of 3.4% is down on the 4.1% increase recorded last quarter mainly due to a reduction in the rate of increase in the value of debt outstanding (down from 3.4% to 2.9%). Interest rates increased by 0.6% compared with 0.8% in December quarter.

Household equipment and operation: +1.5%

This represents no change on the rate recorded last quarter. Increases in consumer credit charges account for 36% of the movement and increases in furniture prices for a further 32%.

Consumer credit charges increased by 3.6% this quarter, compared with 2.8% last quarter, comprising 1.7% from increases in the value of debt outstanding and 1.9% from increases in interest rates.

Furniture prices increased by 2.0% on average compared with 2.4% last quarter with increases being recorded in all cities.

Recreation and education: +2.3%

The rate of increase recorded this quarter is slightly down on the 2.5% increase recorded last quarter. The most significant contributor to the movement this quarter is the increase in education fees which account for 57% of the change.

Large increases in education fees were recorded in all cities with Melbourne recording the highest (16.0%) and Darwin the lowest (8.9%). Private primary and secondary school fees increased in all cities and Government secondary school fees increased in all cities except Brisbane.

Changes over recent years.

An improved approach to the treatment of mortgage interest charges in the CPI was introduced in March quarter 1989. CPI series which included mortgage interest charges (eg Housing group and All groups) were affected by the change. In order to provide the correct basis of comparison for the analysis of changes in prices, the ABS has compiled index number series using the new debt profile approach from the time that mortgage interest charges were first included in the CPI (March quarter 1987). These series together with an explanation of the change in treatment of mortgage interest charges were published in the December quarter 1989 issue of this publication, copies of which are available on request. They also form the basis of the graphs on the following page and the estimates shown in Table 5 of this publication. These series are recommended for the analysis of price change (as distinct from statutory indexation and contract escalation purposes).



EXPLANATORY NOTES

Brief description of the CPI

- 1. The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a basket of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditure by the CPI population group (ie metropolitan wage and salary earner households). This basket covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing; housing; household equipment and operation; transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Pensioners and other social welfare recipients are not included in the CPI population group and the index does not reflect concessional prices paid by these people such as subsidised government dwelling rents, public transport fares and the like.
- 2. The capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
- 3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

Prices

- 4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some important items are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).
- 5. In order to facilitate a more even spread of field collection workload the bulk of the items for which prices are collected quarterly are priced in the first two months of each quarter (ie July/August, October/November, January/February, April/May). With a few exceptions items priced in the third month are those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information about any changes in price during the quarter is obtained so that an average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

Weighting pattern

- 6. There are 107 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the eleventh series CPI and each expenditure class has its own weight, or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights.
- 7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now comprises eleven series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series.

Analysis of CPI changes

8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as changes in *index points* or as percentage changes. The following example illustrates the method of calculating index points changes and percentage changes between any two periods:

All Groups CPI: Weighted average of eight capital cities

Index numbers:

Dec quarter 1989: 200.7 (see Table 1) less: Sept. quarter 1989: 197.0 (see Table 1) Change in index points: +3.7

Percentage change = $\frac{+3.7}{197.0}$ x 100 = +1.9%

- 9. In this publication, percentage changes are calculated to illustrate 3 different kinds of movements in index numbers:
 - movements between consecutive financial years (where the index numbers for financial years are simple averages of the quarterly index numbers),
 - movements between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, and
 - movements between consecutive quarters.
- 10. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for selected expenditure classes. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup makes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy products subgroup contributed 2.91 index points to the total All Groups index number of 197.0 for September quarter 1989. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.
- 11. Table 8 provides summary information about a range of Special series in a similar format to that provided in Table 7.
- 12. Information on the impact of changes in Selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 8. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 8 shows index numbers for two special series Selected State and local government charges and All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. An explanation of the derivation and limitations of these figures was published in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.

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
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
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
