

### **SUMMARY OF FINDINGS**


### Overview

The All groups CPI increased 0.9 per cent between December quarter 1992 and March quarter 1993, resulting in an annual increase (March quarter 1993 on March quarter 1992) of 1.2 per cent.





### **ALL GROUPS - QUARTERLY MOVEMENT**



Contributing most to the overall increase this quarter were fresh vegetable prices (up 31.7%), cigarette and tobacco prices (up 4.6%), motor vehicle prices (up 2.6%), the cost of pharmaceuticals (up 15.0%), fresh fruit prices (up 14.7%), and mortgage interest charges (up 1.3%).

Partially offsetting the above were falls in petrol prices (down 3.3%), furniture prices (down 2.7%), the cost of overseas holiday travel and accommodation (down 7.4%), and consumer credit charges (down 1.9%).

### Main contributions to quarterly change

### Food: +2.2%

The food group was the largest contributor to the change in the All groups index, accounting for 47.2 per cent of the total change this quarter. Increases in prices of fresh fruit and vegetables (up 19.0%) accounted for about two-thirds of this, and take away foods (up 1.5%) and lamb and mutton (up 11.0%) each accounted for a further 12 per cent of the overall increase.

Fresh vegetable prices increased by 31.7 per cent on average this quarter, with increases in prices of cauliflower, lettuce, carrots, and tomatoes contributing most to the national result. Fresh fruit prices increased 14.7 per cent mainly as a result of increases in prices of apples and grapes.

These increases were partially offset by a fall in the price of fresh potatoes (-9.2%).

Over the 12 months to March quarter 1993, fresh vegetable prices have increased 23.9 per cent, fresh potato prices have fallen 7.6 per cent, and fresh fruit prices have fallen 1.8 per cent.

#### Tobacco and alcohol: +2.2%

Cigarette and tobacco prices increased 4.6 per cent nationally as a result of the increase (from 50 to 75 per cent) in the tobacco franchise fee in Melbourne and small increases in prices in all other capital cities.

### Health and personal care: +2.4%

The increase this quarter is largely attributable to increases in costs of pharmaceuticals (+15.0%) due mainly to the reduced effect of the PBS safety net scheme.

### Recreation and education: +1.1%

Increases in the prices of books, newspapers, and magazines (+5.8%), education fees (+4.3%), entertainment charges (+1.8%), and child care fees (+7.8%) were partially offset by falls in the cost of holiday travel and accommodation overseas (-7.4%) and in Australia (-1.5%).

### Household equipment and operation: -0.6%

The decrease in the cost of household equipment and operation this quarter results mainly from falls in furniture prices (-2.7%) and consumer credit charges (-1.9%, reflecting an increase of 0.9 per cent in the value of the debt outstanding combined with a fall in interest rates of 2.7 per cent).

### Housing: +0.4%

The increase in housing costs this quarter results from an increase in mortgage interest charges (+1.3%), reflecting an increase in the debt outstanding (+1.4%) combined with a slight decrease in interest rates (-0.1%). This is the first increase in mortgage interest charges since June

quarter 1990, reflecting a moderation in interest rate reductions.

### Transportation: +0.4%

Increases in motor vehicle prices (+2.6%), motoring charges (+7.4%), and urban transport fares (+3.0%) were largely offset by falls in petrol prices (-3.3%) and the cost of vehicle insurance (-0.6%).

Motor vehicle prices increased relatively uniformly in all cities, ranging from 2.2 per cent in Adelaide to 3.6 per cent in Hobart. The 2.6 per cent overall increase this quarter, compared with a 0.7 per cent increase last quarter, delivers an annual increase (March quarter 1993 on March quarter 1992) of 3.3 per cent.

Motoring charges increased 7.4 per cent overall as a direct result of the increase (from \$70 to \$140) in the cost of motor vehicle registration in Melbourne.

The 3.0 per cent increase in urban transport fares is due to an 11.0 per cent increase in Melbourne combined with smaller increases in Brisbane (+2.2%) and Sydney (+0.2%).

The 3.3 per cent fall in petrol prices this quarter results from a decrease in October (-0.3%), a small increase in November (+0.9%), decreases in December (-1.2%), January (-2.2%) and February (-0.7%) followed by a small increase in March (+0.4%).



### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

### Brief description of the CPI

- The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a basket of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditure by the CPI population group (ie metropolitan wage and salary earner households). This basket covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing: housing; household equipment and transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Pensioners and other social welfare recipients are not included in the CPI population group and the index does not reflect concessional prices paid by these people such as subsidised government dwelling rents, public transport fares and the like.
- 2. The capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
- 3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

#### **Prices**

- 4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some important items are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).
- 5. In order to facilitate a more even spread of field collection workload the bulk of the items for which prices are collected quarterly are priced in the first two months of each quarter (ie July/August, October/November, January/February, April/May). With a few exceptions items priced in the third month are those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information about any changes in price during the quarter is obtained so that an average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

### Weighting pattern

6. There are 107 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the eleventh series CPI and each expenditure class has its own weight, or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights.

7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now comprises twelve series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series.

### Analysis of CPI changes

8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as changes in *index points* or as percentage changes. The following example illustrates the method of calculating index points changes and percentage changes between any two periods:

All Groups CPI: Weighted average of eight capital cities Index numbers:

Dec quarter 1992: 107.9 (see Table 1) less: Sep quarter 1992: 107.4 (see Table 1) Change in index points: 0.5

Percentage change = 
$$\frac{0.5}{107.4}$$
 x 100 = 0.5%

- 9. In this publication, percentage changes are calculated to illustrate 3 different kinds of movements in index numbers:
  - movements between consecutive financial years (where the index numbers for financial years are simple averages of the quarterly index numbers),
  - movements between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, and
  - movements between consecutive quarters.
- 10. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for selected expenditure classes. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup makes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy products subgroup contributed 1.60 index points to the total All Groups index number of 107.9 for December quarter 1992. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.
- 11. Table 8 provides summary information about a range of Special series in a similar format to that provided in Table 7.

12. Information on the impact of changes in Selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 8. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 8 shows index numbers for two special series Selected State and local government charges and All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. An explanation of the derivation and limitations of these figures was published in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.
