



# 2005 NORTHERN TERRITORY AT A GLANCE

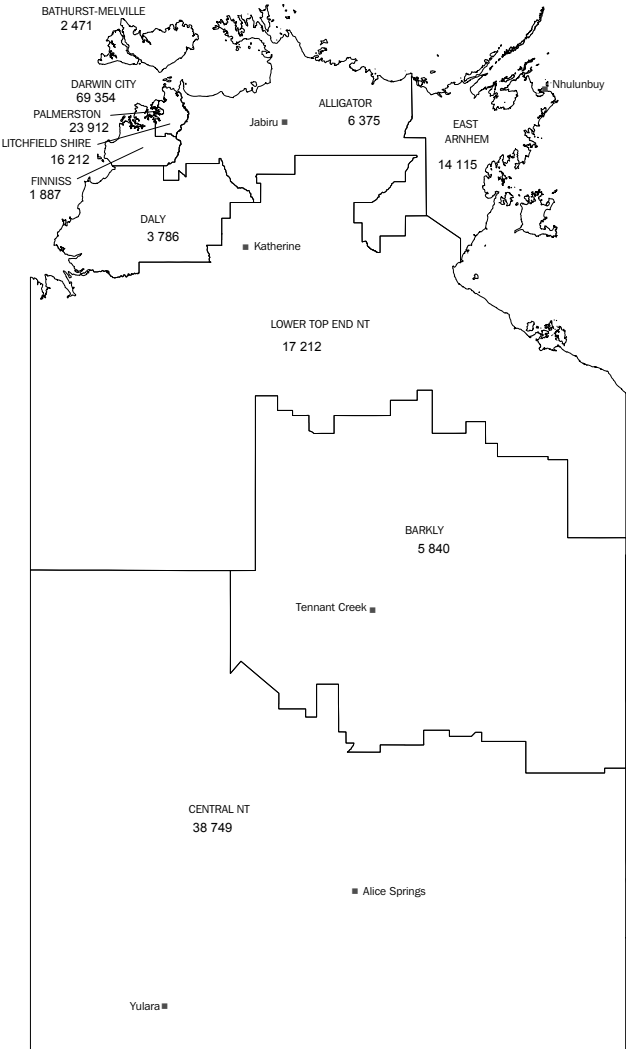


Northern Territory (NT) comprises a land area of 1,346,200 km<sup>2</sup>. It is the third largest of the states and territories after Western Australia and Queensland, yet has the smallest population and lowest population density.

Darwin City has an estimated population of 69,354. It is the commercial and administrative centre of the Territory. Alice Springs is the largest regional population centre outside Darwin and is the base for significant tourism activities in the Central Region. Mining, tourism and defence are major contributors to the NT economy.

A \$750m underwater gas pipeline is being built from the Bayu-Undan field in the Timor Sea to Wickham Pt near Darwin. Projects such as this, which exploit the rich oil and gas reserves in the region, will bring substantial economic benefits to the NT.
