NOTES

GENERAL

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. This smoothing technique does result in revisions to the most recent estimates as additional observations become available. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators* (Cat. no. 1308.0).

STANDARD ERRORS OF ESTIMATES

One measure of the variability which occurs as a result of surveying only samples of the total business population is the standard error. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE).

NSW OVERVIEW

EMPLOYMENT

The number of employed persons in NSW increased by 0.7% in April 1998 to a seasonally adjusted figure of 2,850,400, while the last 12 months has seen a 1.0% rise. Nationally, employment increased by 0.7% in April and by 2.0% in the past year.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Seasonally adjusted unemployment in NSW decreased by 4.4% in April 1998 and by 10.2% over the previous 12 months. The unemployment rate in NSW fell from 7.5% in March 1998 to 7.2% in April and the national rate fell from 8.2% to 7.9% in this period.

BUILDING APPROVALS

The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in March 1998 increased by 14.3% from the previous month to 4,481.

RETAIL

Total retail sales for NSW in March 1998 was a seasonally adjusted figure of \$3,969.6 million (\$3,973.9 million in February 1998).

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

In seasonally adjusted terms, new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in March 1998 fell by 4.8% from the previous month to 20,725.

FINANCE

The value of housing finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in March 1998 was \$1,932.9 million. This represented a 10.3% increase from February 1998 and a 10.9% increase from March 1997.

LABOUR

In April 1998, 75.9% of employed persons in NSW were working full-time and 24.1% part-time (based on original data). This was unchanged from a year earlier. However, there was a significant gender difference in the distribution of full and part-time work. At April 1998, 88.8% of employed males were working full-time compared to 58.7% of employed females.

Over the year to April 1998, full-time male employment rose by a little over 1% while part-time male employment fell by 4.0%. The reverse happened for females — full-time employment fell by a little over 1% but part-time employment rose by 5.2%.

Of the total of 219,000 people who were unemployed in NSW in April 1998 (based on original figures), 76.6% were looking for full-time work and 23.4% were looking for part-time work. The gender split showed that 85.2% of unemployed males and 65.7% of unemployed females were looking for full-time work.

The original (unadjusted) unemployment rate in NSW in April 1998 was 7.0% for males and 7.3% for females. The corresponding participation rates were 71.3% and 52.2% respectively.

RETAIL TRADE

In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in March 1998 was \$3,969.6 million. Apart from Household good retailing and Department stores, which achieved sales increases of 4.1% and 3.3% respectively, most other industry groups experienced decreases from February 1998. Nationally, total retail sales in March 1998 was \$11,310.0 million, showing little movement from the previous month's figure of \$11,235.2 million.

Compared with March 1997, seasonally adjusted total retail sales for NSW increased by 3.0%. Most industry groups increased over the period, with Other retailing showing the largest rise (4.3%). At the national level, total retail sales rose by 4.1%. Most industry groups experienced increases, except Household good retailing, where the sales level remained virtually unchanged. The industry Other retailing showed the most substantial rise over the period.
