GENERAL

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. This smoothing technique does result in revisions to the most recent estimates as additional observations become available. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators* (Cat. no. 1308.0).

STANDARD ERRORS OF ESTIMATES

One measure of the variability which occurs as a result of surveying only samples of the total business population is the standard error. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE). For detailed explanatory notes and definitions for the items shown in this publication, readers are referred to the specific ABS publications.

NSW OVERVIEW

EMPLOYMENT

There was little change in employment in NSW over the month and in January 1999 the seasonally adjusted figure was 2,889,600. National employment was unchanged in this period.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment in NSW rose by 4.2% in January 1999 to a seasonally adjusted figure of 216,400 while the unemployment rate rose from 6.7% to 7.0%. The national unemployment rate remained steady at 7.5%.

BUILDING APPROVALS

The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in December 1998 increased by 8.8% from the previous month to 4,636.

RETAIL

In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in December 1998 was \$4,003.1 million. The figure for the previous month was \$4,064.6 million.

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

New motor vehicle registrations for NSW in seasonally adjusted terms in December 1998 fell slightly from the previous month to 23,117.

FINANCE

The seasonally adjusted value of housing finance for owner occupation in NSW in December 1998 was \$2,095 million. This represented an increase of 4.5% on the previous month and an increase of 16.7% since December 1997.

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RETAIL TRADE

In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail turnover for NSW in December 1998 was \$4,003.1 million. A year earlier the figure was \$3,986.2 million. Nationally, total retail turnover for December 1998 was \$11,549.8 million, with the figure for December 1997 being \$11,177.8 million.

Of all industry groups in NSW, only Department stores showed significant movement. Retail turnover for this group was \$341.4 million, a decrease of 10.4% on November 1998.

The Food retailing industry contributed the largest share, \$1,537.2 million (38.4%), to the total retail turnover for the State in December 1998.

Nationally, Department stores also showed significant movement between November and December 1998 with a fall in retail turnover of 8.2% to \$1,007.0 million. Compared with December 1997, increases were experienced by Clothing and soft good retailing (9.0% to \$798.1 million), and Food retailing (4.3% to \$4,728.0 million). As in NSW, the Food retailing industry group contributed the largest share (40.9%) to total national retail turnover in December 1998.

LABOUR MARKET

There has been some volatility in the seasonally adjusted labour estimates for NSW over the past three months. Rises in the number of unemployed and the unemployment rate in November 1998 were reversed by falls in December, while the fall in employment in November was almost offset by the rise in December. By comparison, movements in January 1999 were much smaller.

The number of employed persons in NSW and the labour force estimate remained steady in January at 2.9 million and 3.1 million respectively while the number of unemployed increased by 4.2% to 216,400. The unemployment rate rose from 6.7% in December to 7.0% in January. The corresponding national indicators remained steady in January with the key unemployment rate staying at 7.5%.

Gender differences in some of the estimates are quite noticeable. One of the key differences was in the participation rate with the male participation rate in NSW being 72% (seasonally adjusted) in January 1999 while the female rate was 52%. Another key difference is in the proportion of the employed who were working full-time—88% of males in NSW were working full-time compared to 59% of females. Another difference was in the unemployment rate which was lower for females at 6.5% compared to 7.4% for males in seasonally adjusted terms.


