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

DATA HIGHLIGHTS

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

SUMMARY	
	During the 12 months ending April 1999, almost 85% of the Australian population aged
	15 years and over (12.6 million persons) attended at least one of the cultural
	venues/activities surveyed.
AGE AND SEX	
	Attendance rates were highest for persons primarily in the lower to middle age groups,
	with persons aged 65 years and over usually participating at significantly lower rates than
	persons in other age groups.
	Generally, females had higher attendance rates than males across all age groups with
	only minor exceptions (see table 3).
AREA OF RESIDENCE	
	As can be seen in the graph below, attendance rates for persons living in the six State
	capital cities were higher than those of persons residing in the remainder of the country
	for all venues and activities, with the exception of other performing arts (see table 2).
	Residents of the Australian Capital Territory had the highest attendance rates for 8 of the
	12 venues and activities. In addition, residents of the Australian Capital Territory shared
	the highest rate for attendance at botanic gardens with Victoria. Western Australia had
	the highest rate of attendance at opera or musicals and residents of the
	Northern Territory had the highest attendance rates for the remaining venues (see
	table 1).

RELATIONSHIP IN HOUSEHOLD

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Unrelated persons sharing accommodation generally had higher attendance rates at the selected venues and activities in comparison to persons living with family members (see table 5).

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS continued

BIRTHPLACE	
	Of those persons born overseas, rates of attendance were significantly higher for those
	born in main English-speaking countries than other countries. In addition, persons born
	in main English-speaking countries generally had higher attendance rates than persons
	born in Australia (see table 6).
EMPLOYMENT STATUS	
	With the exception of libraries, employed persons' attendance rates were higher than
	those of unemployed persons or persons not in the labour force for all venues and
	activities. Of those who were employed, part-time workers had higher attendance rates
	than full-time workers for all venues and activities surveyed (see table 7).
EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT	
	Persons whose highest qualification was a postgraduate diploma or higher had the
	highest attendance rates in almost all of the categories surveyed. Attendance rates for
	cinema were highest for persons still at school (see table 8).
MAIN VENUES ATTENDED	
	Cinema was by far the most popular cultural venue, with 67.0% of Australians attending
	at least once in the 12 month period. The next most popular venues were libraries
	(38.1%), botanic gardens (36.1%) and animal or marine parks (33.9%).
FREQUENCY OF ATTENDANCE	
	Australians went to the cinema or visited a library much more often than they attended
	other cultural venues or activities. Of library users, 62.8% visited on six or more occasions
	during the reference period while 49.2% of persons who went to the cinema attended
	six or more times. Of the other venues or activities, classical music concerts had the
	highest proportion of persons (17.2%) attending five times or more (see tables 9, 10
	and 11).

COMPARISON WITH 1995 SURVEY

The table below summarises attendance numbers and attendance rates at the cultural venues and activities. All venues and activities were common to the two surveys.

There were marginal changes in attendance rates and number of persons attending the selected venues/activities since the 1995 survey. In terms of attendance rates, museums showed the largest decline, 8 percentage points (see paragraph 14 of the Explanatory Notes), while cinemas had an increase of almost 5 percentage points (see tables 12 and 13).

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DATA HIGHLIGHTS continued

ART GALLERIES


AREA OF RESIDENCE

The highest attendance rate for art galleries was by residents of the Australian Capital Territory (37.7%). The rate of attendance of persons living in the six State capital cities was slightly higher than for those living in other areas of Australia.

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

The highest attendance rates for art galleries occurred in the 15–17 year age group and the 45–54 year age group (both 25.4%).





The attendance rate for art galleries was over 6 percentage points higher for females than males.

DATA HIGHLIGHTS continued

MUSEUMS

ATTENDANCE

Attendance rates at these venues were significantly lower than for the 1995 survey (see comparison table on page 5), with 19.9% of persons attending museums in 1999 compared with 27.8% in 1995 (see also Explanatory Notes, paragraph 14).


AREA OF RESIDENCE

About two-fifths of the residents of the Northern Territory (38.6%) visited a museum. Tasmanians (28.8%) and residents of the Australian Capital Territory (25.8%) also had attendance rates significantly higher than the Australian average (19.9%). The attendance rate for residents of the Australian Capital Territory was almost 20 percentage points less than the rate recorded for these persons in the 1995 survey.

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

The highest attendance rate for museums was for people aged between 15 and 17 years (25.8%).

MUSEUMS



Employed persons, particularly those employed part time, had higher attendance rates than unemployed persons and those not in the labour force.

	capital cities than for the rest of Australia, while the difference in attendance rates was									
	almost 10 percentage points for zoological gardens.									
	Western Australians had the highest attendance rate at zoological gardens (32.3%).

Highest attendance rates occurred in situations where young dependent children were present in the household. Where there was a husband, wife and children aged up to 14 years in the household, the rate of attendance was 48.1%. The attendance rate for lone parents with children 0–14 years present was 43.7%. In comparison, where there were no children less than 15 years of age in the family, attendance rates were approximately 20 percentage points lower.

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Over 93% of persons who visited animal or marine parks did so on less than five occasions during the year.

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BOTANIC GARDENS

ATTENDANCE

Botanical gardens, which had an attendance rate of 36.1%, were the third most popular cultural venue attended by all Australians.


AREA OF RESIDENCE

Persons living in the Australian Capital Territory and Victoria shared the highest attendance rate of 40.9%.

Capital city residents attended a botanical garden at a significantly higher rate than persons living in other parts of Australia (39.7% compared with 30.0%).

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

Females attended at a rate about 6 percentage points higher than that of males (39.0% compared with 33.1%).



Generally, attendance rates increased with higher levels of educational attainment.


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LIBRARIES

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

Females used libraries at a significantly higher rate than males for all age groups except the most elderly where the difference, while still in favour of females, was of a much smaller magnitude (just over 2 percentage points).

LIBRARIES



The attendance rate of persons who were family members (38.7%) was higher than that for those who were not living with any family members (35.1%). Dependent students had the highest attendance rate (63.5%) followed by lone parents with children under 15 (49.7%) and lone parents with dependent students but without children under 15 (49.6%).

More than half (53.0%) of persons employed part time had used a library during the previous 12 months. The rate for unemployed persons was 46.3%. The lowest rate occurred for persons employed full time (30.9%).

When cross-classified by educational attainment, the highest proportion of library users occurred for persons with postgraduate diplomas (65.3%), closely followed by students still at school (64.7%). Those with skilled vocational qualifications had the lowest attendance rate of 24.4%.

Older persons attended libraries more often than younger persons. Almost 32% of the library users aged 65 years and over recorded attending a library 26 times or more during the reference period compared to 12.3% of persons aged 18–24 years.

DATA HIGHLIGHTS continued

POPULAR MUSIC


ATTENDANCE

The attendance rate for Australians 15 years of age and over going to popular music performances was 25.4%, ranging from 30.2% for residents of the Australian Capital Territory to 23.7% for residents of Queensland.

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

The highest attendance rate for popular music was for those in the 18–24 year age group (42.4%). Attendance rates then steadily declined with age to 7.2% for persons aged 65 years and over. The graph below illustrates a continuing decline in the rate for each successive age group and for both males and females.

POPULAR MUSIC



Persons who did not live with related persons had an attendance rate almost 6 percentage points higher than persons who resided with other family members.

Australian-born persons had an attendance rate of 28.2% while the rate for persons from other than main English-speaking countries was 13.5%.

More persons attended popular music performances between two and four times (45.7%) than once (37.5%).

CLASSICAL MUSIC, THEATRE, DANCE, OPERA/MUSICALS, OTHER PERFORMING ARTS

ATTENDANCE

Attendance rates at these activities ranged from 17.8% for other performing arts (over half of this was due to attendances at circuses) to 8.8% for classical music performances. The rate of attendance at theatre performances was 16.5% and dance 9.0%, while 16.3% of persons had been to an opera or musical.

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

Females had higher attendance rates than males at each of these five activities. The smallest difference between the rates for the sexes occurred for classical music (about 3 percentage points) while the largest difference was over 8 percentage points for attendance at operas/musicals.

More 15–17 year olds went to watch a theatre performance (25.1%) than to any of the other four activities.

Classical music had the lowest attendance rate of these activities; however, this activity had the highest proportion of persons who had been to see a performance five times or more.

DATA HIGHLIGHTS continued

CINEMAS

ATTENDANCE

Attending the cinema was clearly the most popular cultural activity undertaken by persons 15 years of age and over in each State and Territory for the 12 months ending April 1999. Almost 10 million (9,987,600) Australians had been to see a movie at least once during the reference period; an attendance rate of 67.0%. This was almost 29 percentage points higher than the rate of attendance for the second most popular venue and almost 5 percentage points higher than the previous survey in 1995.


AREA OF RESIDENCE

The attendance rate for residents of capital cities was 71.2% which was about 11 percentage points higher than the rate for persons who lived in the rest of Australia.

CHARACTERISTICS OF USERS

Females had higher attendance rates than males for all age groups. Attendance decreased steadily with age from 90.9% for 15–17 year olds to 35.6% for persons aged 65 years and over. Going to the cinema has become the most popular cultural activity for persons aged 65 years and over.





The rate of attendance at the cinema of Australian-born and persons born overseas in main English-speaking countries was about 16 percentage points higher than the rate displayed by persons from other countries.

For females, those employed full time had the highest attendance rate at cinemas (83.9%). However, for males, those employed part-time had the highest rate of cinema attendance (75.4%).

More than half (50.8%) of persons who had been to the cinema during the previous 12 months had been one to five times, while 40.5% had been six to twenty times. Younger movie goers attended the cinema more often than older attendees.

	1 This publication presents results from the Survey of Attendance at Selected Cultural Venues, a supplementary survey to the April 1999 Monthly Population Survey.

	2 The survey was conducted in both rural and urban areas in all States and Territories.
Dwellings	
	3 It excluded some 175,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia. The exclusion of these persons will have only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates that are produced for individual States and Territories, with the exception of the Northern Territory where such persons account for over 20% of the population.
	4 The survey covered both private and non-private dwellings. Private dwellings are houses, flats, home units and any structures used as places of residence at the time of the survey. Non-private dwellings are hotels, motels, hostels, boarding houses, hospitals and homes, educational and religious institutions, construction camps, caravan parks etc.

	 5 The survey included all persons 15 years of age and over except: members of the Australian permanent defence forces; certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations; overseas residents in Australia;
	 members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia; and
	 boarding school pupils not resident in households, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories and gaols.

	6 In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See <i>The Labour Force, Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0) for more details.

	7 The survey was conducted using a sub-sample of the monthly population survey sample. The monthly population survey which is described in <i>The Labour Force, Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0) comprises the monthly labour force and supplementary topics. The household sample was selected using multi-stage sampling techniques and included approximately 30,000 dwellings. One randomly selected respondent per household from seven-eighths of the households selected in the Labour Force Survey was asked additional questions (i.e. approximately 25,200 persons were interviewed) by trained interviewers relating to attendance at cultural venues. About 80% of the interviews were conducted by telephone with the remainder being face-to-face interviews.

Inability to obtain comprehensive data from all people included in the sample. The errors arise because of differences which exist between the characteristics of respondents and non-respondents. Errors in reporting on the part of both the respondent and the interviewer. These errors may arise due to the inappropriate wording of questions, misunderstanding of what data is required, answers that were based on memory and inability or unwillingness to provide accurate information. Errors arising during the processing of the survey data. These processing errors may arise through mistakes in coding and data recording.
	11 Every effort is made to minimise these types of errors. In particular, the effects of reporting and processing errors described above were minimised by careful questionnaire design, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and extensive editing and quality control checking at all stages of data processing.
DATA INTERPRETATION	
	12 It should be noted that this publication presents details of people who attended a cultural venue or activity at least once during the 12 months to April 1999. Given that tables provide number of attendees together with attendance rates, it is possible to calculate details of non-attendees.
	13 The data presented cannot be compared with any administrative data held by cultural venues on total admissions, since details in relation to attendees under 15 years of age were not part of the survey. In addition, the survey provides information about attendances rather than total admissions.
	14 Tables 12 and 13 provide comparisons with data collected in the 1995 Survey of Attendance at Selected Cultural Venues. The large drop in museum attendances (almost 900,000 persons since the 1995 survey) can be partly explained by temporary closure of some large museums. Other contributing factors may be increased virtual access to museums on the Internet and a reduced number of special exhibitions.
	15 Data presented in this publication for libraries include only National, State and local libraries. Data in relation to either a school, college or university library was excluded from this publication.

COMPARISONS WITH PREVIOUS DATA

	 16 The methodology used in the March 1995 Survey differed from that used in this survey. In particular: The data about randomly selected persons was collected from any responsible adult in the household in the 1999 Survey whereas in the 1995 Survey, the information was obtained by personal interview with the randomly selected person. Pilot tests conducted for the 1999 Survey showed that this had only a minimal impact on the accuracy of the responses. In the 1999 Survey, most of the interviews were conducted by telephone, whereas in the 1995 Survey, all of the interviews were conducted face-to-face. This change in methodology necessitated some wording changes to the questions in the 1999 Survey as prompt cards could not be used. This may also have had a slight impact on the results.

STANDARD ERRORS


1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which estimates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about 2 chances in 3 (67%) that a sample estimate will vary by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs.

RELATIVE STANDARD ERRORS

2 Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate. The RSE is a useful measure in that it provides an indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling.

3 An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows:

From table 10 an estimated 104,000 people aged between 35 and 44 years reported having been to a cinema 21 times or more during the 12 months ending April 1999. Referring to the table of SEs, an estimate of 104,000 has a SE of approximately 7,980 people. There are about 2 chances in 3 that the number that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey was between 96,020 and 111,980 (i.e. 104,000 plus or minus 7,980). There are about 19 chances in 20 that the number lies between 88,040 and 119,960 (i.e. 104,000 plus or minus 15,960). This example is illustrated below.



4 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below:

 $RSE(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$

RELATIVE STANDARD ERRORS continued

5 From table 1, of the 370,000 people aged 15 years or more resident in Tasmania, 30,300 (8.2%) had been to a classical music concert during the 12 months ending April 1999. The SE of 30,300 for Tasmania is about 1,510, so the RSE is 1,510/30,300 = 5.0%. The RSE of 370,000 is approximately $2,900/370,000 \ge 10.8\%$. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is $\sqrt{(5.0)^2 - (0.8)^2}$ or 4.9%. This then gives a SE of the proportion (8.2%) of $4.9/100 \ge 0.4\%$. Therefore, there are about 2 chances in 3 that the proportion of Tasmanians attending classical music concerts was between 7.8% and 8.6% and approximately 19 chances in 20 that the proportion was in the range 7.4% to 9.0%.

COMPARISONS OF ESTIMATES

6 Particular care should be taken when comparing figures. It is not correct to assume that an apparent difference between figures is actually significant. Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

7 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics of sub-populations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

STANDARD ERRORS TABLE

9 As the SEs in the following table show, the size of the SE increases with the size of the estimate. However, the smaller the estimate the higher is the RSE. Thus, large estimates will be relatively more reliable than smaller estimates. Very small estimates are subject to such high SEs (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less and percentages based on such estimates are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates and percentages with larger RSEs have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *2.8) to indicate that they should be treated with caution and viewed as being merely indicative of the magnitude involved.

GLOSSARY

Animal or marine park	Included are zoological gardens and marine parks primarily engaged in the breeding, preservation, study and display of native and/or exotic fauna in captivity, enclosures or natural environments, so as to be accessible to the general public.
Art gallery	Included are National, State, regional, local and private galleries primarily engaged in the collection, acquisition, research into, conservation, communication and exhibition of visual art/craft objects, for the purposes of study, education and enjoyment by the general public and/or specialists. Commercial art galleries where works are exhibited for sale are excluded.
Associate diploma	The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a prerequisite certificate course. The duration of study ranges from one to two years full-time study or its equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skill necessary to give support to professionals, and for positions in advanced trade, technical or associate professional occupations.
Attendance rate	For any group, the number of people who attended a venue/activity at least once during the year, expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 years and over in the same group.
Bachelor degree	The entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from three to six years full-time study or its equivalent. Courses are designed to provide students with a systematic and coherent introduction to a broad body of knowledge. The emphasis is on the underlying principles and concepts of that body of knowledge. Examples are BA in English; Bachelor of Education; BSC in Maths and Statistics.
Basic vocational qualification	Often requires Year 10 completion, however many courses have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from one semester to one year of full-time study or equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the practical skills and background knowledge necessary for employment at the operative level in many different fields. Examples includes: Pre-apprenticeship in Plumbing; Certificate in Shorthand and Keyboarding; Pre-vocational Certificate in Automotive Mechanics.
Birthplace	Classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS) (Cat. no. 1269.0).
Botanic gardens	Institutions established as a large garden to collect, study, exchange and display plants for research and for the education and enjoyment of the public.
Capital cities	The areas determining the six State capital cities are the Statistical Divisions for those capital cities defined in the <i>Statistical Geography: Volume 1– Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC)</i> (Cat. no. 1216.0).
Cinema	Included are drive-ins and public screenings of films at other locations (e.g. at a community hall) in addition to cinema screenings.
Circus	Travelling company of performers which may or may not incorporate animals in its acts. Data about circuses are a subset of other performing arts.

Classical music	Refers to performances given by symphony, philharmonic, youth and theatre orchestras, chamber and choral groups presenting, in the main, performances of classical, oratorio, early and contemporary music. Individual performers and singers, vocal ensembles and other groups presenting music, other than popular music, are also included.
Dance	Included are ballet, classical dance, contemporary dance, modern dance, dance theatre, dance revue, ethnic and folk dance companies and dance in education companies. Variety dance shows such as 'dance on ice' are excluded.
Dependants	All family members under 15 years of age; all family members aged 15–19 years attending school or aged 15–24 years attending a tertiary institution full-time (except those classified as husbands, wives or lone parents).
Dependent student	In couple or one-parent families, sons or daughters aged 15–19 years attending school or aged 15–24 years attending a tertiary educational institution full time (except those classified as husbands, wives or lone parents).
Educational attainment	Highest level of qualification completed. Questions asking educational attainment were not asked in this survey. However, the topic was included as a supplementary to the May 1999 Monthly Population Survey and for those respondents common to both surveys, educational attainment was matched with cultural attendance data.
Employed	 Persons aged 15 and over who, during the reference week: worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and own account workers); or worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or were employers, own account workers or contributing family workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.
Family	 Two or more related persons (related includes relationships by blood, marriage or adoption) usually resident in the same household at the time of the survey. A family comprises a married couple (including de facto) or a family head, together with any persons having any of the following relationships to them: sons or daughters of any age, if not married and with no children of their own present; other relatives if not accompanied by a spouse, sons or daughters, or parents of their own; or any children under 15 years of age who do not have a parent present.
Full-time workers	Employed persons who usually worked 35 hours or more a week (in all jobs) and others who, although usually working less than 35 hours a week, worked 35 hours or more during the reference week.

Higher degree Libraries	Includes doctorates and masters degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a masters degree or first class honours for a doctorate and first class honours for a masters degree. The duration of study is a minimum of two to four years for a doctorate and two years full-time or equivalent for a masters degree. Courses at this level involve in-depth study in a particular field, and build on the knowledge and skills gained in previous study in the same area. There is usually emphasis on original research. Examples include: Doctorate in Astronomy; Masters in Financial Management. Includes National and State libraries as well as public libraries. The latter are institutions funded by State and Local government which are primarily engaged in the provision of a free library service to the population of a community or region. Special libraries and those located in educational institutions are excluded from this category.
Lone parent	The head of a one-parent family.
Lone person	A person who is the sole member of a household.
Main English-speaking countries	The group comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, South Africa, Canada, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Museums	Organisations involved in the collection, acquisition, research into, conservation, communication and exhibition of the material evidence of people, their culture and environment, for the purposes of study, education and enjoyment by the general public and/or specialists. Included are science and technology, history, natural science, transport and specialist museums, science centres, museums and art galleries combined and historical theme parks.
Non-dependent child	In couple or one parent families, sons or daughters aged 15 years and over, other than those classified as dependent students, husbands, wives or sole parents.
Non-family member	A person who is not related to any other member of the household in which they are living.
Not in the labour force	Persons who were not in the categories employed or unemployed, as defined. They include persons who were keeping house (unpaid), retired, voluntarily inactive, permanently unable to work, persons in institutions (hospitals, gaols, sanatoriums etc.), trainee teachers, members of contemplative religious orders, and persons whose only activity during the reference week was jury service or unpaid voluntary work for a charitable organisation.
Opera or musical	This category of activity includes major musical productions, opera and operetta, performed in front of a live audience. Excluded are variety, cabaret and instrumental music performances.
Other performing arts	Consists of performing artists, working individually or in groups or companies. Included are acrobats, clowns, fire eaters, sword swallowers, stilt walkers, trick cyclists, circuses, with or without animals, magicians, ventriloquists, pantomime, variety, revue and mime artists, comedians, ice dancing, reciters, poetry readers and oral history performance artists.
Part-time workers	Employed persons who usually worked less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the reference week.

Popular music	This category covers the presentation, in front of live audiences, of popular music performances by individual musicians and vocalists as well as by orchestras, brass and concert bands, music groups etc. Included are rock, jazz, pop, folk, country and western, ethnic, aboriginal and multicultural music. Almost any venue is included, including performances in hotels and clubs, but performances in the street, such as busking and street parades, are excluded.
Postgraduate diploma	Includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a bachelor degree or an undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from six months (for a Graduate Certificate) to one year full-time study or equivalent. Courses usually build on undergraduate studies, and are designed to broaden or develop professional knowledge and skills in a related or new area of study. Examples include: Graduate Diploma in Chemistry; Diploma of Education in Special Education; Graduate Certificate in Business.
Rest of State	Incorporates people usually resident in areas outside of the six State capital city Statistical Divisions, including all residents of the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory.
Skilled vocational qualification	The entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is two to four years and typically involves some on-the-job training. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to work in a specific vocation or a recognised trade or craft, that requires a high degree of skill in a range of related activities. Examples are a Trade Certificate in Vehicle Building or Carpentry, an Apprenticeship in Electrical Fitting and a Certificate in Landscape Design.
Still at school	Persons aged 15–20 years still attending school.
Theatre	Consists of live performances, by actors or puppets, of plays where the entire, or a major part of the performance, does not use song and music. Included are innovative, playback, puppet, fringe, youth and community theatre, theatre sports and theatre of the deaf as well as drama, comedy, mime and theatre-in-education.
Undergraduate diploma	The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is three years full-time study or its equivalent. Courses are designed to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary for practice in a professional or associate professional occupation. Examples include: Diploma of Applied Science in Nursing; Diploma of Applied Arts in Graphic Design; Diploma of Teaching.

Unemployed	Persons aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the reference week, and:
	 had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week and; were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of
	 the reference week); or were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then; or were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (including the whole of the reference week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
Zoological gardens	Parks or other large enclosures for the keeping, breeding, study and display, to the public, of animals. Data about zoological gardens are a subset of animal and marine parks.

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
