

KEY POINTS

TREND ESTIMATES

- The provisional trend estimate of the balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$952m in July 2006, a decrease of \$138m on the revised deficit in June.
- Goods and services credits rose \$216m (1%) to \$17,492m. Goods and services debits rose
 \$78m to \$18,444m.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

- In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$588m in July, a decrease of \$47m on the revised deficit in June.
- Goods and services credits fell \$471m (3%) to \$17,405m. Non-rural and other goods fell \$590m (5%), while rural goods rose \$54m (2%). Services credits rose \$65m (2%).
- Goods and services debits fell \$518m (3%) to \$17,993m. Intermediate and other goods fell \$305m (4%) and capital goods fell \$265m (8%), while consumption goods rose \$12m. Services debits rose \$40m (1%).

ORIGINAL ESTIMATES

- In original terms, the July balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$107m, a decrease of \$817m on the revised deficit in June. Goods and services credits rose \$44m and goods and services debits fell \$773m (4%).
- Non-rural and other goods were up \$2.0b (19%) and rural goods were up \$0.1b (5%) on the corresponding period in 2004-05.

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

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ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES	The trend estimate of the balance on goods and services in July 2006 was a deficit of \$952m, a decrease of \$138m on the deficit in June.
	In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services in July 2006 was a deficit of \$588m, a decrease of \$47m on the deficit in June.
EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES	The trend estimate of goods and services credits rose \$216m (1%) between June and July to \$17,492m.
	In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services credits fell \$471m (3%) to \$17,405m. Other goods fell \$413m (29%), non-rural goods fell \$177m (2%), while rural goods rose \$54m (2%). Services credits rose \$65m (2%).

RURAL GOODS

The trend estimate of rural goods exports rose \$5m to \$2,181m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of rural goods rose \$54m (2%) to \$2,215m.

The movements in the seasonally adjusted components contributing to this rise were:

- cereal grains and cereal preparations, up \$22m (5%)
- wool and sheepskins, up \$16m (7%)
- other rural, up \$16m (2%).

In original terms, exports of rural goods rose \$31m (1%) to \$2,206m.

NON-RURAL GOODS

The trend estimate of non-rural goods exports rose \$181m (2%) to \$10,790m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of non-rural goods fell \$177m (2%) to \$10,878m.

The main movements in the seasonally adjusted components contributing to the fall were:

- metal ores and minerals, down \$259m (8%)
- transport equipment, down \$89m (22%).

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- other manufactures, up \$79m (6%)
- other mineral fuels, up \$63m (5%)
- metals (excluding non-monetary gold), up \$23m (2%).

In original terms, exports of non-rural goods rose \$109m (1%) to \$11,271m.

NON-RURAL GOODS continued

The main movement in the original series contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted terms was:

- transport equipment, down \$136m (32%), compared to an average June to July fall of 4% over the previous three years, of which:
 - road vehicles, down \$99m (31%)
 - other transport equipment, down \$37m (32%).


OTHER GOODS

The trend estimate of other goods exports rose \$26m (2%) to \$1,249m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of other goods fell \$413m (29%) to \$1,012m.

The main component contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series was non-monetary gold, down \$401m (33%).

In original terms, exports of other goods fell \$420m (29%) to \$1,004m.



In trend terms, services credits rose \$4m to \$3,272m.

Seasonally adjusted, services credits rose \$65m (2%) to \$3,300m.

All components contributed to the rise in the seasonally adjusted series with:


- other services, up \$32m (4%)
- transportation services, up \$18m (3%)
- travel services, up \$15m (1%).

Seasonally adjusted, tourism related services credits rose \$31m (2%) to \$2,097m.

IMPORTS OF GOODS ANDThe trend estimate of goods and services debits rose \$78m between June and July toSERVICES\$18,444m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits fell \$518m (3%) to \$17,993m. Intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$309m (5%) and capital goods fell \$265m (8%), while consumption goods rose \$12m and other goods rose \$4m (1%). Services debits rose \$40m (1%). Imports of goods

CONSUMPTION GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of consumption goods rose \$41m (1%) to \$4,442m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of consumption goods rose \$12m to \$4,428m.

The components contributing to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- consumption goods n.e.s., up \$49m (4%)
- food and beverages, mainly for consumption, up \$18m (3%)
- textiles, clothing and footwear, up \$6m (1%).

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- non-industrial transport equipment, down \$43m (4%)
- household electrical items, down \$12m (3%)
- toys, books and leisure goods, down \$6m (2%).

In original terms, imports of consumption goods rose \$101m (2%) to \$4,388m.

CAPITAL GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of capital goods fell \$54m (2%) to \$3,247m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of capital goods fell \$265m (8%) to \$3,082m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- industrial transport equipment n.e.s., down \$102m (24%)
- civil aircraft, down \$100m
- machinery and industrial equipment, down \$72m (6%).

In original terms, imports of capital goods fell \$597m (16%) to \$3,035m.

INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods rose \$62m (1%) to \$6,639m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, intermediate and other merchandise goods imports fell \$309m (5%) to \$6,421m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- fuels and lubricants, down \$429m (19%)
- primary industrial supplies n.e.s., down \$45m (32%)
- parts for ADP equipment, down \$19m (11%).

Imports of goods continued

INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS continued

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- organic and inorganic chemicals, up \$83m (29%)
- parts for transport equipment, up \$46m (7%)
- processed industrial supplies n.e.s., up \$27m (2%)
- other parts for capital equipment, up \$18m (2%).

In original terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$445m (7%) to \$6,274m.

OTHER GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of other goods rose \$14m (2%) to \$794m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, other goods imports rose \$4m (1%) to \$712m.

The main components contributing to the small rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:


- goods for processing, up \$115m
- goods procured in ports by carriers, up \$7m (6%).

Largely offsetting these effects was non-monetary gold, down \$120m (21%).

In original terms, other goods imports rose \$9m (1%) to \$716m.

SERVICES DEBITS



In trend terms, services debits rose \$15m to \$3,322m.

Seasonally adjusted, services debits rose \$40m (1%) to \$3,350m.

All components contributed to the rise in the seasonally adjusted series with:

- travel services, up \$32m (3%)
- other services, up \$6m (1%)
- transportation services, up \$2m.

Seasonally adjusted, tourism related services debits rose \$27m (2%) to \$1,747m.



INTRODUCTION	1 This publication presents preliminary estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis and merchandise import and export statistics on a recorded trade basis.
	2 Merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis are compiled from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS). Adjustments for coverage, timing and valuation are made to recorded trade data to convert them to a balance of payments basis. The main source for services data is the quarterly Survey of International Trade in Services.
	3 More comprehensive quarterly estimates of Australia's trade in goods and services, together with comprehensive details of Australia's balance of payments are included in the quarterly publication, <i>Balance of Payments and International Investment Position</i> , <i>Australia</i> (cat. no. 5302.0). Detailed monthly statistics on merchandise trade are available on AusStats or by subscription to tailored services.

To bring merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis to a balance of payments basis, timing adjustments are made to ensure that the transaction is recorded in the period in which ownership changed, rather than in the period in which the transaction was recorded by ACS. Adjustments are also made to imports to take account of distortions which arise when significant changes occur in the volume of import entries lodged but not yet processed by ACS in a given month. Chapter 6 of cat. no. 5331.0 provides more detail on the relationship between statistics on international merchandise trade on a recorded trade basis.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT	7 Monthly original estimates are volatile, being subject to calendar-related and large irregular influences. Seasonally adjusted estimates are derived by estimating and removing systematic calendar related effects, such as seasonal and trading day influences, from the original series. Trading day effects are removed from the original estimates prior to the seasonal adjustment process. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. These irregular influences may reflect both random economic events and difficulties of statistical recording. The estimates of international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis are seasonally adjusted. The merchandise exports and imports statistics on a recorded trade basis are not.
TREND ESTIMATES	8 The month-to-month movements of the seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour because they include irregular or non-seasonal movements. Trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted series. The use of a 13-term Henderson average can result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent six months as additional

TREND ESTIMATES continued	observations become available. Revisions can also occur because of changes in the original data and as a result of the annual re-estimation of the seasonal factors.
SIGN CONVENTION	9 In keeping with balance of payments conventions, where statistics are on a balance of payments basis, credit entries (exports) are shown without sign and debit items (imports) are shown as negative entries. For statistics on a recorded trade basis, both imports and exports are shown without sign. The calculation of percentage changes on balance of payments debit items are made without regard to sign. References to balance of payments debit items in Key Figures, Key Points, and Analysis and Comments are also made without regard to sign.
COMMODITY BREAKDOWNS OF GOODS	10 For details of the classification used for goods exports on a balance of payments basis (credits), see table 6.6 in <i>Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998</i> (cat. no. 5331.0).
	11 Details of the classification of goods imports on a balance of payments basis (debits) are provided in table 6.7 in cat. no. 5331.0. Goods debits sub groups at a more detailed level than shown in Table 4 are available from the Time series spreadsheets.
	12 The recorded trade statistics shown in tables 12 and 13 are classified by the Standard International Trade Classification 2 (SITC). The first section of tables 12 and 13 show the most significant commodities (by value) at the SITC 3 digit level.
COMMODITY BREAKDOWNS OF SERVICES	13 The quarterly detailed services data published in table 11 are consistent with the monthly aggregates shown in table 9.
	14 Monthly indicators for many of the services components that are only surveyed quarterly are not available. In particular, the Freight and Other transportation components of Total services credits are not available for publication on a monthly basis. The estimates for these items shown in table 9 are therefore derived by dividing the quarterly estimate by three. Where quarterly survey data are not available, freight debits are derived directly from imports data for the reference month as a difference between total merchandise cost, insurance and freight (CIFE) and free on board (FOB), adjusted to reflect timing and processing adjustments. For freight credits and other transportation credits and debits, estimates are derived by extrapolating the last month's data by an average of movements for the same month over the three previous years.
TOURISM RELATED SERVICES	15 The tourism related services memorandum items provide timely indicators of the movements in tourism related activities, not an absolute measure of the level of these activities. These series are not complied on a balance of payments conceptual basis. However, they do provide a reasonable approximation of world tourism related activities.
	16 The memorandum items have been derived by re-aggregating relevant components of the international trade in services series of the balance of payments accounts. The tourism related indicator has been derived by combining total travel services (business, education-related and other personal travel), passenger fares, and the air transport component of other transportation services which relates to agency fees and commission receipts.
SERVICES BY STATE AND BY PARTNER COUNTRY	17 Annual services data by state and by partner country are released twice yearly. Calendar year data are released with the March issue of this publication and financial year data are released with the September issue. The data are available from Time series spreadsheets and data cubes.
	18 Services credits are classified by the state of provision, while services debits are classified by the state of consumption. The state allocations for transportation, travel and communication services are based on a number of indicators including merchandise trade statistics by state, overseas passenger arrivals and departures by state of clearance

The allocation for other services (about 25% of all trade in services) is primarily based on the location of the business reporting the information, which serves as a proxy for the state of provision/consumption of that service. The data should be used with care but are considered suitable for analysis over time.
	19 A comprehensive explanation of the data sources used and the methodology applied in the compilation of partner country statistics is provided in Chapter 17 of <i>Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia - Concepts, Sources and Methods</i> (cat. no. 5331.0). Approximately 8% of total services credits and 6% of total services debits for 2004–05 are either confidential, or unable to be allocated to individual countries.

Tables 12–15 contain estimates of merchandise exports and imports based on Australian Customs Service records. Paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Notes provides an explanation of the

difference between these bases.
