## KEY POINTS

## TREND ESTIMATES

- The provisional trend estimate of the balance on goods and services was a deficit of $\$ 1,910 \mathrm{~m}$ in October 2003, a decrease of $\$ 122 \mathrm{~m}(6 \%)$ on the deficit in September.
- Goods and services credits rose $\$ 112 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 11,624 \mathrm{~m}$. Goods and services debits fell $\$ 10 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 13,534 \mathrm{~m}$.


## SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

- In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services was a deficit of $\$ 1,648 \mathrm{~m}$ in October, a decrease of $\$ 602 \mathrm{~m}(27 \%)$ on the deficit in September.
- Goods and services credits rose $\$ 201 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ to $\$ 11,755 \mathrm{~m}$. Services credits rose $\$ 211 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $8 \%$ ), rural goods rose $\$ 32 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ and non-rural and other goods fell $\$ 42 \mathrm{~m}(1 \%)$. The increase in services credits was partly due to international visitors attending the Rugby World Cup.
- Goods and services debits fell $\$ 401 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 13,403 \mathrm{~m}$, with goods debits down $\$ 457 \mathrm{~m}$ (4\%) and services debits up $\$ 56 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$. Consumption goods fell $\$ 156 \mathrm{~m}$ (4\%), intermediate and other goods fell $\$ 163 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) and capital goods fell $\$ 138 \mathrm{~m}$ (5\%).


## ORIGINAL ESTIMATES

- In original terms, the October balance on goods and services was a deficit of $\$ 3,147 \mathrm{~m}$, a decrease of $\$ 33 \mathrm{~m}(1 \%)$ on the deficit in September. The decreased deficit was the result of a $\$ 459 \mathrm{~m}(4 \%)$ increase in exports of goods and services, mostly offset by a $\$ 426 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ increase in imports of goods and services.

## Seasonal Factors

Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates of the balance on goods and services have been revised as a result of the seasonal re-analysis which takes account of additional data that have become available since the previous re-analysis.

Revised historical and new forward seasonal factors are available in the electronic version of this publication (see 5368.0, Table 19, for monthly seasonal factors). A feature article on Australia's Exporters, 2002-03 has been released on the ABS web site [http://www.abs.gov.au](http://www.abs.gov.au) concurrently with the release of this publication. The article is the third in a series analysing the characteristics and international trading activities of Australia's exporters and importers, based on the Australian Business Number (ABN). The earlier articles related to analyses for the July to December 2001 and 2001-02 reference periods respectively.

The number of Australian exporters of goods and services in 2002-03 was estimated to be 31,174 , a fall of $0.9 \%$ from the estimate of 31,450 for 2001-02. This estimate is consistent with the $3.2 \%$ fall in the total value of exports of goods and services from $\$ 153.3 \mathrm{~b}$ in 2001-02 to $\$ 148.4$ b in 2002-03. Information on importers for 2002-03 will be included in a separate article to be released on the web site on 9 January 2004. A feature article on the Statistical Treatment of Economic Activity in the Timor Sea was included in the September quarter 2003 issue of Australian National Accounts:
National Income, Expenditure and Product (cat. no. 5206.0), released on 3 December 2003.

The tables in this publication are presented on two bases. Tables 1-6 contain estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services which have been adjusted for coverage, valuation and timing to a balance of payments basis. Tables 7-10 contain estimates of merchandise exports and imports based on Australian Customs Service records. Paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Notes provides an explanation of the difference between these bases.

## ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of the balance on goods and services in October 2003 was a deficit of $\$ 1,910 \mathrm{~m}$, a decrease of $\$ 122 \mathrm{~m}(6 \%)$ on the deficit in September.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services in October 2003 was a deficit of $\$ 1,648 \mathrm{~m}$, a decrease of $\$ 602 \mathrm{~m}(27 \%)$ on the deficit in September.

EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of rural goods rose $\$ 31 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ to $\$ 1,837 \mathrm{~m}$.

In seasonally adjusted terms, rural goods increased $\$ 32 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ to $\$ 1,903 \mathrm{~m}$.

Rural goods, in original terms, rose $\$ 122 \mathrm{~m}(7 \%)$ to $\$ 1,971 \mathrm{~m}$.

The main contributor to the increase in the seasonally adjusted series was cereal grains and cereal preparations, up $35 \%$, in contrast to the average September to October fall of $2 \%$ over the previous three years. This was partly offset by a fall in other rural goods, down $\$ 3 \%$, compared with the average September to October rise of $7 \%$.

## ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS continued

The trend estimate of non-rural and other goods exports fell $\$ 7 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 6,923 \mathrm{~m}$.

Seasonally adjusted, non-rural and other goods fell $\$ 42 \mathrm{~m}$ (1\%) to $\$ 6,887 \mathrm{~m}$.
In original terms, non-rural and other goods fell $\$ 48 \mathrm{~m}(1 \%)$ to $\$ 7,182 \mathrm{~m}$.
Contributing to the decrease in the seasonally adjusted series were:

- other goods, up $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}(0 \%)$, compared with the average September to October rise of $29 \%$ over the previous three years
- other non-rural, down $\$ 99 \mathrm{~m}(12 \%)$, in contrast to the average September to October rise of $8 \%$ over the previous three years
- transport equipment, up $\$ 11 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$, compared with the average September to October rise of $24 \%$ over the previous three years
- other mineral fuels, down $\$ 153 \mathrm{~m}$ (18\%), compared with the average September to October fall of $7 \%$ over the previous three years.

Partly offsetting these decreases was a rise in metal ores and minerals, up $\$ 126 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $11 \%$ ), compared with the average September to October rise of $6 \%$ over the previous three years.

The trend estimate of goods and services debits fell $\$ 10 \mathrm{~m}$ in October to $\$ 13,534 \mathrm{~m}$. In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits fell $\$ 401 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 13,403 \mathrm{~m}$. Goods debits fell $\$ 457 \mathrm{~m}$ (4\%) while services debits rose $\$ 56 \mathrm{~m}$ (2\%).

## Capital goods

Intermediate and other goods

The trend estimate of imports of consumption goods fell $\$ 5 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 3,439$.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of consumption goods fell $\$ 156 \mathrm{~m}(4 \%)$ to $\$ 3,445 \mathrm{~m}$.

Consumption goods, in original terms, rose $\$ 122 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 4,105 \mathrm{~m}$.
Contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series were:

- non-industrial transport equipment, down $\$ 60 \mathrm{~m}(5 \%)$, in contrast to an average September to October rise of $4 \%$ over the previous three years
- consumption goods n.e.s., up $\$ 87 \mathrm{~m}(7 \%)$, compared with an average September to October rise of $16 \%$ over the previous three years
- food and beverages, up $\$ 25 \mathrm{~m}$ (5\%), compared with an average September to October rise of $21 \%$ over the previous three years
- textiles, clothing and footwear, down $\$ 29 \mathrm{~m}$ (6\%), in contrast to an average September to October rise of $8 \%$ over the previous three years.

The trend estimate of imports of capital goods fell $\$ 38 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 2,511 \mathrm{~m}$.

Seasonally adjusted, capital goods imports decreased \$138m (5\%) to \$2,403m.

Imports of capital goods, in original terms, rose $\$ 62 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ to $\$ 2,709 \mathrm{~m}$.
Contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series were:

- civil aircraft, down $\$ 68 \mathrm{~m}(24 \%)$, in contrast to strong September to October rises over the previous three years
- machinery and industrial equipment, up \$34m (4\%), compared with an average September to October rise of $17 \%$ over the previous three years
- ADP equipment, up $\$ 6 \mathrm{~m}(1 \%)$, compared with an average September to October rise of $6 \%$ over the previous three years
- industrial transport equipment, up $\$ 24 \mathrm{~m}$ (8\%), compared with an average September to October rise of $14 \%$ over the previous three years.

The trend estimate of imports of intermediate and other goods decreased $\$ 23 \mathrm{~m}$ to $\$ 4,733 \mathrm{~m}$.

Seasonally adjusted, intermediate and other goods imports fell $\$ 163 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) to $\$ 4,682 \mathrm{~m}$.

Imports of intermediate and other goods, in original terms, increased $\$ 218 \mathrm{~m}$ (4\%) to $\$ 5,240 \mathrm{~m}$.

Contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series were:

- other merchandise goods, down $\$ 79 \mathrm{~m}$ (49\%), in contrast to strong September to October rises over the previous three years
- fuels and lubricants, down $\$ 71 \mathrm{~m}(9 \%)$, in contrast to an average September to October rise of $33 \%$ over the previous three years
- goods for processing, down $\$ 98 \mathrm{~m}$ (26\%), in contrast to an average September to October rise of $44 \%$ over the previous three years.

Intermediate and other goods continued

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- organic and inorganic chemicals, up $\$ 153 \mathrm{~m}(75 \%)$, in contrast to an average September to October fall of $12 \%$ over the previous three years
- processed industrial supplies, up $\$ 119 \mathrm{~m}(12 \%)$, compared with an average September to October rise of $9 \%$ over the previous three years.

INTRODUCTION

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

TREND ESTIMATES

1 This publication presents preliminary estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis and merchandise import and export statistics on a recorded trade basis.

2 Merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis are compiled from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS). Adjustments for coverage, timing and valuation are made to recorded trade data to convert them to a balance of payments basis. The main source for services data is the quarterly Survey of International Trade in Services.

3 More comprehensive quarterly estimates of Australia's trade in goods and services, together with comprehensive details of Australia's balance of payments are included in the quarterly publication, Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia (cat.no.5302.0). Detailed monthly statistics on merchandise trade are available on AusStats or by subscription to tailored services.

4 The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's merchandise trade statistics can be found in International Merchandise Trade, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 2001 (cat.no.5489.0).

5 The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's balance of payments statistics is based on the Fifth Edition of the International Monetary Fund's Balance of Payments Manual (BPM5,1993). Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of the balance of payments and the sources, methods and terms used in compiling the estimates are presented in Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998 (cat.no.5331.0). To bring merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis to a balance of payment basis, timing adjustments are made to ensure that the transaction is recorded in the period in which ownership changed, rather than in the period in which the transaction was recorded by ACS. Adjustments are also made to imports to take account of distortions which arise when significant changes occur in the volume of import entries lodged but not yet processed by ACS in a given month. Chapter 6 of cat. no. 5331.0 provides more detail on the relationship between statistics on international merchandise trade on a recorded trade basis and on a balance of payments basis.

7 Monthly original estimates are volatile, being subject to calendar-related and large irregular influences. Seasonally adjusted estimates are derived by estimating and removing systematic calendar related effects, such as seasonal and trading day influences, from the original series. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. These irregular influences may reflect both random economic events and difficulties of statistical recording. The international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis estimates are seasonally adjusted. The merchansdise exports and imports statistics on a recorded trade basis are not.

8 The month-to-month movements of the seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour because they include irregular or non-seasonal movements. Trend estimates are derived by applying a 13 -term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted series. The use of a 13 -term Henderson average can result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent six months as additional observations become available. Revisions can also occur because of changes in the original data and as a result of the annual re-estimation of the seasonal factors.

9 In keeping with balance of payments conventions, where statistics are on a balance of payments basis, credit entries (exports) are shown without sign and debit items (imports) are shown as negative entries. For statistics on a recored trade basis, both imports and exports are shown without sign. The calculation of percentage changes on balance of payments debit items are made without regard to sign. References to balance of payments debit items in Key Figures, Key Points, and Analysis and Comments are also made without regard to sign.

10 For details of the classification used for goods exports on a balance of payments basis (credits), see table 6.6 in Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998 (cat.no.5331.0).

11 Details of the classification of goods imports on a balance of payments basis (debits) are provided in table 6.7 in cat. no. 5331.0. Most of the commodity groups shown in table 4 for goods debits are available for more detailed sub-groups from AusStats.

12 The recorded trade statistics shown in tables 7 and 8 are classified by the Standard International Trade Classification 2 (SITC). The first section of tables 7 and 8 show the most significant commodities (by value) at the SITC 3 digit level.

13 The quarterly detailed services data published in Table 6 are consistent with the monthly aggregates shown in Table 5 . Services trade data by major partner countries and by Australian state of production/consumption are published on a financial year basis and a calendar year basis.
14 Monthly indicators for many of the services components that are only surveyed quarterly are not available. In particular, the Freight and Other transportation components of Total services credits are not available for publication on a monthly basis. The estimates for these items shown in table 5 are therefore derived by dividing the quarterly estimate by three.

15 More detailed balance of payments and recorded merchandise trade data, including forward seasonal factors, are available from AusStats. Very detailed merchandise trade data by commodity, country and state are available by contacting the National Information and Referral Service, as shown on the back of this publication.
