



CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

This issue contains a feature article, *Australia's export markets, 1991-92 to 2000-01*. The article examines exports to Australia's major trading partners over the last ten years, and considers the changes in the value and composition of those exports. It also analyses some of Australia's emerging export markets.

In the Analyses and comments section, the quarterly analysis of merchandise exports and merchandise imports concentrates on movements from the same quarter of the previous year. This change has been made to reduce the influence of seasonal effects on the quarterly data.

The Explanatory notes have been revised to include references to the *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5489.0) publication, which was released on 30 May 2001.

REVISIONS

Revisions since the last issue of this publication have:

- increased total merchandise exports for the March quarter 2001 by \$36 million, and increased them by \$36 million for the year ended March 2001;
- decreased total merchandise imports for the March quarter 2001 by \$15 million, and decreased them for the year ended March 2001 by \$15 million;
- these movements combined to increase the merchandise trade surplus for the March quarter 2001 by \$51 million and the merchandise trade surplus for the year ended March 2001 by \$51 million.

QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the June quarter 2001, merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$2,627 million, an increase of \$1,977 million from the March quarter 2001. This is the largest quarterly surplus recorded. It continues a trend of exports increasing more quickly than imports since the September quarter 1999, when a deficit of \$4,122 million was recorded.


In the June quarter 2001, exports increased 13% (\$3,537 million) over the March quarter 2001, and imports increased 6% (\$1,560 million). Both exports and imports normally record a seasonal increase in trade in the June quarter compared with the March quarter.

Australia's trade position with most of its major trading partners improved substantially during the June quarter 2001. Surpluses were recorded with:

- Japan, up \$100 million (4%) to \$2,199 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$189 million (14%) to \$1,131 million;
- Taiwan, up \$124 million (19%) to \$768 million;
- New Zealand, up \$74 million (16%) to \$532 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$984 million from a deficit of \$577 million to a surplus of \$407 million; and
- Singapore, down \$432 million (72%) to \$169 million.

Deficits were recorded with:

- United States of America, down \$501 million (17%) to \$2,372 million the lowest quarterly deficit since the June quarter 1994; and
- China, down \$565 million (79%) to \$152 million the lowest quarterly deficit since the June quarter 1997.




MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports increased for the June quarter 2001 by 13% from the March quarter 2001 to \$31,672 million. This is the highest quarterly value for exports ever recorded. From the June quarter 2000, exports have increased 19%.

Exports have increased in both quantity and value. The Export Price Index, which covers about 95% of export commodities, rose 4% from the March quarter 2001, and 14% from the June quarter 2000 to the June quarter 2001. MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



All export commodity groups recorded increases in the value of exports from both the previous quarter and the June quarter 2000. The largest increases between the June quarter 2000 and the June quarter 2001 were:


- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$1,108 million (21%) to \$6,458 million due mainly to an increase of \$917 million (41%) in Coal, whether or not pulverised but not agglomerated (SITC 321). The increase in coal resulted from an increase in price and quantity of exports, especially to Japan, up 47% (\$457 million) to \$1,425 million, and the Republic of Korea, up 96% (\$180 million) to \$369 million;
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, up \$1,057 million (20%) to \$6,396 million due mainly to increases in Cotton (SITC 263), up \$257 million (61%) to \$872 million and Iron ore and concentrates (SITC 281) up \$189 million (17%) to \$1,308 million;
- Commodities and transactions n.e.c. in the SITC, up \$922 million (38%) to \$3,377 million;
- Food and live animals, up \$741 million (17%) to \$5,224 million due mainly to increases in Meat of bovine animals (SITC 011), up \$302 million (34%) to \$1,189 million and Wheat (SITC 041), up \$275 million (31%) to \$1,174 million; and
- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$512 million (17%) to \$3,454 million due mainly to an increase in Road vehicles (including air-cushion vehicles), up \$307 million (44%) to \$998 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the June quarter 2001 were \$29,045 million, a rise of 6% (\$1,560 million) from the March quarter 2001. In contrast to the significant rise in exports, the rise in imports from the June quarter 2000 was only 1% (\$235 million).

The Imports Price Index rose by 4% in the June quarter 2001 and 9% from the June quarter 2000 to the June quarter 2001. These increases were due in part to the declining value of the Australian dollar relative to most of our trading partners. MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



The main reason for the low growth from the June quarter 2000, was a substantial fall in imports of *Machinery and transport equipment*, down 6% (\$835 million) to \$12,833 million. This decrease was due mainly to lower imports of Aircraft and associated equipment (SITC 792), down 59% (\$692 million) to \$483 million. There were also significant declines in imports of Automatic data processing machines (SITC 752), Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), and Goods carrying motor vehicles (SITC 782). In contrast, there was a large increase in Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up 18% (\$341 million) to \$2,238 million.

Other commodity groups that recorded lower imports were *Manufactured goods* classified chiefly by material, down 3% (\$102 million), and *Crude materials, inedible, except fuels*, down 18% (\$95 million).

Commodity groups that recorded increased imports between the June quarter 2000 and the June quarter 2001 were:

- Chemical and related products, n.e.s, up 17% (\$559 million) to \$3,804 million due mainly to increases in Medicaments (SITC 542), up 16% (\$125 million), Inorganic chemical elements, oxides and halogen salts (SITC 522), up 64% (\$84 million), and Medicinal and pharmaceutical products (SITC 541), up 51% (\$81 million);
- Commodities and transactions n.e.c., up 37% (\$220 million); and
- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up 7% (\$163 million) to
 \$2,590 million due mainly to Petroleum oils (other than crude) (SITC 334), and
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$4% (\$158 million) to \$3,895 million.

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the financial year 2000-2001, merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$1,338 million (1%). This followed a trade deficit (ie. excess of imports over exports) of \$12,792 million recorded in 1999-2000. This was the first financial year trade surplus since 1993-1994, and the largest since 1991-1992 when a \$4,043 million surplus was recorded.


Australia recorded an improved trading position (ie. increased surplus or reduced deficit) with all of its major trading partners except:

- China where the trade deficit increased by 19% (\$486 million) to \$3,035 million;
- New Zealand where the trade surplus decreased by 3% (\$60 million) to \$2,307 million.

Australia's trade with its major trading partners produced the following:

- Japan, surplus up 72% (\$3,396 million) to \$8,108 million;
- USA, deficit down 21% (\$2,829 million) to \$10,703 million;
- Singapore, surplus up 323% (\$1,603 million) to \$2,099 million;
- Republic of Korea, surplus up 36% (\$1,194 million) to \$4,499 million;
- Taiwan, surplus up 75% (\$1,092 million) to \$2,544 million; and,
- UK, deficit down 23% (\$511 million) to \$1,682 million.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the financial year 2000-2001 were \$119,602 million, an increase of 23% (\$22,316 million) from the previous financial year. This was the highest value for exports ever recorded and is due to price rises and increased quantities of exports.


All export SITC sections recorded increases. The most significant increase was *Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials*, up 39% (\$7,128 million) to \$25,211 million due mainly to increases in Petroleum, petroleum products and related materials, up 52% (\$3,723 million) and Coal, coke and briquettes, up 30% (\$2,503 million). Exports of these commodities have increased in price and quantity. There were large price rises for petroleum in the second half of 2000, and for coal in the June quarter 2001.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

Other commodity groups that recorded significant increases were:

- Crude materials, inedible except fuels, up 28% (\$5,211 million) to \$23,592 million due mainly to Iron ore and concentrates (SITC 281) up 29% (\$1,095 million), Aluminium ores and concentrates (excl. alumina) (SITC 285), up 29% (\$991 million), Wool and other animal hair (excl. wool tops) (SITC 268), up 27% (\$763 million) and Cotton (SITC 263), up 39% (\$551 million); and
- Food and live animals, up 19% (\$3,223 million) to \$20,115 million due mainly to Meat of bovine animals, up 29% (\$919 million) to \$4,108 million as a result of increases in both price and quantity.


COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia increased exports to most destinations. The countries with the largest increases were:

- Japan, up 25% (\$4,657 million) to \$23,479 million;
- USA, up 21% (\$2,051 million) to \$11,654 million; and
- China, up 38% (\$1,879 million) to \$6,846 million.


COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF EXPORTS



MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the financial year 2000-2001 were \$118,264 million, an increase of 7% (\$8,186 million) from the 1999-2000 financial year. This was the slowest growth recorded since the 1996-1997 financial year, which had a 2% increase.

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS



Most import commodity groups recorded increases during the 2000-2001 financial year. The largest increases were:

- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up 37% (\$2,818 million) to \$10,473 million due mainly to an increase in the price and quantity of Petroleum, petroleum products and related materials, up 37% (\$2,779 million) to \$10,295 million;
- Machinery and transport equipment, up 4% (\$2,050 million) to \$53,492 million due mainly to increases in Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up 24% (\$1,667 million) to \$8,578 million, and Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), up 14% (\$758 million) to \$6,050 million. There was a decrease in imports of Motor vehicles for the transport of goods (SITC 782), down 11% (\$276 million) to \$2,193 million;
- Chemical and related products, n.e.s, up 14% (\$1,703 million) to \$14,200 million due mainly to increases in Medicinal and pharmaceutical products, up 24% (\$851 million) to \$4,371 million, and Inorganic chemicals, up 33% (\$228 million) to \$911 million; and
- *Miscellaneous manufactured articles*, up 9% (\$1,326 million) to \$16,804 million.

All other imports SITC sections reported small increases except *Commodities and transactions n.e.c. in the SITC*, down 26% (\$677 million) to \$1,889 million due to a decrease in imports of Non-monetary gold (excl. ores and concentrates), down 30% (\$709 million) to \$1,688 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS continued


Australia's imports sources that recorded the highest increases were:

- China, up 31% (\$2,366 million) to \$9,881 million due mainly to increases in Articles of apparel and clothing accessories, up 25% (\$434 million), Office and automatic data processing machines, up 57% (\$282 million), and Miscellaneous manufactured articles, n.e.s., up 26% (\$255 million) - especially Baby carriages, toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), up 39% (\$191 million);
- Japan, up 9%, (\$1,261 million) to \$15,371 million due mainly to Road vehicles (incl. air-cushion vehicles), up 9% (\$644 million) to \$7,593 million;
- United Arab Emirates, up 178% (\$713 million) to \$1,114 million due mainly to Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up 187% (\$697 million);
- Viet Nam, up 41% (\$706 million) to \$2,431 million due mainly to Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up 46% (\$668 million);
- Saudi Arabia, up 61% (\$611 million) to \$1,613 million;
- Indonesia, up 21% (\$577 million) to \$3,277 million; and
- Malaysia, up 11% (\$411 million) to \$4,177 million.

Australia's import sources that recorded highest decreases were:

- USA, down 3% (\$778 million) to \$22,356 million due mainly to Machinery and transport equipment, down 9% (\$1,228 million); and,
- Singapore, down 11% (\$460 million) to \$3,898 million.

COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF IMPORTS



INTRODUCTION

This article examines exports to Australia's major trading partners over the last ten years, and considers the changes in the value and composition of those exports during that period. The article also analyses some of Australia's emerging export markets.

The export commodities are classified according to the Standard International Trade Classification Rev. 3 (SITC Rev. 3), which is consistent with other commodity data included in this publication. Value data included are in original terms and on a recorded trade basis. The series therefore reflect the influence of changes in the quantity and price of goods exported. Effects of exchange rates over the ten year period have not been analysed. Table F1 includes volume measures for total exports and provides estimates of the changes in quantity, after the direct effects of price changes have been removed.

Confidentiality restrictions apply as in the rest of this publication. The confidential component has been included in total exports for the relevant countries and country groups, but excluded from the affected commodities.

AUSTRALIA'S EXPORT MARKETS

Table F1 shows the destination of exports for the last decade.

The total value of Australia's exports grew from \$55,027 million in 1991–92 to \$119,602 million in 2000–01, an increase of 117%. The increase in the volume of exports (i.e. after adjustment for price increases) was 81%. The growth in the export market has resulted from Australian exporters actively seeking new markets, as well as increasing exports to traditional markets. In 2000–01 there were 24 countries that each purchased over \$1 billion of Australian exports, compared with 12 countries at the start of the decade. Of those 24 countries, about half (13) had increased their trade by more than the average increase of 117% for exports to all countries.




MAJOR EXPORT MARKETS

Australia's top five export markets in 2000–01 were in order, Japan, USA, Korea, New Zealand and China. In total these countries accounted for 48% of exports, while in 1991–92 they accounted for 50% of total exports. Since 1991–92, the top three were in their same relative position, New Zealand moved from fifth to fourth position, replacing Singapore which dropped to sixth, and China improved from tenth to fifth.

Japan has been Australia's largest export market over the last ten years, with a growth in exports of 61%. Its share of total Australian exports declined from 26% in 1991–92 to 20% in 2000–01, largely as a result of the diversification of Australia's export markets.



Japan was the major destination for Australia's exports of Coal (SITC 321) and Iron ore (SITC 281) during the decade, accounting for more than 40% of Australia's exports of these commodities. Exports of coal to Japan showed modest growth over the period. However, the value of exports did not change substantially as increases in quantity exported were largely offset by price reductions. From 1992—93 Japan displaced the USA as Australia's most important market for Beef (SITC 011).




JAPAN continued Although Japan remained Australia's major market for Aluminium (SITC 684) exports over the decade, exports of this commodity fluctuated due to price and quantity variations. Japan was also Australia's major destination for exports of Crude petroleum (SITC 333) from 1991–92 to 1994–95, but fell to fourth position behind Singapore, Korea, and Taiwan in 2000-01. The sharp increase in the last two years reflects greater demand combined with higher world oil prices and a lower Australian dollar.

> Australia's exports of Wool (SITC 268) and Non-monetary gold (SITC 971) to Japan both declined markedly over the last ten years. In 1991-92, Japan was the major market for Australia's exports of wool, while in 2000–01 it fell to eighth position. Non-monetary gold exports were \$275 million in 2000-01, after peaking at \$1,428 million in 1993-94. Changes in the value of these exports over the decade have largely reflected changes in quantity.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The USA was the second most important destination for Australia's exports during the last decade. While its share of total Australian exports was similar at the beginning and the end of the period at around 10%, there was a decrease in the middle years to a low of 6%.

MAIN EXPORTS TO THE USA



Beef (SITC 011) was Australia's major export to the USA, although its share of trade with the USA decreased from 22% in 1991–92 to 13% in 2000–01. Beef exports dropped from 1991-92 to 1995-96, mainly due to increased competition from USA producers and an appreciating Australian dollar. Reduced USA slaughterings, increased beef prices and a weaker Australian dollar led to an increase in exports in the latter half of the decade.

Crude petroleum (SITC 333) exports to the USA rose from \$144 million in 1991–92 to \$1,014 million in 2000–2001, driven by higher demand and increased prices in the last two years.


The USA market for Australian Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781) showed some volatility over the period. It reached a low of \$3 million in 1995-96 due to lower consumer demand and expired contracts with USA parent companies, but recovered sharply in subsequent years to reach \$489 million in 2000-01.

Exports of Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112) increased from \$122 million in 1996–97 to \$503 million in 2000-01, mainly due to higher exports of wine. The USA is the second largest market for Australian wine, accounting for a quarter of total wine exports.

THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA

Korea has been either Australia's second or third most important export market during the last decade. The value of exports to Korea has almost trebled since 1991–92 to \$9,209 million in 2000–01. Australia's major exports to Korea were fuels, iron ore and non-monetary gold. Non-ferrous metals, particularly aluminium and copper, were also important.

MAIN EXPORTS TO THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA



Coal (SITC 321) was the main export to Korea for most of the decade, making Korea the second largest market for this commodity after Japan. The value of coal exports climbed from \$670 million in 1991–92 to a high of \$1,189 million in 1997–98, but fell in 1998-99 and 1999-2000 due to reduced demand as a result of the Asian economic crisis. The market recovered somewhat in the last financial year to reach \$1,079 million. Iron ore was Australia's second highest export to Korea at the start of the decade. Sales generally increased throughout the ten year period, doubling since 1991–92 to \$742 million in 2000–01.

Crude petroleum (SITC 333) exports to Korea exceeded exports of coal for the last two years. Petroleum exports rose steeply in 1999–2000 to \$1,104 million reflecting both increased export volumes and higher world oil prices. The value of exports increased to \$1,457 million in 2000–2001 even though a reduced quantity was exported.


Australia's exports to Korea of Internal combustion piston engines (SITC 713) increased steadily over the decade until 1998–99, when the value of exports almost halved compared with the previous year. This was largely due to a decline in automotive production in Korea.

Other significant exports to Korea during the ten year period included wheat, zinc ores, copper ores, wool, cotton and beef.

NEW ZEALAND Over the last decade New Zealand was ranked fourth as a destination for Australia's exports. The market grew by 143% over this period to account for 5.7% of total Australian exports. New Zealand is a large consumer of Australian machinery and transport equipment (SITC 7), chemicals (SITC 5) and manufactured products (SITC 6)

and SITC 8).

MAIN EXPORTS TO NEW ZEALAND




New Zealand was a major export destination for Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781) during the last decade. However, its relative importance has declined as new markets have been developed in the Middle East. Exports of passenger motor vehicles to New Zealand were valued at \$161 million and accounted for 42% of total motor vehicle exports in 1991–92. This is in contrast to the higher value of exports in 2000–01 of \$299 million, which was only 11% of total motor vehicle exports.

There has been strong growth in sales of Refined petroleum (SITC 334) to New Zealand over the period. In 1991–92 Australia exported \$119 million of this product to New Zealand, and \$538 million in 2000–01. Australia also exported Crude petroleum (SITC 333) to New Zealand. Exports peaked at \$163 million in 1996–97, and were still relatively high in 2000–01 at \$145 million. While the values were similar in those two financial years, the quantity exported in 2000–01 was approximately half that exported in 1996–97, reflecting higher world oil prices in recent years.

Australia also exported large quantities of medicaments and paper products to New Zealand.

CHINA The value of Australia's exports to China have more than quadrupled during the last ten years from \$1,458 million to \$6,846 million. It is now Australia's fifth largest export market, rising from tenth in 1991–92. Exports to China were dominated by agricultural and mineral raw materials, although there was some broadening of the export base with a rise in exports of partly manufactured goods, particularly copper and aluminium.

CHINA continued




China has been Australia's major export market for Wool (SITC 268) since 1992–93 when it overtook Japan and Italy. It now accounts for one third of Australia's wool exports. Wheat (SITC 041) has also been an important agricultural export to China during the past ten years. Sales ranged between 2.2 million tonnes in 1995–96 when crops failed in China and 60,000 tonnes in 2000–01.

Iron ore (SITC 281) was the major mineral product exported to China and sales trebled in the last decade to \$1,214 million in 2000-01. It has been one of the top two exports to China for the decade. Copper ore (SITC 283) exports have also risen in the last ten years, particularly following China's recovery from the Asian economic downturn of 1997–98. Sales of Crude petroleum (SITC 333) also rose over the period, peaking at \$431 million in 1999–2000 when world oil prices rose sharply.

EMERGING EXPORT MARKETS

Over the period 1991–92 to 2000–01, several new export markets have emerged for Australia. Export growth has often been very rapid, and at the end of the decade the value of exports to many of these markets was substantial. A selection of the new markets are analysed below.



SAUDI ARABIA Exports to Saudi Arabia increased eightfold, from \$266 million in 1991–92 to \$2,196 million in 2000-01, to become Australia's thirteenth largest export market. During the first half of the decade, exports mainly comprised food items such as dairy products, lamb and vegetables.

> Saudi Arabia became a new market for Australian motor vehicles from 1995-96. In that year, exports of Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781) were valued at \$11 million. In the last three years, exports of motor vehicles increased by more than \$300 million per year to reach a record high of \$1,207 million in 2000-01, or 55% of exports to that country. It is now the major export market for Australian motor vehicles, accounting for 44% of motor vehicle exports in 2000-01.

Exports of Australian motor vehicles to other Middle Eastern countries, the United Arab Emirates, Kuwait, Bahrain, Oman and Qatar, increased from \$12 million in 1995-96 to \$514 million in 2000-01.

SOUTH AFRICA From 1991–92 to the end of apartheid in 1993–94, exports to South Africa increased from \$226 million to \$350 million. During the mid 1990s exports grew by more than \$200 million each year and exceeded \$1 billion for the first time in 1996–97. Since then exports have remained at around that level, with the value of exports reaching \$1,296 million in 2000-01.

> Australia commenced exporting Coal (SITC 321) to South Africa in 1996-97. In that year the value was \$9 million, which increased to \$90 million in 2000–01. Crude petroleum (SITC 333) exports to South Africa began in July 2000 with sales reaching \$72 million in 2000-01.

Sales of manufactured goods and chemical products (SITC 5 – 8) to South Africa also grew in the second half of the decade to reach a high of \$382 million in 1996-97 and 1997–98. Those exports included aluminium, medicaments, leather, and industrial machinery.

IRAQ Exports to Iraq over the decade have been severely affected by United Nations trade sanctions. In 1991–92 exports to Iraq were valued at \$187 million which dropped to between \$14 million and \$40 million in the subsequent four years. Since 1996-97 exports recovered to reach a high of \$734 million in 2000-01.

As a result of the trade sanctions, Australia's main exports to Iraq were food and humanitarian items, particularly Wheat (SITC 041). These exports were made as part of the UN Oil for Food program. Iraq has been the major recipient of Australian wheat exports for the past two years with exports reaching 2.6 million tonnes in 2000-01. The value of wheat sales is not available due to confidentiality restrictions.

VIET NAM Although Viet Nam remains a minor market for Australian exports, there was a tenfold increase in the value of Australian exports to that country during the past decade. In 2000-01 exports to Viet Nam were valued at \$499 million, compared with \$50 million in 1991-92.


> Australian exports to Viet Nam cover a range of commodities, mainly food products and industrial raw materials. Wheat, cereal preparations and milk products are the major food exports. Aluminium, copper, fertilisers and cotton were the other major commodities exported to this country.

COUNTRY GROUPS

The analysis of exports to APEC, ASEAN and the EU reflects the current composition of these groups and takes no account of changes in membership over the decade. The current membership of these country groups is detailed in the Appendix.

ASIA-PACIFIC ECONOMIC
COOPERATION (APEC)


EXPORTS TO APEC



Exports to countries within APEC accounted for the majority of Australia's exports from 1991–92 to 2000–01. APEC contains nine of Australia's top ten export destinations. The value of Australian exports to APEC increased in all years except 1998–99 while the share peaked in 1994–95 at 79%. APEC's share of Australia's exports was at its lowest in 1998–99 at 71% and has since increased to 73% in 2000–01.

ASSOCIATION OF SOUTHEAST ASIAN

NATIONS (ASEAN) EXPORTS TO ASEAN AND THE EU



Australia's exports to ASEAN increased in all financial years over the decade except 1997–98 and 1998–99 when their value declined to \$11,514 million and \$10,416 million, respectively, as a result of the Asian economic crisis. In 2000–01 exports were \$15,922 million, an increase of 116% from their value in 1991–92. Australia's major exports to ASEAN were wheat, milk and cream, live cattle, cotton, petroleum (crude and refined), non-ferrous metals (aluminium, copper and zinc) and non-monetary gold.

NATIONS (ASEAN) continued

ASSOCIATION OF SOUTHEAST ASIAN Singapore was Australia's major export destination within ASEAN throughout the decade. Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand also accounted for a large proportion of Australia's exports to ASEAN. Australia's exports to Indonesia declined from \$3,305 million in 1996-97 to \$2,199 million in 1998-99. Increased exports of Crude petroleum (SITC 333) of \$842 million and Non-monetary gold (SITC 971) of \$2,055 million to Singapore in 1999–2000 were largely responsible for the recovery in exports to ASEAN.

EUROPEAN UNION (EU) The total value of exports to the EU was \$13,963 million in 2000-01, an increase of 95% over the 1991–92 level of \$7,148 million, but the share of Australia's total exports has decreased from 13% to 12%. Australian commodities purchased by the EU were predominantly raw materials and agricultural products — coal, wool, non-monetary gold, metal ores and concentrates. Other products such as catamaran ferries, engines and telecommunications equipment were also exported to the EU during the decade.

> Coal (SITC 321) exports ranged between \$900 million and \$1,300 million for most of the decade. Sales rose to \$1,747 million in 2000-01, accounting for 16% of Australian coal exports.

Approximately one-third of Australia's exports of Wool (SITC 268) over the decade was exported to the EU. Sales peaked at \$1,382 million in 1997-98 and were \$1,193 million in 2000-01.

Exports of Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112), predominantly wine, to the EU increased over the decade from \$151 million in 1991–92 to \$946 million in 2000–01. Within the EU, the United Kingdom was the major market for this commodity with exports to that country reaching \$742 million in 2000–01. Exports of alcoholic beverages to Germany, Ireland and the Netherlands also increased during the decade.

Australia's exports of Non-monetary gold (SITC 971) to the EU (in particular to the United Kingdom) increased from \$328 million in 1997–98 to \$1,759 million in 1998–99. This coincided with a drop in exports of this commodity to the Asian region which was experiencing economic problems at that time.

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5489.0). RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

3 The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

4 International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

5 Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2,000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1,000.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- individual transaction lines (within an export consignment) where the value of the goods is less than \$500.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

BASIS OF COMPILATION

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.
- **10** Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- **11** Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 85% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

STATISTICAL PERIOD

VALUATION

COUNTRY

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.
- **16** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **17** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **18** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **19** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

COUNTRY continued

20 The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);

Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);

Developing Countries (DCs);

European Union (EU).

- **21** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

23 Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

STATE

- **24** State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **25** State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

26 Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, *1993 Edition* (Cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

27 Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

28 Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on *Data Confidentiality* in the December 1999 issue.

CONFIDENTIALITY continued

RELIABILITY

30 Statistics for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
