





#### QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the March quarter 2003, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$4,091m, or 15% of the value of exports. This is a decrease of \$789m on the deficit recorded in December quarter 2002, which was the largest recorded. Both exports and imports fell during the March quarter, in line with normal seasonal patterns, with the larger reduction in imports leading to the reduced deficit.


Australia's trade position improved with several of its major trading partners. Improvements were recorded with:

- United Kingdom, the surplus increased \$898m, to \$1,062m;
- USA, the deficit decreased \$457m (14%), to \$2,833m;
- China, the deficit decreased \$415m (28%), to \$1,062m; and
- Japan, the surplus increased \$137m (10%), to \$1,504m.

Australia's trade position worsened with:

- New Zealand, the surplus decreased \$116m (15%), to \$678m;
- Republic of Korea, the surplus decreased \$99m (9%), to \$960m; and
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased \$88m (33%), to \$181m.

AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES, Excess of exports (+) or imports (-)




#### MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the March quarter 2003 were \$27,782m, down \$2,993m (9.7%) from the December quarter 2002, and down \$931m (3.2%) compared with the March quarter 2002.

The decrease in merchandise exports in the quarter was partly the result of a small decrease in average prices received for exports. The Export Price Index fell 0.7% in the March quarter 2003, predominantly driven by appreciation of the Australian dollar against the United States dollar. The main contributors to the decrease were coal and semi-coke, and iron ores and concentrates. These decreases were partially offset by price increases for crude petroleum oils, wool, wheat, gold and nickel. Estimates of chain volume measures for exports and seasonally adjusted data will be published in the March quarter 2003 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Trade Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 3 June 2003.

#### MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



Most export commodity groups recorded decreases during the March quarter 2003. The most significant decreases occurred in:

- Machinery and transport equipment, down \$1,022m (26%) to \$2,941m, due mainly to large decreases in Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), down \$397m (39%) and Aircraft (SITC 792), down \$191m (46%).
- Food and live animals, down \$906m (18%) to \$4,122m, due mainly to decreases in Beef (SITC 011), down \$304m (27%), Milk and cream and milk products (SITC 022), down \$143m (31%) and Wheat (SITC 041), down \$118m (15%).
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$599m (10%) to \$5,164m, due mainly to large decreases in Wool and other animal hair (SITC 268), down \$315m (28%), Iron ore (SITC 281), down \$112m (8%) and Cotton (SITC 263), down \$92m (28%).
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$456m (13%) to \$2,926m, due mainly a decrease in Nickel (SITC 683), down \$193m (47%).

The only commodity group recording a significant increase was *Commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC*, up \$698m (22%) to \$3,877m, due mainly to an increase in exports of gold.


#### MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the March quarter 2003 were \$31,873m, down \$3,781m (10.6%) from the December quarter 2002, but up \$3,300m (11.5%) compared with the March quarter 2002.

The decrease in merchandise imports in the quarter was partly the result of a decrease in average prices paid for imports. The Import Price Index fell 1.9% in the March quarter 2003. The main contributors to the price decreases were computing and telecommunications equipment, electrical machinery and road vehicles. These decreases were partially offset by price increases for crude petroleum oils and other petroleum products. Estimates of chain volume measures for imports and seasonally adjusted data will be published in the March quarter 2003 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Trade Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 3 June 2003.

#### MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



Most import commodity groups recorded decreases during the March quarter 2003. The most significant were:

- Machinery and transport equipment, down \$3,016m (18%) to \$13,491m, due mainly to decreases in Aircraft (SITC 792), down \$1,026m (51%), Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), down \$243m (20%), Heating and cooling equipment (SITC 741), down \$198m (37%), Sound and television equipment (SITC 763), down \$177m (50%) and Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), down \$153m (6%).
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, down \$907m (17%) to \$4,304m, due mainly to decreases in Toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), down \$287m (49%) and Furniture and bedding (SITC 821), down \$140m (31%).
- *Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material*, down \$220m (5%) to \$3,992m.

The import commodity group that recorded the largest increase was *Chemicals and related products*, *nes*, up \$333m (9%) to \$3,897m, due mainly to increases in Fertilisers (SITC 562), up \$182m (164%) and Medicaments (SITC 542), up \$85m (9%).

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the year ended March 2003, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$12,471m, or 11% of the value of exports. This is a \$16,793m turnaround from the trade surplus of \$4,322m recorded for the year ended March 2002.


Australia's trading position worsened with most of its major trading partners.

- Japan, the surplus decreased by \$2,443m (29%) to \$5,920m;
- USA, the deficit increased by \$2,349m (25%) to \$11,699m;
- China, the deficit increased by \$1,709m (58%) to \$4,632m; and
- Singapore, the surplus decreased by \$473m (48%) to \$514m.

Australia had an improved trading position with:

- United Kingdom, a turnaround of \$2,001m, from a deficit of \$847m to a surplus of \$1,154m; and
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by \$349m (13%) to \$3,037m.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the year ended March 2003 were 118,481m, down 4,641m (3.8%) from the year ended March 2002. Most commodity groups recorded decreases with the largest being:


- Food and live animals, down \$2,543m (11%) to \$19,860m due mainly to decreases in Wheat (SITC 041), down \$925m (20%), Vegetables (SITC 054), down \$321m (37%), Beef (SITC 011), down \$315m (7%), Milk and cream and milk products (SITC 022), down \$221m (12%) and Rice (SITC 042), down \$200m (62%).
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$1,229m (5%) to \$22,027m due mainly to decreases in Cotton (SITC 263), down \$551m (30%), Alumina (SITC 285), down \$478m (11%) and Ores and concentrates of base metal (SITC 287), down \$323m (20%).
- Mineral Fuels, lubricants and related materials, down \$1,152m (4%) to \$24,504m due mainly to decreases in Coal (SITC 321), down \$1,021m (8%) and Natural gas (SITC 343), down \$283m (10%).
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$958m (7%) to \$12,971m, due mainly to decreases in Aluminium (SITC 684), down \$422m (9%) and Copper (SITC 682), down \$278m (17%).

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

Two export commodity groups recorded substantial increases:

- *Commodities and transactions n.e.c in the SITC*, up \$1,510m (13%) to \$12,761m; and
- Beverages and tobacco, up \$493m (22%) to \$2,726m, due mainly to Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112), up \$436m (20%) to \$2,575m.


#### COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations for the year ended March 2003 were:

- Japan, down \$1,622m (7%) to \$22,092m;
- USA, down \$1,075m (9%) to \$11,039m;
- Republic of Korea, up \$185m (2%) to \$9,679m;
- China, up \$964m (12%) to \$8,709m;
- New Zealand, up \$573m (8%) to \$8,002m;
- United Kingdom, up \$1,542m (29%) to \$6,946m;
- Singapore, down \$318m (6%) to \$4,826m; and
- Taiwan, down \$717m (14%) to \$4,503m.

#### COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF EXPORTS




MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the year ended March 2003 were \$130,952m, an increase of \$12,152m (10.2%) over imports for the year ended March 2002. All import commodity groups recorded increases with the largest being:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$6,820m (13%) to \$59,514m, due mainly to increases in Aircraft (SITC 792), up \$2,518m (94%), Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), up \$1,156m (13%), Goods vehicles (SITC 782), up \$457m (19%) and Ships (SITC 793), up \$419m (139%).
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$1,519m (11%) to \$15,977m, due mainly to increases in Paper and paperboard (SITC 641), up \$296m (17%), Manufactures of base metal, nes (SITC 699), up \$130m (12%) and Made-up articles of textile materials (SITC 658), up \$120m (22%). These increases were partly offset by a decrease in Paper and paperboard, cut to size (SITC 642), down \$124m (23%).
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$1,350m (8%) to \$18,578m due mainly to increases in Toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), up \$316m (22%) and Furniture and bedding (SITC 821), up \$289m (25%).

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS




Australia's major import sources for the year ended March 2003 were:

- USA, up \$1,274m (6%) to \$22,738m;
- Japan, up \$822m (5%) to \$16,172m;
- China, up \$2,673m (25%) to \$13,341m;
- Germany, up \$679m (10%) to \$7,509m;
- United Kingdom, down \$459m (7%) to \$5,792m;
- New Zealand, up \$224m (5%) to \$4,965m;
- Republic of Korea, up \$244m (5%) to \$4,834m; and
- Singapore, up \$155m (4%) to \$4,312m.

INTRODUCTION

Recent rises in the value of the Australian dollar in relation to some of the currencies of our major trading partners has renewed interest in the currencies used in invoices for Australia's exports and imports.

This article analyses the major invoice currencies used for Australia's international merchandise trade for the five quarters from March quarter 2002 to March quarter 2003. Changes in the composition of the currencies in which goods are invoiced are identified. The article also examines selected invoice currencies of major commodities exported and imported into Australia, classified according to the *Standard International Trade Classification Revision 3* (SITC Rev3).


An historical comparison is also provided to examine changes over a longer period. Previous articles in the March quarter 1998 and March quarter 2001 issues of this publication provided similar analyses. Copies of these articles are available on the ABS web site <www.abs.gov.au> by selecting Themes / International Trade / Topics of Interest.

All values in this article are reported in Australian dollars. Details about the treatment of invoice currencies are included as an Appendix to this article.

Graph F1 shows movements in the value of the Australian dollar against selected other currencies since the beginning of 2002, which is the period covered by this analysis. The Trade Weighted Index (TWI) is also included. The Australian dollar has appreciated against the US dollar (up 16%) and the Japanese yen (up 4%), but has depreciated against the euro (down 4%) and the NZ dollar (down 11%) in that period, leading to an overall rise in the TWI of 7%.

With an appreciating currency, Australian exports invoiced in Australian dollars become less attractive to foreign buyers, as it takes more of their currency to purchase Australian goods. Australian exports invoiced in other currencies provide smaller Australian dollar returns to exporters, and decrease the nominal value of Australian exports. Australian imports of foreign goods invoiced in other currencies require fewer Australian dollars, making imports more attractive to domestic consumers.

**EXPORTS** 

Table F2 lists the major invoice currencies used for Australia's merchandise exports for the period from March quarter 2002 to March quarter 2003. Just over 95% of Australia's exports were written in either US or Australian dollars in that period. The US dollar was the predominant currency, accounting for 68% of exports while the Australian dollar accounted for 27% of exports. The euro, the NZ dollar and the Japanese yen were the only other currencies in which more than 1% of exports were invoiced since the beginning of 2002.

Over the five quarters, the proportion of exports invoiced in US dollars fell, then rose giving a net increase over the period of 1.3 percentage points to 70.2%. The higher proportion of exports invoiced in US dollars in March quarter 2003 was largely caused by increases in exports of a small number of commodities invoiced mainly in US dollars combined with a fall in exports invoiced in Australian dollars across a range of commodities.

The proportion invoiced in Australian dollars fell a net 1.1 percentage points over the period to 25.8%. The proportion invoiced in Australian dollars in March quarter 2003 was the lowest observed since analysis of invoice currencies commenced in 1997.

**EXPORT COMMODITIES** 

Table F3 summarises the invoice currencies used for Australia's major export commodities between March quarter 2002 and March quarter 2003. By commodity, there were substantial differences in the invoice currencies used. The US dollar was used most often as the invoice currency in the resources sector, particularly for gold (SITC 97), natural gas (SITC 34) and coal (SITC 32). Over 95% of each of these commodities were invoiced in US dollars.

There were several commodities where the Australian dollar was the predominant invoice currency. Over 60% of exports of beverages (SITC 11), miscellaneous manufactured articles (SITC 8) and medicinal and pharmaceutical products (SITC 54) were invoiced in Australian dollars.

For a small number of commodities, other currencies were used for a significant proportion of exports. Around 20% of exports of fish and crustaceans (SITC 03) were invoiced in Japanese yen, while a similar proportion of beverages (SITC 11) were invoiced in pounds sterling, reflecting significant export destinations for these commodities.

IMPORTS

Table F4 lists the major invoice currencies used for Australia's merchandise imports for the period from March quarter 2002 to March quarter 2003. The US dollar was the predominant currency, although less so than for exports, accounting for almost 50% of imports.

The Australian dollar was the second most significant invoice currency over the period, accounting for almost 31% of imports. Other currencies were more significant for imports than exports. The euro (9%) and Japanese yen (4%) were the next most significant invoice currencies, while all other currencies combined accounted for about 7% of imports over the period.

IMPORT COMMODITIES

Invoice currencies used for Australia's major import commodities are summarised in Table F5 for the period from March quarter 2002 to March quarter 2003.

A small number of commodities were dominated by invoices in US dollars, particularly petroleum products (SITC 33) at 99%, and transport vehicles (excluding road vehicles) (SITC 79) at 82%. By comparison, 75% of medicinal and pharmaceutical products (SITC 54) and almost two-thirds of road vehicles (SITC 78) were invoiced in Australian dollars.

The euro was the third most significant invoice currency, with industrial machinery (SITC 72 & SITC 74) accounting for approximately one-quarter of these imports. The Japanese yen was the invoice currency for 10% of machinery specialised for particular industries (SITC 72), and 13% of road vehicles (SITC 78).

HISTORICAL COMPARISON

Table F6 shows the proportion of exports and imports invoiced in the major currencies for the last four years. Over this longer period, trends in the data are more readily apparent. The proportion of merchandise exports invoiced in US dollars increased from 64% in 1999 to around 68% in each of the subsequent three years.

The proportion of imports invoiced in US dollars has remained relatively stable over the four year period, while a greater proportion of imports have been invoiced in Australian dollars since 2001 compared with earlier years.

The euro was introduced as a scriptural currency on 1 January 1999. Euro banknotes and coin came into circulation on 1 January 2002, replacing the individual currencies of 12 European Union (EU) countries. Denmark, Sweden and the UK were the only EU countries which subsequently retained their own currencies. This is reflected in the proportion of trade invoiced in the euro which has risen substantially since 2002, particularly for imports.

#### APPENDIX: Treatment Of Invoice Currencies

INVOICE CURRENCIES

Information on the invoice currencies used in export and import transactions is collected by the Australian Customs Service (Customs) and passed to the ABS with other international trade information.

For exports, goods invoiced in US dollars, Japanese yen, Pounds sterling, Euros and NZ dollars are reported in those foreign currencies. Amounts invoiced in other currencies are converted to Australian dollars by the exporter and this value is reported on the Customs entry. The invoice currency is also reported. The ABS receives the exports data as reported to Customs and converts values reported in the foreign currencies to Australian dollars using the exchange rate prevailing on the date of departure of the goods from Australia.

For imports, the value of the goods is reported to Customs in the invoice currency of the transaction. The Customs system automatically converts the value to Australian dollars using exchange rates prevailing on the reported date of departure of the goods from the overseas country. The ABS receives details of the reported invoice currency, together with the value of the import transaction in Australian dollars.

While currencies are converted to Australian dollars at exchange rates applicable on the day of shipment, the Australian exporter or importer may undertake the conversion for the actual receipt or payment using a different exchange rate, or one applying on a different day. As well, many exporters and importers hedge transactions and the actual exchange rate applied may differ from that applicable on the shipment date.

#### INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5489.0). # RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

**3** The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

**4** International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

**5** Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

### Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2,000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1,000.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- individual transaction lines (within an export consignment) where the value of the goods is less than \$500.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.

goods imported into bonded warehouses.

- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.
- **10** Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- **11** Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 90% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 5% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.
- **16** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **17** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **18** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **19** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

**20** The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);

Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);

Developing Countries (DCs);

European Union (EU).

- **21** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- **22** More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra 02 6252 5409.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

**23** Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

STATE

- **24** State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **25** State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

**26** Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, 1993 Edition (cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

**27** Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

**28** Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on *Data Confidentiality* in the December 1999 issue.
