





#### CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

This issue contains a feature article - *Harmonized System Changes*. The article summarises changes to the Australian classification resulting from the implementation of a review of the international Harmonized System by the World Customs Organization. The changes will affect trade statistics from 1 January 2002.

#### REVISIONS

The revisions policy for imports data has changed since the June quarter 2001 publication. Revisions are now made to data up to six months prior whereas previously only data up to three months prior was available for revision. This change is now consistent with the exports revision period.

Revisions since the last issue of this publication have:

- decreased total merchandise exports for the June quarter 2001 by \$33 million, and decreased them for the year ended June 2001 by \$47 million;
- decreased total merchandise imports for the June quarter 2001 by \$10 million, and decreased them for the year ended June 2001 by \$12 million;
- these movements combined to decrease merchandise trade surplus for the June quarter 2001 by \$23 million, and decrease it for the year ended June by \$34 million.

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the September quarter 2001, merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$1,813 million (6% of exports for the September quarter 2001). This represented a \$791 million (30%) decline from the surplus in the June quarter 2001.

The decrease in the surplus recorded in the September quarter 2001 was a result of a larger increase in imports (up \$902 million or 3%) than in exports (up \$111 million or about half a percentage point).


The value of the Australian dollar did not impact significantly on imports as it didn't vary greatly against most currencies during the September quarter 2001. This follows declines in the first half of 2001, particularly against the US dollar.

In the September quarter 2001, there was no direct evidence of any impact on exports or imports from the terrorist attacks on the United States of America on 11 September 2001.

Australia's trade position with many of its major trade partners fluctuated significantly during the September quarter 2001.

- United Kingdom moved from a surplus of \$411 million to a deficit of \$448 million.
   This was due to a large decrease in exports, down \$529 million (29%) combined with a significant increase in imports, up \$330 million (23%).
- China, the deficit rose \$743 million to \$898 million, due to a large increase in imports, up \$745 million (35%).
- USA, the deficit dropped \$594 million (25%) to \$1,775 million, due to an increase in exports, up \$242 million (8%) and a decrease in imports, down \$352 million (6%). This continues a trend of decreasing deficits, and is the lowest trade deficit recorded with the USA since the June quarter 1992.
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased by \$322 million (41%) to \$468 million.
- Singapore, the surplus increased by \$298 million (166%) to \$478 million.
- Japan, the surplus increased by \$189 million (9%) to \$2,407 million, the highest quarterly surplus ever recorded with Japan.
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by \$153 million (28%) to \$694 million.
- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by \$106 million (9%) to \$1,235 million.




#### MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the September quarter 2001 were \$31,750 million, an increase of approximately half a percent from the June quarter 2001 (\$31,639 million). From the September quarter 2000 exports have increased 11%.

The small increase in exports is a result of increased quantity and a change in the composition of exports, as the average price of exports as measured by the Export Price Index fell 1% over the quarter. Despite this fall, the Export Price Index increased 10% from the September quarter 2000. For more information on the Export Price Index see *International Trade Price Indexes, Australia* (Cat. no. 6457.0). Estimates of chain volume measures for exports will be published in the September quarter issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position* (Cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 29 November 2001.

#### MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



There was no consistent pattern with the value of exports by commodity groups, with some significant increases and decreases. The largest increases between June quarter 2001 and September quarter 2001 were:

- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$457 million (7%) to \$6,912 million due mainly to increases in Coal (SITC 321) and Natural gas (SITC 343).
- Food and live animals, up \$156 million (3%) to \$5,412 million due mainly to Fruit and nuts (SITC 057), and Live animals other than fish, etc (SITC 001). These increases were partially offset by a decline in Wheat (SITC 041).

The largest decreases between June quarter 2001 and September quarter 2001 were:


- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$372 million (6%) to \$6,008 million due mainly to Ores and concentrates of base metals (excl. iron, copper, nickel, aluminium, and uranium) (SITC 287), especially in zinc (SITC 28750), and niobium, tantalum and vanadium (SITC 28785), and Oil seeds and oleaginous fruits for the extraction of vegetable oils (SITC 222).
- Machinery and transport equipment, down \$160 million (5%) to \$3,326 million mainly due to Telecommunications equipment, parts and accessories (SITC 764).

#### MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports in the September quarter 2001 were \$29,937 million, an increase of \$902 million (3%) from the June quarter 2001. Despite this quarterly increase, the value of imports has fallen \$387 million (1%) from the September quarter 2000.

The Import Price Index fell by 3% in the September quarter 2001, due mainly to price falls in electronic goods, computers, medicinal products, inorganic chemicals and petroleum products. It rose by 5% from the September quarter 2000. For more information on the Import Price Index see *International Trade Price Indexes*, *Australia* (Cat. no. 6457.0).

#### MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



Several commodity groups recorded increased imports in September quarter 2001 compared to June quarter 2001. The most significant were:

- Miscellaneous manufactured goods, up \$796 million (20%) to \$4,685 million due mainly to increases in Baby carriages, toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), and Men's, boys', women's and girls' clothing (SITCs 841 and 842).
- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$459 million (4%) to \$13,290 million due mainly to increased imports of Rotating electric plant (SITC 716), Civil engineering plant and equipment (SITC 723) and Heating and cooling equipment (SITC 741). These increases were partially offset by a large decrease in imports of Automatic data processing equipment (SITC 752).
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$337 million (10%) to \$3,693 million.

Decreased imports were recorded in:

- *Commodities and transactions, n.e.s.*, down \$373 million (46%) to \$437 million.
- Chemicals and related products, down \$230 million (6%) to \$3,574 million due mainly to Fertilisers (SITC 562) and Organo-inorganic compounds (SITC 515).


EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the year ended September 2001, merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$4,922 million (4% of exports for the year ended September 2001). This followed a trade deficit (an excess of imports over exports) of \$10,474 million for the year ending September 2000.

Australia recorded an improved trading position (an increased surplus or reduced deficit) with all of its major trading partners and produced the following trade surpluses or deficits:

- USA, deficit down \$3,603 million (27%) to \$9,588 million;
- Japan, surplus up \$3,289 million (59%) to \$8,853 million;
- Singapore, surplus up \$1,459 million (243%) to \$2,060 million;
- Taiwan, surplus up \$852 million (50%) to \$2,545 million;
- Republic of Korea, surplus up \$710 million (18%) to \$4,604 million;
- UK, deficit down \$546 million (26%) to \$1,577 million;
- China, deficit down \$84 million (3%) to \$2,771 million; and,
- New Zealand where the trade surplus increased by \$46 million (2%) to \$2,442 million.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the year ended September 2001 were \$122,786 million, an increase of \$18,876 million (18%) from the year ended September 2000.

Part of the stimulus for the increase in the value of Australia exports has been the low value of the Australian dollar. Over this period it declined against most major trading currencies (US dollar, Euro, etc.) although it rose slightly against the Japanese Yen.


Most export SITC sections recorded increases with the most significant being:

- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$5,611 million (27%) to \$26,023 million due mainly to increases in Coal (SITC 321), up \$3,007 million (34%), Petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude (SITC 333), up \$1,333 million (22%) and Natural gas (SITC 343), up \$654 million (30%).
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, up \$4,333 million (22%) to \$24,089 million due mainly to Iron ore and concentrates (SITC 281), up \$1,044 million (26%), Aluminium ores and concentrates, including alumina (SITC 285), up \$710 million (19%), Wool and other animal hair, including wool tops (SITC 268), up \$672 million (22%), and Cotton (SITC 263), up \$654 million (46%).

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

• Food and live animals, up \$3,286 million (19%) to \$21,047 million due mainly to Meat of bovine animals, fresh, chilled or frozen (SITC 011), up \$1,100 million (33%), Wheat (incl. spelt) and meslin, unmilled (SITC 041), up \$657 million (18%) and Milk, cream and milk products (excl. butter and cheese) (SITC 022), up \$488 million (36%).


#### COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations for the year ended September 2001 were:

- Japan, up \$3,617 million (18%) to \$24,019 million;
- USA, up \$1,902 million (19%) to \$12,119 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$822 million (10%) to \$9,284 million;
- China, up \$2,041 million (38%) to \$7,396 million;
- New Zealand, up \$205 million (3%) to 7,083 million;
- Singapore, up \$801 million (16%) to \$5,939 million;
- Taiwan, up \$606 million (12%) to \$5,705 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$614 million (14%) to \$4,966 million;
- Hong Kong, up \$653 million (19%) to \$4,050 million; and
- Indonesia, up \$634 million (24%) to \$3,246 million.


#### COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF EXPORTS



MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the year ended September 2001 were \$117,864 million, an increase of \$3,480 million (3%) from the year ended September 2000.

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS



Import SITC sections recording significant movements were:


- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$1,751 million (20%) to \$10,374 million due mainly to an increase in Petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude (SITC 333), up \$1,628 million (25%);
- Chemicals and related products, nes, up \$1,313 million (10%) to \$14,355 million due mainly to Medicaments (SITC 542), up \$437 million (14%), Medicinal and pharmaceutical products (excl. medicaments)(SITC 541), up \$284 million (44%), and Inorganic chemical elements (SITC 522), up \$263 million (58%). These increases were partially offset by a fall in Organo-inorganic compounds (SITC 515), down \$282 million (18%);
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$981 million (6%) to \$15,975 million due mainly to Baby carriages, toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), up \$206 million (17%), Measuring, checking, analysing and controlling instruments (SITC 874), up \$152 million (9%), and Clothing of textile fabrics (SITC 845), up \$107 million (12%). These increases were partially offset by a fall in Musical instruments, parts and accessories; and record and tapes (SITC 898), down \$136 million (12%); and
- Machinery and transport equipment, down \$612 million (1%) to \$52,749 million due mainly to Aircraft and associated equipment; spacecraft and parts thereof (SITC 792), down \$1,463 million (35%) and Ships, boats and floating structures (SITC 793), down \$690 million (63%). These decreases were partly offset by a large increase in Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up \$1,420 million (20%).

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS continued

Australia's major import sources for the year ended September 2001 were:

- USA, down \$1,701 million (7%) to \$21,707 million;
- Japan, up \$328 million (2%) to \$15,166 million;
- China, up \$1,957 million (24%) to \$10,167 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$68 million (1%) to \$6,543 million;
- Germany, up \$513 million (9%) to \$6,404 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$112 million (2%) to \$4,680 million;
- New Zealand, up \$160 million (4%) to \$4,641 million;
- Malaysia, down \$160 million (4%) to \$3,969 million;
- Singapore, down \$658 million (15%) to \$3,879 million; and
- Indonesia, up \$817 million (29%) to \$3,634 million.

INTRODUCTION

Australia and most countries throughout the world use the international Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (the Harmonized System or HS) for the classification of internationally traded goods as they pass their country's customs frontier. The World Customs Organisation (WCO) has designed and maintained the classification system for this purpose. Australia uses extensions of the international HS for the collection and dissemination of statistics on detailed merchandise export and import commodities of particular interest.

Australia extends the international HS to produce the Combined Australian Customs Tariff Nomenclature and Statistical Classification (the Customs Tariff or the Tariff) to classify imports and the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) to classify exports. The extensions exist:

- for Customs purposes, to differentiate between imported goods grouped under a single 6-digit HS code. This is generally driven by the need to impose varying import duty rates on similar goods. This is achieved by adding two digits to the HS code, making an 8-digit code. This extension is maintained by the Australian Customs Service (Customs).
- for statistical purposes, to provide a finer level of detail. This is achieved by adding two digits to the combination of HS and Customs 8-digit codes for imports and to the 6-digit HS codes for exports. The statistical codes are maintained by the ABS.

Several other classifications, such as the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) and the Classification of Broad Economic Categories (BEC), are used for the presentation of broader level statistics in this publication, in line with international standards and practice. The statistics presented for these classifications are prepared by translating the data collected according to the HS via concordances between the classifications. In this way the varying requirements and interests of traders and users of the information can be met efficiently and effectively.

The WCO is introducing the third revision to the international HS on 1 January 2002. The HS was introduced on 1 January 1988 and subsequently revised in 1990 and 1996. The 2002 revisions affect 68 of the 98 chapters in the classification, either through note changes, classification changes or both. Extensive revisions have been made to Petroleum (chapter 27), Chemicals (chapter 29), Hides and skins (chapter 41), and Paper and paper products (chapter 48). In these chapters, the structure of the classification has been altered. In some instances, the WCO has kept the same codes even where there has been a change in the content of that category in the 2002 version. Users of the classification need to be aware of such instances.

In the hierarchy of the HS there were no changes made to either the description or the number of chapters. There has been an increase of 3 in the number of 4-digit HS headings and an increase of 111 in the number of 6-digit HS headings. As a signatory to the HS convention, it is mandatory for Australia to implement the revised international classification in its entirety on 1 January 2002.

Chapter 27, Petroleum, now separately identifies waste oils. In chapter 29, Chemicals, the basis of the classification has changed from a chemical composition description to a mixture of end-use and chemical composition descriptions. In both chapters there has been no reuse of classification codes where categories have changed content.

INTERNATIONAL REVIEW

INTERNATIONAL REVIEW continued

Chapter 41, Hides and skins, now incorporates the concept of reversible tanning. Reversible tanning means a hide or skin, which after being washed returns to an unprocessed state and without further tanning processes will begin deteriorating. In industry terms this means a hide or skin that has had no further processing past alum sulphating, leaving the reverse side of the hide or skin coloured white (or close to white). The statistical codes now distinguish between raw skins, not processed beyond drying or salting, and those skins which are partially processed, that is, not a raw skin.

In chapter 48, Paper and paper products, the WCO has placed emphasis on identifying types of paper and the level of processing the paper has undergone, for example bleaching, in the 6-digit structure. In chapters 41 and 48, several of the 1996 HS classification headings have been reused for the 2002 HS version, even though a change in scope of those classification headings has occurred.

AUSTRALIAN EXTENSIONS

Any changes made at the 6-digit level of the international HS necessarily impact on the extensions to the HS for Australian requirements. Accordingly, Customs and the ABS have undertaken reviews of the Australian extensions. Customs has reviewed the 8-digit tariff extensions for imports and the ABS has reviewed the 10-digit extensions for import statistical codes and the 8-digit extensions for export statistical codes.

Proposals for the detailed import and export classifications were developed by the ABS after implementing the WCO changes to the 6-digit level and, in the case of imports, the changed 8-digit tariff codes determined by Customs. The initial extensions to the classifications for statistical purposes were developed by applying the previous dissections wherever possible. The ABS determined areas of the classification where further assistance was required from industry experts. It consulted relevant industry organisations where significant changes were proposed or technical advice and assistance was required with the classification.

Initial classification proposals have been made available on the ABS website and have been distributed as paper copies where this was requested. All known stakeholders were advised by letter of the ABS proposals and an Australian Customs Notice was issued. All submissions made were considered and where necessary further industry advice sought.

The review team contacted organisations who had requested current confidentiality restrictions which were affected by the changes. The organisations were asked to assess their potential level of exposure under the new classification. These assessments have been used to apply restrictions which will be reviewed in the first six months of operation of the new classification. Subsequently, the restrictions will be reviewed every two years, unless there are changes in trading patterns, in accordance with normal procedures.

Throughout the review process the ABS worked closely with the other government agencies involved and consulted with several international and overseas agencies on aspects of the review. Industry experts were consulted on the final structures. Finally the ABS allocated the statistical codes, wrote descriptions of the classifications and prepared the classification manuscript.

STATISTICAL CODES

In conjunction with the review, the ABS examined trade reported for the existing statistical codes in the import and export classifications. It examined low value trade to determine whether continued use of these dissections was warranted. The ABS limits the level of detail to that which can be reasonably provided by importers and exporters and justified by the uses made of the information. 342 import codes and 173 export codes were identified for investigation.

STATISTICAL CODES continued

FINAL STRUCTURES

These categories were assessed against the following criteria:

- is trade in the item greater than \$1 million per annum?
- is the code used for the purposes of formulating, administering or monitoring government policy?
- does the statistical code clarify the classification structure and is the classification mutually exclusive?
- is the code likely to have confidentiality restrictions applied to it?

The result of these investigations was to close 111 import codes and 47 export codes, less than 1% of the total number of statistical codes. It should be noted that a substantial review of these codes was previously undertaken relatively recently (in 1999). The changes resulting from these investigations will also be implemented on 1 January 2002.

Table F1 shows the number of categories in the import and export classifications before and after the review. The number of 8-digit export statistical codes increased by 125, or 2.4%, largely the same as the increase in the number of 6-digit HS headings resulting from the WCO review. The number of 10-digit import statistical codes increased by 766 or 9.8 %.

STATISTICAL IMPACTS

Users of detailed international merchandise trade statistics may be affected by these changes. There will be some breaks in time series for categories, or combinations of categories, where there is no direct translation between the two versions of the classification. The ABS will not be backcasting any data, but the classification concordances are available for users who wish to do their own modelling. Most series will be unaffected by the changes. There will be no impact on trade statistics classified to the SITC or the BEC, as there are no concordance changes between the HS and these classifications.

The Appendix to this article examines the relationship between the structure and levels in the HS based classifications with Australian trade classified to them. It uses the previous HS classifications, as it will be some time before trade data will be available on the new bases.

**FUTURE CHANGES** 

The detailed Australian classifications for exports and imports change in response to international and national requirements, as determined over time by the WCO, Customs and the ABS. The ABS will continue to update the classifications six monthly, in response to requests from clients for investigations. The next WCO review is scheduled for implementation on 1 January 2007. An Australian Customs Notice has been issued requesting input for this process.

AHECC release practices will change after the release of the 2002 edition on 13 December 2001. Future issues of replacement pages and new editions will be released electronically from the ABS web site. The AHECC Replacement pages (Cat. no. 1233.0.00.001) will be released electronically from 1 July 2002. #### APPENDIX: THE HS CLASSIFICATIONS AND AUSTRALIAN TRADE

This Appendix examines the value of Australian trade reported against the chapters of the AHECC and Customs Tariff. It also examines the relationship between Australian trade and the additional categories created in the Australian extensions of the HS.

The first six digits of the HS classification broadly reflect international trade requirements. Patterns of Australian trade do not necessarily accord well with those for international trade, nor do Australian requirements for detailed information necessarily accord well with international requirements. The Australian extensions of the HS classification are designed to overcome such deficiencies, while maintaining international comparability at the 6-digit level.

Readers should note that the AHECC has one more chapter than the Customs Tariff. In the AHECC chapter 98 is used to classify Special transactions and commodities not classified according to kind and is maintained by the ABS. It is not an international HS classification chapter. The difference between the number of 6-digit headings in the AHECC and Customs Tariff, is also due to the additional headings in chapter 98 of the AHECC.

Table F2 shows that 54% of Australia's total exports in 2000–01 were classified to just 7 of the 98 chapters: Petroleum, Metal ores and concentrates, Precious and semi-precious stones and metals, Meat, Cereals, Machinery and mechanical appliances, and Aluminium. A further 32% of total exports were classified to the next 17 most significant chapters, bringing the combined total to 86% for the top 24 chapters.

The number of 6-digit headings for these chapters was only 39% of the total number, indicating, not surprisingly, that Australian exports are significant in only a small proportion of a classification system designed to meet international trading requirements. However these chapters account for 61% of the additional categories established to meet Australian statistical requirements. On average, these chapters have 2.4 times the proportion of additional categories per 6-digit heading than the remaining chapters of the classification.

Table F3 shows that 51% of Australia's total imports in 2000–01 were classified to just 4 chapters: Machinery and mechanical appliances, Electrical machinery and equipment, Vehicles and Petroleum. A further 28% of total imports were classified to next 14 most significant chapters, bringing the combined total to 80% for the top 18 chapters.

The number of 6-digit headings for these chapters was 45% of the total number, but accounted for 61% of the additional categories established to meet Australian tariff and statistical requirements. On average, these chapters have 2 times the proportion of additional categories per 8-digit heading than the remaining chapters of the classification.

#### INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5489.0). # RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

**3** The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

**4** International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

**5** Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

#### Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2,000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1,000.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- individual transaction lines (within an export consignment) where the value of the goods is less than \$500.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

BASIS OF COMPILATION

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.
- **10** Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- **11** Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 85% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

STATISTICAL PERIOD

VALUATION

COUNTRY

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.
- **16** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **17** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **18** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **19** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

COUNTRY continued

**20** The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);

Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);

Developing Countries (DCs);

European Union (EU).

- **21** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- **22** More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra 02 6252 5409.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

**23** Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

STATE

- **24** State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **25** State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

**26** Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, 1993 Edition (Cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

**27** Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

**28** Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on *Data Confidentiality* in the December 1999 issue.

CONFIDENTIALITY continued

**29** More information on the treatment of confidential data in international merchandise trade statistics can be obtained from *Information Paper: International Merchandise Trade Statistics, Australia: Data Confidentiality* (Cat. no. 5487.0), or the Confidentiality Manager on Canberra 02 6252 5409. RELIABILITY

**30** Statistics for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
