

TREND ESTIMATES


Employed persons

The trend estimate of employed persons has been rising since July 1997 and by November 1998 had reached 2,878,000. This was 3% above the level in July 1997.




Unemployed persons

From a low of 229,000 in July 1995, the trend estimate of unemployed persons in NSW rose to 246,000 in April 1997 before falling back to 228,000 in November 1998.



Unemployment rate

The trend unemployment rate in NSW fell from a peak of 11.0% early in 1993 to 7.7% in the middle of 1995 and remained there until early 1996. The trend then increased to 8.1% in April 1997 before gradually falling to 7.3% in November 1998.



Participation rate and labour force

The trend estimate of the participation rate in NSW rose from 61.5% at the beginning of 1998 to 62.0% in July. In November 1998, the participation rate was 61.8%.

The size of the labour force in NSW has increased by 1.7% in the past 12 months to be 3,106,000 in November 1998.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

The seasonally adjusted estimate of employment in NSW was 2,852,000 in November 1998 compared to 2,832,000 a year earlier.

Seasonally adjusted estimates of unemployment and the unemployment rate have fluctuated over the past three months. In November 1998, unemployment stood at 242,000 and the unemployment rate was 7.8%.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS NSW continued

REGIONS OF NSW

While the Labour Force Survey (LFS) is designed primarily to produce reliable estimates at the national and State/Territory level, it also delivers estimates for a number of regions within States. As with national and State estimates, regional labour force estimates are subject to sampling error. Since estimates for regions are components of corresponding estimates at the State level—and are thus based on a considerably smaller sample size—they are subject to higher relative standard errors. Care should therefore be taken in interpretation of regional estimates, particularly month-to-month movements.

Sydney

The number of employed people in the Sydney Major Statistical Region (MSR) was 1.9 million in November 1998, the same as a year earlier. The unemployment rate in November 1998 was 5.9%, also the same as a year earlier.


Regional unemployment rates within the Sydney MSR in November 1998 ranged from 2.9% in Northern Beaches Statistical Region (SR) to 14.3% in Fairfield–Liverpool SR. Participation rates varied from 54% in Canterbury–Bankstown SR to 69% in Hornsby–Ku-ring-gai SR and Baulkham Hills (A).

Balance of NSW


There were 1.0 million employed people in Balance of NSW MSR in November 1998. This was 1.9% higher than a year earlier. The unemployment rate was 10.1% this November compared to 9.9% a year ago.

Unemployment rates ranged from 6.6% in Northern, Far West–North Western and Central West SRs to 14.7% in Richmond–Tweed and Mid-North Coast SRs. Participation rates varied from 52% in Richmond–Tweed and Mid-North Coast SRs to 65% in Murray–Murrumbidgee SR.

INDUSTRY AND OCCUPATION

The industries in NSW with the highest gains in employment in the year to November 1998 were Property and business services (35,000 or 12%) and Transport and storage (16,000 or 12%) while the largest falls occurred in Manufacturing (46,000 or 12%) and Agriculture, forestry and fishing (28,000 or 18%).

The industries with the highest employment in November 1998 were Retail trade with 422,000 (15% of total employed) and Manufacturing with 346,000 (12%).

The major occupation group with the largest annual gain in employment was Professionals with an increase of 34,000 (7%) while the largest falls were in Intermediate clerical, sales and service workers (35,000 or 7%) and Labourers and related workers (33,000 or 11%).

AGE

Employment for 45–54 year olds increased by 24,000 (4%) in the year to November 1998 while changes in the other age groups were much smaller. The unemployment rate at November 1998 decreased with age from 18.7% for 15–19 year olds to 4.6% for 45–54 year olds then increased to 7.1% for the 55–59 age group.


BIRTHPLACE

The unemployment rate for Australian-born people in NSW was 7.3% in November 1998 compared to 5.5% for those born overseas in the main English-speaking countries and 8.6% for those born in other countries.

DURATION OF UNEMPLOYMENT

In November 1998, the average (mean) duration of unemployment was 65 weeks and the median duration of unemployment was 26 weeks. Some 37% of the unemployed had been unemployed for a year or more. There has been an upward trend in the average duration of unemployment during 1998.


Average duration of unemployment



TREND ESTIMATES


Employed persons

The trend estimate of employed persons in the ACT has been fluctuating for the past two years. The last five months have seen the trend fall from 159,000 to 156,000. The whole of this fall was in female employment.




Unemployed persons

Trend unemployment in the ACT has been falling since October 1997 and in November 1998 it was 11,000, a decrease of 21% in 13 months.



Unemployment rate

The trend unemployment rate in the ACT has been falling since October 1997 and in November 1998 it was 6.6%. The rate has fallen 1.6 percentage points in this 13 month period.



Participation rate and labour force

The ACT trend participation rate has fluctuated during 1998. Having reached 72.5% in June, the rate had fallen to 70.9% by November. Also, the trend labour force estimate reached 170,000 in June before falling to 167,000 in November.

INDUSTRY AND OCCUPATION


Half of the employment in the ACT is provided by three industries: Government administration and defence with 23% of total employed, Retail trade with 14% and Property and business services with 13%. Employment in Government administration and defence fell by an average of 3,400 or 8% over the year to November 1998.

The largest occupation group was Professionals which had an average of 38,000 employed people (or a quarter of the total).

AGE

The proportion of employed people working part-time ranged from 82% of 15–19 year olds to 19% of those aged 25 years and over. Also, the unemployment rate decreased from 17.4% to 3.9% for the same age groups.


Unemployment rate by age



DURATION OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Average duration of unemployment in the ACT was 51 weeks in November 1998 compared to 33 weeks a year earlier.



ANNUAL CHANGE IN EMPLOYMENT BY AGE, NSW, NOVEMBER 1997 TO NOVEMBER 1998










UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY AGE, NSW



UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY PERIOD OF ARRIVAL OF OVERSEAS BORN, NSW, NOVEMBER 1998



AVERAGE EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY DIVISION, ACT, YEAR ENDING NOVEMBER



AVERAGE EMPLOYMENT BY OCCUPATION GROUP, ACT, YEAR ENDING NOVEMBER




EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

1 This publication contains estimates of the labour force derived from the Labour Force Survey (LFS) component of the monthly population survey, which is conducted on a sample basis throughout Australia.

THE POPULATION SURVEY

2 This survey consists of the LFS and, in most months, one or more supplementary topics. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.) and covers 1 in 300 of the population of NSW. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by specially trained interviewers. The interviews are generally conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and 12th of each month. The information obtained relates to the week before the interview (i.e. the reference week).

TELEPHONE INTERVIEWING

3 The ABS has introduced the use of telephone interviewing into the LFS. Households selected for the LFS are interviewed each month for eight months, with one-eighth of the sample being replaced each month. The first interview is conducted face-to-face with subsequent interviews conducted by telephone (if acceptable to the respondent). Telephone interviewing was phased in from August 1996 to February 1997.

SCOPE

- **4** The LFS includes all persons aged 15 years and over, except:
- members of the permanent defence forces;
- certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- overseas residents in Australia; and
- members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia

SURVEY SAMPLE REDESIGN

- **5** The LFS sample was reselected using information collected in the 1996 Census of Population and Housing.
- **6** The bulk of the new sample was phased in over the eight-month period from September 1997 to April 1998, with one eighth of this portion of the sample being introduced every month. The remainder of the sample (about 15% of the total), which covered less settled areas of Australia and non-private dwellings was rotated in fully for New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania, Northern Territory and Australian Capital Territory in September 1997 and for the other States in October 1997.

DEFINITIONS

8 The labour force category to which a person is assigned depends on the actual activity undertaken during the reference week (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.). The following definitions, which conform closely to the international standard definitions specified by the International Labour Office (ILO), relate only to those persons within the scope of the survey.

- **9** *Employed persons* comprise civilians aged 15 years and over who, during the reference week:
- worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind (including employees, employers and own account workers) in a job or business, or on a farm; or
- worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or
- were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or
- were employers, own account workers or contributing family workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.
- **10** Prior to April 1986, contributing family workers who worked for 1–14 hours were excluded from the category of employed persons.
- **11** Employed persons can be classified into:
- full-time workers, i.e. those who usually worked 35 hours or more a week (in all jobs) and those who, although usually part-time workers, worked 35 hours or more during the reference week; and
- part-time workers, i.e. those who usually worked less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the reference week.
- **12** *Unemployed persons* are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the reference week, and:
- had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:
 - were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available
 except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end
 of the reference week); or
 - were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then; or
- were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (including the whole of the reference week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
- **13** *Actively looking for work* includes writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering an advertisement for a job; checking factory notice-boards or the touchscreens at the Centrelink offices; being registered with Centrelink as a jobseeker; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives
- **14** *The unemployment rate* for any group is the number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the labour force in the same group.
- **15** The *labour force* comprises persons who were employed or unemployed as defined above.

- **16** *Long-term unemployed* comprises persons unemployed for a period of 52 weeks or more.
- **17** *Persons not in the labour force* are those who, during the reference week, were not in the categories *employed* or *unemployed* as defined above.
- **18** *The participation rate* for any group is the labour force expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 years and over in the same group.
- **19** *Duration of unemployment* is the period from the time the person began looking for work or was stood down to the end of the reference week.
- **20** *Unemployed persons classified by industry and occupation.* Unemployed persons who had worked full-time for two weeks or more in the last two years are classified according to the industry and occupation of their most recent full-time job.
- **21** *Industry classification.* From August 1994, LFS industry data have been classified according to the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, 1993 (Cat. no. 1292.0).
- **22** Occupation classification. From August 1996, occupation data have been classified according to the *Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO), Second Edition* (Cat. no. 1220.0).
- **23** *Marital status*. In the LFS, persons are classified as married or not married. Persons are classified as married if they are reported as being married (including de facto) and their spouse was a usual resident of the household at the time of the survey.
- **24** *Persons attending school or a tertiary educational institution.* Persons attending school comprise those aged 15–19 years who, during the reference week, were enrolled full-time at secondary or high schools. Persons attending a tertiary educational institution comprise those aged 15–24 years who were enrolled full-time at universities, other institutions of higher education, TAFE colleges and theological colleges.
- **25** *Employment/population ratio*. For any group, the number of employed persons expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 years and over in the same group.

STATISTICAL AREAS

- **26** The regional structure for NSW used in tables 16–19 is based on the Statistical Region structure of the *Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC)* (Cat. no. 1216.0).
- 27 Changes were made to labour force regions in NSW from September 1997. Blacktown–Baulkham Hills SR was split up with Blacktown being merged with Outer Western Sydney SR to form Outer Western Sydney SR and Blacktown (C) and Baulkham Hills being merged with Hornsby–Ku-ring-gai SR to form Hornsby–Ku-ring-gai SR and Baulkham Hills (A). In addition, Northern, Far West–North Western and Central West SRs now include the Far West Statistical Division, previously excluded. This has resulted in a series break in the data for this area

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION

- **29** Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effects of other influences on the series can be more clearly recognised.
- **30** Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. The trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term Henderson-weighted moving average to the respective seasonally adjusted series. While this smoothing technique enables estimates to be produced which include the latest month, it does result in revisions to the most recent months as additional observations become available.
- **31** Seasonally adjusted series for NSW appear in table 2. Trend estimates for NSW and ACT appear in tables 2 and 21 respectively. Seasonally adjusted data is not available for the ACT.

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

32 Estimates are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. See the Technical note on pages 57–59 for more information.

APPENDIX SUPPLEMENTARY TOPICS

Although emphasis in the population survey is placed on the regular collection of data on demographic and labour force characteristics, supplementary and special surveys of particular aspects of the labour force are carried out from time to time.

It was ABS practice to release statistics from supplementary and special surveys in *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0). This practice ceased with the release of the February 1996 issue of *Labour Force, Australia*. For future releases of supplementary labour data, separate publications containing summary results and key findings will be produced.

Equivalent tables at the State level are available on microfiche. In addition, other unpublished data can be provided to meet special requirements.





TECHNICAL NOTE DATA RELIABILITY

SOURCES OF ERROR

There are a number of possible sources of error in sample surveys and these can be classified into two types: sampling error; and non-sampling error.

NON-SAMPLING ERRORS

Non-sampling errors may arise as a result of errors in the reporting, recording or processing of the data and can occur even if there is a complete enumeration of the population. Non-sampling errors can be introduced through: inadequacies in the questionnaire; non-response; inaccurate reporting by respondents; errors in the application of survey procedures; incorrect recording of answers; and errors in data entry and processing.

It is difficult to measure the size of the non-sampling errors and the extent of these errors could vary considerably in significance from survey to survey, and from question to question. However, every effort is made in the design of the survey and development of survey procedures to minimise the effect of these errors.

SAMPLING ERRORS

Sampling error is the error which occurs by chance because the data were only obtained from a sample, not the entire population.

Standard errors of estimates

One measure of the variability of estimates which occurs as a result of surveying only a sample of the population is the standard error (SE). There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all persons had been included and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. That is, there are 19 chances in 20 that the true estimate is in the range—

$$X - 2 \times SE(X)$$
 to $X + 2 \times SE(X)$

(where *X* is the estimate)

The standard error of an estimate can be obtained from the tables on pages 60–62. Linear interpolation should be used to calculate the standard error of estimates falling between the sizes of estimates listed in the table (see example on page 59).

In the tables in this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors of 25% or less, and percentages based on such estimates, are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates and percentages with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.

The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE). The RSE is determined by dividing the standard error of an estimate SE(*X*) by the estimate *X* and expressing it as a percentage. That is—

$$RSE(X) = \frac{SE(X) \times 100}{X}$$

(where *X* is the estimate)

The look up list on the following page provides a guide for the calculation of standard errors and relative standard errors for a range of statistics.

CALCULATING STANDARD ERRORS

The methods described below refer to the calculation of standard errors for NSW estimates. Standard errors of ACT estimates should be calculated from the table on page 62, using column 2 (from September 1992) instead of the table on page 60, and column 3 (Monthly movements for December 1992 – January 1993 onwards) instead of the table on page 61.

MEASURE OF RELIABILITY TO BE DETERMINED	METHOD
Standard errors of estimates of employed persons.	Determine the SE from the table on page 60 directly.
Standard errors of estimates of unemployed persons.	Multiply the SE from the table on page 60 by 1.06.
Standard errors of estimates of persons not in the labour force.	Multiply the SE from the table on page 60 by 1.1.
Standard errors of rates (e.g. the unemployment rate which is based on the number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the number of persons in the labour force).	Determine the RSE of the numerator (X) and the denominator (Y) then apply the following formula: $RSE\left(\frac{X}{Y}\right) = \sqrt{[RSE(X)]^2 - [RSE(Y)]^2}$
Standard error of average duration of unemployment.	Determine the RSE for the number of persons on which the average is based and multiply this by 1.3.
Standard error of median duration of unemployment.	Determine the RSE for the number of persons on which the average is based and multiply this by 2.0.
Standard error of monthly movements.	From the table on page 61, look up the SE of the larger estimate.
Standard error of quarterly movements.	Determine the standard error of the larger estimate from the table on page 60 and multiply this by 1.11.
Standard error of annual movements.	Determine the standard error of the larger estimate from the table on page 60 and multiply this by 1.3.

LINEAR INTERPOLATION

Linear interpolation is used to determine the standard error of an estimate which falls between two values listed in the size of estimate column in the tables on page 60 or 61. Linear interpolation is best described using an example. In November 1998, there were 692,800 (X_e) employed persons working part-time in NSW. This estimate falls between the values 500,000 (X_p) and 1,000,000 (X_u) in the table on page 60.

The standard error of the estimate is determined as follows. Firstly calculate

$$F = \frac{X_e - X_l}{X_u - X_l}$$

$$= \frac{692,800 - 500,000}{1,000,000 - 500,000}$$

$$= 0.39$$

Secondly, calculate the standard error of the estimate, $SE(X_a)$ thus:

$$SE(X_e) = SE(X_l) + (F \times [SE(X_u) - SE(X_l)])$$

= 8,800 + (0.39 × [11,300 - 8,800])
= 9,775

Therefore the standard error of the number of employed persons working part-time in NSW in November 1998 is 9,775.
