





KEY POINTS

AUSTRALIAN WINE DOMESTIC SALES

DOMESTIC WINE SALES

- The trend estimate for domestic sales of Australian produced wine was 35.8 million litres in June 2009, no change from last month and up 1.7% from June 2008.
- The seasonally adjusted estimate was 36.4 million litres this month, up 0.5% from May 2009 but down 7.6% on June last year.

WHITE TABLE WINE

- The trend estimate for domestic sales of Australian produced white wine was 17.0 million litres this month, an increase of 0.2% on May 2009 and 0.7% on June 2008.
- The seasonally adjusted estimate was 17.4 million litres in June 2009, up 0.3% from May 2009 and 6.8% lower than June 2008.

RED/ROSÉ TABLE WINE

- The trend estimate for domestic sales of Australian produced red and rosé wine fell by 0.1% to 13.2 million litres this month but was up 1.8% on the same month last year.
- The seasonally adjusted estimate was 13.2 million litres in June 2009, a decrease of 1.8% on May 2009 and 12.1% on June 2008.

AUSTRALIAN WINE EXPORTS

■ Exports of Australian produced wine decreased by 5.6% this month to 66 million litres. The value of the exported wine in June 2009 was \$207.7 million, a decrease of 1.7% from last month. Australia exported 752.5 million litres, with a total value of \$2.5 million in the twelve months ending June 2009. This was a rise of 5.3% in volume and a decrease of 7.5% in value over the corresponding period to June 2008.

DOMESTIC AUSTRALIAN TABLE WINE SALES TREND

TOTAL WHITE AND RED/ROSÉ TABLE WINE

The trend estimate for white table wine sales was 17.0 million litres which was 0.2% higher than May 2009. The trend estimate for red and rosé wine sales was 13.2 million litres which was 0.1% lower than last month.

TOTAL WHITE AND RED/ROSÉ TABLE WINE: Trend




TABLE WINE,

The trend estimate for sales of white table wine in glass containers of less than 2 litres increased by 0.1% from last month. The trend estimate for red and rosé wine sales in glass containers of less than 2 litres increased by 0.2% from last month, the ninth consecutive monthly increase.

TABLE WINE, Glass container less than 2 litres: Trend





TABLE WINE,

The trend estimate for domestic sales of white table wine in soft packs fell 0.2% this month, the tenth consecutive monthly decrease. The trend estimate for red and rosé wine sales in soft packs fell by 0.1% this month, the sixth consecutive monthly decrease.

TABLE WINE, Soft pack containers: Trend




EXPORTS OF AUSTRALIAN PRODUCED WINE

ANNUAL EXPORTS OF AUSTRALIAN PRODUCED WINE

The graph below shows a rise from last year in the quantity of exports of Australian produced wine. In 2008-09 wine exports totalled 753 million litres, an increase of 5.3% from the 715 million litres exported in 2007-08. Further, the volume of Australian made wine exported in 2008–09 was 4.4% lower than the volume in 2006-07 (787 million litres).


EXPORTS OF AUSTRALIAN PRODUCED WINE, Annual totals: Original



EXPORTS OF WHITE AND RED/ROSÉ TABLE WINE

In original terms, 66.0 million litres of Australian produced table wine were exported in June 2009, a fall of 5.6% on May 2009 and an increase of 29.2% on June 2008. In June 2009, 25.4 million litres of Australian produced white table wine were exported, a decrease of 12.5% from last month and an increase of 35.5% on June 2008. Australian producers exported 38.9 million litres of red and rosé table wine in June 2009, a decrease of 2.1% from last month and a 24.6% increase on June 2008.

EXPORTS OF TABLE WINE BY TYPE: Original



UNIT VALUE OF WINE EXPORTS

In original terms, the value of the wine exported this month (66 million litres) was \$207.7m, a decrease of 1.7% in value from May 2009. The average value of Australian wine exported in June 2009 was \$3.15 per litre, up from \$3.02 per litre last month and down from \$3.60 per litre in June 2008.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN

EXPORT FIGURES


The value of wine exports reported in this publication is derived by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) from customs export records and the ABS converts the value on the day of shipment, at the daily conversion rate (see paragraph 10 of the Explanatory Notes for more detail). The Australian Wine and Brandy Corporation (AWBC) also report the value of exports and the exporter makes the conversion when submitting wine for export approval. With the AWBC method, it is expected that some of the conversions will occur at hedged rates. This does not occur with the ABS method. For June, the value reported by the ABS was \$207.7m, while the AWBC value was \$217.7m. When the Australian exchange rate is moving significantly the alternative methods will result in diverging valuations.

IMPORTS AND DISPOSALS OF AUSTRALIAN PRODUCED WINE

WINE IMPORTS CLEARED FOR HOME CONSUMPTION

In original terms, 3.9 million litres of wine, valued at \$27.3 million were imported in June 2009, an increase of 7.1% in quantity from the previous month. The value of imports was 11.0% higher than May 2009. The average value of wine imports cleared for home consumption in June 2009 was \$6.95 per litre up from \$6.71 per litre in May 2009.

The original data for the June quarter 2009 shows that wine available for consumption in Australia has remained steady since the same quarter in 2008. Domestic sales of Australian wine for the June 2009 quarter decreased 0.9% compared with the same quarter last year, and wine imports increased 6.4% over the same period. Total disposals of Australian produced wine in the June quarter 2009 increased by 8.8% on the same quarter in 2008 with exports rising 14.7%.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

SCOPE AND COVERAGE

1 The information shown in this publication for the domestic sales of Australian produced wine is obtained directly from winemakers by means of a mail collection. The brandy sales figures shown represent quantities on which excise duty was paid, i.e. the quantity of brandy released for sale. Statistics relating to import clearances and exports are based on information provided to the Australian Customs Service by importers, exporters and their agents.

- **2** The information on domestic sales of Australian produced wine is obtained from 105 winemaking enterprises with sales of 250,000 litres or more in either of the previous two financial years and crush 400 or more tonnes of grapes annually. These account for approximately 92% of total wine sales. All sales data are collected on an Australia-wide basis only and state figures are therefore not available.
- **3** Tables 1, 3 & 4 include all sales by winemakers (within the scope of the collection) with the exception of exports, sales for ships' stores, sales of imported wine and brandy and inter-winery sales, the last exclusion being necessary to avoid duplication in the published figures. From July 1998 the definition for table wine in the glass container categories changed from '1 litre and under' to 'less than 2 litres'. This series has been retained as the contribution of the over 1 litre but under 2 litres containers (such as table wine in magnum sized bottles) is believed to have been less than 1%. There is an expectation this contribution will increase in the future. This has a consequential effect for the 'other containers' category which includes glass containers 2 litres and over from July 1998 (prior to this it was glass over 1 litre). This series will also be retained.
- **4** From July 2000, the category 'Flavoured wine' has been changed to 'Other wine products'. This change reflects the inclusion of de-alcoholised, low and reduced alcohol wines in the category. These wine types were previously included in 'Table wine'. While it is expected that the effect on the 'Table wine' series resulting from this change will be insignificant, care should be taken in comparing 'Flavoured wine' with 'Other wine products'.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

- **5** Figures relating to international trade in wine and brandy are presented in tables 5–10 to provide a basis for assessing the overall wine market. ABS procedures are designed to ensure that sufficient editing is undertaken to guarantee the quality and integrity of trade statistics to at least the six-digit Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS) level. After the release of monthly trade statistics, the ABS may receive a number of client requests to investigate cases of possible misreporting. Most relate to potential errors at the more detailed levels of the commodity classification. Client requests for data investigations of this type will be undertaken free of charge if data at the six-digit level of the HS are affected. Otherwise investigations will only be considered if the value of the aggregate data queried exceeds \$250,000 in each month queried, and the cost of the investigation is met by the client.
- **6** Imports cleared for home consumption (including re-imports, that is, goods originating in Australia that have been exported but then returned to source) comprise those goods entered for home consumption, together with goods cleared from Customs warehouses. Exports of Australian produce are defined as exports of goods, materials or articles which have been produced, manufactured or partly manufactured in Australia. Due to a change in the Customs Tariff codes implemented in July 1999 and July 2000, the wine type categories are not necessarily comparable with earlier data.
- **7** In order to retain stability in the time-series of data, the selection of countries for which exports and imports data has been presented has been based upon the level of annual imports or exports from the previous financial year.
- **8** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. The ABS converts foreign currency f.o.b. values to

Australian dollars using the exchange rate prevailing on the date of departure shown on the export manifest.

- **9** The value of imports is the Australian customs value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **10** For details of currency conversion procedures for wine export values, please refer to 2.34 and 2.35 of *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia*; *Concepts*, *Sources and Methods*, *2001* (cat. no. 5489.0). Goods invoiced in one of six major foreign currencies are converted to Australian dollars by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. Sales in other foreign currencies are converted by the exporter to Australian dollars.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED AND TREND ESTIMATES

- **11** Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effects of other influences can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not remove from the series the effect of irregular influences (e.g. abnormal weather and industrial disputes).
- **12** The seasonally adjusted estimates in this publication have been produced using a concurrent methodology whereby the seasonal factors are revised each month to take into account the seasonality exhibited by the latest observation. A more detailed review is conducted annually.
- 13 The revision properties of the seasonally adjusted and trend estimates have been improved by the use of autoregressive integrated moving average (ARIMA) modelling. ARIMA modelling relies on the characteristics of the series being analysed to project future period data. The Sales of Australian Wine and Brandy by Winemakers Survey uses ARIMA modelling where appropriate for individual time series. The ARIMA model is assessed as part of the annual reanalysis. For more information on the details of ARIMA modelling see feature article: Use of ARIMA modelling to reduce revisions in the October 2004 issue of *Australian Economic Indicators* (cat. no. 1350.0).
- **14** The smoothing of seasonally adjusted series to create trend estimates is a means of reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. The trend estimates of wine sales have been derived by applying a 13-term Henderson weighted moving average to the seasonally adjusted series.
