CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

This publication is substantially different to previous issues of *Tourism* Indicators, Australia. The changes follow a user review conducted in late 1997 and changes to the Survey of Tourist Accommodation, as advised in the December quarter 1997 edition and described further below. The main impact is in the layout of tables contained in the Tourist Accommodation and the International Tourism Sections of the publication.

CHANGES TO THE SURVEY OF TOURIST **ACCOMMODATION**

The Tourist Accommodation Section of this issue is substantially different to previous issues, as a result of the user review and significant changes to the Survey of Tourist Accommodation:

- Only hotels, motels and guest houses with 15 or more rooms are now included (previously establishments with five or more rooms were included).
- Serviced apartments with 15 or more units are included in the collection as a separate category for the first time.
- Because of the separate classification of serviced apartments, there have been several changes to definitions of accommodation units. As a result, some establishments have been re-classified to different accommodation types (see Explanatory Notes).

Annual counts of establishments and capacity will be compiled in respect of the previous survey scope. These counts are expected to be published annually in the December issue of this publication.

The Survey will be expanded in the Year 2000 to cover significant establishments within the previous scope.

This publication presents substantially revised estimates to data previously published as a result of the changes outlined above. Information in respect of 1997 has been re-tabulated on the basis of the new scope, while data for earlier periods have been recompiled to partially account for the new scope. As a result there is a break in series for estimates between December 1996 and March 1997. See Explanatory Notes for further details.

IN BRIEF

STATE TOURIST ACCOMMODATION DATA As a result of substantial changes to the Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA) from the March quarter 1998, the publication strategy for the collection has been reviewed. The State and Territory publications (Cat. nos 8635.1 to 8635.8) ceased with the December quarter 1997 issues. State data are still available as special data services, and present detailed data for each State by Tourism Region and selected Statistical Local Areas, For further information, contact Paull Hoffmann on Brisbane 07 3222 6201.

TOURISM SATELLITE **ACCOUNTS**

Tourism is an activity that is not identified in classifications of industry or in the National Accounts. As a result there is generally no official measure of the contribution of tourism to, and its role in, the economy.

Tourism Satellite Accounts (TSA) have been developed as a means of providing such an official measure. A TSA enables tourism to be measured in a way which uses the same concepts as the National Accounts. This enables the economic effects of tourism to be directly compared to those of industries such as manufacturing, mining and agriculture.

The Australian Tourism Satellite Account (ATSA) will follow the guidelines of the models currently being developed by the World Tourism Organisation and the OECD. The ABS is currently compiling statistics for an ATSA for the reference year 1997-98. The ATSA is expected for release in September 2000.

Supply side data (supply of goods and services to visitors) is currently being collected by ABS via the Economic Activity and the Service Industry Surveys. Data on employment numbers in tourism related industries will come from the ABS's Labour Force Survey.

Demand side data (expenditure by visitors) is being collected via the Bureau of Tourism Research's National Visitor Survey and International Visitor Survey.

THE ABS SERVICE INDUSTRIES SURVEY **PROGRAM**

The ABS conducts rotating collections of the services sector of the economy. Outlined below are details of collections which may be of interest to users of Tourism statistics.

For the 1997-98 reference year, the following collections of interest are currently being compiled:

- Accommodation (ANZSIC 5710)
- Pubs, Taverns and Bars (ANZSIC 5720)
- Clubs (ANZSIC 5740)
- Casinos (ANZSIC 9322)

It is expected that estimates from these collections will be released progressively from March to September 1999.

For the 1998-99 reference year, the following collections of interest are to be conducted:

- Cafes and Restaurants (ANZSIC 5730)
- Casinos (ANZSIC 9322)

In the coming months, the ABS Service Industries program will be reviewed, in order to develop the program for 1999-2000 onwards.

THE NATIONAL CENTRE FOR CULTURE AND **RECREATION STATISTICS** (NCCRS)

The NCCRS is a part of the ABS and is located in the Adelaide Office. Much of the work program is developed in conjunction with the Cultural Ministers' Council Statistics Working Group, and the Recreation and Sport Industry Statistics Group of the Sport and Recreation Ministers' Council.

This centre is involved in working with these groups to develop collections in the field of culture and sport statistics.

Some of the topics covered by the NCCRS include Cultural funding in Australia, Survey of museums, Sport and recreation employment, Education and employment of arts workers, Business sponsorship of sport and culture, to name a few. The centre is also involved in reviewing the Framework for Cultural Statistics and the Framework for Sport and Recreation Statistics.

THE INTRODUCTION OF A TOURISM REGION CLASSIFICATION TO THE SURVEY OF TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

INTRODUCTION

Commencing with the March quarter 1998, the ABS has introduced a new geographic classification, the Tourism Region to the Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA).

BACKGROUND

Tourism Regions were developed by the Bureau of Tourism Research (BTR) and the State and Territory Tourism Commissions, primarily for use in presenting tourism statistics such as the BTR's International Visitor Survey and National Visitor Survey. Traditionally, results from the STA have been presented according to the geographic units of the Australian Standard Geographic Classification (ASGC) which is used by the ABS for the collection and dissemination of spatially related data. Although Tourism Regions have been developed by combining regions of the ASGC they are not regions for which ABS data has previously been published. Consequently, it has not been easy to make direct comparisons of destination based data from the major tourism collections.

NATIONAL STANDARDS

Agreement has now been reached by the ABS, BTR and Tourism Commissions that Tourism Regions should be adopted as the national standard geographic classification for all tourism statistics. Accordingly, Tourism Regions have been incorporated into the Framework for Australian Tourism Statistics which has been developed by the ABS as a reference manual of standards for national tourism statistics. The ABS expects to release the Framework sometime in 1999.

Tourism Regions are compatible with the ASGC as they are constructed from Statistical Local Areas, the basic ASGC geographical units. Detailed concordances between Tourism Regions and the ASGC are contained in the Framework and are also included, for each State and the Northern Territory, in the STA Standard Data Services described below.

TOURISM REGION **PRODUCTS**

As mentioned above, Tourism Regions were introduced in the STA in respect of data for the March quarter 1998. Summary capacity, occupancy and takings data for Tourism Regions in each State and Territory are included in the quarterly national publication Tourist Accommodation, Australia (Cat. no. 8635.0). An expanded data set for each Tourism Region is provided in the new Standard Data Services, which were also introduced for each State and the Northern Territory in respect of the March quarter 1998. The Standard Data Services include outline maps for the Tourism Regions of the State/Territory concerned, and a detailed concordance between the Tourism Regions and the ASGC for that State/Territory.

FEATURE ARTICLE

TRAVEL AGENCY SERVICES

KEY POINTS

The ABS recently surveyed the travel agency services industry in respect of the 1996-97 financial year. The data from this collection relates to businesses classified to ANZSIC Class 6641 of the Australian and New Zealand Industrial Classification (ANZSIC). Class 6641 covers those businesses predominantly engaged in the provision of travel agency services such as transport and/or accommodation bookings and tour retailing or wholesaling. Businesses such as domestic and international airlines which carry out travel agency activities, but are mainly engaged in other activities (such as providing airline transport services) were excluded from the scope of the survey.

The Survey was conducted with the assistance of the Travel Compensation Fund (TCF). The TCF provided statistical data from information collected from travel agency businesses, which was included in the TCF 1996-97 Annual Financial Review. Information was also collected directly by the ABS from travel agency businesses not covered by the TCF.

RESULTS

There were 3,266 businesses in the travel agency services industry at 30 June 1997. These businesses are categorised into four broad types: retailers, wholesalers/ticket consolidators, inbound tour operators and tourist bureaux. Businesses mainly engaged in retailing of travel products accounted for 87% of travel agency businesses.

Businesses employing fewer than 20 persons comprised 97% of all businesses in the industry at the end of June 1997. Total employment in the travel agency services industry was 24,451, of which females comprised 73% (17,737).

Of the income earned in the industry in 1996-97, 65% (\$1,571 million) was in the form of commissions on ticket sales. Total expenses incurred by the industry over this period were \$1,936 million. The industry recorded an operating profit before tax (OPBT) of \$37 million, which represented an operating profit margin of 2%.

TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

INTRODUCTION

The statistics presented in this Section are from the Quarterly Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA). The series of tables and graphs for each State and Australia reflect the significant changes to this collection since the December quarter issue of this publication.

The data presented here are for hotels, motels, guest houses and serviced apartments with 15 or more rooms or units. Serviced apartments are shown separately for the first time. As a result of the changes to the STA, there is a break in all time series presented in tables and graphs between December quarter 1996 and March quarter 1997.


AUSTRALIA

There were 3,609 accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms in Australia, at the end of March 1998. This is an increase of 107 (or 3%) compared with the same time in 1997.

Accommodation establishments

All states showed increases in the number of accommodation establishments, except for South Australia where a slight decrease of 1.3% occurred. Queensland showed the largest proportional increase in the number of accommodation establishments of 5.2%, where 44 additional establishments were operating compared with March quarter 1997.






Guest rooms

The total number of guest rooms between March 1997 and March 1998 increased by 8,237 (5%). Serviced apartments showed the largest increase in the number of guest rooms in percentage terms, showing an increase of 2,551 guest rooms (13%). The average number of rooms per establishment increased by 0.9, from an average of 47.4 in March 1997 to 48.3 in March 1998.

Room nights occupied


Across Australia the number of room nights occupied in the March quarter 1998 were 9.2 million in trend terms. This represents an increase of 313,300 (or 3.5%) room nights occupied compared with the March quarter 1997 and 73,200 (0.8%) compared with the December quarter 1997. Quarterly room nights occupied have steadily increased since the March quarter 1991, as the graph below shows.

The Australian Capital Territory and Tasmania showed the largest proportional increases in the number of room nights occupied between March quarter 1997 and March quarter 1998 of 11.8% and 10.9% respectively. While the number of room nights occupied for New South Wales increased by 2.5%, this represented a total increase of 73,900 room nights occupied compared with March quarter 1997. The Northern Territory was the only state to show a slight decrease of 0.9% in the number of room nights occupied compared with the March quarter 1997.




Guests The nightly number of guests per occupied room increased slightly over the March quarter 1997 to 1.8 persons.

The average length of stay of guests in accommodation establishments across Australia was 2.2 nights in the March quarter 1998.

Takings from accommodation

The trend estimate for takings from accommodation establishments in the March quarter 1998 were \$959 million. This represented an increase of 5.5%, compared with the takings recorded in the March quarter 1997 and 1.4% compared with the December quarter 1997. In 1989–90 price terms the trend estimate for takings from accommodation for Australia increased by 4.5%.


QUARTERLY TAKINGS FROM ACCOMMODATION, Trend estimates—Aust.



Note: There is a break in series between December quarter 1996 and March quarter 1997, because of scope changes to the STA. Refer to Explanatory notes.


All states showed increases in takings between the March quarter 1997 and March quarter 1998. The trend estimate for takings for the Australian Capital Territory and Tasmania showed the largest percentage increases at both current and constant prices, although New South Wales showed the largest increases in dollar terms. For New South Wales the takings from accommodation for March quarter 1998 in current price terms were \$338 million, an increase over the March quarter 1997 of 5.5%.

Takings per room night occupied In trend terms, the average takings per room night occupied for Australia, have shown a consistent increase since the June quarter 1993. Up to that point, the average takings in current prices had remained flat, while at average 1989-90 prices had steadily declined. At the March quarter 1998, the average takings per room night occupied in current price terms were \$104 and at 1989-90 prices were \$80.

NEW SOUTH WALES

The number of accommodation establishments in NSW during the March quarter 1998 was 1,263, an increase of 31 (3%) over the number in the March quarter 1997. In NSW in the March quarter 1998, there were 56,124 guest rooms available, and 44.4 rooms on average per establishment.

The number of guests per occupied room in March quarter 1998 was 1.8, with serviced apartments showing the highest rate at 2.1 guests. The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment in the March quarter 1998 was 26.6. The average length of stay of guests in NSW accommodation establishments during this period was 2.0 nights. Serviced apartments showed the highest average length of stay of 3.4 nights.


The takings from NSW accommodation establishments in the March quarter 1998 were \$343.2 million, a slight decrease on the takings in the March quarter 1997 of \$8.7 million (3%). Licensed hotels with facilities accounted for 52% of these takings.

The average takings per establishment in NSW were \$271,800, a very slight increase over the average in the corresponding quarter last year. The establishments with the highest average takings were licensed hotels with facilities, which averaged \$1.0 million per establishment in the quarter. The average takings per room night occupied were \$114, an increase of \$3 for each room night occupied from the March quarter 1997. Five star establishments had an average of \$221 per room night occupied, while establishments with a 1 star grading had an average of \$48. The average takings per guest night in the March quarter 1998 were \$65.

Room nights occupied



VICTORIA

Victoria had 668 accommodation establishments with more than 15 rooms in March quarter 1998. This is compared with 647 in the corresponding quarter in 1997, and represents an increase of 3%. The total number of guest rooms available rose by 1,936 from March quarter 1997, to 28,603 in the March quarter 1998. The average number of guest rooms per establishment increased over the March quarter 1997 by 2 to 43 in the March quarter 1998.

The average nightly rooms occupied per establishment was 25.7 for Victoria in the March quarter 1998, which represents no change on the corresponding quarter in 1997. The average nightly number of guests per room was 1.7 for all establishments in Victoria in the March quarter 1998. The average length of stay of guests staying in Victorian establishments was two nights. Guests in serviced apartments stayed an average of 3.9 nights.


In the March quarter 1998, Victorian accommodation establishments had \$175.6 million in takings. Fifty percent, or \$88.6 million of these takings were by the Licensed hotels sector. The average takings per establishment in March quarter 1998 was \$87,600.

The average takings per room night available were \$69. Five star establishments showed an average takings per room night available of \$161, compared with \$9 for star grade 1 establishments. The average takings per room night occupied was \$115. The average takings per guest night for all establishments in the March quarter 1998 was \$67.

Room nights occupied

The quarterly number of room nights occupied for Victoria have increased in trend terms to nearly 1.5 million in the March quarter 1998, continuing an increase that has occurred throughout the 1990s, except for during 1996, when the trend estimate for number of room nights occupied remained stable over three quarters at just under 1.4 million room nights occupied per quarter.


QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Trend estimates—Vic.

QUEENSLAND

There were 887 accommodation establishments with more than 15 rooms in Queensland in the March quarter 1998. This represents an increase of 44 establishments (5%) compared with the March quarter 1997.

The total number of guest rooms since the March quarter 1997 increased by 2,996 to 47,314, in the March quarter 1998. The increase was spread across all star grades except for star grades 2 and 3. The average number of rooms per establishment was 53.3 in the March quarter 1998, a slight increase over the average for the March quarter 1997 which was 52.6.

The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment in the March quarter 1998 was 29, compared with 31 in the March quarter 1997. There were decreases across all star grades and types of establishment. The average length of stay for guests in Queensland in the March quarter 1998 was 2.6 days, with serviced apartments showing the longest average length of stay of 4.5 days.


Takings from accommodation in the March quarter 1998 totalled \$234.6 million, a decrease of \$5.9 million (2%) over the March quarter in 1997. Takings decreased in all types of accommodation, except for serviced apartments where they increased by 3%. Average takings per establishment in Queensland decreased from \$95,100 to \$88,100 per establishment over the period March 1997 to March 1998.

Average takings per room night occupied showed a slight decrease from \$103 in March quarter 1997 to \$102 in March quarter 1998. Average takings per room night available in the March quarter 1998 for Queensland were \$55, a decrease of \$5 per room night available on the corresponding quarter last year. Average takings per guest night were \$53 in the March quarter 1998.

Room nights occupied


The quarterly number of room nights occupied in Queensland steadily increased during the 1990s until the September quarter 1997. The trend estimate has dropped from 2.52 million room nights occupied in the September quarter 1997 to 2.49 million room nights occupied in the March quarter 1998.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

There were 227 accommodation establishments in South Australia with 15 rooms or more in the March quarter 1998, compared with 230 in the corresponding quarter in 1997. There were 9,715 guest rooms available at this time, almost the same number as 12 months previously. The average number of rooms per establishment showed a slight increase over this period from 42.2 to 42.8.

All occupancy ratios remained relatively unchanged compared with the March quarter 1997. The average nightly rooms occupied per establishment in the March quarter 1998, was 25.3 and the average nightly number of guests per occupied room was 1.7. Serviced apartments had the greatest number of guests per occupied room at 2.1.

The average length of stay of guests in accommodation establishments in South Australia was two nights.





Room nights occupied



WESTERN AUSTRALIA

In the March quarter 1998 there were 294 accommodation establishments, an increase of 2% over the March quarter 1997. The number of guest rooms in Western Australia was 16,596, an increase of 2% on the March quarter 1997. The number of rooms per establishment in the March quarter 1998, was 56.4.

The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment was 33 in the March quarter 1998, almost unchanged compared with the March quarter 1997. The average nightly number of guests per occupied room was 1.7 in March quarter 1998.

The average length of stay for guests in Western Australian accommodation establishments in the March quarter 1998 was 2.6 nights. Serviced apartments showed the highest average length of stay of 3.8 nights.

Western Australian accommodation establishments had takings in the March quarter 1998 totalling \$82.8 million, an increase of 4% over the March quarter 1997.


The average takings per establishment increased slightly in March 1998, compared with March quarter 1997, by \$1,000 to \$93,900 per establishment.

The average takings per room night occupied in Western Australia for the March quarter 1998 was \$95, which is almost the same as for the corresponding period in 1997. Average takings per room night available was \$56 dollars, slightly up on the March quarter 1997. Average takings per room night available increased for licensed hotels and serviced apartments. Average takings per guest night were \$57 in the March quarter 1998.

Room nights occupied



TASMANIA

In the March quarter 1998 there were 130 accommodation establishments in Tasmania which had 15 or more rooms. This was a slight increase over the March quarter 1997. The number of guest rooms totalled 5,521, an increase of 4% over the corresponding period in 1997.

The average number of rooms per establishment in the March quarter 1998 was 43, an increase of one room per establishment over the March quarter 1997. The only type of establishment showing any significant change was serviced apartments, where the average number of rooms per establishment increased from 32 in the March quarter 1997 to 37 in the March quarter 1998.

The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment was 28.6, a slight increase on the average for the March quarter 1997 which was 26.8. The average nightly number of guests per occupied room was 1.9 in the March quarter.

The average length of stay in Tasmanian accommodation establishments was 1.8 nights. Guests in the star grade categories 4 and 5 showed the longest average length of stay of 2.2 nights.


Tasmanian accommodation establishments had takings of \$28.7 million in the March quarter 1998, an increase of \$3.2 million over the March quarter 1997. This represents an average increase in takings per establishment of \$6,200 between the two periods.

The average takings per room night occupied were \$86, a slight increase over the March quarter 1997. Average takings per room night available in the March quarter 1998 were \$58 per night, an increase of about \$5 from the March quarter 1997.

Room nights occupied

The trend estimate for quarterly room nights occupied for Tasmania has shown a steady increase since the September quarter 1996 when it was 236,000, the lowest quarterly estimate since the March quarter 1994. In the March quarter 1998 in trend terms, the number of room nights occupied was 266,600.


QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Trend estimates—Tas.

NORTHERN TERRITORY

There were 91 accommodation establishments in the Northern Territory in the March quarter 1998. These establishments had 6,160 guest rooms, and an average of 68 rooms per establishment.

The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment in the March quarter 1998 was 30 compared with 32 in the March quarter 1997. This decrease is reflected in all star grades except for star grade 1 and Ungraded combined. The average nightly number of guests per occupied room in the March quarter 1998 was 1.6.

The average length of stay for visitors to Northern Territory accommodation establishments was two nights in the March quarter 1998. Serviced apartments had the longest average length of stay of 2.5 nights per guest.


Total takings for Northern Territory accommodation establishments in the March quarter 1998 was \$22.3 million, a slight decrease of 2% on the March quarter 1997. All star grades showed a decrease in takings, except for establishments with a star grading of 1 and Ungraded combined. The average takings for all establishments was \$81,600, with 4 star establishments having average takings for the quarter of \$230,900.

For the March quarter 1998, the average takings per room night occupied were \$95, while the average takings per room night available were \$42, and the average takings per guest night were \$59. The average takings per room night available is the only ratio to show a decrease from the corresponding quarter in 1997.


QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Trend estimates—NT


There were 49 accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms, in the Australian Capital Territory in the March quarter 1998, no change from the March quarter 1997. There were 4,185 guest rooms available, representing 85 rooms per establishment.


The average nightly number of rooms occupied per establishment was 55 in the March quarter 1998. The average number of guests per occupied room was 1.7, and the average length of stay of guests was 2.2 nights. Serviced apartments showed the longest average length of stay of 3.7 nights.

Australian Capital Territory accommodation establishments recorded takings from accommodation in the March quarter 1998 of \$24.3 million, an increase of 11% over the March quarter 1997. The average takings per establishment in the March quarter 1998 were \$165,200, an increase of \$16,700 (11%) over the average takings recorded in the March quarter 1997. The average takings per room night occupied were \$100, while the average takings per room night available were \$65 and the average takings per guest night were \$58. All star grades showed a decrease over this period in average takings per guest night.

Room nights occupied

The quarterly trend estimate in room nights occupied for the Australian Capital Territory has shown a steady increase since dropping to 204,400 in the December quarter 1995 and the March quarter 1996. In the March quarter 1998, the trend estimate for room nights occupied was 244,000, an increase of 25,800 (12%) room nights occupied over the March quarter 1997.







Takings per room night occupied

Average takings per room night occupied in current price terms have steadily increased since the December quarter 1993, to reach \$100 per room night occupied in the March quarter 1998. In average 1989-90 price terms the average takings per room night occupied have fluctuated, although they have generally shown an upward trend since the March quarter 1996 to reach an average of \$77 in the March quarter 1998.

INTERNATIONAL TOURISM

VISITOR ARRIVALS

During the March quarter 1998, 1,038,400 short term visitors from overseas arrived in Australia. This was a decrease of 13% on the December quarter 1997 and a decrease of 9% on the March quarter 1997.

Visitor arrivals from a number of Asian countries were significantly down compared with the March quarter in 1997. These countries included Korea (down 81%), Indonesia (down 53%), Thailand (down 46%), Malaysia (down 31%) and Hong Kong (down 27%). These decreases were partially offset by increases of visitors from some regions between March quarter 1997 and March quarter 1998, in particular from the United Kingdom (13%), China (30%), the USA (16%) and Canada (11%).

While the number of visitors from Japan has decreased slightly, they still accounted for 20% of all visitors in the March quarter 1998.

The median intended length of stay for visitors in the March quarter was 10.5 days, an increase over the median for the December quarter of one day. The countries showing the greatest median length of stay were predominantly European, i.e. Switzerland (30.2 days), the Netherlands (30.2 days), Germany (23.5 days), Canada (21.4 days) and the United Kingdom (21.9 days).

Visitors arriving in the March quarter 1998 intended to spend 36.9 million person days in Australia. Visitors from the UK accounted for 16% or 6.0 million person days.

Visitors from Japan


During the March quarter 1998, visitors from Japan numbered 205,500, an increase of 5% on the December quarter 1997, but a decrease of 8% on the March quarter 1997. Visitors from Japan accounted for 20% of all visitors in the March quarter 1998, however they stayed for the shortest median length of stay (6.6 days).

In the March quarter 1998, 88% of all visitors from Japan intended to visit Australia for holidays. Of all visitors from Japan, 53% were in the age group 15 to 34 years in the March quarter 1998.

Of the 217,100 visitors from Japan who departed Australia in the March quarter 1998, 45% spent most of their time in Queensland.

As shown in the following graph, the trend estimate for number of visitors from Japan peaked in September 1997 at 69,500, and has declined to 64,200 in March 1998.





Visitors from New Zealand


In the March quarter 1998, visitors from New Zealand totalled 128,200 and accounted for 12% of all visitors in this period. This represents a decrease of 10% over the March quarter in 1997 and a decrease of 28% over the December quarter 1996. Visitors from New Zealand intended to stay a median of eight days.

In the March guarter 1998, 41% of the visitors from New Zealand intended to holiday in Australia, while 27% were intending to visit friends and relatives, and 21% were intending to do business. In the March quarter 1998, 73% of the visitors from New Zealand were intending to stay for less than two weeks.

During the March quarter 1998, 91% of New Zealand visitors spent time in the three largest states. Of the 147,200 visitors from New Zealand who departed Australia in March quarter 1998, 41% had spent most of their time in New South Wales, followed by 30% in Queensland, and 21% in Victoria.

In trend estimate terms, the number of visitors from New Zealand has remained fairly stable over the last 12 months-in March 1997 there were 58,500 visitors compared with 57,900 in March 1998.

MONTHLY VISITOR ARRIVALS, Residents of New Zealand—Trend estimates




Visitors from the United States Of America


There were 101,200 visitors from the Unites States of America (USA) during the March quarter 1998, 10% of all visitors for this period. This was an increase of 16% over the March quarter in 1997 and 13% over the December quarter 1997. Visitors from the USA in the March quarter 1998 intended to stay a median of 11 days, and accounted for 7% (2.5 million) of the total person days to be spent by visitors in Australia.

Of all visitors from the USA in the March quarter 1998, 46% were intending to holiday here, while 23% were here on business. In the March quarter 1998, 84% of USA visitors intended to stay for less than one month, with 27% of the total staying for between two weeks and one month. Visitors from the USA were evenly spread across all age groups, although those visitors over 55 years were mainly visiting for holidays (68% of the 36,300 visitors over 55).

Of the 104,100 visitors from the USA who departed Australia in the March quarter 1998, 58% had spent most of their time in New South Wales.

In trend estimate terms, the number of visitors from the USA has gradually increased over the 12 months to March 1998 to peak at 31,500.





Visitors from the United Kingdom

There were 143,100 visitors from the United Kingdom (UK) during the March quarter 1998. This was an increase of 13% over the March quarter 1997, and almost no change on the December quarter 1997.

Visitors from the UK accounted for 14% of all visitors during the March quarter, and 16% (6.0 million) of the total person days to be spent in Australia. Visitors from the UK intended to stay a median length of 21.9 days during their visit.


Of visitors from the UK in the March quarter 1998, 44% were visiting friends or relatives, while 41% were visiting for holidays. In the March quarter 1998, 60% of visitors from the UK were visiting for up to one month (85,700). Of these visitors 48,500 (34%) intended to stay for between two weeks and one month, while 22% intended to stay for between one and two months.

Visitors from the United Kingdom continued Visitors from the UK were spread evenly across most age groups, although among the older age groups (over 45 years), the majority were intending to visit friends and relatives rather than have a holiday.

Of the 160,300 visitors from the UK who departed Australia in the March quarter 1998, 44% spent most of their time in New South Wales.

In trend estimate terms, the number of visitors from the UK in March 1998, was 37,900, showing a steady increase each month over the 12 months to March from 31,500 in April 1997.

Purpose of journey

During March quarter 1998, 1,038,400 visitors arrived in Australia. Of these, 55% (569,000) were visiting for holiday purposes, followed by those visiting friends and relatives (20%, or 206,800 persons).

These visitors intended spending 36.9 million days in Australia, a decrease of 2% on the same quarter in 1997. Of the intended days to be spent in Australia, 11.4 million (31%) were for holiday purposes while 7.0 million days (19%) were for visiting friends and relatives.

Visitors arriving for education purposes accounted for 5% of total arrivals, but for 34% (12.5 million) of the expected days to be spent in Australia. The reason for this high number of days is that most of these arrivals have coincided with the commencement of the academic year. Of the 12.5 million days to be spent in Australia by those arriving for education purposes, 9.8 million days or 78% related to arrivals from Southeast and Northeast Asia.

The average number of days to be spent in Australia by those arriving for educational purposes in the March quarter 1998 was 225 days, compared with 20 days for those on holiday and 34 days for those visiting friends and relatives. Visitors from the United Kingdom during the March quarter 1998 intended spending 6.0 million days in Australia (16%), followed by visitors from Japan (3.5 million days or 9%), visitors from the United States of America (2.5 million days or 7%), visitors from New Zealand (2.2 million days or 6%) and visitors from Malaysia (2.1 million days or 6%).

Most visitors in the March quarter 1998, were intending to spend between one and two weeks in Australia (302,100 or 29%). Most of these (194,100) were planning a holiday. Of visitors to Australia in the March quarter 1998, 293,700 or 28% expected to stay for less than one week.

While 115,200, or 56% of visitors from Japan expected to say for less than 1 week in Australia, 105,900 visitors from the UK (74% of UK visitors), intended to stay for more than two weeks. The largest number of UK visitors, 48,500, (34%) expected to stay for between two weeks and one month.

In the March quarter 1998, 39% of New Zealand visitors intended to stay for less than one week. Of the 101,200 visitors from the United States of America in the March quarter 1998, 34% intended to stay for between one and two weeks.

Age of visitors

Of the 1,038,400 visitors to Australia in the March quarter 1998, the largest group of travellers (23% or 240,800) were in the 25 to 34 year age group. The next highest age group for arrivals were 35-44 year olds (177,400 or 17%). People aged over 65 accounted for 9% (92,800) of the arrivals, while children under 14 accounted for 6% (64,700) of arrivals during the quarter.

Across all age groups, holidays accounted for most arrivals, followed by visiting friends and relatives. The exceptions were in the 14-24 age group where 90,900 arrivals (54%) came for holidays and 40,100 (24%) arrived for education purposes. The other age group that was different to the trend was the 35-44 year olds, where, of the 177,400 arrivals in this age group, 84,500 (48%) visited for holidays.

Visitor departures

During the March quarter 1998, 1,114,000 overseas visitors departed from Australia. Of these, 496,000 (45%) had spent most of their time in New South Wales, followed by Queensland (281,100 or 25%) and Victoria (169,000 or 15%). Of those visitors who spent most of their time in New South Wales, the highest number—92,000 or 19%—were from Japan. Of visitors to Queensland—96,900 or 34%—were from Japan. Of the 169,000 visitors who spent most of their time in Victoria, 30,300 or 18% were from New Zealand.

DEPARTURES OF AUSTRALIAN RESIDENTS FOR SHORT-TERM TRIPS There were 650,800 departures of Australian residents for short term trips in the March quarter 1998. This was an increase of 4% over the March quarter in 1997, and a decrease of 15% over the December quarter in 1997 (when there are traditionally more departures because of Christmas school holidays).

The most popular destination for short term resident departures was New Zealand, accounting for 17% of total departures. The other popular destinations were the USA with 11%, and Indonesia with 11% of residents departing. While the UK accounted for 8% of the departures in the March quarter 1998, it was the destination which accounted for the largest number of person days as a destination (17% or 4,609,000).

Of all short-term resident departures in the March quarter 1998, 45% (290,400) were for holidays, 22% (142,200) of departures were for visiting friends and relatives, and business travel accounted for 20% (132,200) of departures.

The average intended length of stay abroad for all persons departing in the March quarter 1998 was 41 days. For those departing on holidays, the average intended length of stay was 30 days. For those travelling to a convention or conference, the average intended length of stay was 12 days, while residents departing for employment purposes intended to stay away for an average of 158 days, and those travelling for education intended to stay away for 148 days.

Indonesia was the most popular destination for holiday makers, accounting for 54,300 of the 290,400 people travelling on holidays. The holiday makers to Indonesia intended to stay for an average of 13 days. New Zealand was the second most popular destination for holiday makers (42,200), but was the most popular destination for visiting friends and relatives (36,000) and for business (22,300). The average expected length of stay for all residents departing for New Zealand was 17 days.

Of the 26.4 million days to be spent out of Australia by residents departing in the March quarter 1998, 4.6 million were to be spent in the UK, followed by 2.7 million days to be spent in the United States of America. Residents departing for the UK intended spending an average of 90 days abroad.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

This publication brings together domestic tourism data from a number of sources, including previously unpublished data from the quarterly Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA) and the Overseas Arrivals and Departures Collection (OAD).

TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

This series of tables and graphs contains statistics for Australia and each State and Territory, from the quarterly Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA). Statistics in this publication are the latest available for the March quarter 1998. Note that the STA has changed significantly since the December quarter issue of this publication. See paragraphs 2-6 below.

SCOPE AND COVERAGE

- Tourist accommodation establishments included in the STA, and for which data appear in this publication, are hotels, motels and guest houses with facilities; and serviced apartments which are available to the general public for a minimum of one night.
- Data collected and published relate to both long-term and short-term guests at hotels, motels and guest houses, but only short-term guests at serviced apartments. For hotels, motels and guest houses the amount of long-term residential activity is considered insignificant. This activity is included in the data presented.
- As a result of the separate classification of serviced apartments from March quarter 1998, there have been several changes to definitions of accommodation units. Some units which were previously classified as hotels, motels or holiday flats have been reclassified to serviced apartments. A small number of establishments previously classified as motels, have been reclassified as holiday flats, units or houses, and are no longer in scope of the quarterly STA.
- From the March quarter 1998, only those in-scope establishments with 15 or more rooms or units are covered by the Survey. Data for the 1997 calendar year have been recompiled on the new basis and will differ to data presented in earlier issues of this publication. Data for time periods prior to 1997 have been recompiled to only include accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms, but have not been recompiled to reflect the inclusion of serviced apartments as a separate classification. This means that data for periods prior to March quarter 1997 reflect the old classification and only include hotels, motels and guest houses. It should be noted that some serviced apartments may have been included in STA estimates prior to March guarter 1997, as they may previously have been classified as hotels or motels, as outlined in paragraph 4 above.
- As a result of the changes to the scope and classification of accommodation establishments there is a break in all time series between December quarter 1996 and March quarter 1997.

ESTIMATES AT CONSTANT PRICES

- 7 Estimates of quarterly takings from accommodation contained in this publication are also expressed in terms of average 1989-90 prices (constant prices). These estimates are presented in original, seasonally adjusted and trend terms, for Australia and each State and Territory. (Note: monthly data at constant prices are not available.)
- Takings from accommodation for each State and Territory have been deflated using the All Groups Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the relevant capital city. The CPI has been used as it is a measure of the general extent of price change (inflation) in the economy. (Note: the CPI is only produced for capital cities.) As an example, an increase of 10% in the New South Wales takings from accommodation at 1989-90 prices over a period would mean that New South Wales takings from accommodation increased 10% more than the Sydney CPI over that period, implying that takings from accommodation in New South Wales increased 10% more than inflation.
- General information on price deflators and constant price estimates is contained in Section 4 of Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods (Cat. no. 5216.0).

INTERNATIONAL TOURISM

10 This series of tables and graphs contains statistics on short-term visitors arriving in or departing from Australia, and departures of Australian residents for short-term trips abroad. Short-term movement relates to an intended length of stay of less than 12 months.

SOURCE OF THE STATISTICS

- **11** Persons arriving in, or departing from, Australia are required to complete prescribed questionnaires in the form of Incoming and Outgoing Passenger cards. These cards provide information to the Department of Immigration and Multicultural Affairs (DIMA) for administrative purposes and serve as the source of statistics of overseas arrivals and departures. In accordance with the Census and Statistics Act 1905, information relating to individuals, individual flights or ships and individual carriers, which is contained in these cards or other documents, is treated as confidential by the ABS.
- 12 Implementation of the Migration Reform Act, 1992 by DIMA required that a health and character check be incorporated with the Incoming Passenger card. The redesign of both passenger cards followed and new passenger cards were officially introduced on 1 September 1994. The main statistical change relating to data in this publication affects the Purpose of journey classification and constitutes a break in time series for this data item.

SCOPE

13 The statistics in this publication relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than the number of travellers (i.e. the multiple movements of individual persons during a given reference period are each counted separately). The statistics exclude the movements of operational air and ships' crew, of transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and of passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not then engaged on regular voyages.

ESTIMATION METHOD

14 Overseas arrival and departure statistics are derived from a combination of full enumeration and sampling. All movements with a duration of stay of less than one year are sampled. Statistics relating to these movements are therefore estimates, which may differ from statistics which would have been obtained if details of all these movements had been processed.

CORRECTIONS AND **IMPUTATIONS**

- 15 Imprecision due to sampling errors should not be confused with errors arising from imperfections in reporting, which may occur in any data collection, whether sampled or not. Every effort is made to minimise such errors, by careful design of the passenger cards and through checks on the information once it is received. During the edit process some items are corrected where they conflict with other known information. Missing replies to certain items such as age are also imputed by reference to other related items.
- 16 Errors of this kind differ from discrepancies arising from the fact that certain information reflects the travellers' intentions, at the time the passenger cards were completed. These intentions are, of course, subject to change. Particularly affected is the distinction between permanent and temporary movement and in the latter case, length of intended stay, country in which most time will be spent, and purpose of journey.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

- 17 Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates are shown in various graphs and tables throughout this publication. In these series, account has been taken of normal seasonal factors, 'trading day' effects (arising from the varying number of Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays etc. in the month) and the effect of movement in the date of Easter which may, in successive years, affect figures for different months. Details of the methods used in seasonally adjusting the series from the STA and OAD collections are available on request.
- **18** Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effect of other influences on the series may be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment procedures do not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. Irregular influences that are highly volatile can make it difficult to interpret the movement of the series even after adjustment for seasonal variation, and cannot be assumed to indicate changes in the trend.

TREND ESTIMATES

- **19** Smoothing seasonally adjusted series reduces the impact of the irregular component of the seasonally adjusted series and creates the trend estimates. The trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term weighted moving average to the monthly and a 7-term Henderson moving average to the quarterly seasonally adjusted series. The 7- and 13-term Henderson averages (like all Henderson averages) are symmetric but, as the end of a time series is approached, asymmetric forms of the average are applied. Unlike the weights of the standard 7-term Henderson moving average, the weights employed with the quarterly data have been tailored to suit the particular characteristics of individual series.
- **20** While these techniques enable smoothed data for the latest period to be produced, it does result in revisions to the smoothed series, principally of recent months, as additional observations become available. There may also be revisions as a result of the re-estimation of the seasonal factors. GLOSSARY

Average length of stay

Average length of stay is expressed in numbers of days and calculated:

- for hotels, motels and guest houses, by dividing guest nights by guest arrivals: and
- for serviced apartments, by dividing units nights occupied by unit lettings.

Average nightly guests per occupied room Guest nights divided by room nights occupied.

Average nightly rooms occupied per establishment The average number of rooms per establishment multiplied by the occupancy rate for the survey period.

Average takings per guest night

The takings from accommodation divided by the total number of guest nights for the survey period.

Average takings per room night available

The takings from accommodation divided by the total room nights available for the survey period.

Average takings per room night occupied The takings from accommodation divided by the total number of room nights occupied for the survey period.

Average takings per establishment The takings from accommodation for the survey period divided by the number of establishments at the end of the survey period.

Capacity

Capacity in terms of Guest rooms/units or Bed spaces is the maximum number available to accommodate paying guests during the survey period. Capacity closed temporarily for seasonal reasons is included.

Country of residence

Country of residence refers to the country in which short-term visitors regard themselves as living or as last having lived.

The classification of countries in this publication is based on the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS). For more detailed information, refer to the ABS publication Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (1269.0).

Country of intended stay

For Australian residents travelling abroad for short-term trips, this relates to the country in which they intend to spend the most time.

Establishments

All hotels, motels, guest houses and serviced apartments within the scope of the survey which operated for any part of the survey period, or which closed temporarily for the quarter for seasonal reasons.

Guest nights

The total number of paying guests counted on each night they stayed at the accommodation establishment.

Guest rooms

The maximum number of rooms available at each establishment during the survey period for accommodating short-term paying guests. Units and apartments within serviced apartments are treated as rooms in these survey results.

Median length of stay

Defined as the length of stay which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, one half of the cases falling below the median and the other half exceeding it.

Occupancy rate

Occupancy rates represent occupancy expressed as a percentage of total capacity available during the survey period, e.g. for the period

Room occupancy rate (%) = Room nights occupied $\times 100$

(Guest rooms) x (No. of days in the period)

Person days

Defined as the number of short-term visitor arrivals or short-term resident departures multiplied by the intended length of stay for each visitor or resident.

Purpose of journey

From September quarter 1994, all statistics relating to purpose of journey are published using the following categories: Convention/conference, Business, Visiting friends/relatives, Holiday, Employment, Education and Other. In tabulations of data collected before September 1994, the 'Other' category includes 'In transit', and the 'Holiday' category includes 'Student vacation' and 'Accompanying business visitor'.

Room nights available

The total of guest rooms/units available multiplied by the number of days for which each was available during the survey period.

Room nights occupied

The total number of nights each guest room/unit was occupied by a paying guest during the survey period.

Rooms per establishment

The average number of rooms/units per establishment.

Short-term movement

Movements of travellers whose intended or actual length of stay is less than 12 months are classified as short-term. The tables for visitor arrivals and resident departures in this publication relate to short-term movements only.

Star grading

The grading of hotels and motels with facilities and serviced apartments is based on the classification system used by members of the Australian Automobile Association (AAA). The gradings are allocated according to a points system based on the amenities and facilities available to guests. Details of the grading scheme are contained in the RACV-RAASA members' publication Accommodation Australia, or the individual tour guides produced by members of the AAA. For the purpose of classifying establishments to a star grading in this publication, 'half' star gradings are ignored (e.g. a two and a half star grading has been shown as a two star).

Takings from accommodation

Gross revenue from the provision of accommodation, including bed taxes. Takings from meals are excluded. Takings from accommodation for each month generally represent the takings received during that month. Where payments are received in advance of, or after, the provision of accommodation to guests, the monthly figure for takings from accommodation may not necessarily bear a direct relationship to the number of guests accommodated during the month.

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
