Page 666.—Reference is made on this page to the inauguration of a partial service of electric trains on the suburban lines between Melbourne and Essendon and Melbourne and Sandringham respectively on the 29th May, 1919. On the 14th September following, the train service on both those lines became wholly electric. The service on the St. Kilda line, however, was made a wholly electric one a fortnight earlier, viz., on the 31st August. The economy of time effected by the electrification will be seen from the following table:—
