MONTH OF DECEMBER 1968 (rfrofictomat

A provisional estimate of the total value of retall sales in Australia lexcluding motor vehieles, parts, petrol, ete.) for the month of December 1968 is shown in the table overleaf. Figures for some earller months are a lso shown for purposes of comparison.
2. The provisional monthly estimates of retail sales are obtained from a sub-sample of establishments used to provide quarterly estimates of the value of retail sales. The monthly sub-sample is comparatively small sine it is designed to provide prompt estimates of the tetal value of retail sales lexcluding moter vehicles, parts, petrol, etc.) without placing an undue burden on elther the resources of the bureau or upon retail establishments.
3. : As the provisional monthly estimates are derived from returns received from a sample of retall establishments, they may differ sonewhat from the results which would have been obta ined from a comparable complete collection. A measure of the likely difference is given by the stamard error of the estimate. There are about 2 chances in 3 that a sample estimate will differ from results which weuld be obta ined from a eomparable complete collection by less than 1 standard error and 19 chanoes im 20 that the differonee would be less than 2 standard errors. If, for example, a sample gives an estimate of 8500 million and the standard orror of this estimate is 1 per cent, $i$.e. $\$ 5$ million, then there would be 2 chances in 3 that a comparable complete colleetion would give a figure within the range $\$ 495$ million to $\$ 505$ milition and 19 chances in 20 that the figure would be within the range $\$ 490$ million to $\$ 510$ million.
4. The standard error of the estimates of the total value of monthly retail sales lexcluding moner vehicles, parts, petrol, etc.l is about 1.0 per cent. The stamdard orror of the month-to-momith movement of the stimates of the value of retall sales is gemeraliy about 0.3 per cent of the current monthly estimate. For example, the movement in the value of retail sales between the months of Movember 1968 and December 1968 is shewn by the original series in the table overleaf as an increase of $\$ 170.4$ illifen. The standard orror of this movement is about 0.3 per cent of the December 1968 estimate, which is approxinately $\$ 2.6$ million. Therefore, there would be 2 chances in 3 that the movement in retail sales between November 1968 and December 1968 would be between $\$ 167.8$ million and $\$ 173.0$ million and 19 chances in 20 that it weuld be between $\$ 165.2$ million and $\$ 175.6$ million.
5. $:$ The monthly estimates way also differ from those which would be ebialmed from a sample as large as that used to provide quarterly estimates. Hence, the sum of the estimates for the three months comprisimg a quater may differ from the estimate obtalned for that quarter from the full quarteriy sample. The standard error of this difference is approximately 0.8 per cent of the quarterly estimate. The menthly estimates are subsequently adjusted in accordance with the preliminary and final quarterly estimates as they become avaliable.
6. Seasonally adjusted statistics are also shown in the table overleaf. In the seasonal adjustaent, account has been taken of both nornal seasonal factors and "Erading-day" affects (arising from the varyling numbers of Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays, etc. in the month). While the normal seasonal factors should change only gradually from year to year, the trading-day adjustment for any month will vary from year to year im accordame with the combination of days which occur in the month. Ne adjustment has been made for the effects of movement In the date of Easter. Detalis of the methods used in seasonally adjusting these and other series are given in "Seasonally Adjusted Indicaters 1968" (Ref. No. 1.10) issued on 21 May 1968. It should be noted that the seasonally adjusted figures reflect the sampling errors to which the original figures are subject.
7. All flgures in this bulletia are on a basis comparable with the 1961-62 Retail Consus. Furtiner information relating to the basis on which the statistics of retall sales of goods are complled is contalmed in statistical bulletin "Retall Sales of Goods" (Ref. No. 11.4) September quarter 1968 of 31 December 1968.
