#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

In February 1975 a survey based on the quarterly population survey was conducted throughout Australia in order to obtain information about some aspects of the mobility of the labour force, e.g. for how long employed persons had held their current jobs and employees had worked at their current locations. Particulars of the methods by which employees had obtained their current jobs were also provided by the survey.

2. A preliminary statement containing estimates of employed persons, classified according to the length of time they had been in the job held in February 1975, was published on 28 October 1975 (Job Tenure Reference No. 6.44). The present publication provides more detail than the preliminary statement and covers other aspects of labour mobility. Data for earlier periods relevant to labour mobility have been published in Labour Mobility, November 1972 (Reference No. 6.43) and Job Tenure, February 1974 (Reference No. 6.44).

### The population survey

3. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained each quarter from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. The interviews are carried out during a period of four weeks, so that there are four survey weeks in each of the months to which the survey relates. These four survey weeks are chosen so as to fall within the limits of the calendar month or with minimum encroachment into the adjacent months.

#### Scope

- 4. The estimates relate to all persons aged 15 years and over, except persons in institutions, members of the permanent armed forces and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from census and estimated populations. Persons in institutions are those who were patients in hospitals and sanitoria, or inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc., and for whom, for the purpose of the survey, the institution was regarded as their dwelling.
- 5. Because of the effects of cyclone Tracy, the

population survey was not conducted in Darwin in February 1975. It is estimated that at the time of the survey about 12,000 males and 5,000 females aged 15 years and over were living in Darwin.

#### **Concepts and Definitions**

- 6. Definitions of labour force categories used in this bulletin are the same as those used in the quarterly labour force survey, which are set out in the bulletin *The Labour Force* (Reference No. 6.20).
- 7. For the purposes of this survey duration of current job (job tenure) was defined as the length of time during which a wage or salary earner had worked for his current employer, or an employer or self-employed person had worked in his current business.
- 8. Method of obtaining current job. This question was asked only of wage and salary earners who had been in their current job for less than twelve months. Some of these persons may have obtained more than one job during the year but the question was restricted to their current job.

#### Reliability of the estimates

- 9. Since the estimates in this statement are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census using the same questionnaires and procedures. More information on this topic is given in the Technical Note, page 20.
- 10. The estimates are also subject to errors of response and reporting. In many cases the answer to the question on method of obtaining current job was based on the knowledge of one person in the household, generally the housewife. This may have resulted in some misreporting.
- 11. The method used in classifying persons according to occupation in the population census takes educational qualifications into account, whereas in the population survey this is not generally the case. For this reason the estimates for the occupation group "Professional, technical and related workers" may be overstated.
- NOTE. Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components in the tables are due to rounding.

#### TECHNICAL NOTE

#### **Estimation procedure**

The estimates are derived from the quarterly population survey by use of a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than to the age and sex distribution within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of the estimates

- Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on a sample they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census using the same questionnaires and procedures. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample, and not the whole population, was enumerated. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have heen obtained from a comparable complete enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two-standard errors.
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this bulletin. A table of standard errors for general application is given below. These figures will not give a precise measure of standard error of a particular estimate since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of quarterly labour force surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics. However, they will provide an indication of the magnitude of the standard error of any particular estimate. An example of the use of the table is as follows: if the estimate for Australia obtained from the sample is 100,000 the standard error is 3 per cent of the estimate i.e. 3,000: there are then about

two chances in three that the true figure is within the range 97,000 to 103,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that this figure is between 94,000 and 106,000.

- 4. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. However, the per cent standard error of the estimated percentage will generally be lower than the per cent standard error of the estimate of the numerator. The per cent standard errors of the numerators can be obtained from the table below.
- 5. As the standard errors in the table below show, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this bulletin, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the table below have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 6. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
