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#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

The monthly Population Survey (which is described in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the February 1986 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. This subset of respondents was asked about their labour mobility during the year up to the end of the week prior to interview in February 1986. Specific questions related to the duration of current job, whether respondents had changed jobs or not and the number of jobs held during the period.

#### Scope

3. The scope of this supplementary survey was restricted to those persons in scope of the labour force survey who worked at some time during the year ending February 1986 except that it excluded students boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of jails, reformatories, etc. For a full description of the scope of the labour force survey see *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

#### Definitions

4. It is impractical to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference period. For the survey of labour mobility a person is assigned to a labour force category for each of the weeks in the year on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms *worked* and *looked for work* are used in this survey rather than the rigidly defined terms *employed* and *unemployed* used in the monthly labour force survey.

5. Persons in the *labour force* are those persons who, *for those weeks*, reported having either worked or looked for work as defined in paragraphs 6 and 7.

6. Persons who *worked* are those persons who, *for those weeks*, reported having either worked or been on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are not classified as worked.

7. Persons who *looked for work* are those persons who, *for those weeks*, reported having been out of work and looking for a job.

8. Persons out of the labour force are those who, during any week, neither worked nor looked for work as defined in paragraphs 6 and 7.

- 9. For the purposes of this survey:
  - (a) Labour mobility is defined in terms of the specific questions asked regarding job mobility and duration of current job (see paragraph 2); and
  - (b) a *job* is defined as:
    - (i) employment as a wage or salary earner (or unpaid family helper) by a particular employer, in a particular locality; or
    - (ii) self-employment (with or without employees) in a particular locality.

10. *Locality*. In capital cities and major towns each suburb is considered to be a different locality.

11. Job mobility is defined as a change of job. A change of job may involve a change of employer without a change of job locality; a change of locality without a change of employer; or a change in both employer and locality. For example, the movement of an employer's operations to premises in a different locality would entail a change of job for employees who moved to the new locality. Promotion or transfer of an employee which involves a move to premises in a different locality would be noted, however, that for a person who works at different sites for the same employer (for example, a construction worker), his base of operations (i.e. his employer's office, depot, yard, etc.) is considered to be his place of work.

12. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication are as at the survey week.

13. Further definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

#### Results of the survey

14. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1986. Because of emigration, deaths and other exits not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour mobility may relate to experience outside Australia.

15. Additional tables available but not included in this publication are listed on page 20. A preliminary publication (6208.0) containing a summary of the results of the survey was released on 1 July 1986.

16. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in November 1972, have been given in previous issues of this publication.

17. It is proposed that this survey will next be conducted in February 1987.

#### Discontinuities in the series

The estimates for surveys held from February 1983 18 are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The reference period for the February 1980 and prior surveys was the previous calendar year (e.g. 1 January to 31 December 1979). The reference period for the February 1981 and 1982 surveys was from the beginning of the previous February to the end of the week prior to interview. As interviews were conducted over the second and third week of February, the reference period could have extended to 54 weeks. From the February 1983 survey onwards the reference period has been the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. Due to the change in the reference period timing, some estimates, particularly those for groups who enter the labour force during the earlier months of the year (e.g. 15 to 19 year olds) will also be affected from the February 1981 survey onwards.

19. In the February 1981 survey, reason for leaving a job was only asked of persons who changed jobs. For all previous and subsequent surveys, reason for leaving a job was asked of the wider population of persons who left a job.

#### Reliability of the estimates

20. Estimates in this publication are subject to *sampling* and *non-sampling* errors. For more information refer to the Technical note.




#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

7,639,000 civilians aged 15 and over at February 1986 had worked at some time in the previous twelve months. Of these 6,920,200 (90.6 per cent) had a job, 244,300 (3.2 per cent) were looking for work, and the remaining 474,600 (6.2 per cent) were out of the labour force.

Almost one quarter of those persons who had a job at February 1986 had worked in their current job for less than one year, 1,696,100 (24.5 per cent); 534,700 (31.5 per cent) of these had had no other job in the period while the remaining 1,161,400 (68.5 per cent) had changed jobs during the preceding twelve months. This 1,161,400 persons contributed 61.8 per cent of the 1,880,300 persons who had left a job during the year ending February 1986. The other 38.2 per cent (718,900 persons) were not working at February 1986 but had worked at some time in the previous twelve months.

The job mobile population consists of all persons who changed jobs during the period, encompassing the 1,161,400 persons who had left a job in the period and who were working at February 1986, and the 124,900 persons who were not working at February 1986 and who had changed jobs during the period. Thus during the twelve months ending February 1986 1,286,300 persons, or 16.8 per cent of those who had worked at some time during the year, were job mobile.





#### Levels of job mobility, February 1976 to February 1986

Fluctuations in the level of job mobility since 1976 range from 13.8 per cent in February 1984 to 17.2 per cent, recorded in February 1976. The level of job mobility has risen steadily from that recorded during the year ending February 1984 (13.8 per cent) to the 1986 level (16.8 per cent).

As in previous years, persons who changed employer but not locality made up the bulk of persons who were job mobile during the year ending February 1986 (73.1 per cent), with persons who had changed locality but not employer (20.6 per cent) and persons who had changed employer and locality (6.3 per cent) representing much smaller proportions.


During the year ending February 1986 there was no significant difference between the levels of job mobility of males (16.9 per cent) and females (16.7 per cent). This was the first year in the series where this was the case. In all previous years the level of job mobility for males had been higher than that of females.

#### Duration of current job, February 1976 to February 1986

Of the 6,920,200 persons who had a job at February 1986, 1,696,100 had been in their current job for less than one year, 2,575,100 (37.2 per cent) for one and under five years and 2,648,900 (38.3 per cent) for five years or more. The proportion of persons who had been in their current job for five years or more has varied from the 1976 figure of 37.3 per cent, 36.4 per cent in 1983, rising again to the 1986 figure of 38.3 per cent. This change is due largely to an increase in the proportion of females in this group, from 26.2 per cent in 1976 to the present proportion of 31.5 per cent. The proportion of males who had been in their current job for five years or more was 42.8 per cent in 1976 and 42.7 per cent in February 1986.

The proportion of persons who had been in their current job for less than one year has risen from 20.5 per cent of those persons who had a job at February 1983 to the 1986 level of 24.5 per cent. As in all previous years a higher proportion of females had been in their current job for less than one year than males, 28.6 and 21.8 per cent respectively in 1986.

The 1,696,100 persons who had been in their current job for less than one year can be grouped into those who commenced their current job and had no previous job during the year (31.5 per cent), and those who had changed jobs during the year (68.5 per cent). The proportion of females who had been in their current job for less than one year was higher than males due largely to the relative proportions who had commenced their current job and had no previous job during the year (11.7 per cent and 5.2 per cent respectively).

#### Persons who had left a job - Duration of previous job

During the year ending February 1986 1,880,300 persons left a job. About half of those persons had been in the job for less than one year and 24.5 per cent had been in their job for less than three months. 16.9 per cent had been in their previous job for more than five years.


1,015,400 (54.0 per cent) of those who had left a job during the period were male. A higher proportion of females who had worked during the year had left a job (27.7 per cent) than males (22.5 per cent). Females were also more likely to have worked for a shorter period before leaving their job with 52.9 per cent having worked for less than one year before they left compared with 46.6 per cent of males. Similarly while 19.8 per cent of all males who had left a job during the period had worked for five years or more in this job, only 13.6 per cent of females had worked for this duration.

As a proportion of persons who had worked at some time during the year, younger persons were the most likely to have left a job. 41.2 per cent of all persons in the 15 to 19 age group had left with 77.6 per cent having worked for less than one year, compared to persons aged between 45 and 54 where only 13.0 per cent had left a job.

#### Persons who had left a job - Reason for leaving job and labour force status at February 1986

1,161,400 (61.8 per cent) persons who had left a job during the year subsequently found employment and were employed at February 1986. Of the remainder 244,300 (13.0 per cent) were looking for work and 474,600 (25.2 per cent) were out of the labour force. Males who had left a job during the year ending February 1986 were more likely to remain in the labour force than females, with 69.1 per cent of males employed at February 1986 and a further 15.1 per cent looking for work compared to the female proportions of 53.2 and 10.5 per cent respectively.

1,345,000 of the persons who had left a job in the last twelve months had done so for employment reasons, while 466,200 left for personal or family reasons. The majority of males and females who left a job had done so for employment reasons (77.9 and 64.1 per cent respectively), however a much larger proportion of females had left for personal or family reasons (32.1 per cent) than males (18.6 per cent).

Of those persons who had left a job for employment reasons 943,500 (70.1 per cent) were employed at February 1986. Labour force participation varied according to the different employment reasons reported. All those who reported having left their job because their business or job changed location or because of promotion or transfer had a job at February 1986, while 96.3 per cent of those seeking a better business or job were employed at February 1986. Persons who left for employment reasons other than these were less likely to be employed at February 1986 (46.6 per cent). Over a third of those persons who had been laid off from their previous job (either because of no work or other reasons) were looking for work at February 1986, and most of those who had left their job because it was holiday or seasonal work were out of the labour force.


Over half of those persons who had left their job for personal or family reasons were out of the labour force at February 1986. Those who had left to study, for health or medical reasons, or because they had retired were most likely to have left the labour force (73.8, 63.7, and 87.7 per cent respectively), while those who left because they wanted a change were likely to be employed at February 1986, 51,800 (73.7 per cent).

#### Persons who had changed jobs - Occupation and Industry

The proportion of persons who changed jobs during the period varied with occupation and industry. Persons working in Clerical (18.8 per cent), Sales (18.6 per cent), and Service, sport and recreation (18.6 per cent) occupations had high levels of job change, while those in Farmers, fisherpersons, timber-getters etc. (8.5 per cent), and Transport and communication (14.3 per cent) occupations had lower than average levels. By industry, persons working in the Recreation, personal and other services (22.2 per cent), Finance, property and business services (21.8 per cent) and Construction (20.4 per cent) industries had a higher than average level of job change.

32.1 per cent of persons who changed jobs changed their occupation and 41.6 per cent changed their industry from their previous to current jobs. The amount of movement varied with occupation and industry. The Administrative, executive and managerial occupations increased by 8,800 persons (35,300 joined and 26,500 left), while Sales recorded a decrease of 11,200 (55,100 joined and 66,300 left). Similarly the Finance, property and business services industry gained 14,100 persons (60,600 joined and 46,500 left) while the Wholesale and retail trade industry lost 17,000 persons (104,400 joined and 121,400 left).

#### **Estimation procedure**


The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

#### **Reliability of the estimates**

2. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling error, that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics, these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

4. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. From Table 3 on page 8, the estimated number of males who, in February 1986, had been in their current job for less than one year is 919,000. Since this estimate is between 500,000 and 1,000,000 in the standard error table, the standard error for Australia will be between 8,700 and 11,200 and can be approximated as 10,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 908,200 to 929,800 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 897,400 to 940,600. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



5. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

7. Considering the example from paragraph 4, the 919,000 males represent 21.8 per cent of the 4,206,200 males working at February 1986. The standard error of 4,206,200 is approximately 17,800 so the relative standard error is 0.4 per cent. The relative standard error for 919,000 is 1.2 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(1.2)^2 - (0.4)^2}$  or 1.1 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (21.8 per cent) of 0.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who had been in their current job for less than one year is between 21.6 per cent and 22.0 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 21.4 per cent to 22.2 per cent.

8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
