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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

7,840,500 civilians aged 15 and over at February 1987 had worked at some time in the previous twelve months. Of these 7,094,400 (90.5 per cent) had a job, 320,800 (4.1 per cent) were looking for work, and the remaining 425,400 (5.4 per cent) were out of the labour force.

Around one quarter of those persons who had a job at February 1987 had worked in their current job for less than one year, 1,782,700 (25.1 per cent); 608,300 (34.1 per cent) of these had had no other job in the period while the remaining 1,174,400 (65.9 per cent) had changed jobs during the preceding twelve months. This 1,174,400 persons contributed 61.2 per cent of the 1,920,500 persons who had left a job during the year ending February 1987. The other 38.8 per cent (746,100 persons) were not working at February 1987 but had worked at some time in the previous twelve months.

The job mobile population consists of all persons who changed jobs during the period, encompassing the 1,174,400 persons who had left a job in the period and who were working at February 1987, and the 166,400 persons who were not working at February 1987 and who had changed jobs during the period. Thus during the twelve months ending February 1987 1,340,800 persons, or 17.1 per cent of those who had worked at some time during the year, were job mobile.




DIAGRAM 1. PERSONS WHO WORKED AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1986

Levels of job mobility, February 1979 to February 1987


Fluctuations in the level of job mobility since 1979 range from 13.8 per cent in February 1984 to 17.1 per cent, recorded in February 1982 and 1987. The level of job mobility has risen steadily from that recorded during the year ending February 1984 (13.8 per cent) to the 1987 level (17.1 per cent).

During the year ending February 1987 there was a significant difference between the levels of job mobility of males (17.6 per cent) and females (16.4 per cent). The trend of males being more job mobile than females was typical of every year since 1979, with the exception of 1986.

Duration of current job, February 1979 to February 1987

Of the 7,094,400 persons who had a job at February 1987, 1,782,700 had been in their current job for less than one year, 2,362,500 (33.3 per cent) for one and under five years and 2,949,200 (41.6 per cent) for five years or more. The proportion of persons who had been in their current job for five years or more has varied from 36.4 per cent in 1983, rising to the 1987 figure of 41.6 per cent. This change is due largely to an increase in the proportion of males in this group, from 40.3 per cent in 1983 to the present proportion of 47.0 per cent. The proportion of females who had been in their current job for five years or more was 29.8 per cent in 1983 and 33.4 per cent in February 1987.

The proportion of persons who had been in their current job for less than one year has risen from 20.5 per cent of those persons who had a job at February 1983 to the 1987 level of 25.1 per cent. As in all previous years a higher proportion of females had been in their current job for less than one year than males, 28.7 and 22.7 per cent respectively in 1987.



The 1,782,700 persons who had been in their current job for less than one year can be grouped into those who commenced their current job and had no previous job during the year (34.1 per cent), and those who had changed jobs during the year (65.9 per cent). The proportion of females who had been in their current job for less than one year was higher than males due largely to the relative proportions who had commenced their current job and had no previous job during the year (12.9 per cent and 5.7 per cent respectively).

Persons who had left a job — Duration of previous job


During the year ending February 1987, 1,920,500 persons left a job. About half of those persons had been in the job for less than one year and 22.8 per cent had been in their job for less than three months. Some 16.4 per cent had been in their previous job for more than five years.

An estimated 1,067,900 (55.6 per cent) of those who had left a job during the period were male. A higher proportion of females who had worked during the year had left a job (26.3 per cent) than males (23.2 per cent). Females were also more likely to have worked for a shorter period before leaving their job with 51.7 per cent having worked for less than one year before they left compared with 48.0 per cent of males. On the other hand 18.6 per cent of all males who had left a job during the period had worked for five years or more in this job. Only 13.7 per cent of females had worked for this duration.

As a proportion of persons who had worked at some time during the year, younger persons were the most likely to have left a job. 36.3 per cent of all persons in the 15 to 19 age group had left with 75.4 per cent having worked for less than one year, compared to persons aged between 45 and 54 where only 13.9 per cent had left a job.

Persons who had left a job - Reason for leaving job and labour force status at February 1987

An estimated 1,174,400 (61.2 per cent) persons who had left a job during the year subsequently found employment and were employed at February 1987. Of the remainder 320,800 (16.7 per cent) were looking for work and 425,400 (22.2 per cent) were out of the labour force. Males who had left a job during the year ending February 1987 were more likely to still be in the labour force at the end of the year than females, with 67.9 per cent of males employed at February 1987 and a further 17.8 per cent looking for work compared to the female proportions of 52.7 and 15.3 per cent respectively.




Of the persons who had left a job in the last twelve months, 1,345,800 had done so for employment reasons. The majority of males and females who left a job had done so for employment reasons (75.3 and 63.6 per cent respectively), however a much larger proportion of females had left for reasons other than employment or own ill health (30.6 per cent) than males (20.6 per cent).

Of those persons who had left a job for employment reasons 944,000 (70.1 per cent) were employed at February 1987. Labour force participation varied according to the different employment reasons reported. All those who reported having left their job because their business or job changed locality had a job at February 1987, while most of those seeking a better business or job, or to start their own business were employed at February 1987. Persons who left for employment reasons other than these were less likely to be employed at February 1987 (47.7 per cent). Over a third of those persons who had been laid off from their previous job were looking for work at February 1987.

Persons who had changed jobs - Occupation and Industry

The proportion of persons who changed jobs during the period varied with occupation and industry. Salespersons and personal service workers (19.7 per cent) had a high level of job change, while those working as Managers and administrators (11.9 per cent) had a lower than average level. By industry, persons working in the Finance, property and business services (22.1 per cent), Recreation, personal and other services (19.7 per cent) and Construction (18.9 per cent) industries had a higher than average level of job change.

Some 30.4 per cent of persons who changed jobs changed their occupation and 38.6 per cent changed their industry from their previous to current jobs. The amount of movement varied with occupation and industry. The Clerical occupations increased by 12,200 persons (59,200 joined and 47,000 left, while Salespersons and personnel service workers recorded a decrease of 22,100 (62,200 joined and 84,300 left). Similarly the Finance, property and business services industry gained 20,800 persons (62,300 joined and 41,500 left) while the Agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting industry lost 8,100 persons (11,300 joined and 19,400 left).



EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

The monthly population survey (which is described in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the February 1987 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked about their labour mobility during the year up to the end of the week prior to interview in February 1987. Specific questions related to the duration of current job, whether respondents had changed jobs or not and the number of jobs held during the period.

Scope

3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)), except that it excluded visitors to private dwellings, students who were boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc. Persons who had not worked during the past year were also excluded.

Coverage

4. In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each persons is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

Definitions

- 5. It is impractical to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference period. For the survey of labour mobility a person is assigned to a labour force category for each of the weeks in the year on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms worked and looked for work are used in this survey rather than the rigidly defined terms employed and unemployed used in the monthly labour force survey.
- 6. Persons in the labour force are those who were reported as having worked or looked for work as defined in paragraphs 7 and 8.
- 7. Persons who worked are those who were reported as having either worked or been on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are not classified as work.

- 8. Persons who *looked for work* are those who were reported as having been out of work and looking for a job.
- 9. Persons out of the labour force are those who, during any week in the reference period, were reported as having neither worked nor looked for work as defined in paragraphs 7 and 8.
- 10. For the purposes of this survey:
 - (a) Labour mobility is defined in terms of the specific questions asked regarding job mobility and duration of current job; and
 - (b) a job is defined as:
 - (i) employment as a wage or salary earner (or unpaid family helper) by a particular employer, in a particular locality; or
 - (ii) self-employment (with or without employees) in a particular locality.
- 11. Locality. In capital cities and major towns each suburb is considered to be a different locality.
- 12. Job mobility is defined as a change of job. A change of job may involve a change of employer, regardless of whether a change of locality was involved; or a change of locality without a change of employer. For example, the movement of an employer's operations to premises in a different locality would entail a change of job for employees who moved to the new locality. Promotion or transfer of an employee which involves a move to premises in a different locality would also constitute a change of job. It should be noted, however, that for a person who works at different sites for the same employer (for example, a construction worker), his base of operations (i.e. his employer's office, depot, yard, etc.) is considered to be his place of work.
- 13. For persons who left a job during the year, details collected (such as industry of job left, reason for leaving job, etc.) relate to the last job left.
- 14. Persons with a post-school qualification are those who had left school and answered 'Yes' to the question: 'Since leaving school have you obtained a trade qualification, certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification?'.
- 15. Classification of post-school qualifications. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification:
 - (a) Degree: a bachelor degree (including honours), a graduate or post-graduate diploma, masters degree or a doctorate;
 - (b) Trade qualification or apprenticeship: completion of an approved trade/technical apprenticeship in fitting and turning, hairdressing, plumbing, carpentry, etc;

- (c) Certificate or diploma: completion of an approved certificate or diploma in secretarial or business studies, administration, teaching, nursing, etc;
- (d) Other: completion of other types of education, e.g. adult education, preparatory/bridging course or hobby course.
- 16. Highest level of secondary school available refers to the highest level of secondary schooling (or equivalent) offered by the education system at the time the respondent left school.
- 17. Still at school. Current school attendance is recorded only for persons aged fifteen to twenty years.
- 18. Further definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 19. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.

Results of the survey

- 20. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1987. Because of emigration, deaths, etc. not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour mobility may relate to experience outside Australia.
- 21. A publication Labour Mobility, Australia, During the Year Ending February 1987, Summary (6208.0) containing a summary of the results of the survey was issued on 14 January 1988.
- 22. Results of similar surveys, conducted in November 1972, February 1975 and February 1976, and annually since February 1979 have been published in *Labour Mobility, Australia* (6209.0).
- 23. It is proposed that this survey will be conducted next in February 1988.

Unpublished tables

24. In some cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published. This information may be made available in one or more of the following forms: microfiche, photocopy, data tape, computer printout, manually-extracted tabulation. In general, a charge is made for providing unpublished information. Inquiries should be made to the officer whose name appears in the *Phone Inquiries* section at the front of this publication, or to Information Services in the nearest ABS Office.

Discontinuities in the series

25. The estimates for surveys held from February 1983 are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The reference period for the February

- 1980 and prior surveys was the previous calendar year (e.g. 1 January to 31 December 1979). The reference period for the February 1981 and 1982 surveys was from the beginning of the previous February to the end of the week prior to interview. As interviews were conducted over the second and third week of February, the reference period could have extended to 54 weeks. From the February 1983 survey onwards the reference period has been the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. Due to the change in the reference period timing, some estimates, particularly those for groups who enter the labour force during the earlier months of the year (e.g. 15 to 19 year olds) will also be affected from the February 1981 survey onwards.
- 26. In the February 1981 survey, reason for leaving a job was only asked of persons who changed jobs. For all previous and subsequent surveys, reason for leaving a job was asked of the wider population of persons who left a job.
- 27. Estimates contained in this publication are based on a revised labour force questionnaire introduced in April 1986. The definition of employment was expanded, resulting in decreases in the estimates of unemployed persons and persons not in the labour force. Further information is contained in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) and in an information paper *Questionnaires Used in the Labour Force Survey* (6232.0).
- 28. Classification of occupation according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) 1986 was introduced in the August 1986 labour force survey, replacing the Classification and Classified List of Occupations (CCLO) used in previous surveys. The main difference between these classifications is that ASCO occupations are classified on the basis of the level and specialisation of skill required for the satisfactory performance of primary tasks. For a more detailed explanation of ASCO see the appendix to *The Labour Force*, *Australia*, *August 1986* (6203.0).
- 29. To provide a link between the two classifications, a matrix has been produced and is shown in Tables 41 of *The Labour Force, Australia, August 1986* (6203.0). It shows the relationship between ASCO and CCLO at the broadest classification level (the Major Group). The estimates in the matrix are based on a sub-sample of respondents to the May 1986 Labour Force Survey.
- 30. For this survey, an expanded classification of postschool qualifications was used. As a result a small number of persons previously categorised as 'Degree' or 'Other' may now be included in the categories 'Trade qualification or apprenticeship' or 'Certificate or diploma'.
- 31. The family status classification in Table 12 varies from that shown in Table 12 of the February 1986 issue of this publication. Dependents are now identified rather than children aged 0 to 14. *Dependents* comprise all family members under 15 years of age; all family members

aged 15 to 19 attending school; and all family members aged 15 to 24 who are full-time students at a tertiary or further educational institution.

Reliability of the estimates

32. Estimates in this publication are subject to *sampling* and *non-sampling* errors. For further information refer to the Technical Note.


TECHNICAL NOTE

Estimation procedure

The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

- 2. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling error, that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics, these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 4. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 3 shows the estimated number of males who, in February 1987, had been in their current job for less than one year as 968,800. Since this estimate is between 500,000 and 1,000,000 the standard error for Australia will be between 8,700 and 11,200 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 11,000 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 957,800 to 979,800 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 946,800 to 990,800. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



- 5. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although, in some cases, estimates for these small components can be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. An approximate relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion may be calculated by the following formula:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

7. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, the 968,800 males represent 22.7 per cent of the 4,261,700 males working at February 1987. The standard error of 4,261,700 is approximately 17,900 so the relative standard error is 0.4 per cent. The relative standard error for 968,800 is 1.1 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(1.1)^2 - (0.4)^2}$ or 1.0 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (22.7 per cent) of 0.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who had been in their current job for less than one year is between 22.5 per cent and 22.9 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 22.3 per cent to 23.1 per cent.

8. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is also subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE
$$(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce non-sampling errors to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
