MAJOR GROUP 4

TRADESPERSONS

Tradespersons perform a variety of complex physical tasks, applying a body of trade-specific technical knowledge. These tasks require initiative and a high degree of manual dexterity and other practical skills.

Occupations in this major group have a level of skill commensurate with a 4 year trade certificate, usually obtained by apprenticeship.

Tasks performed by Tradespersons typically include constructing buildings and other large structures; fabricating individual (i.e. not mass-produced) metal, wood, glass, and textile products; repairing and maintaining these individual products, motor vehicles and other machinery, electrical and electronic equipment; applying protective and decorative finishes to surfaces; printing and binding documents; preparing and cooking food; and propagating and cultivating plants.

Tradespersons operate a wide variety of complex precision machinery to complete several stages in the fabrication and maintenance of products. Occupations concerned with the operation of a single non-precision or partly automated machine during one phase of the manufacturing process are located in Minor Group 74, Machine Operators.

MINOR GROUP 41 METAL FITTING AND MACHINING TRADESPERSONS

METAL FITTING AND MACHINING TRADESPERSONS shape metal stock, usually to fine tolerances, using lathes and other precision metal tools to fabricate or repair tools, dies, jigs and other individual (ie not mass-produced) metal products, assemble machinery incorporating these as components, and set up partially automated machine tools for use by less skilled operators.

Occupations in this minor group have a level of skill commensurate with a 4 year trade certificate, usually obtained by apprenticeship.

Tasks performed by Metal Fitting and Machining Tradespersons typically include selecting stock; determining dimensions and tolerances; setting machine controls; manipulating stock and controls of machine tools to shape stock by cutting, drilling or abrasion; measuring product for conformity to specifications; and fitting parts into machinery using hand tools, and testing to ensure that machinery functions correctly.

This minor group includes Metal Machinists (Second and Third Class) because they perform similar tasks to Metal Machinists (First Class), and cannot reliably be distinguished from them in statistical collections, although their skill level is different.

Tool Designers are excluded from this minor group because they are primarily involved in the design rather than fabrication of tools. They are located in Unit Group 3205, Mechanical Engineering Associates and Technicians.

4103 METAL FITTERS AND MACHINISTS

METAL FITTERS AND MACHINISTS set up machining tools, production machines and textile machines, operate machining tools and machines to shape metal stock and castings, and fit and assemble the fabricated metal parts into products. They may supervise, or receive training in, occupations in this unit group.

SKILL LEVEL

The entry requirement for this unit group is a trade certificate, except for Die Setters, Metal Machinists (Second Class), and Metal Machinists (Third Class) which have no specific entry requirement.

OTHER METAL TRADESPERSONS cut, shape, join and finish metal, using a variety of tools and equipment other than lathes and similar machine tools.

Occupations in this minor group have a level of skill commensurate with a 4 year trade certificate, usually obtained by apprenticeship.

Tasks performed by Other Metal Tradespersons typically include drawing or marking out patterns; heating metal stock and shaping it using hammers; cutting stock or mould components to shape using hand tools, cutting torches or machine tools; joining components by welding, soldering brazing, rivetting, bolting, screwing or gluing; dismantling and inspecting aircraft components and complex items of metal machinery, repairing or replacing faulty components, and re-assembling; and applying protective or decorative finishes to metal products.

This minor group includes Electroplaters and Sheet Metal Workers (Second and Third Class) because they perform similar tasks to Electroplaters and Sheet Metal Workers (First Class) and cannot reliably be distinguished from them in statistical collections, although their skill level is different.

The entry requirement for this unit group is a trade certificate, except for Welders (Second Class) and Welders (Third Class), which have no formal entry requirement.

Occupations in this minor group have a level of skill commensurate with a 4 year trade certificate, usually obtained by apprenticeship.

Tasks performed by Electrical and Electronics Tradespersons typically include examining and updating wiring and cable location diagrams; testing for, locating and repairing electrical malfunctions; cutting and connecting wiring and cables; assembling, fabricating and/or fitting electrical components using hand-held and power tools, and machinery; connecting electrical systems and appliances to power supply; joining air-conditioning ducting components; and filling refrigeration units with refrigerant.

Electrical and Electronic Engineering Associates and Technicians are excluded from this minor group because they are concerned more with the design and operation of complex electrical and electronic equipment than with its fabrication or maintenance. They are located in Unit Group 3201, Electrical and Electronic Engineering Associates and Technicians. Occupations involving the assembly and installation of simple electrical components on a production line are excluded because each involves only one phase in the manufacturing process and requires the performance of a narrow range of routine tasks. They are located in Minor Group 81, Trades Assistants and Factory Hands.
