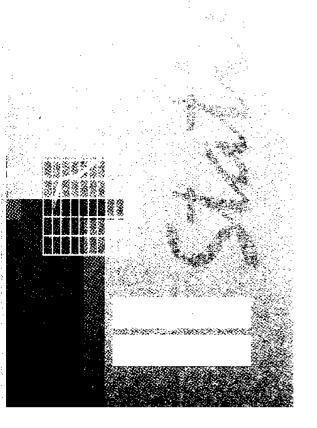

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UPDATED SERIES

Series updated since the August 1996 issue are: labour force, industrial disputes; housing finance; building approvals; price indexes; average weekly earnings; retail turnover; and new motor vehicle registrations. A feature article on the teenage labour market in the ACT is included on page 6.

NOTABLE MOVEMENTS

Unemployment

The trend number of persons employed in the ACT has fallen for each of the last 10 months from a peak of 159,700 persons in October 1995 to 154,700 persons in August 1996 (an overall fall of 5,000 persons or 3.1%). Over the same period, the trend unemployment rate has steadily increased from 7.0% to 8.9% and the trend participation rate has decreased from 74.3% to 72.8%. The trend unemployment rate is the highest on record.

Industrial disputes

In May 1996, there were 40 working days lost per 1,000 employees in the ACT compared with 101 working days lost per 1,000 employees nationally.

Housing and construction

The trend number of dwelling units financed (includes refinancing) in the ACT during July 1996 increased to 816 dwellings (an overall increase of 3.2%). Refinancing of existing dwellings comprised 33% of the total number of dwelling units financed (original terms) in July 1996, which was up from 29% in the previous month. The trend estimate for the value of commitments in the ACT in July 1996 was \$80.3 million, an increase of 2.8% on the previous month.

The trend number of dwelling units approved in the ACT has fallen for each of the last 8 months from a peak of 235 dwellings in November 1995 to 105 dwellings in July 1996 (an overall fall of 55.3%). Nationally the total number of dwelling units approved rose by 0.2% to 10,375.

Price indexes

The quarterly established house price index for Canberra rose by 0.3% in June 1996 after a fall of 1.2% in March 1996. Nationally, the index increased by 1.2% in the June quarter 1996. In the 12 months from June 1995, the price index decreased by 0.5% for the ACT compared to a 1.1% increase for the capital cities' weighted average.

Average weekly earnings

Trend estimates of average weekly earnings for the ACT continued the steady upward movement of the past two years. The average weekly earnings for May 1996 was \$639.10, an increase of 0.4% from the previous quarter. Nationally average weekly earnings increased by 0.9% to \$564.60.

Retail turnover

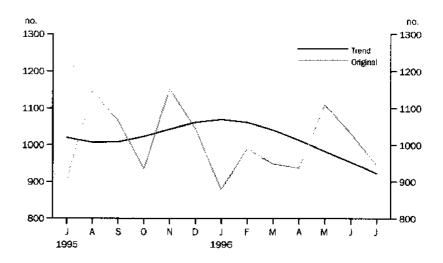
The trend estimate for retail turnover in the ACT for July 1996 was \$195.4 million, up slightly on the previous month's figure of \$193.5 million. Nationally trend retail turnover has increased by 5.2% over the last 12 months compared to 6.1% for the ACT.

Motor vehicle registrations

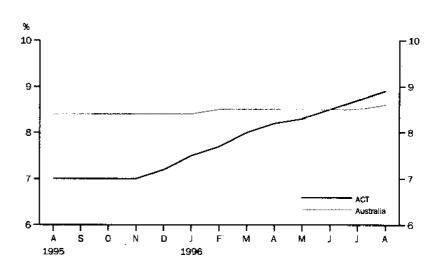
The trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations for the ACT in July 1996 was 923, a decrease of 3.1% over June 1996, and 9.5% lower than that recorded for July 1995. Nationally, the trend for total new registrations in July 1996 recorded the first fall (0.3%) since October 1995.

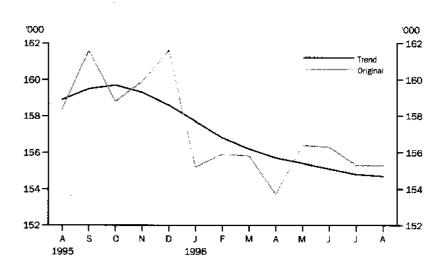
NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS



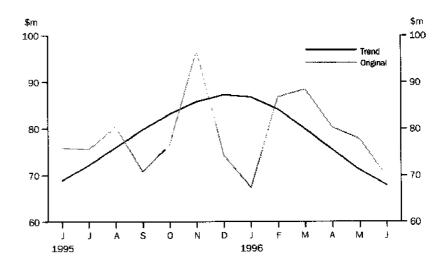
LABOUR FORCE — TREND UNEMPLOYMENT RATE



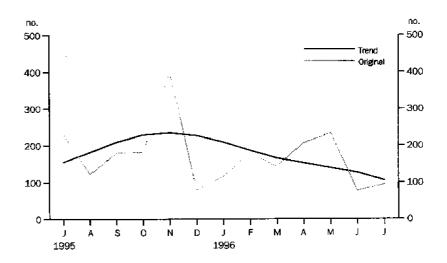
LABOUR FORCE — EMPLOYMENT



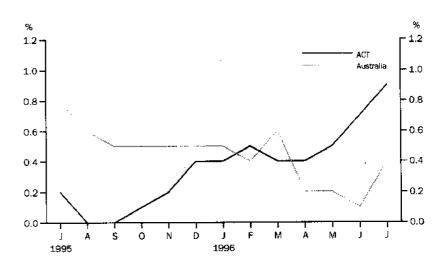
HOUSING FINANCE -TOTAL HOUSING COMMITMENTS - TREND FINANCE RATE

TEENAGE LABOUR MARKET, AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY, JUNE 1996

The teenage labour market displays different characteristics to the adult labour market. Young people have higher levels of job mobility, lower average incomes and a different occupation profile to the rest of the working population. It is during these years that the transition from full-time education to employment occurs.

In June 1996 the ACT had a total estimated resident population of 23,100 in the 15–19 year age group. Of the 14,100 in the labour market, 2,200 were employed full time and 8,200 part time with the remaining 3,600 unemployed. This represents a participation rate of 60.9%, which is above the national average of 57.4%. The unemployment rate for those aged 15–19 was 25.4% and the average duration of unemployment was 20.7 weeks. Of the 3,600 unemployed teenagers who made up this 25.4% unemployment rate, 1,900 (53%) were seeking part-time employment while also attending a school or a tertiary institution full time, while 1,700 (47%) were attending neither school nor a tertiary institution full time. Combining part-time employment with full-time education is clearly a common practice for a large number of teenagers in the ACT, thus accounting for the high teenage unemployment rate and the low average weekly hours worked by employed persons (15.3 hours).

In June 1996 the employment/population ratio of persons aged 15–19 was 45.5%, and the unemployment/population ratio was 15.4%. While the unemployment rate shows the proportion of those unemployed in the labour force (i.e. employed plus the unemployed) for any given group, the employment to population ratio gives the proportion of unemployed in the group to the total population for the group (the labour force plus those not in the labour force).

Similar labour force details for persons aged 20-24 are contained in the following table.
