# ECONOMIC INDICATORS, NEW SOUTH WALES JUNE 1995

#### MAIN FEATURES

#### **Employment**

Seasonally adjusted, the estimated number of employed persons in NSW in May 1995 was 2,732,000, a fall of 0.2% since April 1995 but an increase of 3.8% since May 1994. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted number of employed persons fell by 0.3% between April and May 1995 but increased by 4.5% over the last 12 months.

#### Unemployment

The seasonally adjusted estimate of unemployed people in NSW in May 1995 was 235,000, a rise of 2.7% since April but 17.8% lower than in May 1994. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in NSW for May 1995 was 7.9% compared to the national rate of 8.5%.

#### **Building Approvals**

The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved in NSW in April 1995 (4,384) recovered from the fall experienced in March 1995 to be almost back to the levels of January and February 1995. The increase of 15.2% over the previous month occurred mainly in numbers for Other residential buildings, with numbers of Houses remaining virtually unchanged.

#### New Motor Vehicle Registrations

The seasonally adjusted figure for new motor vehicle registrations in NSW increased by 19.5% from 18,160 in March 1995 to 21,694 in April 1995.

#### Finance

The value of housing and finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in April fell by 24.4% over the previous month and was 20.6% lower than in April 1994. The value of personal and commercial commitments in NSW in April 1995 decreased by 22.8% and 31.2% respectively over March 1995.

#### Overseas Arrivals and Departures

The number of short-term arrivals to NSW in April 1995 was 125,000, representing a decrease of 9.2% from the previous month but an increase of 5.7% compared to April 1994.

#### NOTES

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.







### PRICES AND EARNINGS, NSW (Annual rate of change)




### NEW MOTOR VEHICLES REGISTERED (Monthly)




### VALUE OF ALL BUILDINGS COMMENCED (Average 1989-90 prices, quarterly)




### UNEMPLOYMENT RATE




### RETAIL TURNOVER (Trend, monthly)
