




SECTION 1: DEMOGRAPHY SUMMARY


The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) compiles and publishes time series estimates of the population and its major demographic components. Each of these estimates employs the concept of estimated resident population which links people to a place of usual residence within Australia.

POPULATION SIZE

■ The estimated resident population of the Northern Territory at the 31 December 1994 was 172,100. The Northern Territory was the smallest of the States and Territories.


POPULATION GROWTH

■ The population of the Northern Territorywas estimated to have grown by 0.9% between December 1993 and December 1994. This rate was the third highest of the States and Territories.



BIRTHS


• The Northern Territory birth and fertility rates (2.344 compared to 1.846 for Australia) are the highest of the States and Territories and the median age of the mother (for all confinements) is the lowest (26.7 years compared to the national rate of 29.0 years and 28.1 years for Tasmania, the next highest rate).



DEATHS


- The Northern Territory standardised death rate at 10.8 is significantly higher than that of Tasmania (7.6) which has the second highest rate. This rate was also higher than the national rate of 6.7.
- The median age at death for males at 53.9 years is almost 20 years below the national figure while median age at death for females (64.0 years) is 16 years below the national figure.





- The infant mortality rate for the Northern Territory at 11.3 deaths per thousand live births was over twice that of Victoria, South Australia and the Australian Capital Territory. This rate was nearly twice the national rate of 5.9.
- Perinatal death rates for the Northern Territory were also comparatively high (14.8 compared to the national rate of 8.0).


SECTION 2: POPULATION

POPULATION OF NORTHERN TERRITORY

The estimated resident population of the Northern Territory at 31 December 1994 was 172,100 persons (88,800 males and 83,300 females).

POPULATION GROWTH

Over the last ten years the population has increased by 18% from 145,300. The annual Northern Territory population growth rate to 31 December 1994 was 0.9%, the lowest in the last 5 years.



In 1994:

- The net natural increase (the excess of births over deaths registered during the year) was the major component of positive population change. Births exceeded deaths by 2,753 persons.
- Interstate movement accounted for a decrease of 1,584 persons which was the major negative component of population change.
- Overseas migration increased the population by 310 persons and was the lowest figure for the last 7 years.

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

Different assumptions can be used when making projections about the future size of the population. Depending on these assumptions, the population of the Northern Territory is expected to grow to between 185,200 and 190,500 people by the year 2000 and is projected to pass the 200,000 mark as early as 2003.

AGE OF POPULATION

- In 1994 the Northern Territory had the lowest median age of all States/Territories. The median age of the Northern Territory population was 28.0 years compared to 33.4 years for Australia, and 33.8 years for New South Wales which had the highest median age.
- The median age of Northern Territory residents is increasing gradually in line with the national trend. Five years ago the median age of the Northern Territory population was 26.5 years, while ten years ago it was 25.0 years.
- The Northern Territory's child dependency ratio in 1994 was 40.3 in 1994 and in 1984 to 45.9 in 1994. In contrast, the aged-dependency ratio has increased from 3.4 in 1984 to 4.4 in 1994.

FERTILITY


• The total fertility rate in the Northern Territory was 2.3 in 1994. This rate was higher than the national average of 1.8. The relatively high rate for the Northern Territory is due to the high fertility rate of 2.9 for Indigenous mothers.

BIRTHS

■ There were 3,626 births registered to mothers usually resident in the Northern Territory, an increase of 0.6% compared to 1993. Of these, 1,338 births (36.9% of all births) were Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander births.


AGE SPECIFIC BIRTH RATES

Age specific birth rates differ markedly between Indigenous and non-Indigenous mothers. The rates tend to be higher for Indigenous mothers in the younger age groups and lower in the older age groups.




TOTAL DEATHS

- In 1994, there were 776 registered deaths of persons usually resident in the Northern Territory. Of these, 380 (49% of all deaths) were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander deaths.
- The Northern Territory standardised death rate was 10.8 per thousand people, which was well above the Australian rate of 6.7.
- The standardised death rate for males continues to be over 20% higher than the rate for females. Death rates for males aged 20-29 years are 5 times higher than for females in the same age group.

■ The median age at death in the Northern Territory was 53.9 years for males and 64 years for females. These estimates were well below the corresponding national median ages of 73.5 years for males and 80.2 years for females. For the past seven years, the median age at death has remained steady for males and has increased for females.



CAUSES OF DEATH

■ In 1994 the three major causes of death were heart disease (158 deaths or 20.4% of all deaths), cancer (156 deaths or 20.1% of all deaths), and diseases of the respiratory system (87 deaths or 11.2% of all deaths). These were the most common causes of death for both males and females.

INFANT DEATHS

There were 41 infant deaths recorded in the Northern Territory in 1994. The infant mortality rate was 11.3 per thousand live births, the lowest for the last five years. This rate was the highest of all was States/Territories and almost twice the Australian rate of 5.9.


NUMBER OF **MARRIAGES**

- There were 765 marriages registered in the Northern Territory in 1994. This was an increase of 4.7% compared to 1984 (731 marriages).
- Of all marriages registered, 448 couples (58.6%) were married for the first time, 206 marriages (26.9%) took place in which one partner had been married before, and 111 marriages (14.5%) were registered in which both partners had been married before.
- The Northern Territory recorded the lowest crude marriage rate of all States/Territories at 4.5. This compared with a national crude marriage rate of 6.2.

MEDIAN AGE AT MARRIAGE

The median age of marriage for both partners has increased steadily since 1989. In 1994, the median age at marriage was 30.8 years for bridegrooms and 27.8 years for brides.


MEDIAN AGE OF BRIDE AND BRIDEGROOM 1989-1994

In 1994, 282 marriages or 36.9% were performed by ministers of MARRIAGE CELEBRANTS religion, while 483 marriages or 63.1% were performed by civil celebrants. The ratio between the two types of marriage has remained reasonably steady for the past six years.

6.1 DEFENCE FORCES MIGRATION INTO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

MAGNITUDE

As at 30 June, 1994, there was a total of 2,711 Australian Defence Force personnel, 273 Defence civilians, and an estimated 3,500 Defence dependants in the Department of Defence Darwin Region. The Darwin Region includes Tindal Base at Katherine.

Between June 1991 and June 1994, approximately 500 additional Army personnel have moved to the Northern Territory. Net migration of personnel from the other Defence Forces has been minimal. The influx of 500 Army personnel has been accompanied by approximately 500 family members and dependants. Of those defence personnel posted to Darwin some fifty percent are single personnel.

ORIGIN

Most of the Army personnel who have moved into the Darwin Region recently have come from the Holsworthy Army Barracks in New South Wales. Holsworthy was the previous home of the 2nd Cavalry Regiment which is being transferred to Darwin. The other significant place of origin is Puckapunyal in Victoria.

The major movements of Army personnel into the Northern Territory takes place at the end of each calendar year. Less than twenty percent of Army personnel moving into the Darwin Region since 1991 have originated from parts of the country other than the Holsworthy area.

DESTINATION

Most of the new additional defence force arrivals to the Darwin Region are being housed in Palmerston. A small proportion move to Darwin City although this is balanced by those personnel leaving the Northern Territory.

PROJECTIONS

The Cunning Plan for the Army Presence in the North (APIN) predicts that a further 2,200 Army personnel will have moved into the Darwin Region by the year 2001. These are expected to be accompanied by 2,600 family members and dependants. There is also a possibility that Navy personnel may be increased by some 400 persons (and a similar number of accompanying family and dependants) by the year 2006.

In the immediate future, 280 additional Army personnel are expected to arrive in the Darwin Region in the 1995/96 financial year.

6.2 INTERSTATE MIGRATION

1986 - 1991

The Northern Territory has experienced the highest population turnover through internal migration of any State or Territory since 1976. The 1991 Census found that 30,434 persons had moved into the Northern Territory from other States since 1986, and 34,219 persons had moved out to other States. In total, 17% of the total 1991 Census population had moved in from other States. About 22% of the 1986 population had moved out of the Northern Territory by 1991.

The most common destinations and states of origin for residents leaving the Northern Territory between 1986 and 1991 were Queensland, South Australia, New South Wales, and Western Australia.

The 1991 Census indicated that there were far higher percentages of interstate movers (both into and out of the Northern Territory) aged between twenty and thirty-five years than for other age groups. There were very few differences in interstate movement patterns between males and females.

Northern Territory Interstate Migration, State of Destination and Origin, 1986-1991




Since the 1991 Census, interstate migration into and out of the Northern Territory has been estimated on the basis of Medicare change of address data. These estimates have shown a net loss of persons due to interstate migration in 1992 (1,298 persons), 1993 (1,461 persons) and 1994 (1,584 persons).

Evidence from the Medicare change of address data suggests that the pattern observed in the 1991 Census has continued in 1994. The origin of most people moving into the Northern Territory was Queensland followed by New South Wales and Victoria. The most common destination for residents moving out of the Northern Territory was Queensland, followed by South Australia and New South Wales.


ARRIVALS BY STATE OF ORIGIN 1994

6.3 INDIGENOUS DEMOGRAPHY


INTRODUCTION

The demographics on the Northern Territory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population are quite different from that of the non-Indigenous population. The Northern Territory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population tends to be younger, has higher birth and death rates and is less concentrated in the larger urban centres.

AGE AND SEX STRUCTURE OF THE NORTHERN TERRITORY INDIGENOUS POPULATION The age and sex structure of the Northern Territory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population is different to that of both the non-Indigenous Northern Territory population and the total Australian population. The Northern Territory Indigenous population has a high proportion of people in the younger age groups tapering quickly to low proportions of people in the older age groups. This profile reflects the high birth and death rates of the Indigenous population.

The sex ratio of the Northern Territory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population is also very different to the non-Indigenous population with females outnumbering males in all age groups over 30 years.

Northern Territory Indigenous Population by Age Group, 1994




The proportion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Northern Territory population varies with age due to the mobility of the non-Indigenous component of the population and the high birth and death rates of the Indigenous population.

The high proportion of Indigenous people in the 0-14 year age groups is due to the higher fertility rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women. Indigenous mothers in the Northern Territory have a fertility rate of 2.9 compared to a rate of 1.8 for the total Australian population.

The lower proportion of Indigenous people in the 30-50 year old range is due to the influx of non-Indigenous people into the Northern Territory at this age and the age structure of the Indigenous people. The standardised death rate for Indigenous people in the Northern Territory is two and half times that expected for the total Northern Territory population and four times that expected for the total Australian population.

While Indigenous people have a higher death rate and lower life expectancy than non-Indigenous people they make a significant proportion of the elderly in the Northern Territory because significant number of elderly non-Indigenous people move interstate.

LOCATION


Indigenous people tend not to be as concentrated in the major towns as the non-Indigenous population. In the 1991 Census, 23% of the Northern Territory's population identified as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islanders (excluding visitors this rises to 26%). Only 7% of people counted in Darwin identified as Aboriginal, less than 20% in Alice Springs, Katherine and Palmerston with only Tennant Creek having a greater proportion of Aboriginal people than the Northern Territory total.

The more remote areas had significantly higher proportions of Aboriginal people; over 80% for Bathurst-Melville, West Arnhem, East Arnhem and the Tanami. The only two remote areas with relatively low proportions of Aboriginal people were the tourist regions associated with Uluru and Kakadu where the bulk of the non-Indigenous population were interstate visitors.

AGE AND SEX STRUCTURE OF THE NORTHERN TERRITORY NON-INDIGENOUS POPULATION The age and sex structure of the Northern Territory non-Indigenous population is very different to that of the Indigenous population. It reflects a more mobile population with larger proportions of people in the 20 to 40 year age groups and a rapid decline in the proportions of people in the over 55 years age groups. This is due to young adults moving to the Northern Territory and older persons moving away. Queensland is both the source and destination of a large proportion of interstate migrants.

The sex ratio of the non-Indigenous population is skewed with a greater proportion of males than females especially in the adult population. In the 40 to 50 year olds there are 120 males per 100 females, in the 50 to 69 year olds there are 140 males per 100 females and only in the over 74 years age group do females significantly outnumber males (80 males per 100 females).


Northern Territory Non-Indigenous Population by Age Group, 1994



AGE AND SEX STRUCTURE OF THE TOTAL AUSTRALIAN POPULATION For comparison, the total Australian population has similar proportions of people in all age groups up to the 45-49 years age group before a gradual reduction in the proportions of people in each susequent age group.

The sex ratio (number of males to females) indicates there are more males than females in most age groups below 60 years. In all of those age groups males outnumber females by up to 106 males per 100 females. Conversely there are more females than males in the older age groups (over 59 years) where females predominate with as few as 60 males per 100 females in the over 74 years age group.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1 This publication brings together a number of closely related series of statistics on demography covering Births, Deaths, Marriages and Divorces. It also includes some information on estimated resident population and migration.
- **2** A Glossary of Terms follows the Explanatory Notes. More detailed definitions are given in more specialised publications, a list of which is given in the section on Related Publications.

POPULATION ESTIMATES

- 3 This section provides estimates of the resident population, with information on overseas arrivals and departures and net interstate migration.
- 4 Estimates of the Northern Territory population are made to varying degrees of detail throughout the year, and this publication has used the most up to date estimates available for each particular table.

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

- **5** Population projections are published twice in each intercensal period. The latest projections are based on the results of 1991 Census of Population and Housing and relate to the period from 1996-2041.
- 6 The population projections are not intended as predictions or forecasts; they are illustrations of growth and change in the population which would occur if certain specified assumptions about the future demographic trends were realised. While the selection of the assumptions is based on analysis of past demographic trends, both in Australia and overseas, and an assessment of their likely future movements, there is no certainty that any of the assumptions will be realised.
- 7 Four alternative projections have been provided in recognition of the uncertainty of future movements in demographic trends, and to give users a range of options.
- 8 The mortality assumptions are the same for all series, while for fertility, a higher rate is assumed for Series A and B. For the migration assumptions, Series A, B and C have a higher level of overseas migration, while Series B and C have a high level of interstate migration.

MIGRATION

9 Data on overseas arrivals and departures relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than to the number of travellers. However, the statistics exclude the movements of operational air crew and ships' crew, transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not engaged on regular voyages. Estimates of transit sea passengers are no longer available.

10 Data on interstate migration have been derived from aggregated statistical information on interstate changes of addresses advised to the Health Insurance Commission in the process of administering Medicare. The ABS adjusts the Health Insurance Commission data to make allowance for the persons who do not inform the Commission of their change of residence. Further details are shown in the Explanatory Notes to Australian Demographics Statistics (3101.0).

BIRTHS

- 11 Birth statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the mother, regardless of where in Australia the birth occurred or was registered.
- 12 Births to mothers usually resident in Australia which took place overseas are excluded. Births to mothers usually resident overseas which occurred in Australia are included in the State or Territory where the birth occurred.
- 13 Except for Tables 3.7 to 3.9, the statistics in this publication refer to births registered during the calendar year shown. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a birth, and some births occurring in one year are not registered until the following year, or even later. However, most births are registered shortly after they occur, and almost all births occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year. Tables 3.7 to 3.8 refer to births which occurred in the years shown.
- 14 Data on stillbirths (fetal deaths) may be found in summary form in Section 4 (Deaths) of the publication.
- 15 The live birth statistics used to calculate the fetal and neonatal death rates have been adjusted (in accordance with the WHO definition of perinatal death) to exclude cases where the birthweight was known to be less than 500 grams. However, infant death rates are calculated using all live births registered, because figures are not available for infants who weigh less than 500 grams at birth, and who lived for 28 days, but die before they are one year old.

DEATHS

- 16 In this publication death statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the deceased, regardless of where in Australia the death occurred and was registered.
- 17 Except for Tables 4.11 to 4.14, the death statistics in this publication refer to deaths registered during the year shown. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of death, and as a result some are not registered in the year in which they occur. However, most deaths are registered within 6 months of occurrence. More than 99 per cent of deaths occurring in one year have been registered by 30 June of the following year. Tables 4.11 to 4.14 show the number of deaths occurring in a particular year.

18 In 1988, revisions were made to Northern Territory legislation to enable the registration of a death prior to the certification of cause. As a result, deaths registered in the Northern Territory during 1988 included a number of deaths which would not necessarily have been registered under the former legislation. This should be borne in mind in interpreting statistics for 1988 and comparing them with earlier years.

MARRIAGES

- 19 Marriage statistics in this publication refer to marriages registered by the Northern Territory Registrar during the years shown. There is usually an interval between the celebration and the registration of a marriage. As a result of the delay in registration, some marriages celebrated in one year are not registered until the following year. Under the Australian Marriage Act 1961, marriages may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month, and within six calendar months before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration to a District Registrar in the State or Territory in which the marriage took place.
- 20 From 20 June 1973, the minimum age at which a person may marry without parental consent, as required under the Act has been 18 years. Persons between the ages of 16 and 18 years may marry with parental or guardian consent and an order from a judge or magistrate. Any two persons under the age of 18 years may not marry each other.

DIVORCE

21 Due to administrative problems at the Family Court in Darwin divorces data for 1994 are not available. 1994 data will be released in the 1995 Demography publication.

GEOGRAPHIC BOUNDARIES

- 22 The geographic boundaries for small area data are defined in the Australian Standard Geographical Classification, Edition 2.5 (1216.0).
- 23 The boundaries used for Births and Deaths statistics are the SLA boundaries as at 1 July 1994.
- 24 The classification of countries in this publication is based on the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS). For more detailed information refer to the ABS publication Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (1269.0). Political developments in Europe and the Former USSR and Africa have resulted in a number of changes, and are detailed in Revision 1.01, 1.02 and 1.03 of the ASCCSS.

ADDITIONAL STATISTICS AND SERVICES AVAILABLE

- 26 In most cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published. This information may be made available in one or more of the following forms: microfiche, photocopy, data tape, floppy disk, computer printout, or clerically extracted tabulation.
- 27 Current publications produced by the ABS are listed in the *Catalogue of Publications and Products, Australia* (1101.0). The ABS also issues, on Tuesdays and Fridays, a *Publications Advice* (1105.0) which lists publications to be released in the next few days. These publications are available from any ABS office.
- 28 Estimates of expectation of life prepared by the Australian Bureau of Statistics are included in Table 4.4, and summaries mortality expectations relating to the number of deaths registered in 1994. These tables are not constructed according to strict actuarial principles. Readers wishing to use life tables for actuarial purposes are advised to refer to the Official Australian Life Tables 1990-92, prepared by the Australian Government Actuary. These were released in 1995 and copies are available from the Commonwealth Government bookshops or the Mail Order Sales Service.

GLOSSARY

Age-specific birth rates

Age specific birth rates are the live births registered during the calendar year, according to age of mother, per 1,000 of the estimated mid-year female resident population of the same age as estimated for 30 June. For the purposes of calculating these rates, births to mothers aged less than fifteen years are included in the 15-19 year age group, and births to mothers aged fifty years and over are included in the 45-49 year age group.

Age-specific death rates

The age-specific death rate is the number of deaths at a specified age per 1,000 of the estimated resident population of that age at 30 June. The infant mortality rate is used for the age-specific rate for children under 1 year of age. Pro rata adjustment is made in respect of deaths for which the age of deceased is not given.

Age-specific marriage rates

Two different populations are used in the calculation of age-specific marriage rate:

- Per 1,000 population as at 30 June this relates the number of marriages, by age at marriage, to the estimated mid-year resident population in specific age groups. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.
- Per 1,000 not currently married population as at 30 June this
 relates the number of marriages, by age at marriage, to the not
 currently married population in specific age groups. Males and
 females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.

Pro rata adjustment is made in respect of divorces where the age of divorcing parties is not given.

Births

A *birth*, unless otherwise stated, is a *live birth*, i.e. the delivery, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, of a child who, after being born, breaths or shows any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat. A *multiple birth* is a *confinement* which results in two or more births, at least one of which is liveborn.

Category of movement

Category of movement in overseas arrivals and departures is primarily determined by the traveller's own selection of his or her category on the passenger card. This selection is accepted, provided it is consistent with other information on the card.

Children

In divorce data, the term children refers to unmarried children of the marriage who are under the age of 18 years at the time of application for divorce. Under the Family Law Act 1975. These may include (in certain cases) adopted, ex-nuptial, foster- or step-children. Children who are married or aged 18 years or more are not subject to custody and guardianship orders, and are therefore excluded.

Children in the Marriages collection are children (whether now living and under the age of sixteen, or deceased) who were born alive to previous marriages. The term *children* must not be confused with *previous issue* used in the Births collection.

Child dependency ratio

Child dependency ratio is the number of children aged 0 to 14 years per 1,000 population aged 15 to 64 years.

Confinements

Confinements are the number of pregnancies resulting in at least one

live birth.

Crude birth rate

The crude birth rate is the number of registered live births per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population.

Crude death rate

The crude death rate is the number of registered deaths per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population.

Crude marriage rate

The crude marriage rate is the number of marriages per 1,000 of the estimated mean resident population. For years prior to 1994, the crude death rate is based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year.

Duration of marriage

Duration of marriage is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date the marriage ended by decree made absolute or death of the spouse.

Estimated resident population

The estimated resident population (ERP) is the official ABS estimate of the Australian population. The ERP for the whole of Northern Territory is based on the results of the 1991 population census. ERP is concerned only with resident population, and excludes other populations such as tourists and non-resident service populations.

Females gross reproduction rate

The female gross reproduction rate is the sum of the female age-specific fertility rates (i.e. the number of female live births according to age of mother per 1.000 females of that age) multiplied by 5 and divided by 1,000. It represents the average number of daughters that would be born per woman in a group of women all of whom survive to the end of the reproductive period and had born daughters at each age in accordance with the rates prevailing during that year. It is an indication of the extent to which the population would reproduce itself under these conditions, except that it does not allow for females who fail to survive to the end of the child-bearing period.

Fetal deaths

Fetal deaths relates to the delivery of a child, weighing at least 500 grams at delivery (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 22 weeks gestation) who did not, at any time after delivery, breathe or show any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat.

Fetal death rate

Fetal death rate is the number of fetal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at delivery (or, when birthweight is unavailable, of at least 22 weeks gestation) plus fetal

Female net reproduction rate

The female net reproduction rate represents the number of daughters a woman would bear if she were subject to the female age-specific fertility and mortality rates of the year shown. It is obtained by multiplying the female age-specific birth rates by the proportion of survivors at corresponding ages in a life table, adding the products and dividing by 1,000.

First marriage rates

First marriage rates are the number of males and females, of a certain age, marrying for the first time per 1,000 (mid-year) population of never married males and females of the same age. Indigenous origin

Persons who identify as being of either Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin

An *Indigenous birth* refers to the birth of a liveborn child where either the mother or the father has identified as being of either Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.

An *Indigenous death* refers to a death where the deceased was identified as being of either Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.

Infant deaths

An *infant death* is the death of a live-born child who died when less than one year old.

Infant mortality rate

The *infant mortality rate* is the number of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 live births.

Life expectancy

Life expectancy refers to the average number of additional years a person of a given age and sex might expect to live if the age-specific death rates of the given year continued throughout his or her lifetime.

Live birth

The term *live birth* relates to the delivery of a child, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, who after being born, breathes or shows any other evidence of life, such as heart beat.

Long term arrivals

Long term arrivals comprise overseas visitors (except those who hold migrant visas) who intend to stay in Australia for twelve months or more, and Australian residents returning after an absence of twelve months or more overseas.

Long term departures

Long-term departures comprise Australian residents who intend to stay abroad for twelve months or more, and overseas visitors departing who stayed twelve months or more in Australia.

Marital status

Two separate concepts are measured by the ABS. These are registered marital status and social marital status. They are different personal characteristics and are independent variables with separate classifications. Marital status used in this publication is registered marital status which refers to formally registered marriages for which the partners hold a marriage certificate.

Never married refers to those persons who have never been in a registered marriage.

Median values

The *median* value (*age, duration* or *interval*) is that value which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, half falling below this value, and half above it. Where the value for a particular record has not been stated, that record is excluded from the calculation.

Multiple birth

A multiple birth is a confinement which results in two or more issues, at least one of which is liveborn.

Natural increase

Natural increase is the excess of births over deaths registered in the recording year.

Neonatal deaths

Neonatal deaths are deaths of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or, when birthweight is unavailable, were of at least twenty-two weeks gestation) and who died within twenty-eight days

of birth.

Neonatal death rate

The *neonatal death rate* is the number of neonatal deaths per 1,000 live births of babies who weighed at least 500 grams at birth, (or, when birthweight is unavailable, were of at least twenty-two weeks gestation). See also paragraph 15 in the Explanatory Notes.

Net overseas interstate

migration

Net estimated interstate migration is derived from aggregated statistical information on interstate changes of address advised to the Health Insurance Commission.

Net overseas migration

Net overseas migration is derived by subtracting the number of long term departures from the number of long-term arrivals.

Nuptial first confinements

Nuptial first confinements are the first confinements in the current marriage and therefore do not necessarily represent the woman's first ever confinement resulting in a live birth.

Nuptiality

Nuptiality relates to the relative marital status of parents in the Births collection. Confinements and births are identified as being nuptial where the registered father was married to the mother at the time of the birth, or where the husband died during the pregnancy. Confinements and children of Aboriginal mothers considered to be tribally married are classified as nuptial. Other confinements, and the children resulting from them, are classified as ex-nuptial whether or not the parents were living together at the time of the birth, and whether or not the child may subsequently have been legitimised or adopted.

Paternity-acknowledged births

Paternity-acknowledged births refer to ex-nuptial births where paternity was acknowledged by the child's father.

Perinatal death

A *perinatal death* is either a fetal or a neonatal death, as elsewhere defined.

Perinatal death rate

The *perinatal death rate* is the number of perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births and foetal deaths combined.

Permanent movement

Permanent movement comprised arrivals of settlers, and permanent departures of Australian residents, (i.e., those who, on departure, state that they do not intend to return to Australia).

Rate of population growth

The *rate of population growth* expresses population change over a period as a proportion (per cent) of the population at the beginning of that period. In this bulletin, population growth rate is measured over the twelve months to 31 December of the recording year.

Previous births

Previous births refers to children born alive (which may be still living or now dead) to a mother prior to the registration of the current birth in the processing period. In some States/Territories, legitimated and legally adopted children may also be included.

Due to variations in data collection and processing methods across States and Territories, different definitions of the concept of previous births have been applied throughout this publication.

Previous births of the current marriage relates to nuptial births to the same parents prior to the current nuptial confinement.

All previous births of the mother includes all births prior to the current confinement, regardless of nuptiality and paternity. This information is important for measuring fertility.

Previous issue

Previous issue in the Births collection refers to previous live-born issue of a mother to the current marriage only, and excludes foster, step, or adopted children.

Re-marriage rates

Re-marriages are the number of re-marrying males and females, of a certain age, per 1,000 (mid-year) population of widowed or divorced males and females of the same age.

Sex ratio

The sex ratio is the number of males per one hundred females.

Short term arrival

Movements of travellers whose intended or actual length of stay is less than twelve months are classified as *short-term*, except those who on arrival hold migrant visas.

Standardised death rates

Two different methods are used in the calculation of *standardised* death rates:

- Direct method expressed per 1,000 persons. It is the overall death rate that would have prevailed in a standard population if it had experienced at each age the death rates of the population being studied. The standard population used in these calculations is all persons in the 1991 Australian population. The direct method is used for State/Territory and Australia rates.
- Standardised death rates
- Indirect method expressed per 1,000 persons. This is calculated by initially applying a standard set of age-specific rates (those for persons in the 1991 Australian population) to the population under study, and comparing the actual number of deaths with the number expected assuming that these standard death rates applied. The standardised death rate for the population under study is then calculated by multiplying the crude death rate of the standard population by the ratio of actual deaths to expected deaths. The indirect method is used in the calculation of standardised death rates for data at Statistical Local Area level.

State/Territory of registration

State/Territory of registration refers to the State/Territory in which the birth, death or marriage was registered or the State/Territory in which the divorce was granted. (For further information about how this affects divorce see paragraphs 24 to 25 of the Explanatory Notes.)

State/Territory of usual residence

State/Territory of usual residence refers to the State/Territroy of usual residence of:

- the population (estimated resident population)
- the mother (birth collection)
- the deceased (death collection)
- the parties at separation (divorce collection). (For further information about how this affects divorce see paragraphs 24 to 26 of the Explanatory Notes.)

Usual residence data are not available for the marriage collection.

Total fertility rate

The total fertility rate is obtained by summing the 5 year age-specific birth rates, multiplying by 5 and dividing by 1,000. It represents the number of children one woman would bear if the age-specific rates of the year shown continued during her child-bearing lifetime.


