## AGE GROUPS IN THE POPULATION



- The proportion of children under 18 in the population has declined in the last decade from $27 \%$ in 1989 to $25 \%$ in 1999 , and is projected to fall to around $20 \%$ by 2051.
- Of Australia's 4,724,900 children in 1999, 4\% $(207,400)$ were estimated to be Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.

## CHILDREN UNDER 18 BY BIRTHPLACE



- Over the last ten years, the proportion of children born overseas has remained steady.
- In 1999, $7 \%$ of children were born overseas, with around two-thirds from other than mainly English speaking countries.

TEENAGE BIRTH RATE(a)

(a) Confinements per 1,000 females aged 15-17.

- The teenage birth rate has declined slightly since 1990.
- In 1998 there were 9.5 confinements per 1,000 females aged 15-17, down from 11.0 in 1990.

## CHILDREN UNDER 18 IN ONE-PARENT FAMILIES(a)


(a) Series C projection for 2006.

- Children in one-parent families increased from $11 \%$ in 1986 to $16 \%$ in 1996 and are projected to reach $22 \%$ by 2006 if current trends continue.
- In 1997, 978, 400 children ( $21 \%$ ) had a natural parent who did not live with them. Over three-quarters of these children were living in one-parent families.

CHILDREN UNDER 18 WHO EXPERIENCED PARENTAL DIVORCE(a)

(a) Rate per 1,000 children under 18 in the population.

- Children who experienced the divorce of their parents increased slightly from 9.7 per 1,000 children in 1988 to 10.9 in 1998.
- During 1998, there were 51,600 children whose parents divorced.

## INFANT MORTALITY RATE(a)


(a) Infant deaths per 1,000 live births.

- The infant mortality rate has declined steadily in the last 10 years from 8.7 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1988 to 5.0 in 1998.
- In 1998, the Indigenous infant mortality rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children was 15.2 (for combined total of Qld, SA, WA and NT only).

## LOW BIRTHWEIGHT BABIES(a)


(a) Less than 2,500g.

- The proportion of low birthweight babies has changed little in recent years, remaining steady at $7 \%$ of all babies.
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander babies were nearly twice as likely to be of low birthweight, $13 \%$ in 1997.

CHILDREN AGED 1-2 FULLY IMMUNISED(a)

(a) Data for children 2 years of age are not available for 1997.

- In $1999,87 \%$ of 1 year old children were registered as being fully immunised.
- The proportion was lower for 2 year old children (76\%).

CHILDREN UNDER 5-MEDIAN HOURS PER WEEK SPENT IN CARE


- In 1999, half of all children under 5 using child care spent 13 hours or more in care per week, an increase from 8 hours in 1987.
- In 1999, 66\% of children under 5 used child care, of whom more than 1 in 3 used informal care (e.g. by relatives) only.

YEAR 12 APPARENT RETENTION RATES


- After peaking in the early 90s, apparent retention rates to Year 12 have declined slightly.
- In 1999 , the rate was $79 \%$ for girls and $66 \%$ for boys.

FAMILES WITH CHILDREN UNDER 18 WITH NO PARENT EMPLOYED


- In the last 10 years, the proportion of families with children under 18 with no parent employed has fluctuated, ranging from $14 \%$ in 1990 to $19 \%$ in 1993.
- The proportion was consistently higher for one-parent families than couple families ( $52 \%$ and $8 \%$ in 1999).
- In $1999,9 \%$ of families with children under 18 had one or both parents employed part time, and no parent employed full time.

FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN UNDER 18-PROPORTION RENTING THEIR HOMES


- In $1996,28 \%$ of families with children under 18 were renting their homes, compared with $24 \%$ in 1986 and $26 \%$ in 1991.
- More than half (57\%) of all one-parent families were renting in 1996.
