

#### Introduction

In May 1977 a survey, based on the quarterly population survey, was conducted throughout Australia in order to obtain information about child care arrangements of persons who were responsible for children under twelve years of age. Information obtained from persons who were employed included the type of child care arrangements they made for their children (including after-school care and school holiday care), time of departure for work and arrival home, the usual daily period of absence from home and the cost of child care arrangements. For persons who were looking for work and others who would have liked to have a job but were not looking for one because of child care problems. the information collected related to the care arrangements they would have preferred if they had had a job. The results of similar surveys conducted in May 1969 and May 1973 were published in bulletins entitled Child Care (4402.0).

2. A preliminary bulletin containing a summary of the results of the survey was published on 8 September 1977 (4401.0).

#### The population survey

3. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. Interviews for the child care survey were carried out during a period of four weeks.

#### Scope

4. Questions for the child care survey were not asked of persons under 15 years of age, persons aged 65 years and over, visitors in private dwellings, persons in non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.) and persons in institutions, members of the permanent defence forces and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from census and estimated populations. Persons in institutions are those who were patients in hospitals and sanitoria, or inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc., and for whom, for the purpose of the survey, the institution was regarded as their dwelling.

5. Persons who worked at home and who were responsible for the care of children under twelve years of age were not asked questions about their child care arrangements. It is estimated that there were about 94,800 persons (93,800 females) in this category, of whom 29,500 were responsible only for children aged 0-5 years, 38,200 only for children aged 6-11 years and 27,100 for some children aged 0-5 years and some aged 6-11 years.

6. The *person responsible* for the care of a child under twelve years of age was defined as the person who, being a member of the household to which the child belonged, ranked highest in the following three categories.

- (a) Child's mother, step-mother, foster mother, female guardian
- (b) Child's father, step-father, foster father, male guardian
- (c) Any other person considered by the respondent as being responsible for the child.
- 7. For the purposes of the survey -
  - . *child care centre at work* comprises care centres, creches and nursery facilities at the place of work run either by the employer or by employees on a co-operative basis.
  - . kindergarten, pre-school, child care centre comprises centres or institutions established for the care of children, regardless of whether they were government-operated, operated by voluntary groups or run as commercial ventures, except co-operative/neighbourhood groups (even if run with some government financial support) in which the children were minded at the home of one of the members, and kindergartens or pre-schools incorporated into primary schools.
  - . *looked after by spouse* includes situations where persons responsible for the children worked different hours from those of their spouse.
  - . *in another person's home* includes co-operative groups where a number of persons shared the minding of their children at the home of one or the members.
  - . *school* includes kindergartens and pre-schools incorporated into primary schools.
  - . *type of care arrangement* relates to the usual arrangement used; where more than one type of care arrangement was used, only the main arrangement is shown in the tables.
  - . *cost of child care* refers to the amount usually spent per week and may include the cost of such items as meals and transport.

8. Definitions of labour force categories used in this statement are the same as those used in the labour force survey, which are set out in the bulletin *The Labour Force*.

#### Reliability of the estimates

9. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. An indication of the likely differences is given in the Technical Note, page 22.

#### **Estimation procedure**

The estimates are derived from the quarterly population survey by use of a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than to the age and sex distribution within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of the estimates

2. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included in the survey. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this bulletin. A table of standard errors for general application to sample estimates is given below. These figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past population surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics. However, they will provide an indication of the magnitude of the standard error of any particular estimate. An example of the use of the table is as follows : if an estimate for Australia obtained from the sample is 100,000 then the standard error is 3,000 and there are about two chances in three that the true figure is within the range 97,000 to 103,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that this figure is between 94,000 and 106,000.

4. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. However, the per cent standard error of the estimated percentage will generally be lower than the per cent standard error of the estimate of the numerator. The per cent standard error of the numerators can be obtained from the table below.

5. As the standard errors in the table below show, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this bulletin, estimates below the levels shown in the table below have not been included. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
