TECHNICAL NOTE: COMPILING CONSTANT PRICE GROSS STATE PRODUCT

INTRODUCTION

1 The ABS commenced publishing annual State accounts on a regular basis in 1987. Since that time, a lot of effort has been devoted to improving and extending the annual estimates. Initially, the main aim was to extend the range of current price estimates produced and to improve the timeliness of release, partly by producing annual estimates more quickly and partly by compiling quarterly estimates for major components such as private final consumption expenditure and wages, salaries and supplements.

2 Quarterly current and constant price estimates of all components of State final demand (in original terms) were published for the first time in May 1993 (in respect of December quarter 1992) in a new quarterly publication *Australian National Accounts: State Accounts* (5242.0). At the same time, quarterly estimates of gross operating surplus and net indirect taxes were compiled, thereby enabling a quarterly current price estimate of gross State product (GSP(I) - see below) to be calculated for the first time (the corresponding seasonally adjusted and trend estimates were produced later that year). The constant price estimates were extended to include GSP in the September quarter 1994 issue of 5242.0 (released in December 1994).

3 GSP is a measure of the total market value of goods and services produced in a State after deducting the cost of goods and services used up in the process of production (intermediate consumption), but before deducting consumption of fixed capital. By definition, the value of production in a period must equal the income earned from that production and the final expenditure on the goods and services produced (including an allowance for change in stocks plus exports less imports). This means that, in theory, GSP can be derived using three different approaches:

- GSP(P) the value of all final goods and services produced in the State economy over the period;
- GSP(I) the sum of all incomes accruing to the factors of production over the period, including net indirect taxes; and
- GSP(E) the sum of all final expenditures on State production, including the increase in stocks plus exports less imports (both international and interstate).

4 The methods used to obtain constant price GSP could be best described as "indirect" because the only current price estimate of GSP available is obtained by aggregating the incomes accruing from production (ie, GSP(I)). It is not possible to satisfactorily deflate such incomes to produce constant price estimates because they do not comprise readily identifiable price and quantity elements. While it could be argued that the wages paid to an individual are equal to the product of the number of hours worked and the hourly wage rate, many employees are not paid according to the number of hours worked and the supplements paid are generally independent of the number of hours worked. Moreover, from an employee's perspective the value of wages and salaries has more to do with their purchasing power than any hourly wage rate. Also, because gross operating surplus is the residual flow of income to the owners of capital after the payment of labour costs and net indirect taxes, there is no way of defining it as the product of a price and a quantity. However, while it is not possible to construct constant price estimates of GSP(I) by deriving constant price estimates of its components and summing them, it is possible to deflate the total current price estimate of GSP(I) if a suitable aggregate deflator can be formed.

COMPILING CONSTANT PRICE ESTIMATES

5 Current and constant price estimates of State final demand (SFD) (the sum of private and public expenditures on consumption and gross fixed capital) are compiled and published, but there are no estimates of GSP(E). The reason is the lack of State stocks data and, most importantly, the lack of State data relating to trade in goods and services (other than international trade in goods).

Consequently, the approach taken has been to develop State-specific deflators to deflate the current price estimates of GSP(I) by calculating a deflator covering as much as possible of the difference between GSP(E) and SFD.

6 The difference between these two measures reflects the total of the following data items:

increase in stocks;
plus international exports of goods;
plus international exports of services;
less international imports of goods;
less international imports of services;
plus interstate exports of goods;
plus interstate exports of services;
less interstate imports of goods; and
less interstate imports of services.

7 The approach adopted essentially involves deriving the best possible current and constant price estimates of significant subsets of the above data items. For each State, current price estimates of the identified components are added to the current price estimates of SFD and, similarly, the constant price estimates of those components are added to the constant price estimates of SFD. The quotient derived by dividing the aggregate constant price estimates into the aggregate current price estimates is a Paasche (current-weighted) price index. This price index is used to revalue the current price estimates of GSP(I). It is crucial to identify separately those components for which the deflators deviate significantly from the average, since the method adopted effectively attributes the weighted average deflator to the unidentified components. Available information on the State distribution of these data items has been drawn on where possible and alternative indicators, as detailed below, have been used in their absence. Nevertheless, the aggregate current and constant price estimates used in deriving this deflator are not considered to be complete measures. They merely serve to produce the best deflators for GSP(I) that the available data and resources allow.

8 In some instances, both the current and constant price estimates of a component, or some approximation to them, are split by State using available indicators. In other instances, either a current or a constant price split is derived and the corresponding constant or current price estimates are derived by deflation if the initial split is in terms of current price estimates, or inflation if the initial split is in terms of constant price estimates. There is limited price information available at the State level, especially in the area of producers' prices and prices of internationally traded goods and services, which are the prices most relevant to the data items comprising the difference between GSP and SFD. There is an assumption underlying the approach adopted in deriving the aggregate State deflators that price competition will imply that the available price indicators are reasonably indicative of changes in prices at the State level. This is a less distorting assumption if the price indicators are weighted together at a reasonable level of commodity disaggregation, and implies deriving current and constant price estimates at as fine a level as possible. The indicators used in generating State component splits are necessarily partial and this leads to a caution being required about the accuracy of the derived GSP deflators. A description of the available data sources in respect of each of the component categories and the way in which they have been used follows.

STOCKS

9 There is no available State dimension to the existing quarterly stocks survey estimates. Available information on stock holding, production or sales has been used to give a State allocation of the national totals, in current and constant prices, for a number of sectors for which price variation in the component commodities is considered likely to have a significant impact on the individual aggregate State deflators or for which indicator data were readily available.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN GOODS

10 Detailed current price estimates of exports of goods on a recorded trade basis at the two-digit level of the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) have been revalued, generally using national rather than State-specific deflators, to produce constant price estimates of this component. These data are on the basis of port of loading, ie, the State in which the final stage of manufacture or production occurs. For most exports this should correspond to the basis required for State allocation (the State of final resident ownership). There is an assumption that the national deflators will usually provide a reasonable measure of change in price at the State level. Revaluation at the two-digit level of the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) is a compromise giving a reasonable level of disaggregation by commodity type without increasing the volume of the revaluation exercise too significantly. There are a very limited number of cases where more specific deflators have been used to replace the national deflator at the SITC division level. This has occurred in those cases where the composition of a particular division is known to be very variable between States and the division includes commodities with price movements which deviate significantly from the division average. Mineral and agricultural commodities are the most significant in this regard.

11 A similar approach has been adopted for imports of goods. The level of revaluation corresponds broadly to the commodity sub-group level of the balance of payments merchandise imports end-use classification of imports, that is, two-digit Broad Economic Classification (BEC) by three-digit level of the SITC. These data are on the basis of the State in which the imports were released from Australian Customs Service (ACS) control. In most cases this will correspond to the State of initial resident ownership which is the required basis of State allocation. No information is available on which to base an adjustment for goods which are released from ACS control in a State other than that in which their owner resides.

12 The current and constant price estimates of international trade in goods compiled for the quarterly State accounts are being published for the first time in the June quarter 1995 issue of 5242.0.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN SERVICES

13 Activity indicators have been used to derive State contributions to the national current and constant price estimates of exports and imports of services. Since there are no available indicators of variations in the component deflators between States, the same splits have been applied in current and constant price terms.

INTERSTATE TRADE IN GOODS

14 Interstate exports and imports of goods pose a particular problem. These data items are different from those above in that the flows must net to zero at the national level and hence there are no equivalent current price estimates at the national level which can be split and no relevant price indicators derived in relation to these items at the national level. The strategy adopted has been to generate constant price estimates, derive deflators relevant to these flows, and then inflate the constant price estimates to yield current price estimates.

15 For those States for which survey data by commodity on the value of interstate imports and exports of goods are available (Western Australia (annual) and Queensland (quarterly)), the data are deflated to obtain constant

price estimates. For the remaining States indicators of interstate imports and exports are derived using broad (constant price) activity indicators to extrapolate interstate trade flow estimates which have been derived using estimates from a model produced by the Monash University Centre of Policy Studies as described in Notes on the Construction of the 1986-87 Input-Output Database for the MONASH_MR Model by G.A. Meagher. The model yields estimates of interstate trade in goods by industry and State of supply and by State of destination. The relationships between the estimates by State and by industry are assumed to be fixed over time. The Monash model data used at present are in respect of 1986-87. The model identifies interstate trade flows only with respect to three industries: agriculture, mining and manufacturing. An internationally sourced component of interstate exports and imports is also incorporated. This component is not derived directly from the Monash data, but by comparison of the Monash net interstate trade estimates and the net interstate trade balances after identifying all other items, by State in 1986-87. A 1990-91 edition of the model has been completed recently, and the ABS intends to make use of this new information soon.

16 For each State an interstate imports deflator and an interstate exports deflator are derived. These deflators are current weighted up to the industry level on the basis of production or turnover estimates for the three industries indicated above, but fixed weighted between industries and between supplying States on the basis of the composition of interstate trade in 1986-87 as identified in the Monash model.

17 The deflators for the internationally sourced component of interstate trade reflect the fact that only estimates of the net flows are made for this component. A Paasche price index of international imports into New South Wales and Victoria, the net exporter States, is used for revaluation of flows into the net importer States and the respective aggregate State international import deflators are used for flows out of New South Wales and Victoria. Current price estimates of interstate exports and imports flows are derived by inflating the extrapolated constant price estimates using the deflators derived as described above.

INTERSTATE TRADE IN SERVICES

18 Interstate trade in services, which is not accounted for in the model used for goods, is likely to be significant in the case of at least some of the States, with the ACT likely to be particularly affected. State estimates of private final consumption expenditure include an adjustment to account for net expenditures interstate on services by households. This item is added to private final consumption expenditure to adjust it from a territorial to a resident basis. In order to ensure consistency of treatment, the current and constant price estimates of household expenditures interstate are included here, but with the opposite sign. It has not been possible to include estimates for the net expenditures interstate on services by the business and government sectors. The net effect of making only partial allowance for the interstate flow of services is that the balance of this item will be attributed the weighted average deflator derived for the identified components of GSP, including SFD.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

19 The constant price estimates of GSP(I) are seasonally adjusted at the aggregate level since there are no component constant price estimates available for analysis. The seasonal adjustment factors comprise a combination of the current price seasonal adjustment factors, seasonal adjustment factors for the implicit price deflator and an adjustment for the varying number of pay days in a quarter that contribute to the variation in the current price estimates of GSP(I).

20 The trend estimates are derived by applying a seven-term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted estimates.

**QUALIFICATIONS
ATTACHING TO
CONSTANT PRICE GSP
ESTIMATES**

21 The indirect methods used to obtain the constant price GSP estimates are generally considered to provide a reasonable indicator of overall real activity for each State. However, if there are large price movements in either international or interstate exports and/or imports in a particular quarter(s) then it is possible that the methods described above could lead to distorted estimates of constant price GSP being produced for one or more States. A further problem could arise even if the price effects of these components are correctly identified. It is not possible to ensure that the same effects are being fully included in the gross operating surplus component of GSP(I) and therefore in GSP(I) itself, for quarters beyond those for which taxation data have been incorporated (currently from September quarter 1993). The ABS specifically identified South Australia and Tasmania as two States for which this problem may have occurred in recent quarters and included a note to this effect in both the December quarter 1994 and March quarter 1995 issues of *Australian National Accounts: State Accounts* (5242.0).

**FUTURE RELEASE OF
QUARTERLY STATE
ACCOUNTS**

22 Unfortunately, some State accounts statistics for the March quarter 1995 attracted strong criticism. Since then the ABS has carefully considered whether or not the quarterly estimates of constant price GSP should continue to be produced and published. As part of this process, State and Territory officials were consulted and they confirmed a strong user need for these data. After weighing the matter the ABS decided to continue producing them, but with some significant changes, until their accuracy and reliability could be better assessed against the uses to which the statistics are put.

23 Some major changes are to be made to the ways in which the quarterly data are presented. First, the presentation of 5242.0 will be changed, starting with the June quarter 1995 issue. The new layout is designed to emphasise to users that the accounts are based on less complete data, and consequently make greater use of derived estimates, than the national accounts. Improved data sources are under consideration, but the derivation of constant price estimates of GSP will remain more indirect than is usual for published ABS statistics. Consequently both the quarterly and annual constant price estimates are being labelled "experimental" while the methodology continues to be evaluated.

24 Second, the data sets included in 5242.0 have been extended to show each State's international trade in goods at both current and constant prices. Further, to allow users to better interpret the constant price GSP statistics, a new set of estimates will be released showing constant price GSP adjusted for changes in each State's terms of trade (i.e. real gross State income). The overall terms of trade for each State will also be published.

25 Third, delaying the release of the quarterly State accounts by four weeks from June quarter 1995 on will enable more complete wages and salaries, and capital expenditure data to be used in their compilation. The lag between the end of the reference quarter and the publication of the quarterly State accounts, which was previously about 11 weeks, has now been extended to about 15 weeks.

ANALYSES AND COMMENTS

GROWTH IN EXPERIMENTAL ESTIMATES OF GSP AT AVERAGE 1989-90 PRICES

This is the first time that estimates of gross State product at average 1989-90 prices have been included in this publication. For the reasons set out in the Technical Note, *Compiling Constant Price Gross State Product* (see page vi), these estimates are regarded as "experimental". Users should therefore exercise caution when using them for economic analyses.

The table below compares annual rates of growth in experimental estimates of GSP at average 1989-90 prices and GSP at average 1989-90 prices per head of mean population over the ten years 1984-85 to 1993-94. The graphs on page 2 compare year-to-year rates of growth in GSP at average 1989-90 prices for each State or Territory with all other States/Territories combined. It should be noted that these comparisons are in constant price terms, whereas in previous publications they were at current prices. This means variations reflect changes in real production and effects due to changes in prices have been removed.

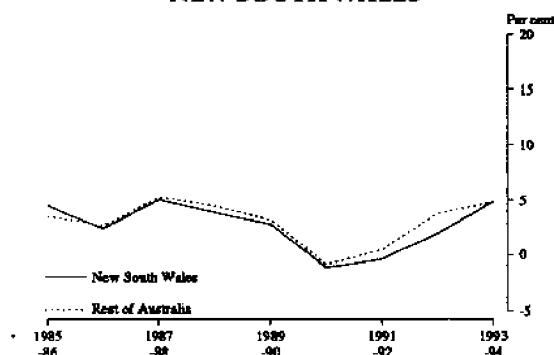
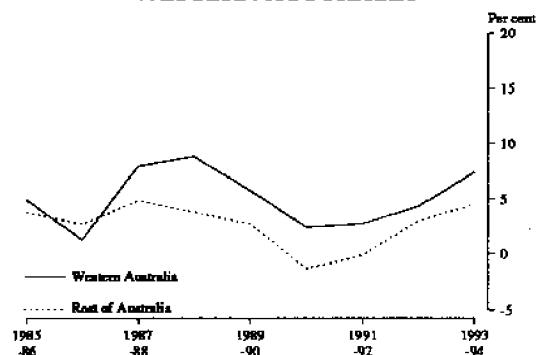
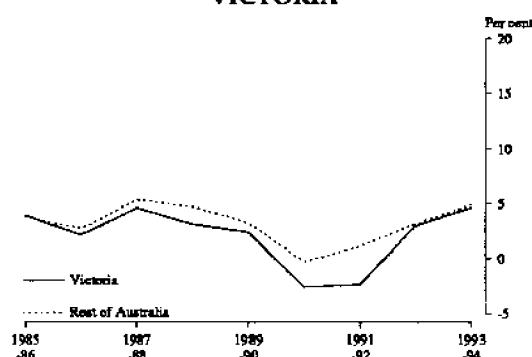
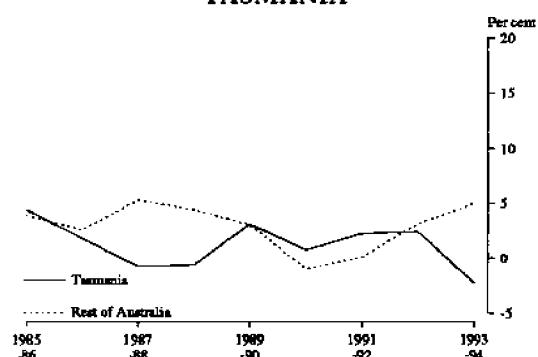
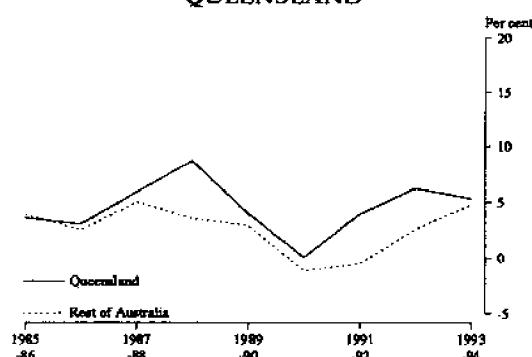
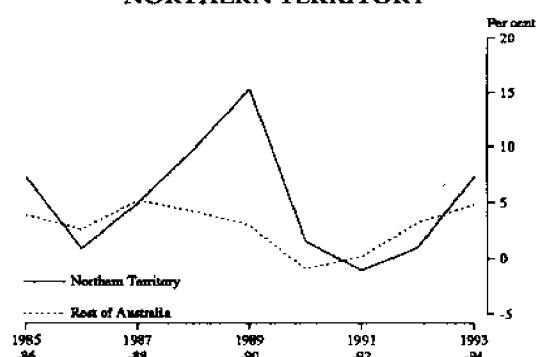
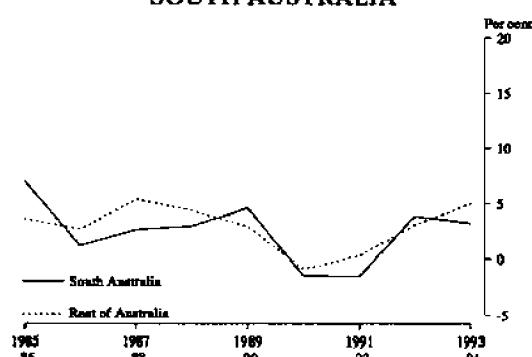
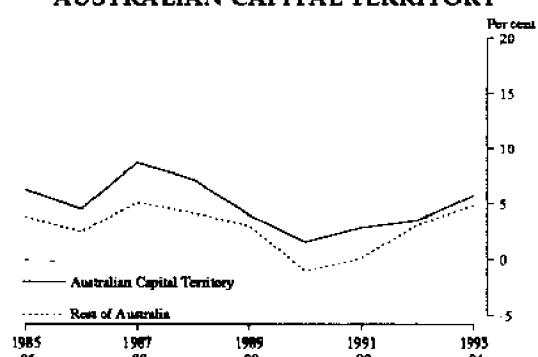
(a) Experimental series. Users are cautioned that these estimates are derived indirectly by calculating a deflator from the expenditure components. It is emphasised that, at times, there may be movements that cannot be fully explained introduced into the constant price GSP(I) series through the use of this proxy deflator (see the Technical Note, *Compiling Constant Price Gross State Product* on page vi).

Over the period 1984-85 to 1993-94, growth in GSP at average 1989-90 prices varied considerably between the States, with growth being strongest in Western Australia, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory and weakest in Victoria and Tasmania. The dispersion of growth rates was less, but still significant, in terms of GSP per head of mean population.

NEW SOUTH WALES

Growth in GSP roughly paralleled the rest of Australia over the period 1984-85 to 1993-94. New South Wales growth peaked in 1987-88, with growth in 1993-94 almost reaching this peak level. During the latest recession the New South Wales economy declined in real terms in 1990-91 and 1991-92. The recovery in New South Wales lagged the rest of Australia in 1991-92 and 1992-93, but matched the growth of the rest of Australia in 1993-94.

VICTORIA

Victoria's annual growth in constant price terms has been lower than the rest of Australia in eight out of the last nine years. The State economy declined more in real terms in the recession of 1990-91 than any other State.

QUEENSLAND

At average 1989-90 prices, growth in the Queensland economy was well above the rest of Australia combined from 1986-87, partly as a result of the above average growth of its population. In the 1990-91 recession, growth in the economy virtually halted but there was no decline. In the two years, 1991-92 and 1992-93, growth was again substantially above the Australian average, but was about the same as for the rest of Australia in 1993-94.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The South Australian economy exhibited the highest growth rate in Australia in 1985-86 and then grew more slowly during the three years 1986-87 to 1988-89. It then showed a high growth rate in 1989-90 followed by two years of decline. The economy declined more in the recession than any other State apart from Victoria, while it showed above average recovery in 1992-93. Growth in 1993-94 was below the rest of Australia.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The Western Australian economy grew faster than the rest of Australia combined in each year since 1985-86, apart from 1986-87, largely due to strong growth in the mining industry. It resulted in Western Australia's share of GDP(I) increasing from 9.1% in 1984-85 to 11.0% in 1993-94. The economy showed relatively strong growth during the 1990-91 recession; this was contributed to by a large increase in gas production from the North West Shelf.

TASMANIA

The growth of the Tasmanian economy has been out of step with the rest of the country. Unlike the rest of Australia, there was a recession during 1987-88 and 1988-89 but none in 1990-91 or 1991-92. Tasmania was the only State economy to show a decline in 1993-94.

NORTHERN TERRITORY

Economic growth in the Northern Territory is subject to considerable year-to-year volatility because of the high relative importance of mining and agricultural commodities to its economy. Production from major new resource projects periodically takes GSP to new levels. The Northern Territory economy recorded the lowest growth of any State in 1992-93 (partly due to disruptions to oil and uranium production) placing it some way behind the rest of Australia which experienced a reasonable recovery from the low growth rate in 1991-92. The Northern Territory economy then showed the second highest growth in 1993-94, just behind Western Australia.

AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY

Over the period 1985-86 to 1993-94, annual growth was higher than that of the rest of Australia. In 1993-94 the ACT economy again grew strongly (5.7%) to record the third highest growth rate behind Western Australia (7.4%) and the Northern Territory (7.3%).

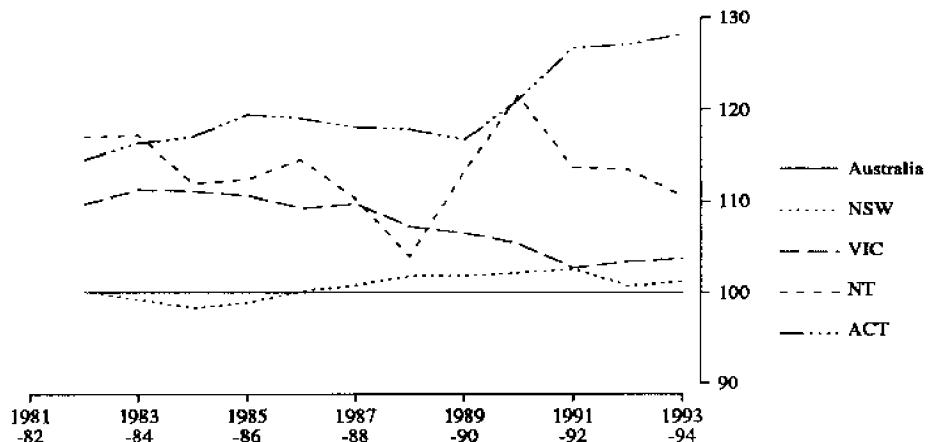
GSP PER HEAD OF MEAN POPULATION (ratio to Australia)

The graphs on page 4 show gross State product (GSP), in current prices, per head of mean population for each State and Territory divided by the Australian value (GDP(I) per head of mean population), for the period 1982-83 to 1993-94. It should be noted that GSP per head of mean population cannot be equated with the income of households in a particular State, (see comments on household income below).

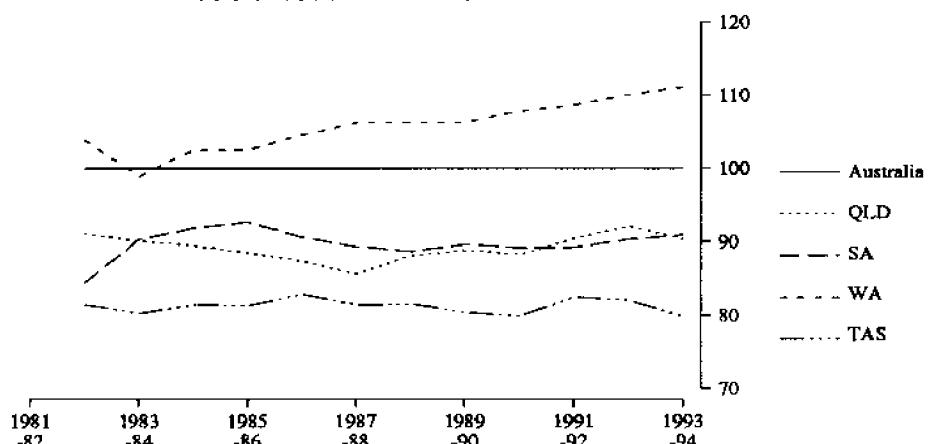
GSP per head of mean population in 1993-94 was above the national average in New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory. With the exception of 1990-91 the Australian Capital Territory had the highest level in each of the years from 1984-85. GSP per head of mean population in Queensland, South Australia and Tasmania has never exceeded the national average.

Queensland, Tasmania and the Northern Territory experienced a decline in this ratio in the past year. Victoria's ratio declined in every year from 1984-85 to 1991-92, apart from 1987-88 for which it recorded a slight increase. Small increases in Victoria's ratio have been recorded for 1992-93 and 1993-94. Despite the overall decline the Victorian ratio remained above the national average throughout the entire period from 1982-83 to 1993-94. Values for the Northern Territory are characterised by sharp peaks and troughs, mostly reflecting changes in gross product for the mining industry.

The ratio for Tasmania which generally declined from 1986-87 (83.0%) to 1990-91 (79.9%), recovered in 1991-92 to 82.6%, but fell slightly in 1992-93 to 82.2% and declined further in 1993-94 to 79.8%. The ratio for South Australia grew quickly from 1982-83 (84.5%) to 1985-86 (92.7%), but then steadily decreased to 88.8% in 1988-89. From 1989-90 the ratio was above 89% and recovered to 90.9% in 1993-94. The ratio for Queensland experienced a five year period of decline, from 1983-84 to 1987-88, but by 1992-93 had recovered to 92.1%. In 1993-94 the

ratio for Queensland declined to 90.3%. The ratio for Western Australia has been above the national average since 1984-85, rising from 102.5% in that year to 111.2% in 1993-94. The ratio for the Australian Capital Territory generally rose from 1982-83 to 1985-86, declined marginally from 1986-87 to 1989-90, and again rose strongly from 1990-91 to 1993-94.

INDUSTRY COMPOSITION OF GSP

Individual industry contributions to gross State product at factor cost (GSP(fc)) for 1993-94 are shown below. Apart from Western Australia and the Australian Capital Territory, a relative shift from goods producing industries to service providing industries has occurred in all States from 1982-83 to 1993-94.

For all States except for the Northern Territory, the manufacturing industry has been the most significant contributor to the decline in the contribution of goods producing industries to GSP(fc). For the Northern Territory the share of manufacturing industry to total GSP(fc) was 5% in both 1982-83 and 1993-94.

NEW SOUTH WALES

In 1982-83, manufacturing (18% of GSP(fc)) was the most important industry in New South Wales. By 1993-94 manufacturing's share of GSP(fc) had fallen to 15%, but manufacturing still remains the most significant contributor to GSP(fc). In contrast, the contribution of property and business services rose from 7% in 1982-83 to 10% in 1993-94 and finance and insurance rose to 4% from 2% in 1982-83. Ownership of dwellings and retail trade's share of GSP(fc) also increased over the same period, while transport and storage (7% in 1982-83) fell to 5% in 1993-94. The share of agriculture, forestry and fishing has mainly varied between 3% and 4% over the same period, but has contributed only 2% to State GSP(fc) from 1991-92 reflecting prolonged drought conditions in much of the State.

VICTORIA

Manufacturing's share of GSP(fc) fell from 23% in 1982-83 to stabilise at 18% between 1990-91 to 1992-93, but increased to 19% in 1993-94. Manufacturing is still Victoria's most important industry. Property and business services' share of GSP(fc) is 9%, placing it equal with ownership of dwellings to be the next largest contributors to GSP(fc) after manufacturing. Finance and insurance recorded the largest growth, increasing from 1% in 1982-83 to 4% in 1993-94. The share of mining has generally declined from a peak of around 6% in 1983-84 and 1984-85 to 3% between the years 1986-87 to 1989-90 and has stabilised at 4% since 1990-91. Agriculture, forestry and fishing has varied mostly between 3% and 4% of GSP(fc) over the period from 1982-83.

QUEENSLAND

Significant contributors to GSP(fc) in 1993-94 include manufacturing (12%, though its share has declined from 14% in 1982-83), retail trade (9%) and ownership of dwellings (10%). The share for construction varied between 9% and 10% over much of the period but has fallen to 8% since 1991-92. The contribution of agriculture, forestry and fishing has levelled off at 5% from 1990-91. This represents a slight decline from the 6% to 7% that this industry contributed for the period 1983-84 to 1989-90. Finance and insurance (2% in 1982-83 and 3% in 1993-94) and property and business services (6% in 1992-83 and 7% in 1993-94) both recorded increases in their contributions to GSP(fc).

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In 1993-94, manufacturing was the highest contributor to GSP(fc) with 19% of the total. Unlike the situation in most other States, manufacturing in South Australia has generally maintained its relative importance. The contribution of mining (1% in 1982-83) peaked at 5% in 1985-86 but has fallen to 2% in 1993-94. The share of agriculture, forestry and fishing peaked at 7% in 1983-84 then generally declined to contribute 4% in 1993-94. Finance and insurance (4% in 1993-94) and property and business services (8% in 1993-94) both increased their contribution to GSP(fc) by 3 percentage points over the period from 1982-83. The share of health and community services at around 7% to 8% of State GSP(fc) over the period 1982-83 to 1993-94 is the highest of any of the States.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

In 1982-83 manufacturing contributed the largest proportion of GSP(fc) (13%), ahead of mining which contributed 10%. Manufacturing fell to 11% of GSP(fc) in 1993-94, while over the same period mining increased in importance, its share ranging between 11% and 16%, contributing 14% in 1993-94. The contribution of agriculture, forestry and fishing (9% in 1982-83) has declined significantly to 4% of GSP(fc) for each of the past three years. Retail trade (7% in 1982-83 and 8% in 1993-94) and construction (8% in 1982-83 and 9% in 1993-94) both recorded increases in their contributions to GSP(fc).

TASMANIA

As in most other States, the share of manufacturing has gradually declined over the period from a peak of 18% between 1983-84 and 1985-86 to 15% in 1993-94. Agriculture, forestry and fishing contributed between 5% and 7% of GSP(fc) over the period 1982-83 to 1993-94. The contribution of mining fell from 5% to 2% over the same period. Following a decline from 6% in the four years to 1985-86, the share of transport and storage has been consistently at 5% between 1986-87 and 1993-94. Ownership of dwellings (6% in 1982-83 and 10% in 1993-94) and retail trade (8% in 1982-83 and 11% in 1993-94) both recorded increases in their shares of GSP(fc).

**NORTHERN
TERRITORY**

Mining remains the most important industry in the Northern Territory, contributing 20% to total GSP(fc) in 1993-94. The share of agriculture, forestry and fishing has remained relatively stable over the period from 1982-83 to 1993-94, contributing 3% of GSP(fc) in most years. Retail trade contributions have varied between 7% and 10% over the same period, with the 1993-94 share being 9%. Between 1982-83 and 1988-89 the construction industry contributed 10% to 11% of GSP(fc). From 1990-91 this industry's share has stabilised at 9%. Consistent with the rest of Australia, finance and insurance (1% in 1982-83 to 3% in 1993-94) and property and business services (5% in 1982-83 to 6% in 1993-94), increased their shares of GSP(fc) over the period.

**AUSTRALIAN
CAPITAL
TERRITORY**

Although the share of government administration and defence services declined between 1982-83 (34% of GSP(fc)) and 1993-94 (26% of GSP(fc)), it remains by far the Territory's dominant industry. Property and business services' contribution of 11% of GSP(fc) in 1993-94 ranks it as the second most important industry in the ACT. Retail trade's share of GSP(fc) has risen from 5% in 1982-83 to 7% in 1993-94. Ownership of dwellings' share has generally increased over the period while education's share of GSP(fc) has fallen to 8% in 1993-94 from 10% in 1982-83. Other industries that increased in relative importance were construction (6% in 1982-83 to 7% in 1993-94), personal and other services (2% in 1982-83 to 3% in 1993-94) and wholesale trade (2% in 1982-83 to 3% in 1993-94).

**HOUSEHOLD
INCOME**

The analysis above concentrates on the level of economic production (GSP) and its growth in current price terms. It does not provide a measure of incomes received by residents, because a proportion of income generated in the production process may be transferred to other States or overseas (and conversely income may be received from other States or overseas).

Household income measures income received by residents (before the deduction of income taxes) from all sources, including wages, salaries and supplements, unincorporated enterprises income, interest, dividends, and personal benefit payments such as pensions, medical benefits and unemployment benefits. Household income per head of mean population in 1993-94 is shown in Table 10.

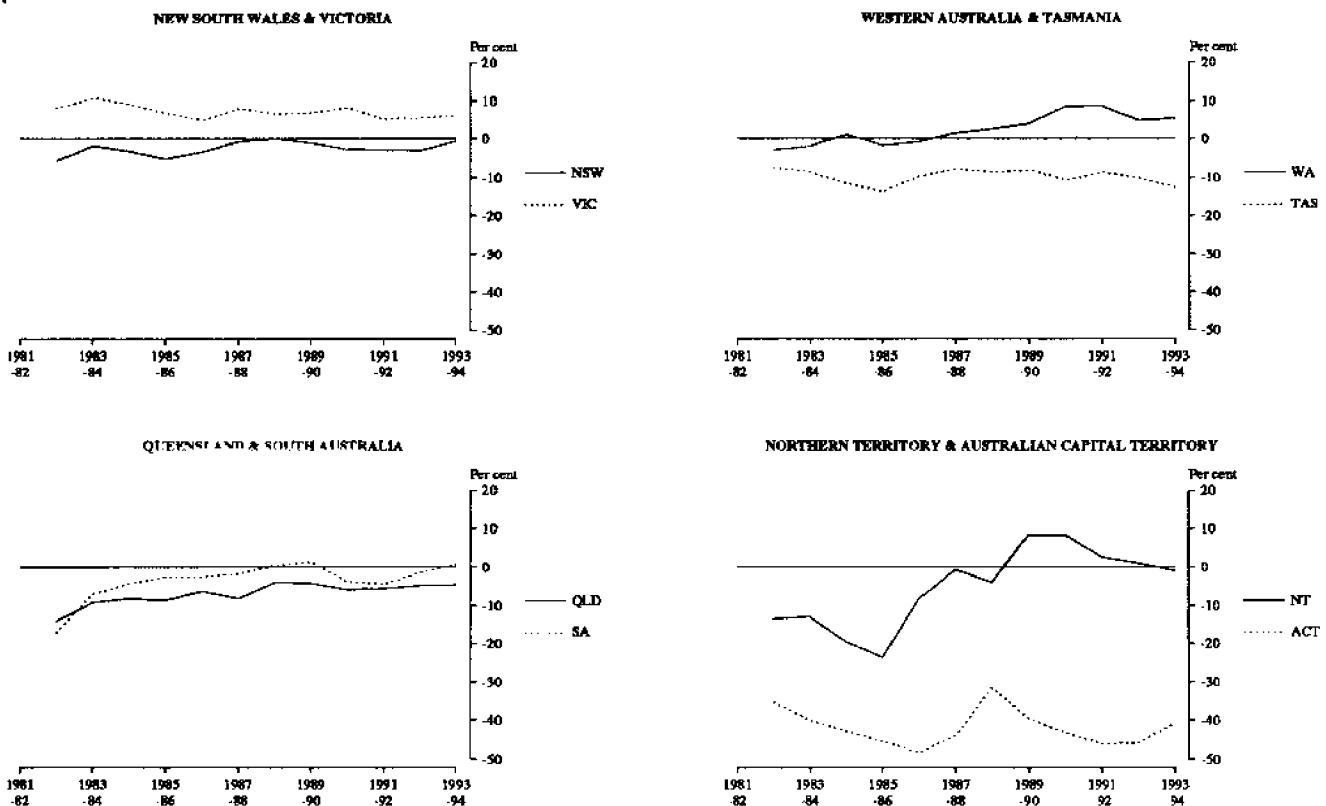
Household income per head of mean population was highest in the Australian Capital Territory and lowest in Tasmania. Differences between the States reflect differences in a range of factors including the average level of wages, salaries and supplements received per employee, the proportion of the population in employment, the age distribution of the population, and differences in the level of dwelling rent (including that imputed to owner occupiers). The relative impacts of these factors differ from State to State. For example, a significant

reason for the high level of household income per head of mean population in the Australian Capital Territory compared with other States is that the labour force participation rate is much higher there than in the rest of Australia.

GROSS STATE PRODUCT less STATE FINAL DEMAND

The difference between GSP and State Final Demand (SFD) is equal to the increase in stocks plus net interstate and international trade in goods and services plus the statistical discrepancy. Changes in stocks may make a significant contribution to the balancing item for particular years. However, it is expected that net interstate and international trade in goods and services will dominate the long-term movements in the residual series over time.

The graphs above show the value of this residual as a percentage of GSP over the years 1982-83 to 1993-94. The graphs indicate that Victoria has been a net exporter over the whole of the period, whereas New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory have been net importers. A major factor influencing this result for the ACT is that much of the Commonwealth government's consumption expenditure occurs in the ACT. The present treatment attributes all of this to the ACT. If data had been available to allocate Commonwealth government final consumption expenditure to end users, the residual for the Australian Capital Territory would be a much smaller negative because the provision of the services would be regarded as an export to other States. This would lead to a substantial reduction in the estimates of SFD in the ACT, but have no impact on its GSP. (See paragraph 14 of the Explanatory Notes for further details.) Western Australia has gone from being a net importer up to the mid 1980s to being a net exporter, reflecting strong growth in the mining industry. South Australia has been a net importer for the whole of this period with the exception of 1988-89 and 1989-90. In the Northern Territory, the residual has changed from being negative (a net importer) during the 1980s to

being positive (a net exporter) from 1989-90 to 1992-93 and back to a very small negative in 1993-94.

**PRIVATE GROSS
FIXED CAPITAL
EXPENDITURE**

The graphs on page 10 compare private gross fixed capital expenditure as a percentage of GSP for each State with the rest of Australia. Investment in most States peaked in 1988-89. As a percentage of GSP, investment has been above the rest of Australia in all years in Queensland and Western Australia. It has been below the rest of Australia in all years in Victoria, Tasmania and Australian Capital Territory. Investment in the two Territories has tended to move independently of national trends. Major resource developments and differences in the timing of property upswings and downswings contribute to differences in investment levels between States.

Tables 48 to 55 provide data on private gross fixed capital expenditure by type of asset, on which the following comments are based.

DWELLINGS

Compared with the other components of capital expenditure, dwelling expenditure in 1993-94 grew relatively strongly in all States. Following a downturn in the early 1990s, Western Australia led the other States, with growth rates just over 20 per cent in 1992-93 and 1993-94. Over the past two years, all States except South Australia and Tasmania, recorded average growth rates above their long term average (since 1982-83).

**NON-DWELLING
CONSTRUCTION**

Since the downturn of the early 1990s, expenditure on non-dwelling construction has continued to fall in New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. The continued decline in these States has resulted in expenditure falling to levels experienced during the mid 1980s - prior to the "property boom" of the late 1980s. A notable exception to this downward trend was the Northern Territory, which increased 123.1 per cent over the latest two years, to 1993-94.

EQUIPMENT

As with other components of capital expenditure, equipment declined in the early 1990s across all States. Since 1991-92, the rate of 'recovery' has varied widely across States, with several States being affected significantly by large "one-off" purchases, eg the purchase of power stations from the public sector in Victoria and Queensland (in 1992-93 and 1993-94 respectively). South Australia was the only State to decline in the latest two years, to 1993-94.

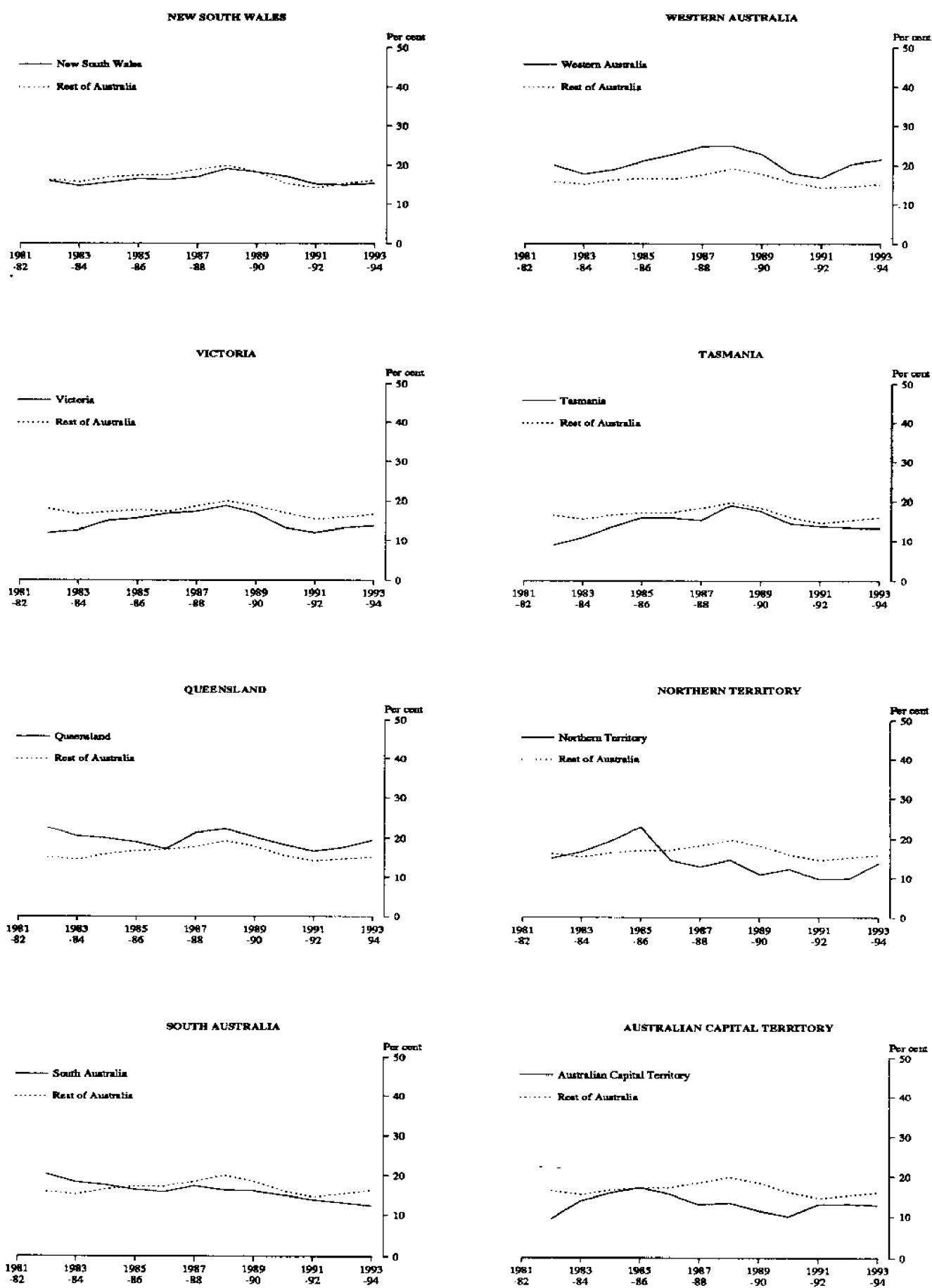
**REAL ESTATE
TRANSFER EXPENSES**

Real estate transfer expenses, as a percentage of private gross fixed capital expenditure, have fluctuated in all States, generally in accordance with property cycles.

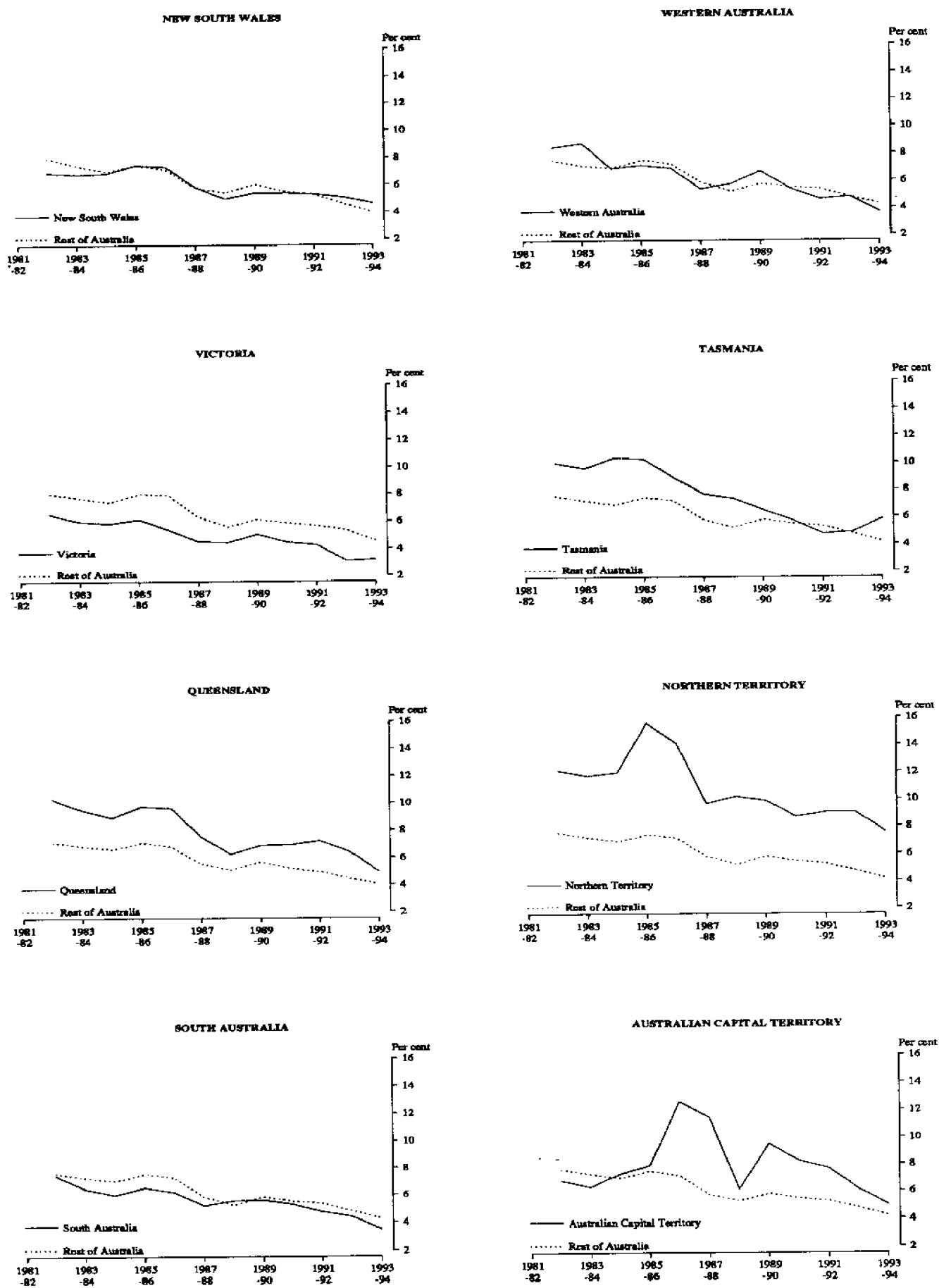
**PUBLIC GROSS FIXED
CAPITAL
EXPENDITURE**

The graphs on page 11 compare public gross fixed capital expenditure as a percentage of GSP for each State with the rest of Australia. Since peaking around 1986-87 (in some States a year or so earlier) public capital expenditure as a percentage of GSP has trended down in all States. Tasmania was the only State showing any increase over the latest two years, to 1993-94. Queensland and Northern Territory public capital expenditure as a percentage of GSP have been consistently above the rest of Australia. Except for one or two years, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory have also been consistently above the rest of Australia. While New South Wales has tended to reflect the Australian pattern, Victoria has been consistently below the rest of Australia.

Percentage of Gross State Product



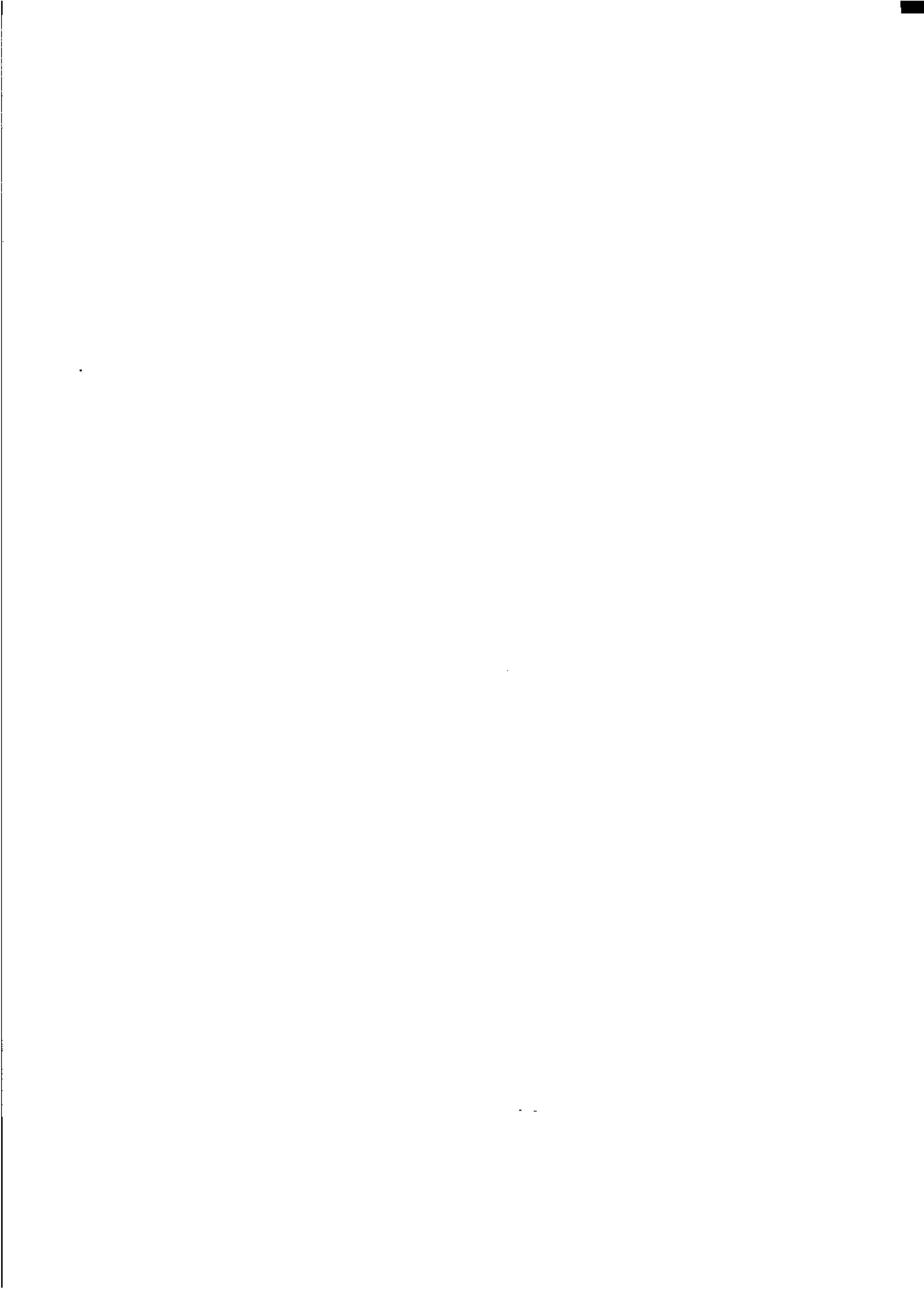

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains income-based estimates of gross domestic product (referred to as gross State product (GSP)) and estimates of domestic final demand by State and Territory for the years 1982-83 to 1993-94. State and Territory estimates are also provided for many other national accounting aggregates (see the Table of Contents, page iii). Estimates are consistent with those published for Australia in the 1993-94 issue of *Australian National Accounts: National Income, Expenditure and Product* (5204.0).

2. State and Territory estimates are essentially a dissection of the counterpart Australian estimates contained in 5204.0. While it is possible in some cases to build up estimates using the same data sources as those used for the Australian estimates, it is quite often necessary to derive dissections using a variety of allocators. These can range from being directly related to the aggregate being allocated (for example, economic census data) to being only indirectly related (for example, population and household income distributions).

Concepts, definitions, sources and methods

3. The structure of the accounts accords closely with the international standard described in the United Nations publication *A System of National Accounts* (SNA) 1968. After a long review process, a revised international national accounting standard has recently been published, entitled *System of National Accounts, 1993*. It was produced and published by an Intersecretariat Working Group, comprising representatives from five organisations involved in the use of economic statistics and the promotion of international statistical standards - United Nations, Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, International Monetary Fund, World Bank and Commission of the European Communities. The Australian national accounts will be reviewed to achieve the maximum possible alignment with these standards, with the major changes being implemented in 1997.

4. Detailed information concerning concepts, definitions, data sources and methodology is contained in the current edition of *Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (5216.0) which was released in May 1990. Some of the more relevant details are provided in the following paragraphs.

5. While national estimates are based on the concepts and conventions embodied in the SNA, no such detailed standard is available for sub-national (regional/State) accounts. In the main the national concepts are applicable to State accounts, but there remain a number of conceptual and measurement issues that either do not apply or are insignificant at the national level. Most problems arise in the context of gross State product for the transport, communication and finance industries and in the treatment of central government. In such cases, conventions need to be

established which reflect data availability and/or the needs of users.

6. Problems can occur where the institutional unit cuts across State borders. However, this is generally not relevant for estimates of: household income; farm income; private final consumption expenditure; State and Local government final consumption expenditure and gross fixed capital expenditure; and State and Local government income and outlay accounts and capital accounts. For these aggregates State and Territory estimates are derived either as a by-product of estimating the Australian total or by distributing Australian totals to States using closely related indicators. Individual State and Local government income and outlay accounts and capital accounts are largely obtained from the ABS public finance system, and are directly estimated (except for the consumption of fixed capital component) from government financial records.

7. Estimates of GSP are produced by summing factor incomes i.e. wages, salaries and supplements, and gross operating surplus (GOS), plus indirect taxes less subsidies. While wages and salaries can be readily collected by State, this is not always the case for supplements or GOS which often cannot be measured satisfactorily within business accounting systems at the individual location. Most of the ABS integrated industry collections which provided data for estimates in this publication have used the "establishment" as their basic collection unit. An establishment has been defined as the smallest accounting unit of an enterprise which controls its own productive activities and maintains a specified range of detailed data, including those which allow value added to be calculated. In general, an establishment covers all the operations of an enterprise at a physical location, but may consist of a group of locations within the same State, or in some cases, Australia. For enterprises that fall into this latter category, conventions have to be adopted in order to allocate GOS to States and Territories.

8. For the Transport and storage and Communication industries, estimates of GOS by State and Territory can be substantially affected by the conceptual basis adopted for allocation. For example, in the case of the modal transport industries (i.e. all transport industries except Services to transport), possible ways of attributing production could include: tonne (or person) kilometres travelled in a State; economic activity attributed to the base of operations only; or a mixture of both. As State economic activity for interstate modal transport activities cannot be uniquely defined, it may even be preferable that they should be regarded as extra-territorial and excluded entirely from State production. However, the approach adopted in this publication is to use activity indicators to allocate interstate transport services to States.

9. Numerous data sources are used to apportion Australia-level GOS to States. Taxation statistics are used for non-farm unincorporated enterprises. Where available, economic censuses and surveys data are used for companies. For intercensal years and for those

industries that are out-of-scope of the ABS program of economic censuses, a variety of allocators are used to extrapolate or estimate State dissections. Indicators include State details of wages and salaries, employment, private final consumption expenditure, movements in unincorporated enterprises' GOS, airport passenger embarkations/disembarkations, and freight shipped from Australian ports (the latter two indicators are specific to the transport industry). Production-based estimates of farm sector GOS are derived using the same data sources and methodology used for the Australian estimates. Although the GOS of State and Local public trading enterprises is directly available from the ABS public finance system, GOS for Commonwealth government public trading enterprises is allocated mainly using indirect indicators.

10. While State by industry estimates of wages and salaries are obtained from the same data sources as those used for the Australian estimates, the corresponding estimates of the components of supplements are essentially allocations of the Australian total. State by industry estimates of superannuation are derived using wages and salaries by State by industry as an allocator. State by industry estimates of workers' compensation are based on industrial accident statistics and labour costs data collected by the ABS. It should be noted that there is a minor definitional difference between wages, salaries and supplements as published in the gross product tables and as published in the household income tables for both Australian and State estimates. The difference arises in situations where a household supplies labour to a production establishment that is in a different domestic territory (State/Country) from the household.

11. Estimates of indirect taxes less subsidies are derived by adding values for indirect taxes received and subsidies paid by State and Local governments and the Commonwealth government. Data are available from the ABS public finance system, although Commonwealth government values are not generally available by State. Indicators are used to allocate sales tax, excise tax, customs duties and major subsidies to the State where the economic activity took place.

12. State estimates of private final consumption expenditure and gross fixed capital expenditure are derived largely from the same sources used for the Australia-level estimates. In the case of private final consumption expenditure, data sources for major components such as household goods, dwelling rent, purchase of motor vehicles, fares, and purchases of gas, electricity and fuel are available by State. Some components of expenditure on entertainment and recreation rely on the extrapolation and interpolation of less frequent Household Expenditure Survey data. Where actual data are not available, indirect indicators such as household disposable income are used to allocate the Australia-level estimate.

13. State and Territory estimates of private gross fixed capital expenditure on dwellings and non-dwelling construction are derived using data from the

ABS Building Activity Survey and the Engineering Construction Survey, while expenditure on equipment is derived from the Survey of Private New Fixed Capital Expenditure. Real estate transfer expenses are derived from data supplied by the various State Stamp Duty Offices, ABS surveys of real estate agents and lawyers, and various other data such as the number of real estate property transfers by State and Territory. Essentially, these are the same data sources used to prepare the Australia-level estimates.

14. The treatment of Commonwealth government final expenditures in regional accounting is rather problematic. Alternative treatments are to attribute final expenditures to the region in which the expenditure was incurred, or to the region in which the beneficiaries reside, or even to consider the Commonwealth government consumer unit as extra-territorial and therefore to exclude it from all regions. For practical reasons the first approach has been adopted in this publication, although it still required extensive use of indirect indicators. An implication is that a large proportion of the consumption of Commonwealth Government services is included in SFD for the ACT, inflating the balancing item for that territory. If data had been available to allocate Commonwealth final consumption expenditure to end users, the balancing item for the ACT would be a much smaller negative because the provision of the services would be regarded as an interstate export instead. Estimates for Commonwealth government expenditures in the States on both an annual and quarterly basis therefore have to be treated with considerable caution. The wages and salaries component of Commonwealth government final consumption expenditure was directly apportioned to States using data from the ABS Survey of Employment and Earnings and information supplied by the Department of Defence. Expenditures on goods and services classified to defence were allocated according to population while non-defence purchases were allocated according to Commonwealth general government employment by State and Territory.

15. For Commonwealth general government gross fixed capital expenditure, Australia-level estimates were first subdivided into expenditure on construction and expenditure on equipment. The construction expenditure component for years since 1986-87 was allocated to States and Territories using data for projected construction expenditure in each State and Territory, published jointly by the Department of Administrative Services and the Department of Industry, Technology and Commerce. In the absence of these data for prior years, population by State and Territory was used to allocate the Australia-level estimate. Expenditure on equipment has been allocated using Commonwealth general government employment by State and Territory.

16. For Commonwealth public enterprise gross fixed capital expenditure, a variety of allocators has been applied at the individual enterprise level. Direct allocators have been used in a few cases where

enterprises operated wholly in one State or Territory. State-level direct indicators were available for larger enterprises from either the ABS Engineering Construction Survey (for Telstra) or published accounts (e.g. Federal Airports Commission). Indirect indicators were used to allocate purchases of equipment: for example, purchases of ships and aircraft were allocated using general freight and passenger activity through ports and airports in each State and Territory, consistent with the treatment adopted for the allocation of gross operating surplus.

Constant price estimates of GSP(I)

17. The estimates of gross State product at average 1989-90 prices presented in this publication are derived by revaluing current-price, income-based estimates of gross state product GSP(I), using deflators which are compiled using the available data on the composition of expenditures on State production and movements in associated prices. For a more complete description of why this approach to the derivation of a constant price estimate of GSP has been adopted and details of the data sources and the methods used, see the Technical Note on page vi of this publication and/or the Technical Note in either the September or December quarter 1994 issues of *Australian National Accounts: State Accounts* (5242.0).

18. A lack of data means that it is not possible to derive estimates at the State level equivalent to the aggregate Australian estimates of expenditure on gross domestic product (GDP(E)). While the components of State final demand (SFD) and recorded trade estimates of international merchandise trade by State are available, there are no complete estimates of international trade in services; interstate trade in goods and services; or change in stocks. Hence, a State-based constant price GSP(E) measure cannot be derived by a similar methodology to that adopted at the Australian level in the derivation of constant price GDP(E). For reasons described in the Technical Note referred to above, constant price estimates of the components of GSP(P) and GSP(I) cannot be derived. In the absence of data for the derivation of production-based estimates of GSP(P), the only currently practical strategy for the derivation of constant price estimates of GSP is revaluation of the aggregate current price GSP(I) estimates.

19. In order to make maximum use of the incomplete expenditure data and limited price data available at the State level, an approach is adopted which essentially involves deriving the best possible current and constant price estimates of subsets of expenditure that encompass most, but not all, of GSP. For each State, current price estimates of identified components of international and interstate trade and increase in stocks are added to the current price estimates of SFD and, similarly, the constant price estimates of those components are added to the constant price estimates of SFD. The quotient derived by dividing the aggregate constant price estimates into the aggregate current price estimates is a Paasche (current-weighted) price

index. It is this price index which is used to revalue the current price estimates of GSP(I).

20. It is crucial to identify separately those components for which the deflators deviate significantly from the average, since the method adopted effectively attributes the weighted average deflator to the unidentified components. There is an assumption underlying the approach adopted in deriving the aggregate State deflators that price competition will imply that the available national price indicators are reasonably indicative at the State level. This is a less distorting assumption if the price indicators are weighted together at a reasonable level of commodity disaggregation, and implies deriving the current and constant price estimates at as fine a level as possible.

21. Despite the fact that as broad a range of information as possible has been drawn on in this estimation procedure, the aggregate current and constant price estimates of expenditures used in the derivation of this deflator are not considered to be complete measures. They merely serve to produce the best deflators and therefore the most reliable estimates of constant price GSP(I) that the available data and resources allow. For this reason, they are regarded as experimental estimates. During the next few quarters, the accuracy and reliability of the constant price GSP(I) estimates will be assessed against the uses to which these statistics are put.

Changes in this issue

22. Estimates of gross State product at average 1989-90 prices are presented for the first time in this issue (see Tables 1 and 2), although such estimates were initially released in the September quarter 1994 issue of *Australian National Accounts: State Accounts* (5242.0). See paragraphs 17 to 21 for a brief description of the sources and methods used to compile these estimates. The summary tables containing the expenditure components of State final demand at both current and average 1989-90 prices (Tables 5 to 11 in the 1992-93 issue of this publication) have been consolidated into Tables 6 and 7 in this issue. As a result of the changes to the summary tables in Section 1, the table numbers for all tables in other Sections of this publication have been reduced by three.

23. National accounts industry statistics are now classified according to a new industrial classification - the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC). Consequently, the estimates of gross State product at factor cost by industry and principal components shown in Section 2, are classified by ANZSIC.

24. In the 1992-93 issue of this publication the method used for deriving constant price estimates of State and local government final consumption expenditure was changed for Victoria and Tasmania. The modified method has now been applied to all States and Territories. Redundancy payments are now deducted from current price values prior to deflation

and a constant price estimate of the redundancy payment liability is added to the result. The constant price estimates of the redundancy payments are derived by multiplying an employment estimate for the particular quarter by the redundancy payments made in the base year (1989-90) divided by the average employment in 1989-90. While these estimates of redundancy payment liabilities are not entirely satisfactory, the new method has the desirable effect of removing volatility caused by redundancy payments from the constant price estimates. (This change was introduced in the June quarter 1994 issue of the quarterly national accounts (5206.0).)

Revisions in this issue

25. Estimates have been revised to incorporate later information from taxation assessment statistics, the gross value of farm production series and other sources which normally become available by this time each year.

Accuracy of estimates

26. The estimates contained in this publication represent allocations of Australian estimates published in 5204.0. Therefore, they will reflect any inaccuracies in those estimates as well as inaccuracies introduced by any particular conceptual, methodological and data problems inherent in the allocation of Australian estimates to States. As such, the degree of accuracy and reliability will necessarily be lower than that for the counterpart Australian estimates.

27. Uniform methodologies and consistent data sources have been used for all States. Although there is no reason to expect that there would be any bias in the methodology used, there is some variation in both the quality of data between States (particularly where sample surveys are used) and the sensitivity of estimates to alternative concepts.

28. Detailed industry estimates for the Territories are likely to be less accurate than those for the States. For example, the adjustment of taxation statistics (the major data source for the unincorporated enterprises component of GOS) from a State office-of-assessment basis to the preferred State-of-residence basis is relatively more significant for the Australian Capital Territory than for the other States and the Northern Territory. For the Communications industry, data for the Australian Capital Territory are available only in combination with New South Wales; a similar problem exists for the Northern Territory which is combined with South Australia. The use of indirect allocators to separate the Territories has a far more significant effect on the relative errors for the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory than for New South Wales and South Australia. Where sample surveys are used to collect data, standard errors are often higher for the Territories than for the States.

29. Estimates of GOS for the latest year rely on a range of broad activity indicators such as retail turnover, construction work done and persons employed. Therefore, they are subject to revision as

more suitable sources, such as taxation statistics and ABS economic census data, become available.

30. There have been a number of source data changes over the period covered in this publication which have adversely affected the accuracy of estimates of GOS by State and Territory. The usual range of taxation data for partnerships and trusts was not produced for the years 1987-88 and 1988-89. In addition, the accuracy of taxation data for partnerships and trusts from 1987-88 to 1990-91 was affected by incomplete statistical processing of returns by the Australian Taxation Office. Changes to the ABS manufacturing census since 1986-87 have resulted in the full range of data items required to calculate GOS being available only every three years rather than annually. Also receipts and expenses data by State for Telecom ceased to be available after 1987-88 as a result of the reorganisation of that organisation's accounting system. Hence estimates of gross operating surplus by industry by State for years 1987-88 to 1990-91 rely to a greater extent than usual on interpolation of allocations established for years prior to 1987-88 and post 1990-91. Care should be taken in interpreting movements over this period as well as in the most recent year.

31. Estimates of indirect taxes less subsidies, government final consumption expenditure, and general government and public enterprise gross fixed capital expenditure can be substantially affected by the indicators chosen to apportion the Commonwealth government component to States and Territories. Again, care is required when interpreting these estimates.

32. For years prior to 1983-84, State estimates of wages, salaries and supplements (particularly for individual industries) were affected by significant changes to source data over that period. For years since 1983-84, estimates of wages and salaries are based on the labour force survey and a large scale survey of employment and earnings. A small interim survey of earnings (which was not designed to produce accurate State estimates either at the industry or total level) and the labour force survey were used to prepare estimates of wages and salaries for the years 1981-82 and 1982-83. Estimates of wages, salaries and supplements, and therefore gross product at factor cost, are only included for all industries combined for the Northern Territory for years prior to 1983-84.

33. The incomplete nature of the price and expenditure data available at the State level for the derivation of the GSP(I) deflators and the generally lower level of accuracy of State data, referred to earlier, mean that there is greater scope for inaccuracy than in comparable estimates at the Australian level. The constant price estimates of GSP(I) are derived measures, calculated by adjusting the current price estimates using specially constructed State deflators. This means that the constant price estimates incorporate the combined effects of the inaccuracies in the current price estimates and those in the deflators.

These inaccuracies reflect a number of factors, including: higher relative sampling errors; the 'fuzziness' of some State data arising from reporting businesses and government agencies that operate across the country having difficulty allocating their activities by State; and the limited availability of source data on a State basis in a number of areas. The inaccuracies in the component value and price estimates may be compounded or offset in the process of deriving the constant price estimates.

34. In analysing the derived constant price estimates it is important to recognise the data limitations at the State level and to be aware that the accuracy of the estimates will not be as high as that of the corresponding national estimates. They represent a useful indicator of growth in the volume of State production, but are necessarily affected by the data limitations at the State level. The series are regarded as experimental.
