INTRODUCTION

This bulletin contains statistics of the Australian civilian labour force for the year 1970, based on the results of a quarterly sample survey (the population survey). It is issued as a supplement to the quarterly bulletin "The Labour Force" (Reference No. 6.20), which contains current estimates for the main series. Corresponding estimates from 1964 have been issued in the bulletins "The Labour Force, 1964 to 1968" and "The Labour Force, 1969" (Reference No. 6.22). The former contained a description of the sample on which the survey is based and particulars of some of the operational features of the survey.

- The population survey is carried out on a one per cent sample throughout Australia in February, May, August and November each year. About 38,000 private dwellings (houses, flats, etc.) are visited during each survey as well as a sample of other dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.). The survey information is obtained by means of personal interviews carried out by specially trained enumerators.
- The main purpose of the survey is to provide, at quarterly intervals, statistics of the labour force, but from time to time it is used for other inquiries, in order to provide additional information about particular aspects of the labour force or more general information about the population of Australia. The results of these inquiries are issued separately.

Population coverage

4. The sample used in the population survey covers the six States, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory. The survey estimates relate to all persons aged fifteen years and over, except members of the permanent aimed forces, national servicemen enlisted in the Regular Army Supplement and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from census and estimated populations.

Classification of the labour force

The classification used in the surveys conforms closely to that recommended by the Eighth International Conference of Labour Statisticians, held in Geneva in 1954. Each person in the survey is classified according to his actual activity (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during "survey week", the week immediately preceding that in which the interview takes place, and is assigned to one of the three categories, employed, unemployed or not in the labour force. The interviews are carried out during a period of four weeks, so that there are four survey weeks in each of the months to which the survey relates. These weeks generally fall within the limits of the calendar month.

Definitions

6. Definitions of the principal items appearing in the tables in this bulletin are as follows:

The labour force comprises all persons who, during survey week, were employed or unemployed, as defined below.

Employed persons comprise all those who, during survey week,

(a) did any work for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind, in a job or business, or on a farm (including employees, employers and self-employed persons), or

- (b) worked fifteen hours or more without pay in a family business (or farm) owned or operated by a relative who was a member of the same household, or
- (c) had a job, business or farm, but were not at work because of illness, accident, leave, holiday or industrial dispute; or because of production hold-up due to bad weather, plant breakdown, etc.

A person who had a job but was temporarily laid off by his employer for the whole week without pay is excluded, and is classified in the tables as unemployed. A person who did some work during the week, however, before he either lost his job or was laid off, is classified as employed. A person who held more than one job is counted only once, in the job at which he worked most hours during survey week.

<u>Unemployed persons</u> comprise all those who, during survey week, did no work at all, and who either:

- (a) did not have a job or business and were actively looking for work (including those who stated that they would have looked for work if they had not been temporarily ill or believed no work was available, or had not already made definite arrangements to start work in a new job after survey week), or
- (b) were laid off from their jobs without pay for the whole week.

A person who either lost his job or was laid off <u>during</u> survey week, but did some work at his job during that week, is classified as employed.

Persons not in the labour force are all those who, during survey week, were not in the categories "employed" or "unemployed", as defined. This category therefore includes persons without a job, business or farm who were not actively looking for work, and who, during survey week, were either keeping house (unpaid), attending school, university, etc., retired or voluntarily idle, permanently unable to work or immates of institutions. A person who worked less than fifteen hours without pay in a family business during survey week is also classified as not in the labour force.

Hours of work relate to actual hours worked during survey week, not hours paid for. Overtime is included and time off is excluded. Estimates of average hours worked and of persons classified according to hours of work may be affected by public holidays, leave, absenteeism, temporary absence from work due to sickness, accidents and industrial disputes, and work stoppages due to bad weather, plant breakdown, etc. If a person worked at more than one job during survey week, the total hours worked at all jobs have been recorded.

Full-time workers are persons who usually work 35 hours or more per week and others who, although usually part-time workers, worked 35 hours or more during survey week.

Part-time workers are persons who usually work less than 35 hours per week and who did so during survey week.

Reliability of the estimates

- 7. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census using the same questionnaires and procedures. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample, and not the whole population, was enumerated. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained from a comparable complete enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 8. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this bulletin. A table of standard errors which is intended to be of general application is therefore given below (Table A). Standard errors of estimates of quarter-to-quarter changes are given in Table B, and approximate standard errors of estimates of the total number of persons in Australia in each of the principal employment status categories, classified by sex only, in Table C.
- 9. The standard errors in these tables are averages based on calculations for a limited number of surveys and are also averages over a wide range of labour force characteristics. These figures thus give not a precise measure but an indication of the magnitude of the standard error of any particular estimate for any particular survey. An example of the use of Table A is as follows: if the estimate obtained from the sample is 100,000 and the standard error is 3 per cent of the estimate, i.e. 3,000, there are about two chances in three that the true figure is within the range 97,000 to 103,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that this figure is between 94,000 and 106,000.
- 10. The quarter-to-quarter change in the level of an estimate is also subject to sampling variability. The standard error of the change will depend on the standard error of the level of the estimate, rather than on the change itself. Final estimates of standard errors of movement have not yet been calculated, but an indication of the magnitude of standard errors of quarter-to-quarter change is given in Table B below. The estimates of standard error of quarter-to-quarter change apply only to estimates of change between two consecutive quarters. Changes between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, or between two other non-consecutive quarters, will generally be subject to somewhat greater sampling variability than is indicated in the table below.

- 11. It should be noted that the standard errors of estimates relating to agricultural employment are generally somewhat higher than the standard errors of other estimates of the same magnitude. Estimates for females also tend to have higher standard errors relative to estimates of equivalent size for males in similar employment categories.
- 12. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the denominator. Percentages quoted in this bulletin, and any other percentages calculated from figures presented herein, have generally somewhat lower proportional standard errors than have the estimates which form the numerators of the percentages, particularly where the percentages are large.
- As the standard errors in Tables A and B show, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates would thus be subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this bulletin, estimates less than 4,000 have not been shown. Although figures for these small components can be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 14. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

Seasonally adjusted series

- 15. Original and seasonally adjusted estimates are shown for persons in the labour force, labour force participation rates and unemployed persons in Table 1. The methods used in seasonally adjusting these statistics are explained in "Seasonally Adjusted Indicators, 1970" (Reference No. 1.10), issued on 29 June 1970.
- NOTE. Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components in tables are due to rounding.
