### LABOUR FORCE EXPERIENCE DURING 1972

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#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

In February 1973 a survey, based on the quarterly population survey, was conducted throughout Australia in order to obtain information about the labour force experience during 1972 of civilians aged fifteen years and over. A preliminary statement containing a summary of the survey results was published on 4 March 1974 (Reference No. 6.38). This bulletin provides estimates in greater detail. The results of a similar survey conducted in February 1969 were published in Labour Force Experience During 1968 (Reference No. 6.26).

#### The population survey

2. The survey is based on a multistage area sample of private dwellings (houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.) and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. In February 1973 about 27,000 private dwellings were included in the sample. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers, the interviews being carried out during a four-week period.

#### Scope

3. The estimates relate to all persons fifteen years of age and over, except members of the permanent armed forces, national servicemen enlisted in the Regular Army Supplement and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from census and estimated populations. Persons who were patients in hospitals and sanatoria, or inmates of goals, reformatories, etc. and for whom, for the purpose of the survey, the institution was regarded as their dwelling, were excluded from the survey.

#### Classification of the labour force

- 4. Each person was assigned to a labour force category for each week in 1972, on the basis of his actual activity (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during that week. The principal categories appearing in the tables in this bulletin are as follows:
  - (i) Persons in the labour force. A person was classified as having been in the labour force during any week in which he was employed or unemployed as defined in (ii) and (iii) below.

- (ii) Employed persons. A person was classified as having been employed during a week if, in that week, he:
  - (a) did any work for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind, in a job or business, or on a farm (including employees, employers and self-employed persons), or
  - (b) worked fifteen hours or more without pay in a family business (or farm), or
  - (c) had a job, business or farm, but was on paid leave (including sick leave).
- (iii) Unemployed persons. A person was classified as having been unemployed during a week if, in that week, he did no work at all, and either
  - (a) did not have a job or business and was looking for work, or
  - (b) was laid off from his job without pay for the whole week.
- (iv) Persons out of the labour force are all those who, in any week, were not in the categories "employed" or "unemployed", as defined above. For the purposes of this survey a person who was on strike and who did no work during a week was classified as out of the labour force in that week.
- 5. A person was classified as having worked mostly full-time in 1972 if the number of weeks in which he worked 35 hours or more (full-time work) exceeded or was equal to the number of weeks in which he worked less than 35 hours (part-time work). If the number of weeks worked full-time was less than the number of weeks worked part-time he was classified as having worked mostly part-time. When absent on paid leave (including paid sick leave) he was classified according to the usual hours worked in the job from which he was absent.

#### Industry classification

6. In the survey of labour force experience during 1968 the industry estimates were based on the Classification of Industries used at the 1966 population census. For the present survey, industry was classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC).

NOTE. Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components in tables are due to rounding.

#### TECHNICAL NOTE

#### **Estimation procedure**

Estimates derived from the quarterly population survey are obtained by using a ratio estimation procedure. This procedure ensures that survey estimates conform to the independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than the age and sex distribution within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of the estimates

2. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census using the same questionnaires and procedures. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which

indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample, and not the whole population, was enumerated. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have obtained from a comparable complete enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. A table of standard errors which is intended to be of general application is given below. An example of the use of this table is as follows: if the estimate obtained from the sample is 100,000 and the standard error is 3.0 per cent of the estimate, i.e. 3,000, there are about two chances in three that the true figure is within the range and about nineteen chances in 97.000 to 103.000 twenty that this figure is between 94,000 and 106,000.

- 3. In the tables in this bulletin only estimates of 4,000 or over have been shown, as smaller estimates would be subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. Although, in some cases, figures for these small components can be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 4. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. Percentages calculated from figures in this bulletin have generally somewhat lower standard errors (proportionally) than

have the estimates which form the numerators of the percentages, particularly where the percentages are large.

5. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
