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
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EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

In association with the February 1982 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia, persons aged fifteen years and over were asked about their labour force experience during the period February 1981 to February 1982. Information sought included the number of weeks they were employed, looking for work or not in the labour force, the number of spells during which they were looking for work and other aspects of labour force experience.

2. During the two weeks beginning Monday 8 February, 1982, specially trained interviewers asked the questions of a sub-sample of 50,000 of the 69,000 respondents in the February labour force survey.

3. A preliminary publication containing a summary of the survey results was issued on 20 December 1982 (6205.0). Similar surveys were conducted in a number of earlier years, the first relating to 1968. Results were published in *Labour Force Experience, Australia* (6206.0). However, see paragraph 13 regarding the change in February 1981 to the reference period for the survey.

Scope

4. The survey included all civilians aged fifteen years and over except:

- (a) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- (b) overseas visitors holidaying in Australia;
- (c) dependants of non-Australian defence forces personnel stationed in Australia;
- (d) students boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria, inmates of jails, reformatories, etc.

5. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1982. Because of emigration, deaths and other exits not all persons with labour force experience during the period are covered. Labour force experience may relate to experience outside Australia.

Definitions

6. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to an extended period which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. For this survey, each person was assigned to a labour force category for each week during the period February 1981 to February 1982 on the basis of his *reported activity* (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during that week. Thus, estimates in this publication differ from estimates published in *The Labour Force, Australia, February 1982* (6203.0) because of differences in definitions applied in the two surveys. 7. The *labour force* comprises all persons who, during any week, are employed or looking for work as defined in paragraphs 8 and 9.

8. *Employed persons*. Persons are classified as employed for those weeks they report having either worked or being on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are excluded.

9. Persons are classified as *looking for work* for those weeks they report as being out of work and looking for a job.

10. Persons not in the labour force are those who, during any week, are neither employed nor looking for work, as defined in paragraphs 8 and 9.

- 11. For the purposes of the survey, a job is defined as:
 - (a) employment as a wage or salary earner (or unpaid family helper) by a particular employer, in a particular locality; or
 - (b) self-employment (with or without employees) in a particular locality.

12. Locality. In capital cities and major towns each suburb is considered to be a different locality.

Discontinuity in the series

13. The estimates in this publication are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The reference period for the February 1980 and prior surveys was the previous calendar year (e.g. 1 January to 31 December 1979). The reference period for the February 1981 and 1982 surveys was from the beginning of the previous February to the end of the week prior to interview. As interviews were conducted over the second and third week of February, the reference period could extend to 54 weeks. For the February 1983 survey the reference period is the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. Due to the change in the reference period timing, some estimates, particularly those for groups who enter the labour force during the earlier months of the year (e.g. 15 to 19 year olds) will also be affected from February 1981 survey onwards.

14. In the February 1982 survey, persons who answered they had been in their current job for a year or longer but who also reported having actually worked for less than the whole period were not counted as out of the labour force for the remainder of the period. In all other years these persons were counted as out of the labour force for that time. In consequence, the February 1982 estimate of persons out of the labour force during all or part of the period is 512,300 persons (249,100 males and 263,200 females) less than the figures which would have been obtained with the procedures used in other years.

Reliability of the estimates

15. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:

- (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability; that is they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error. More information about this topic will be found in the Technical note.
- (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.





SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Summary of Labour Force Experience of the Population

Of the 11,028,000 civilians aged fifteen years and over at February 1982, 7,536,300 had been in the labour force at some time during the previous twelve months (see Diagram 1). 4,754,700 (63.1 per cent) had worked for the whole period, 326,600 (4.3 per cent) had not worked at all (i.e. they had looked for work at some time during the period but had not been employed) and 2,455,000 (32.3 per cent) had only worked for part of the period. Two thirds of those who had worked for part of the period had worked for more than six months.






Participation in the Labour Force

Diagram 2 illustrates the patterns of labour force participation over the period February 1981 to February 1982. Females exhibit a greater tendency to move into and out of the labour force than males. For males, 82.8 per cent had participated in the labour force at some time during the period, including the 78.8 per cent who were in the labour force at February 1982. Forfemales, 54.1 per cent had participated in the labour force at some time during the period, including the 44.9 per cent who were in the labour force at February 1982.


Of the males with labour force experience during the period only one in five had not participated for the whole period. About two in five of females with labour force experience had participated for only part of the period.





Labour Force participation, February 1973 to February 1982

Participation rates have remained relatively steady over the last ten years registering a small decline from 62 per cent in February 1973 to 61 per cent in February 1982. Over the same period the proportion of the population who have participated at some time during the year has also remained fairly steady increasing slightly from 67 per cent to 68 per cent. The proportion of the population in the labour force for the majority of the year (49 weeks or more) was 53 per cent in February 1973 and 54 per cent in February 1982. Over the same period the proportion of those participating for part of the year remained steady at 14 per cent.



Unemployment over the twelve month period

The main measure of unemployment is the *unemployment rate* which indicates the proportion of the labour force who are unemployed at a particular point of time. Also of importance is the measure of the incidence of unemployment experienced by individuals in various groups over a given period of time. In this survey, this incidence may be measured as the proportion of those in the labour force at some time during the period February 1981 to February 1982 who had looked for work at some time during that period.

Diagram 4 compares unemployment rates with the incidence of unemployment for males and females of different age groups. At February 1982, 7.0 per cent of the labour force as a whole were unemployed while 17.1 per cent had experienced unemployment at some time during the previous twelve months. Young people were not only subject to higher level of unemployment than older persons but also faced a higher incidence of unemployment. In February 1982, the unemployment rate for 15 to 19 year olds was 17.0 per cent of females and 21.5 per cent for females, while over the twelve month period 37.2 per cent of males and 44.2 per cent of females participating in the labour force had experienced unemployment. In contrast, the unemployment rate for 45 to 54 year olds was 3.4 per cent, and 7.5 per cent had experienced unemployment.

These results indicate the effects of different durations of unemployment amongst different age groups. Large numbers of young persons are unemployed at any one time, but their unemployment tends to be of short duration resulting in a large number of episodes of unemployment over a twelve month period affecting many people. In contrast, few older persons are unemployed, but they tend to suffer long periods out of work.



Activity of persons out of the labour force

Diagram 5 illustrates the major activity of persons out of the labour force. Of the 3,756,700 females who were out of the labour force at some time during the twelve months February 1981 to February 1982, 2,644,900 (70.4 per cent) kept house while they were out of the labour force. 380,100 (10.1 per cent) were studying and 331,700 (8.8 per cent) had retired. In contrast half of the 1,877,200 males out of the labour force at some time during the twelve months were retirees (947,400 or 50.5 per cent). A further 385,100 (20.5 per cent) were studying.




DIAGRAM 5. ACTIVITY WHEN OUT OF THE LABOUR FORCE (Source of Data: Table 21)

Estimation procedure


The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

Since the estimates in this publication are based on 2 information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

4. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 1 shows the estimated number of married females employed at some time during the period February 1981 to February 1982 was 1,727,100. Since this estimate is between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 the standard error for Australia will be between 10,400 and 13,000, and can be approximated as 12,300 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 1,714,800 to 1,739,400 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 1,702,500 and 1,751,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



5. As can be seen from the standard error table, *the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error.* Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

7. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, these females as a proportion of all married females (3,525,800) is shown in Table 3 as 49.0 per cent. The standard error for 3,525,800 is approximately 15,100 so the relative standard error is 0.4 per cent. The relative standard error for 1,727,100 is 0.7 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(0.7)^2-(0.4)^2}$ or 0.8 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (49.0 per cent) of 0.4 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of married females employed at some time during the period is between 48.6 per cent and 49.4 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 48.2 per cent to 49.8 per cent.

8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y)=
$$\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula is strictly applicable only to differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication. 9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error* and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
