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


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Participation in the labour force

An estimated 8,745,700 persons aged 15 and over had participated in the labour force at some time during the twelve months ending February 1989. The proportion of persons who had participated in the labour force at some time in the twelve months to February has increased from 68 per cent in 1981 to 70 per cent in 1989. Over this eight year period, male participation in the labour force fell from 83 per cent in February 1981 to 80 per cent in February 1989, whereas female participation increased from 54 per cent in February 1981 to 59 per cent in February 1989.



For males aged between 20 and 54 years, participation rates were greater than 90 per cent with the highest participation rate being for the 25-34 age group. For females the highest participation rate was 86 per cent for the 20-24 age group.





Aggregate participation rates for married persons and not-married persons were each 70 per cent, but significant differences emerged for particular age and sex groups.

Married males had higher participation rates than not-married males in all age groups. In the 45-54 age group the participation rate for married males was 93 per cent compared with 85 per cent for not-married males.

Conversely, married females had lower participation rates than not-married females in almost all age groups. The largest difference was in the 20-24 age group, where married females had a participation rate of 75 per cent compared with 92 per cent for not-married females.

Persons who participated in the labour force can be assigned to three groups; those who worked at some time during the year, those who looked for work at some time during the year, and those who had been not in the labour force at some time during the year. These groups are not mutually exclusive as it is possible for an individual to be in more than one of the groups over the course of a twelve month period. Diagram 3 shows the extent to which this happened.






For instance, 593,000 persons, or 5 per cent of all persons at February 1989, had worked at some time, and also looked for work at some time but at no time during the year had they been not in the labour force. Similarly, 5,610,300 persons (45 per cent) had worked for the whole year. A further example; 502,900 persons (4 per cent) worked at some time, looked for work at some time, and were not in the labour force at some time during the year ending February 1989.

Persons who worked at some time during the year

The trends in labour force participation are depicted in Diagram 4. The rate was 65 per cent in 1981, fell to 63 per cent in 1984 and 1985, and has risen to the current estimate of 66 per cent.

The rise in the proportion of females working at some time in the previous 12 months, from 50 per cent in 1981 to 55 per cent in 1989, was accompanied by the corresponding decline in proportions of males, from 81 per cent in 1981 to the low of 76 per cent in 1988, and was 77 per cent in 1989.




Some 8,278,300 persons had worked at some time during the year ending February 1989. Of these persons—


- 5,610,300 (68 per cent) had worked for the full 52 weeks
- · 74 per cent of male workers had worked for 52 weeks, compared with 59 per cent of female workers
- 88 per cent of male workers had worked all their weeks on a full-time basis (93 per cent for married males)
- 37 per cent of female workers had worked all their weeks on a part-time basis (44 per cent for married females)

Persons who looked for work at some time during the year

An estimated 1,603,200 persons looked for work at some time during the year ending February 1989. This represents 13 per cent of all persons aged 15 and over. The proportion of persons who had looked for work in the period prior to interview has varied considerably, as shown in Diagram 5, from the 1981 estimate of 11 per cent to 13 per cent in February 1989.

The proportion of males who had looked for work remained higher than the corresponding proportion of females for all years. These proportions were estimated at 14 per cent and 12 per cent respectively in February 1989.





The survey shows that the proportion of persons who had looked for work during the year decreases with age, and the average duration of looking for work increases. Thus, while 30 per cent of 15 to 19 year olds had looked for work with an average duration of 13.4 weeks, 3 per cent of persons aged 55 and over had looked for work for an average 29.7 weeks.

Persons not in the labour force at some time

An estimated 6,208,100 persons were not in the labour force at some time during the year, with 3,814,200 (61 per cent) not in the labour force for the whole year.

Females outnumbered males by almost 2 to 1 (4,000,800 to 2,207,300), with married females being the largest major demographic group. There were, in fact, more married females than males (married or not) out of the labour force at some time during the year ending February 1989.

#### APPENDIX A

#### **GLOSSARY**

Average duration of time spent looking for work: obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been looking for work by the number of persons in that group.

Certificate or diploma: completion of an approved certificate or diploma in secretarial or business studies, administration, teaching, nursing, etc.

Degree: a bachelor degree (including honours), a graduate or post-graduate diploma, masters degree or a doctorate.

Educational attainment: measures the highest qualification obtained by the respondent. Qualifications may include those obtained at other than educational institutions (e.g. nursing qualifications obtained at a hospital).

Highest level of secondary school available: the highest level of secondary schooling (or equivalent) offered by the education system at the time the respondent left school.

In the labour force: persons who were reported as having either worked or looked for work.

Looked for work: persons who were reported as being out of work and looking for a job.

Median duration of time spent looking for work: the duration which divides persons who looked for work into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose time spent looking for work during the year is above the median, and the other, persons whose time spent looking for work is below it.

Multiple jobholders: all persons who had more than one job in any one week during the reference period. Persons who had more than one job in a week solely by reason of changing jobs were not counted as multiple jobholders.

Not in the labour force: during any week of the reference period, persons who reported as having neither worked nor looked for work were classified as not in the labour force for that week.

Number of spells of looking for work during the year: the number of different periods, including the current period,

during which persons were reported as having been out of work and looking for a job.

Other post-school qualification: completion of other types of education, e.g. adult education, preparatory/bridging course or hobby course.

Post-school qualification: qualifications held by those persons who had left school and answered 'Yes' to the question: 'Since leaving school have you obtained a trade qualification, certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification?'. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification: Degree; Trade qualification or apprenticeship; Certificate or diploma; Other post-school qualification.

Still at school: current school attendance was recorded only for persons aged fifteen to twenty years.

Time in the labour force during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked or looked for work.

Time not in the labour force during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having neither worked nor looked for work.

Time spent looking for work during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as being out of work and looking for a job.

Time worked during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked or been on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are not classified as work.

Trade qualification or apprenticeship: completion of an approved trade/technical apprenticeship in fitting and turning, hairdressing, plumbing, carpentry, etc.

Reference period: the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. See also paragraph 13 of the Explanatory Notes, Appendix B.

Worked: persons who were reported as having either worked or been on paid leave.

#### APPENDIX B

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

The monthly population survey (which is described in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the February 1989 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. For a sub-sample of respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked the length of time they worked, looked for work or were not in the labour force, the number of spells during which they looked for work and other aspects of labour force experience for the 52 weeks up to the end of the week before the interview.

#### Scope

- 3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0)) except that it excluded visitors to private dwellings, students who were boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of reformatories, gaols, etc.
- 4. In the tables, 'All Persons' refers to all persons within the scope of the survey.

#### Coverage

5. In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

#### **Definitions**

- 6. Definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0).
- 7. Labour force experience characteristics relate to the 52 weeks up to the end of the week before the interview. Unless otherwise stated, all other characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.

#### Results of the survey

- 8. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1989. Because of emigration, deaths, etc., not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour force experience may relate to experience outside Australia.
- 9. Results of similar surveys, conducted in February 1969, 1973, 1975, 1976, 1977 and annually since

February 1979, have been given in previous issues of this publication.

10. It is proposed that this survey will be conducted next in March 1990.

#### Unpublished statistics

11. As well as the statistics included in this and related publications, the ABS may have other relevant unpublished data available. Inquiries should be made to the contact in the Phone Inquiries box at the front of this publication.

#### Comparability of series

12. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference week. For the survey of labour force experience, a person is assigned to a labour force category for each of the weeks in the year on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms worked and looked for work are used in this survey rather than the rigidly defined terms employed and unemployed used in the monthly labour force survey.

#### Discontinuities in the series

- 13. The estimates for surveys held from February 1983 are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The reference period for the February 1980 and prior surveys was the previous calendar year (e.g. 1 January to 31 December 1979). The reference period for the February 1981 and 1982 surveys was from the beginning of the previous February to the end of the week prior to interview. As interviews were conducted over the second and third week of February, the reference period could have extended to 54 weeks. From the February 1983 survey onwards the reference period has been the 52 weeks up to the end of the week before the interview. Due to the change in the reference period timing, some estimates, particularly those for groups who entered the labour force during the earlier months of the year (e.g. 15 to 19 year olds), will also be affected from the February 1981 survey onwards.
- 14. In the February 1981 survey, persons who answered that they had been in their current job for a year or longer but who also reported having actually worked for less than the whole period were not counted as not in the labour force for the remainder of the period. In all other years these persons were counted as not in the labour force for that time. In consequence, the February 1981 estimate of persons not in the labour force during all or part of the period is 512,300 persons (249,100 males and

263,200 females) less than that which would have been obtained with the procedures used in other years.

- 15. Since February 1987, an expanded classification of post-school qualifications has been used. As a result, a small number of persons previously categorised as 'Degree' or 'Other' may now be included in the categories 'Trade qualification or apprenticeship' or 'Certificate or diploma'.
- 16. The February 1989 data has been weighted to conform to population estimates based on the 1986 Population Census. Data from the February 1984 to 1988 surveys were based on estimates from the 1981 Population Census, while the February 1981 to 1983 survey data were based on estimates from the 1976 Census.

#### Survey sample redesign

17. The labour force survey sample has been redesigned and reselected using information collected in the 1986 Population Census. As a result, the standard errors in this Supplementary Survey differ from those for surveys of the same topic run prior to September 1987. For details, see Information Paper — Labour Force Survey — Sample Design (6269.0).

#### Sample size

18. For operational reasons, the sample size of this survey (about 16,000 dwellings) was restricted to half the sample size of the labour force survey. (In previous years this supplementary survey has been conducted on 75 per cent of the dwellings selected in the labour force survey). As a result the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to the February 1988 survey.

#### Estimation procedure

19. The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, gender and labour force status, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

#### Reliability of the estimates

20. Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For more information refer to the Technical Note, Appendix C.

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
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#### APPENDIX C

#### **TECHNICAL NOTE**

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

- 2. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 3. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 2 shows the estimated number of married females who worked at some time during the year ending February 1989 was 2,108,900. Since this estimate is between 2,000,000 and 5,000,000, the standard error for Australia will be between 20,200 and 27,900 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 20,500 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 2,088,400 to 2,129,400 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 2,067,900 and 2,149,900. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



- 4. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors less than 25 per cent are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.
- 5. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

- 6. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, these females as a proportion of all married females (3,841,900) is shown in Table 2 as 54.9 per cent. The standard error for 3,841,900 is approximately 24,900 so the relative standard error is 0.6 per cent. The relative standard error for 2,108,900 is 0.9 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(0.9)^2 (0.6)^2}$  or 0.7 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (54.9 per cent) of 0.4 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of married females who worked at some time during the year is between 54.5 per cent and 55.3 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty that the proportion is within the range 54.1 per cent to 55.7 per cent.
- 7. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) = 
$$\sqrt{[SE (x)]^2 + [SE (y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

8. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused

with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count

or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
